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Please Don't Send Your Email Password When Requested

Dear Campus Community Member,

In the last several days, we have seen a several very sophisticated e-mail scams that have been forwarded to campus, masquerading as a communication from ITS. They can look quite legitimate, with language that sounds official and even using what appears to be Alfred University images. All these e-mails have one thing in common: they are seeking your username and password, in an attempt to utilize your account to send spam to off-campus e-mail users.

ITS will never request your username and password via e-mail.

In addition, if you have any concerns about an e-mail, please contact the ITS Helpdesk at helpdesk@alfred.edu or extension 2222.

Spam and scam e-mails are particularly problematic for campus IT departments as over 90% of all e-mails that reach our campus are spam. We spend a great deal of time and resources filtering the few legitimate e-mails from the vast quantity of spam that is sent to campus. Unfortunately, despite great efforts, a few of these e-mails do get through to campus users.

We apologize for the inconvenience; these e-mails can be problematic for the wider campus community. We continue to explore ever-increasingly sophisticated technologies to counter these resourceful spamming/scamming techniques.

Please continue to disregard e-mails advising you that your account has been updated and requesting user names and passwords. If you have any questions about the legitimacy of any e-mail, please contact the ITS Helpdesk before responding.
