The fourth recital in the Wingate Summer Carillon Series will feature Gordon Slater from Ottawa, Canada. Gordon Slater held a position as a church organist and choir director as well as four carillon positions. He has conducted orchestras, choirs, bands and musicals in Toronto and Ottawa and is now retired from the position of Dominion Carillonist of Canada after 31 years of service playing the Peace Tower Carillon in Ottawa. ♦ Slater ♦ tours widely as a carillonist and clinician. He has been Music Director of Divertimento Orchestra since 1987 and plays bassoon and contrabassoon with the Ottawa Symphony Orchestra.

This free recital which starts at 7 pm on Tuesday, July 26, will include less familiar works such as Suite for Lute by Weiss and Suite for Guitar by de Visee and familiar pieces such as "The Bells of St. Mary's", "Shenandoah" and "America the Beautiful". The recital will be held rain or shine. Indoor seating will be available in Howell Hall in the event of rain.

### Lecture: 'Harriet Tubman: Myth, Memory, and History'

This illustrated lecture tell the story of how a poor and illiterate black woman, once enslaved but self-liberated, became the dominant symbol of the Underground Railroad and an inspiration for Americans of diverse backgrounds and reform interests. The audience will hear of the exciting findings of the latest research regarding Tubman the historical person, and of the many ways in which her life has been celebrated by writers, artists, and other creative spirits.

Dr. Sernett has completed a book on the interplay of myth, memory, and history during the years when Tubman was being canonized as an American Saint. Dr. Sernett returns for a third lecture sponsored by a grant from the NY Council on the Humanities and its Speakers in the Humanities Program.

The lecture is free and open to all .
