


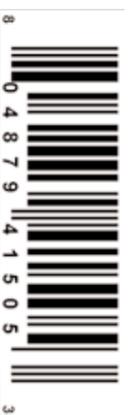

## Like father, like son

*AU to give honorary doctorate to Terry S. Galanis Jr.*

ALFRED—A few weeks ago, 101-year-old Terry S. Galanis Sr. received an honorary doctor of science degree from Alfred University with AU officials delivering the honor in a special ceremony at the family business, Sealing Devices, Inc., that he founded years ago.

Now, his son, Alfred University Trustee Terry S. Galanis, Jr., president and chief executive officer of Sealing Devices, Inc., in Lancaster, will receive a Doctor of Commerce degree, *honoris causa*, at Saturday's Commencement at 10 a.m. in — appropriately enough — the Galanis Family Arena, McLane Center.

"Both Terry Galanis, Sr., and Terry Galanis, Jr., are exemplary businesspeople, who believe family businesses have an obligation to give back to the community," said Alfred University President Mark Zupan. "They live up to that ideal, in every way possible. There are few people who have been so committed to the University as the Galanises."

Galanis, Jr., is a 20-year member of the Alfred University Board of Trustees and chairs its University Advancement Committee.

His affiliation with Alfred University began when Sealing Devices, Inc. won the Family Business Award from the College of Business, leading to the renaming of the award as the Galanis Family Business Award and to Galanis, Jr., joining the board.

A graduate of Hillsdale College, Hillsdale, MI, with a degree in business administration, Galanis, Jr., started his career with Eaton Corporation's Construction Equipment Division in 1970. He rejoined Sealing Devices, the company his father had started in the family garage in 1963, in 1973; as a teen-ager, Terry Galanis, Jr., packed O-rings into plastic bags for distribution to Sealing Devices's customers.

In 1984, when Galanis, Sr., "retired" — a misnomer because even at 101 he still goes to the office most days — Galanis, Jr., took over as president and



CEO, guiding the firm through a sustained period of growth, serving customers in the industrial, aerospace, automotive and telecommunications markets.

The Galanis Family are long-time supporters of Alfred University. They made a gift to create the junior varsity football coach's position, to increase playing opportunities for football recruits, and another to renovate the McLane Center gymnasium, which has been renamed the Galanis Family Arena in their honor.

Galanis, Jr., has been active in the Buffalo community as a member of the boards of the Iroquois High School Foundation, the Conax Corporation, the Gasket Fabricators Association and as a member of the Empire Chapter of Young Presidents' Organization.

He and his wife Nancy are the parents of three daughters: Jessica Kwiteck, Katherine Verni and Elizabeth Miller, and the grandparents of five.

The University will also award 286 baccalaureate degrees; 67 master's degrees; and three doctoral degrees during Saturday's ceremony.

Commencement speaker will be philanthropist and businessperson Dr. Marlin Miller '54, who is member of the Board of Trustees and chair emeritus of the Board. He will receive a Doctor of Arts degree, *honoris causa*, for his support of the visual and performing arts at Alfred University. He received a Doctor of Science degree, *honoris causa*, in 1989.

## Nearly 850 receive degrees

ALFRED—Alfred State College recognized approximately 850 May 2019 graduates during Commencement ceremonies on Sunday, May 12. Dr. Skip Sullivan, president, presided over the event, held at Pioneer Stadium on the Alfred campus.

The student speaker was Hannah Weaver, of Spencerport, a May 2019 graduate of the business administration baccalaureate degree program. Weaver has served as a civic engagement advocate, civic connections coordinator, and student vice president of community, and was named a Newman Civic Fellow by Campus Contact.

During the ceremony, Alfred State conferred an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree to Goya Foods Great Lakes President and former College Council member Robert Drago. Drago joined his family's business, the Bison Canning Company, in 1956, and assumed co-leadership of Bison in 1969 along with his brother, Franklin, and brother-in-law, James Seeley.

Under their guidance, the company became a preferred supplier of private label canned food products among many premier supermarket chains around the US.

In 1991, Bison Canning was purchased by Goya Foods, Inc., the largest Hispanic-owned food company in the United States. As a result, Bison shifted from being a private label processor to an internal supplier of Goya brand canned dry bean products, which can be found in supermarkets throughout the US and offshore.

After Franklin Drago's retirement in 1994, Robert became president of the company. Bison was officially renamed Goya Foods Great Lakes five years later, and the company continues to flourish under Drago's leadership to this day.

Another major component of the ceremony was the presentation of the Paul B. Orvis Award for Excellence to five graduating students. The award honors Paul B. Orvis, a former president of Alfred

State and State University of New York dean for two-year colleges. Recipients must meet the criteria of service, leadership, character, and scholarship.

Receiving the award were Ryan Shipherd, Randolph (School of Applied Technology associate degree recipient); Hannah Weaver, Spencerport (School of Architecture, Management and Engineering Technology baccalaureate degree recipient); Susan Perry, Olean (School of Architecture, Management and Engineering Technology associate degree recipient); Coral Smith, Kings Park (School of Arts and Sciences baccalaureate degree recipient); and Brooke Licata, Conesus (School of Arts and Sciences associate degree recipient).

Abigail Campbell, a construction management graduate from Geneseo, sang the national anthem, and the Alfred State Men's Quartet performed the college's alma mater.

## Alfred Town Board to hold meeting to adopt two laws

ALFRED—The Alfred Town Board will hold a special meeting at 12 noon Thursday, May 23 for the purpose of adopting a pair of local laws.

There was no public comment on either of the two proposed laws at a "public hearing" prior to the board's Thursday, May 9 regular monthly meeting.

Local Law #1 for 2019 is an amendment to the Town Zoning Law to allow for the permitted uses in the Business and Light Industrial Districts to also be included in the Ag District. In essence, it allows "home occupation" in an Ag District with a Special Use Permit.

Local Law #2 for 2019 is proposed to allow the Town of Alfred to temporarily exclude trucks and other similar vehicles exceeding a designated gross weight from highways when such highways would be materially damaged by the operation of such vehicles thereon.

Both laws were subject to the review of the Allegany County Planning Board, which was expected to be completed at a Wednesday, May 15 meeting.

In other business at the May 9 meeting, the Alfred Town Board...

...HEARD A.E. Crandall Hook and Ladder Fire Company President Rebecca Hamm express her concern that Allegany County dispatchers are not honoring the District 4-A mutual aid agreement between Alfred, Alfred Station, Almond and Andover volunteer fire companies, that Medical Transport Services (MTS), a paid service, is being dispatched, which will result in billing of area residents using their services.

...DISCUSSED an anonymous complaint about appearance at former Short's Gas Station with Southern Tier Concrete Product trucks parked there. Ben Palmer, who attended the meeting, was told that his Southern Tier Concrete trucks there are not in violation of the Zoning Law.

### Sara Dagon, 31, one-time Collegiate waitress, struggled with opiate addiction

**HORNELL**—Sara Christine Dagon, 31, of 32 Church St., Hornell, died unexpectedly Saturday, May 4, 2019 at her home.

Born in Hornell on Sept. 12, 1987, she was the youngest daughter of Jim and Patty (Class) Dagon.

Sara grew up in Hornell and attended St. Ann's School. She later graduated from Hornell High School (class of 2005). While in high school, she was a member of the Hornell Swim Team and the HHS Girls Modified Soc-

cer Team. Following high school graduation, Sara attended Alfred State College, Monroe Community College, Finger Lakes Community College at Canandaigua and Buffalo State College. While attending Monroe Community College in Rochester, she was employed as a waitress at Flour City Diner.

For about 10 years, Sara resided in Florida where she worked as a waitress for several restaurants, including Flashback Diner in Ft. Lauderdale and IHOP Diner in Port St. Lucie. Returning to Hornell in 2015, she had served as a waitress at the Country Kitchen in Hornell and The Collegiate in Alfred. Most recently, Sara worked as a Day Care Provider for the Hornell Children's Home, primarily at the After School Program at North Hornell School.

She was a member of Our Lady of the Valley Parish and a communicant of St. Ann's Church. She was also a member of the Hornell Association.

Without a doubt, Sara will be remembered as a warm, compassionate girl who was loved by everyone. She really had no enemies except,

maybe herself. For over 12 years, she struggled with opiate addiction. Throughout the years, Sara tried so hard to stay clean but it seemed almost impossible to do. She would be clean for months at a time and for some reason would relapse. In and out of rehab facilities became the norm.

In January 2018, Sara received the good news that she was expecting a baby. She took the news very, very seriously and was determined to stay clean. On Sept. 6, 2018, Sara gave birth to a beautiful, healthy baby boy - Leo James Dagon. Because of her addiction problems, Sara never thought that she would ever be blessed with a baby. Despite her decade long battle with opiates, Sara fulfilled her lifelong dream of becoming a wonderful, caring and loving mother. But, on Saturday, her demons resurfaced.....

If Sara could speak to the youth of today, she would plead to everyone listening to **BE SCARED OF DRUGS - BE VERY SCARED OF DRUGS - STAY AS FAR AWAY FROM DRUGS AS POSSIBLE!!!**

Sara was preceded in death

by her paternal grandparents, Jim and Rickey Dagon; her maternal grandmother, Rosemary King; her maternal grandfather, Robert Class; her cousin, Jill Andolina; and her uncle, Larry Clark.

Survivors include her 8-month-old son, Leo James Dagon; her parents, Jim and Patty Dagon of Hornell; three sisters, Laura (Dr. Pasquale) Picco of Hornell, Jenny (Jeff) Reynolds of Arkport and Erin (Erik) Werner of North Hornell; her nieces and nephews, Nicholas Picco, Gennaro Picco, Pasquale "PJ" Picco, Marco Picco, Hannah Reynolds, Ethan Reynolds, Bryant Reynolds, Logan Werner, Harrison Werner and Evelyn Werner; and many aunts, uncles & cousins.

## Box of Books Library hosting Alfred House Tour on June 7

ALFRED—The Alfred Box of Books Library is hosting its first ever Alfred House Tour, to be held from 3 to 7 p.m. Friday, June 7.

The self-guided tour includes stops at: The John and Andrea Gill House, The Lesley Brill and Megan Parry House, The Cory and Caitlin Brown House (former Sun Publishing), The Al and Carlyn Yanda House, The Burdick-Saunders House (Klan Alpine), The Craig and Becky Prophet House, The Carnegie Administration Building (from 4-7 p.m.), and The Gothic.

Included in the tour will be a Welcome Center at the Box of Books, where curated displays will provide additional information and refreshments will be offered as part of the ticket price. Souvenir booklets describing all of the sites will also be available to tour participants at the library.

Planned as a walking tour, it is estimated to take about two hours to complete. It is possible, however, to drive between stops as there will be some limited parking available at or near each site. Attendees might choose to drive to the farther points on the tour and walk to those sites closer to the Box of Books Library.

The Tour will be held in conjunction with "Makers on Main," an inaugural event organized by the Village of Alfred in conjunction with Alfred University's Reunion Weekend. Because the House Tour is designed to be flexible, participants can enjoy all that both events have to offer.

The Library has enjoyed strong support from the community for which we are most grateful. While the staff and trustees have done all they can do to make the best use of the space available and to meet standards, it became evident following a 2018 site visit and subsequent report prepared by Butler, Roland, Mays Architects, LLP, that the Box of Books building in its current condition is inadequate and does not comply with accessibility standards. While NY State grants are available to libraries to assist with circumstances such as these, the grants require matching funds over and above those funds that normal operating budgets provide.

Come and learn some of the history behind these houses, as well as what the current owners have done and are planning to do. Area residents' participation in the House Tour will help the Box of Books in its mission to remain the important element in Alfred life that is has been over the years.

## Spring good time to talk vegetables

[Editor's Note: Like most of the recipes she shared with our readers over the past couple of decades, Ellen Shultz's Sunny Side Up columns are worth repeating.]

Let's talk vegetables. Even though our supermarkets have vegetables year round that used to be just seasonal, when spring comes it just seems that we begin to think about those wonderful vegetables that tasted so good coming right from the garden to the table. Though not a vegetarian, I crave lots of vegetables in salads and cooked in creative ways.

This recipe was found in a new magazine called Cooking Pleasures which is published by the Cooking Club of America in Minnesota. They started to send me the magazine, probably because I subscribe to some gourmet magazines. Their recipes are down-to-earth, easy to make, and delicious. Try this one:

### Roasted Ratatouille Pasta

| 1 med. yellow bell pepper, cut in wedges  | 1/2 tsp. salt                        |
| 1 med. zucchini, thinly sliced            | 1/2 tsp. fresh ground pepper         |
| 1 med. onion, thinly sliced               | 12 oz. campanelle                    |
| 1 small eggplant, unpeeled, thinly sliced | 1 1/2 oz. can Italian diced tomatoes |
| 2 T. olive oil                            | 1/4 c. slivered fresh basil          |
| 4 garlic cloves, thinly sliced            | 1/4 c. grated Romano cheese          |

heat oven to 450 degrees. Spray two rimmed baking sheets with nonstick cooking spray. Arrange bell pepper, zucchini, onion and eggplant in single layer on baking sheets. Brush with oil, sprinkle with garlic, salt, and pepper. Bake 10 to 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender and golden brown with charred edges. Remove from oven, coarsely chop. Meanwhile, cook campanelle in large pot of boiling water according to package directions. Drain, leaving about 1/4 c. of the cooking water in pot. Return campanelle to pot. Add roasted vegetables, tomatoes and basil; toss to blend well. Serve pasta sprinkled with cheese. 4 servings.





# Hornell Hibernians sponsor Irish keynote speaker

ANDOVER—Dr. Donncha MacGabhann, artist and Celtic arts scholar from County Limerick, will be the keynote speaker at the upcoming International Day of Celtic Art Conference to be held June 7-9 in Andover. Grants from the Hornell Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Lady Hibernians, Daughters of Erin are sponsoring Dr. MacGabhann's travel expenses.

After retiring from a career as a high school art teacher in rural Ireland, MacGabhann followed his keen interest in the ancient Celtic art of his homeland and earned his PhD in 2016. The making of early medieval masterpiece The Book of Kells is the subject of his doctoral thesis. He has been invited to speak on the subject in Scotland and Ireland, published ar-

ticles on Celtic art and was a visiting research associate at Trinity College Dublin.

His presentation at the conference is titled "A Magnificent Obsession; An Artist's Response to the Book of Kells."


While in Western New York, Dr. MacGabhann will also be lending his expertise to a project to recover and restore extensive Celtic Revival murals at Holy Family Church in South Buffalo. The designs were placed in the interior of the church in 1935 by Danish artist Frode Rambusch, who drew inspiration from medieval Celtic Gospel manuscripts.

Due to deterioration caused by air pollution from the nearby steel mills and changes in taste, these artistic treasures were painted over in the

1960s. The restoration project is being done by Swiatek Studios of Buffalo, which recently carried out the restoration of Immaculate Conception Church in Wellsville.

Dr. MacGabhann's lecture will be at 11 a.m. Friday, June 7 at the former Andover Methodist Church, which is now Andover Village Hall, on the corner of East Greenwood and Church Streets. There is no charge to attend this or any of the other presentations at the conference, however there is a registration fee for attendees who wish to participate in the catered meals that are available.

## Nutrition in a Nutshell

### Immune System: Our Microbial World Part 1/3

When we have a cold, flu, or other immune illnesses, we often attribute them to a bacteria or virus without knowing what these terms actually mean. I will explain these and other terms by defining microbes that make up and interact with our bodies. This process will equip us to better understand how microbes impact our bodies and, in turn, we'll learn how to better support our immune system.

The word, microbe, comes from the Greek word "microorganism" which literally means "any small living form of life." It can typically be broken down into five categories--fungi, algae, protozoa, bacteria and viruses. Many microbes are extremely beneficial to humans. They remove wastes and toxins; recycle that waste; keep our mouths, skin and gut healthy; act as enzymes and breakdown our food; and perform many other incredible unseen functions!

Our first stop is a look at the largest category of microbes which are not always microscopic--the fungus: any group of spore-producing organisms that feed on organic matter which include molds, yeasts, mushrooms, and toadstools.

Unlike plants, fungi have no chlorophyll. They live off of other plants and animals, which makes them a parasite. [1] There are millions of different species of fungi on the earth, and only about 300 of these are known to cause sickness when they become present or overgrown in a weakened immune system.

A common example of a fungus gone wrong is Candidiasis: an overgrowth of the yeast

Candida in the mouth, throat, gut, and vagina. Symptoms of this manifests as thrush, yeast infections, acne, toe fungus, and sugar cravings.

On the other hand, a fungus that provides incredible benefits to our body is the mushroom. Various species of mushrooms provide the body with a rich supply of vitamins, minerals, enzymes and antioxidants that fight free radicals and prevent cancer.

Some mushrooms are capable of "inhibiting viruses and decrease the severity of illness in those who are already sick. For example, certain types of mushrooms are shown to increase production of B and T lymphocytes, which are the crucial immune cells that help control our response to pathogens (harmful bacteria), viruses, toxins and other substances that can make us fall victim to disease." [2] Some of the incredible mushrooms to add to your diet include white button, reishi, shiitake, cordyceps, and enoki.

Next time we will take a look at protozoa and algae before finishing up with a thorough discussion of bacteria and viruses.


# Knights Creek Church offers series on dealing with life's struggles

# A-A District Election to be held Tuesday, May 21

ALMOND—Alfred-Almond Central School District residents will go to the polls from 1 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, May 21 in the annual district election.

The school board is seeking voter approval of a proposed budget of \$14,156,270, the purchase of one 66-passenger school bus and a \$4.5 million capital project that will not increase the tax levy.

The \$14 million spending plan for 2019-20 is under the state mandated 2 percent Tax Cap and property owners in the district will receive their state-

issued tax refund check.

A recently mailed district newsletter reported that there will be no increase in taxes, or a 0 percent tax increase.

The proposed \$4.5 million capital project will include a number of critical improvements to the school district's physical plant:

Also on the ballot, long-time A-A School Board President Earl Pierce is unopposed in his bid for another five-year term on the school board.

In addition, a proposition asks for approval to authorize a levy in the

amount of \$183,323 annually, with annual distribution being \$98,960 to the Alfred Box of Books Library and \$84,363 to the Almond Library.

Voter registration for eligible Alfred-Almond Central School District residents will be held from 2 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 7 in the high school auditorium.

To be eligible to vote in the district election, a person must be a citizen of the United States, 18 years of age on or before the election, a resident of the district for 30 days prior to the vote,

and must be registered as a qualified voter.

Absentee ballots are available for voting purposes but applications must be received by the district clerk at least seven days before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter or one day prior to the vote, if the ballot will be picked up in person. The applications are available from the District Office.

Polls will be open from 1 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, May 21 in the Alfred-Almond high school auditorium.

# Immigration attorney recognized for work by FBI

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Alfred University alumna Emma Buckthal was recognized by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for her work as an immigration attorney, which includes advocating for victims of human trafficking and domestic violence.

Buckthal, who earned a B.A. degree in history and philosophy from Alfred University in 2005, is supervising immigration attorney at the Erie County Bar Association's Volunteer Lawyer's Project in Buffalo. She was among several recipients of the 2018 Director's Community Leadership Award, presented by FBI Director Christopher Wray at a ceremony on Friday, May 3 at the FBI headquarters in Washington, D.C.

The Erie County Bar Association's Volunteer Lawyer's

Project provides free civil legal services to low income individuals and small not-for-profits in the greater Western New York region. The practice focuses on cases of domestic violence, crime victims, trafficking, and unaccompanied minors.

Recipients of Director's Community Leadership Award, selected by area FBI field offices, are recognized for outstanding contributions to their local communities through service. Buckthal was chosen for the award by the Buffalo FBI field office.

According to an FBI press release, Buckthal, "a passionate advocate for victims of trafficking," was honored for her work "with migrant communities that might be vulnerable to traffickers" and building "strong relationships with law enforcement."

Buckthal gains satisfaction knowing she has played a role in giving immigrants a chance to achieve the American Dream. She cited one client she represented who completed her training as a licensed practical nurse and who is now working to become a registered nurse; and another who earned an associate's degree with a 3.92 GPA, who transferred to a four-year college and was honored as a top adult learner.

"I love watching the new lives my clients make with the opportunities they can access when they're able to live and work legally in the U.S.," Buckthal said. "They are going places and I am so glad that I am the one who freed them to use their talents to help others."

After graduating from Alfred University, Buckthal

earned her law degree from the University at Buffalo in 2010 and that year joined the Volunteer Lawyer's Project. She was promoted to senior immigration staff attorney in

2016 and supervising immigration staff attorney in 2018. In 2016, she was named New Lawyer of the Year by the Women's Bar Association of the State of New York.

# AU student leadership course about A's and G's

ALFRED—Members of Alfred University's LEAD 300 leadership class were competing for the A's, as in grades, and the G's, as in a share of a \$5,000 prize.

Co-taught by Alfred University President Mark Zupan and Gabrielle Gaustad, dean of the Inamori School of Engineering, "LEAD 300: Improving Alfred University" is the first course in a sequence that will lead to a newly developed minor in leadership.

To add some excitement to the course, Trustee Charlie Joyce and Sherry Walton '80, '88 MS, offered a \$10,000 prize, with \$5,000 to be shared among the team members, and another \$5,000 to the University to help implement the winning program.

Each team had to identify a problem and propose a solution. The winning entry, determined by judges including Greg Connors '92, chairman of the Alfred University

Board of Trustees; Yasmin Mattox '07 and Josh Dahlman '97, as well as Joyce and Walton, was "Alfred HELLO." Team members Victoria Cramp '20, Angelica Sudore '20, Emma Karch '20 and Marquis Russ '20 suggested using videos to communicate with alumni, as well as other "key constituencies," such as faculty and staff, current and prospective students.

The videos would be crowd-sourced, submitted by students, with a student oversight team to cull out the best items to distribute via a video messaging service. Also providing oversight would be a faculty member and the University Marketing and Communications Team. The end goal, according to team members, is to increase alumni engagement and encourage support of the University.

Walton praised the Alfred HELLO group. "They did their research. The presentation was both oral and visual, and included current statistics and desired goals." Additionally, she noted, the concept is "sustainable and makes good use of technology (email, video and crowd-sourcing.)

A similar experience

through an independent study course when she was a student at AU "allowed me to put my education to work. I was able to expand my knowledge base beyond the classroom," Walton said.

"I was impressed by all the participants' knowledge of and enthusiasm for their projects," Joyce said, adding he thinks the LEAD 300 course "is a major winner."

Judges were asked to select the idea that "would most advance our University," said Zupan.

While Alfred HELLO team members walked away with the prize money, the other teams' projects "were also deemed to be meritorious by the judges, and will be beneficial to our University," Zupan said.

Some may be implemented right away as well, he noted. "AU Fast and Fresh" team, for example, suggested vending machines, stocked with fresh, healthy food options, be placed around campus for the benefit of students who might miss a meal due to scheduling conflicts. AVI Fresh, the University's food service provider, has already agreed to place a vending machine

with healthy options in the Joyce and Walton Wellness Center, adjacent to McLane Physical Education Center.

Members of the "AU Fast and Fresh" team were Rug-giany Georges '20; Samantha Gleason '21; Shannon Mendola '21 and Alexandra Taylor '20.

"Fostering our Future" has a 10-year plan for making Foster Lake a more highly utilized facility with a lot of great ideas," said Zupan.

Members of that team were graduate students David Dobesh '19 MS Glass Science; Andrew King '19 MS Materials Science and Engineering; Sean Locker '20 PhD Glass Science; and Robin Mazejka.

University Advancement and Enrollment Management will implement several ideas offered by the "Fiat LINKS" team as well, he said.

Tiffany Gannon '19; Julio Fuentes '25; Anastasia Campbell '20; Dillon Smith '20; and Victor Liz Lascano '22 were members of the "Fiat LINKS" team.

# Athletic Department hosts End of Year Award ceremony

The Alfred State athletic department celebrated the 2018-19 athletic year recently by hosting the annual End of Year Award ceremonies.

**Pioneer Legacy Award:** Given to the male and female athletes who have achieved success on and off the field throughout their career at Alfred State. The nominees have demonstrated Sportsmanship and Leadership, been involved in Civic Engagement activities, along with earning athletic honors during their career. 2019 Honorees: Maddie Webster & Juwan Toliver

Webster was a four year starter on the volleyball team. This year she moved from her libero position to an outside hitter role to benefit the team and was named 1st team All-ACAA this year after being named 2nd team after her junior season. She finished this season with 282 digs, 231 kills, and 54 service aces and ends her career at Alfred State as the all-time leader with 1,423 digs. She is credited for being an outstanding representative of Alfred State and the athletic department on and off the court. Off the court she was very active with the Business Professionals Association and the Financial Planning Association. During her career she evolved into a great leader and set a great example of what it means to evolve as a student athlete.

Toliver was a four year member of the basketball team. He was a 1st team All-ACAA selection this year after being named the ACAA Player of the Year and 1st team All-ACAA last season. He finished his career with 735 points, 434 rebounds, 344 assists, and 165 steals in 83 games. Toliver helped lead the Pioneers to three straight postseason appearances. He is credited for showing great improvement throughout his career, for filling the stat sheet, and producing highlight film plays on a consistent basis. Toliver was a team leader with a smile on his face constantly that led by example and hard work.

**Athlete of the Year:** Given to the male and female athletes that have made the largest impact upon ASC athletics and exhibited good character in this school year. 2019 Honorees: Marissa Varela and Taj Lewis

Varela was named ACAA Newcomer of the Year and 1st

team All-ACAA after hitting .457 this season with a team high, 37 hits and 35 RBI. She collected eight doubles, four triples, and 2 home runs. She was named the ECAC Player of the Month for March and earned Athlete of the Week honors multiple times. Varela's 35 RBI and .728 slugging percentage establish new NCAA era single season records.

Lewis was named 1st team All-ACAA after leading the basketball team with 431 points, 274 rebounds, and 43 blocks. He scored in double figures in 22 of the teams 26 games and scored more than 20 points in nine games. Versus Nazareth, he had a career high 42 points and 21 rebounds. He earned four ACAA Player of the Week honors on top of numerous Alfred State honors. For his career Lewis finishes with 624 points and 393 rebounds in 51 games.

**Newcomer of the Year Award:** Are given to the male and female athletes who have made the largest impact upon ASC athletics and exhibited good character in their first year as a Pioneer. 2019 Honorees: Jessie LaRue and Jake Wadsworth

LaRue was a two time individual event champion, 200 Individual Medley and 200 back, at AMCC Championships. She Earned All-AMCC 1st team honors with her performances at the Championships. LaRue broke and now holds eight individual NCAA era records and two relay records. During the season she was named Athlete of the Week by Alfred State and the AMCC multiple times. Her 44 points in individual events at the AMCC Championships led the team to their highest overall finish at the meet – 2nd place.

Wadsworth has had an impressive freshman season. He finished 2nd in the ECAC Indoor Championships in the heptathlon with 4,029 points (His total is 2nd highest in school history). For that performance he was named DIII All-Region by the Coaches Association. He has been named CSAC Athlete of the Week once and Alfred State Athlete of the Week multiple times. He scored 5,297 points in the decathlon earlier in the spring season which is 6th all time. His long jump of 6.93 m is currently ranked 6th in all

the ECAC. Was named the CSAC Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year after winning two events, finishing 2nd in a pair of events, and 3rd in another two events.

**Academic Award:** Honor the male and female athletes who have competed in athletics for at least two years, while achieving the highest overall grade-point average during that time. 2019 Honorees: Katherine Frascella, Dannielle O'Buckley and AJ Gartland.

Frascella is a two year member of the cross country and track & field teams. She has a 4.0 GPA in Nursing

O'Buckley is a three year member of the women's soccer team. She has a 4.0 GPA in Surveying and Geomatic Engineering.

Gartland is a two year member of the baseball team. He has a 4.0 GPA in Architecture.

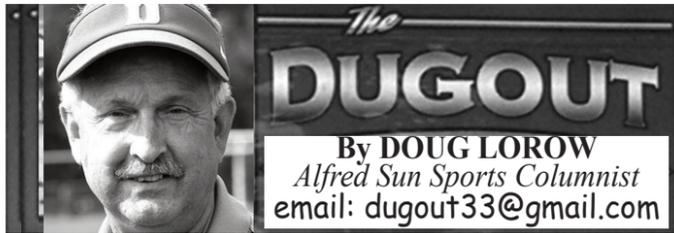
