

Alfred University honors employees at Recognition Reception

ALFRED, NY Alfred University held its first annual All Employee Recognition Reception on Tuesday (May 8), honoring retirees as well as employees for years of service to the University.

The University also recognized recipients of three new awards. Cathy Schnurle, secretary in the Financial Aid office, won the Cathy Johnson Service Award; Tricia Debertolis, associate dean of students, received the Saxon Service Award; and Nadine Shardlow, director of opportunity programs, won the Bob Condrate Lifelong Learner Award.

The Cathy Johnson Service Award recognizes high standards of professionalism; proactive engagement with tasks; and attention to detail and the utmost care for quality in presentation while completing tasks. In offering her name for consideration of the award, nominators said this of Schnurle:

“To watch Cathy in action is like a master&s class in how to represent Alfred University,” and “Cathy has always remained, to me, a beacon of how it should be done. I am a better person for having worked with Cathy.”

The award is named for the late Cathy Johnson, assistant to the Dean of the School of Art and Design, who passed away last November at the age of 53. Gerar Edizel, dean of the School of Art and Design at Alfred University, offered some words about Johnson.

“She was super thoughtful. She was kind and caring toward the students, fellow staff members, and the faculty. She was supremely organized; she would not let me near the files,” Edizel said. “She was a model (employee) and this award fits her well. I miss her very much.”

Other nominees for the Cathy Johnson Service Award were: Dan Napolitano, assistant dean of the School of Art and Design; Jill Crandall, assistant director of the Career Development Center; Valerie Daciw, employer relations coordinator, Career Development Center; and Linda Sootheran, technical processes manager, Herrick Memorial

Library.

The Saxon Service Award honors fostering a positive attitude; demonstrating initiative and standing out among the Alfred University community; and exemplifying the purple and gold Saxon spirit.

Some of the comments made about Debertolis in her nominations:

“Tricia has worked tirelessly for so many years to advance the learning and leadership of students in our community as well as cultivating leaders of all gender identities. In addition, she contributes to the local community in so many ways,” and “Tricia is Alfred University and no one wears purple and gold like she does.”

Other nominees for the Saxon Service Award were: Debra Campbell, mail clerk, Office and Procurement Services; Brian Striker, head men’s and women’s swimming and diving coach; and Bethany Stiller, secretary, College of Professional Studies.

Criteria for the Bob Condrate Lifelong Learner Award include: continually seeking further education/professional development to enhance his/her growth; demonstrating a passion for gaining knowledge over a sustained period of time; and proactively shares their knowledge and/or expertise with campus community. The award is named for Bob Condrate, retired professor of spectroscopy in the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University. Condrate has exemplified lifelong learning by continuing in education, having taken more than 250 credit hours of coursework since his retirement nearly two decades ago.

Shardlow earned a bachelor’s degree in clinical psychology from Alfred University in 1986 and has been director of the Higher Education Opportunity Program (HEOP) and Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) at Alfred University since 2000. In 2017, she earned a master’s degree in college student development, completing her journey toward a graduate degree that began years ago, but was put aside so she could focus on work and family.

“Nadine has been hungry for new knowledge that she can apply in her constant focus on learning and the student experience,” one colleague wrote in nominating Shardlow for the honor. Another noted her efforts to continue her training and education by attending workshops and joining professional organizations.

Each of the awards came with a \$1,000 prize. The awards program is funded by William Holley, a 1951 Alfred University graduate, as well as an anonymous donor.
