Kindness, kisses, kudos to the Klass of 2019

ALMOND—It was an afternoon of kisses, kudos and kindness as forty-six seniors at Alfred-Almond Central School were awarded their high school diplomas in a hot and humid A-A high school gym Saturday afternoon, June 29.

A-A Class of 2019 Salutatorians Hannah Tormey and Mikaela Wisniewski, eager to express their gratitude to all who contributed to their success, offered their warm welcomes even before A-A Board of Education President Earl Pierce could get to the podium. Pierce was tasked with offering a warm welcome in the absence of outgoing District Superintendent Richard Calkins, who had at the last minute been called out of town.

Pierce then introduced incoming District Superintendent Tracie Preston, who expressed her delight in returning to Alfred-Almond where she had at one time served as elementary principal.

Under the direction of Todd Bialecki, the Senior High Symphonic Band then performed a rousing rendition of J. Clifton Williams' Symphonic Dance No. 2 "The Maskers."

Co-Valedictorian Caroline Ding, after explaining her fears of arriving in a new land and a new school only to have those fears allayed by the kindness of her peers, challenged her classmates to continue to take kindness wherever they go.

"Changing our world can be as simple as how we interact with others, how we treat others, if you love

those around you," Ding said.

Co-Valedictorian Abby Kelly, noting that the programs for the 80th annual commencement exercises were being used as fans in the gymnasium, kept her words short and sweet, quoting Dr. Seuss and sharing an original poem in Seuss' style, with the last rhyming line declaring, "I'm off to Cornell!"

Alfred's Dr. Bill LaCourse gets quoted in CNN story

ALFRED—William LaCourse, professor of glass science at Alfred University, was quoted extensively in a story on CNN this week about the difficulties developing foldable screens for smartphones. The story, published Wednesday, June 26, on the CNN Business website, is titled "Why it's so hard to make a foldable smartphone." LaCourse comments about the challenges of developing technology that would allow for the creation of a foldable smartphone screen.

Plastic polymers, LaCourse notes, are flexible enough to bend, but lack the durability of glass. While the protective screen covers on many

phones are made from plastic, the screens themselves are commonly made from glass. The challenge in creating a foldable screen is developing a glass that is thick enough to be strong and durable, but thin enough to have the flexibility needed to bend.

"The combination of ultra-thin glass, less than the thickness of human hair, and very high strength allows glass to be bent, twisted, etc. without fracture," LaCourse told CNN Business. "It will not fold flat like a dollar bill, but you could fold it around a metal rod and you could do it over and over and it will still go back to flat [without] creases."

A pasta salad with a nice crunch to it

[Editor's Note: Like most of the recipes she shared with our readers over the past couple of decades, Ellen Shultz's Sunny Side Up columns are worth repeating.]

There are many varieties of pasta salads besides the old macaroni salad. This is one I have had for many years and don't remember the origin. It adds a few more vegetables and has a nice crunch to it, something I always like.

Garden Pasta Salad

- 1 c. Miracle Whip salad dressing
- 1/4 c. chopped parsley
- 1 tsp. dried basil, crushed
- 1 garlic clove minced
- 8 oz. cubed cheddar cheese
- 1/2 c. chopped walnuts (optional)
- 2 c. broccoli, cooked al dente
- 1 c. tri-color corkscrew noodles, cooked & drained
- 2 med. tomatoes, cut in thin wedges

Combine salad dressing, parsley, basil and garlic; mix well. Add cheese, broccoli and noodles; mix lightly. Chill. Arrange tomatoes on platter and top with salad. Sprinkle with walnuts. Serves 6.

Editor went out on a limb with headline

To the Editor:

I am compelled to take umbrage with the headline inserted above the letter that I submitted to *The Alfred Sun* and that appeared in the 27 June 2019 issue of the *Sun*: "More trees should be removed in the Village."


This headline does NOT reflect the intent of my letter, which was to endorse the Street Tree Plan proposed by Justin Grigg and Andrew McInnes in the previous week's issue of the *Sun*.

Part of such a plan may very well include the removal of dead or dying trees and REPLACEMENT of them with new trees, or the removal of overgrown, messy trees that create more work than is feasible for the Village crew to maintain (including the removal of leaves fallen from the overgrown American linden tree in front of our house after the first snow has fallen in mid- or late November, if not earlier)—and REPLACE-MENT of this and other trees with a tree/trees that grow less tall and wide and create less of a mess all year around than does the American linden. In fact, I have offered to pay for the removal of this tree and replace it with another tree.

My letter also called for MAINTENANCE of the Village trees along South Main Street. Many limbs are low and even drooping over the sidewalk in places.

My letter did NOT call for removal only of trees! Headline: "More trees should be removed in the Village."

That said, a careful Street Tree Plan for the Village of Alfred — and South Main Street in particular, given the uneven condition of the sidewalk, which is dangerous to walk on as well as difficult to plow or shovel — may very well call for a "thinning" of



the density of the trees, which create still another hazard for pedestrians—inability to see after dark—when the trees are in leaf, which is about five months of the year.

Further to the unevenness of the sidewalk because of the heaving from the tree roots: My husband now must use a walker for exercise as part of his at-home physical therapy. In summer, it would be nice if he could walk on the sidewalk. His summer walks are confined to our yard and driveway because the sidewalk is too uneven for him to walk on with his walker (two wheels and two "tennis balls"). He is probably not the only disabled individual in the Village whose well-being is limited by the condition of the sidewalk on South Main Street—and possibly similar sidewalks in the Village.

Why was the unevenness a concern for the Village Board on Main Street in front of Carnegie Hall, but not further along the street south of West University and the street up to the Alfred University campus?

I was a long-time friend of John Ninos, Sr. My family came to Alfred in 1963. My friendship with John began around 1970.

Beginning in the early 1970s we played a lot of doubles tennis for fifteen years or

more. My partner was Ken Snyder and John's partner was Bob Boyd. When Bob moved away, John recruited Therese LeGro to be his partner (Therese was about 25!). We played tennis in spring, summer and fall. We were quite evenly matched.

In the winter I played a lot of ping pong with John, Ken and other guests. We played after Lions Club meetings which were held twice a month for many years. We played at our respective homes after the meetings but my favorite place was John's house. There, the lighting was good and John had a record player. He also had a large collection of records from the 1940s and 1950s. Also, Angie almost always served some sensational dessert.

Our happy days of playing tennis stopped abruptly when Ken Snyder died. Probably my point in providing this much detail is to suggest that I knew John Ninos probably as well or better than any non-family member over a period of 50 years or so.

I last talked to John by phone about two weeks before he died. He was going to make some remarks at a Lions Club meeting at which I was going to talk about World War II. As a young boy, John experienced severe hardships when his island home in Greece was occupied by the Nazis in WWII.

Wouldn't the world be a more beautiful place, wouldn't Alfred be a more beautiful place, if everyone were as friendly as John Ninos...if everyone were as kind as John Ninos?



LOCAL TALENT IN MOST ARTS

Hornell native Lucy Mauro returns to MostArts

ALFRED—Hornell native and classical pianist Lucy Mauro will once again be a fixture of Alfred University's MostArts Festival when she returns to western New York from her home in Morgantown, WV, where she is an Associate Professor of Piano at the West Virginia University School of Music.

Mauro, whose 2017 album *Mademoiselle: Première Audience - Unknown Music of Nadia Boulanger* was nominated for a 2018 Grammy Award, will perform Tuesday and Thursday in Alfred University's Holmes Auditorium, Harder Hall, for the MostArts Sound Bites Sampler, a series of chamber music concerts held through the week in Holmes, beginning at noon, each day. The afternoon concerts have become a popular mid-day interlude for MostArts visitors, as well as local residents, and include delicious lunches served outside the auditorium.

Mauro is the daughter of the late Jean Mauro and Carl Mauro of Hornell. She graduated from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University, after making her concerto debut at the age of 14 with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to her teaching responsibilities at WVU, Mauro has performed and taught for festivals and schools in Germany, Italy, Spain, China and throughout the U.S. Recent performances include the 2013 Esterházy Festival in Austria. Her publications include *Essential Two-Piano Repertoire*, *Essential Keyboard Trios* and *Essential Piano Duets* from Alfred Publishing, and *Master Singers: Advice from the Stage* (2015) from Oxford University Press, which includes interviews with many of today's top opera singers.

Nutrition in a Nutshell

Local Spotlights: Living Acres' Spring Greens

Have you stopped by your local Farmers Market for some fresh vegetables? My favorite part of this time of year is sourcing seasonal fruits and vegetables from as many local farms as possible. This boosts the nutritional value of my food (vs. produce shipped from around the country) as well as the local economy! Living Acres is one of my favorite farms to buy organically grown produce. This week, I want to spotlight their spring greens and share with you how they stand apart from your typical grocery vegetable.

Swiss chard, butterhead lettuce, kale, chrysanthemum greens and fennel are among the mouth watering spring greens that Living Acres is growing. These greens provide a variety of antioxidants, vitamins and minerals, particularly folate and iron. Folate and iron are essential for our cognitive function, immune system, growth and development, energy levels, and preventing anemia. A variety of dark greens should be a staple in our diet.

Chrysanthemum greens are a common Asian food which are very new to my kitchen. So far, I have enjoyed them lightly sauteed with Living Acres' kale and scallions or steeped for a medicinal green tea. The leaves have a mild grassy, herbaceous taste with stalks that are sweet and slightly crunchy. In addition to tea, they are traditionally added to soups or parboiled and then topped with sesame dressing.

Fennel is one of my all-time favorite herbs! It has a sweet licorice taste similar to anise. Even if you don't like licorice candy (which

contains artificial flavor), you may enjoy this light and natural taste. The herb is made up of the bulb, stalks, and fonds (leafy part) I love to add the stalks and fronds to my salads or roast the bulb in the oven (add coconut oil, salt, pepper, and nutritional yeast flakes. Bake for 35-45 minutes until tender.)

I don't exaggerate when I boast of these greens' robust flavors. When you cultivate crops from the soil up, the fruit is impressively juicier and nutritious. Here is what Sasha and Amanda share about their practices, "Our farming philosophy is centered around soil health. We believe that healthy soils make healthy plants which in turn make healthy people. We strive to keep the organic matter in our soils high and the proper nutrients balanced by applying compost, cover crops, and natural soil amendments. No pesticides or herbicides are used in the growing of our vegetables. We are a low-mechanized farm that relies mostly on the power of humans."

If you are not already part of their CSA membership, you can find them at Alfred's Farmers Market every Sunday. (They also are at the Corning Farmers Market every Thursday.)

I hope you are able to try some new greens this spring as you source them from our local farmers. I would love to hear about some of your favorite local produce and recipes!

MOST ARTS FESTIVAL OPENS SUNDAY

World-class musicians join MostArts' magic

ALFRED—Alfred University's MostArts Festival continues to draw a growing circle of world-class musicians to the Village of Alfred and the Festival's unique celebration of the classical music tradition.

Founder and Artistic Director Lisa Lantz recently announced pianist André-Michel Schub will join the MostArts Festival Orchestra, under the direction of Maestro Yuval Zaliouk, to perform Brahms' Piano Concerto No. 1 in D minor on Tuesday, July 9. The concert begins at

7:30 p.m. in Miller Theater on the Alfred University campus.

Schub has been described by the *New York Times* as "pianistically flawless... a formidable pianist with a fierce integrity." His recordings under the Vox Cum Laude label, as well as Piano Disc and CBS Masterworks, have included works of Beethoven, Brahms, and Liszt, and he has performed repeatedly with the most prestigious orchestras in the world, including the Boston Symphony, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the

Chicago Orchestra, and the Los Angeles and New York Philharmonies.

Lantz notes Schub will join world renowned pianist Joaquin Achucarro for this year's MostArts Festival in an extraordinary pairing of two international classical music giants, each representing his own generation of classical piano. Achucarro, described as his own generation's Rubenstein, was born in Spain in 1939; Schub was born in France in 1952 before his family moved to the U.S. when he was eight months old.

"I'm deeply honored to have these two phenomenal artists," Lantz says. "I said earlier listening to Joaquin Achucarro would likely be a once-in-a-lifetime experience for MostArts audience members. We're fortunate now to be hosting two performances that our audiences should never forget."

Zaliouk, who has served as music director of the Toledo Symphony Orchestra and Music Director of the Ra'anana Symphonette Orchestra in Israel, describes Achucarro's performances as "magnificent and unforgettable" and calls Schub "a pianist's pianist" playing the piano with sensitivity, colors and vigor as called for by the composer he performs."

Zaliouk notes he has conducted both Achucarro and Schub in performance with international orchestras and says their appearances in Alfred "should not be missed."

Since 1997, Schub has served as music director of the Virginia

Arts Festival Chamber Music series, planning its chamber music programming and performing on a number of programs each year. He was the 1981 grand prize winner of the Van Cliburn International Piano competition, the 1977 recipient of the Avery Fisher Recital Award, and the 1974 winner of the Naumberg International Piano Competition. He also currently is an artist member of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and has been a member of the Manhattan School of Music College faculty since 2006.

He and Achucarro will join violinist Blanca Cecilia Gonzalez at the 2019 MostArts Festival. A native of Bogota Columbia, Gonzalez has won numerous competitions and has performed as a soloist with orchestras in New York and Philadelphia including the Ambler Symphony, Queens College Orchestra and the Philadelphia Orchestra Society. She currently is concertmaster of the Reona Ito Chamber Orchestra, and her current projects vary from traditional classi-

cal rep, to new jazz, contemporary, rock and folk music, and. She will perform Wieniawski's Violin Concerto No.2 in D minor, Op. 22 with the MostArts Festival Orchestra for the 7:30 pm Evening Concert Series Monday, July 8 in Holmes Auditorium, Harder Hall.

The 2019 MostArts Festival opens Sunday, July 7 with a performance by 14-year-old Christopher Zandieh, winner of the 2018 MostArts Young Pianists Competition. Both Lantz and Zaliouk say the festival this year will be studded with outstanding performances, as Zandieh performs Chopin (7:30 p.m. Sunday, July 7), Schub performs Brahms (7:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 9) and Achucarro performs Mozart, Beethoven, Chopin and Grieg (7:30 p.m. Friday, July 12 and Saturday, July 13). All performances are in Miller Theater on the Alfred University campus.

Zandieh returns for solo performance

ALFRED—When thirteen-year-old Christopher Zandieh captured the \$10,000 Grand Prize at the 2018 MostArts Festival, his face lit up with a smile that reached the back row of Miller Theater on the Alfred University campus.

On Sunday, July 7, the audience at the 2019 MostArts Grand Opening Festival Concert will see that smile flash again, as Zandieh returns to Alfred to play Chopin's Concerto No. 1 in E minor.

His performance continues a tradition established by MostArts Founder and Artistic Director Lisa Lantz, Professor of Music at Alfred University, when the winner of the first, 2014, MostArts Young Pianist Competition, Mayuki Miashita, returned in 2015 to perform in the opening concert of the second annual MostArts Festival.

Together the three brothers perform as the Zandieh Trio and will appear at noon, Monday, July 8, in Holmes Auditorium, Harder Hall, as the MostArts Festival's afternoon Chamber Music Series begins. Members of the Zandieh Trio have performed both individually and together in prestigious venues such as Carnegie Hall, Steinway Hall, Bruno Walter Theatre, Long Island's Tilles Center, and all of Juilliard's concert halls.

They will play Beethoven's Piano Trio in C Minor, Op.1, No. 3 Allegro con brio to open the MostArts 2019 Chamber Music Series.

AU Hall of Fame to induct seven in November

ALFRED—The Alfred University Sports Hall of Fame Committee announced the 2019 Hall of Fame class, recognizing seven former student-athletes with various honors. The induction ceremony will take place on Saturday, Nov. 2, with events honoring former and new Hall of Fame members on Friday, Nov. 1 as well.


Following thorough canvassing for inductees to the AU Sports Hall of Fame, the committee announced **Mark Baker '09** (swimming & diving), **Matt Baker '09** (swimming & diving), **Katie Calfee '08** (women's tennis), **Tim Jaenecke '84** (swimming & diving) and **Paul Keeley '08** (football) will be inducted into the AU Sports Hall of Fame on Nov. 2. The Hall of Fame selection committee also chose **John Henderson '76** as the inaugural Golden Saxon inductee and **Dr. Kathleen Richardson '82, M.S., Ph.D** as the inaugural Distinguished Saxon Alumni Award winner.

"What an outstanding class of Hall of Fame inductees we will honor this November who represents the very best of what a Saxon student-athlete is, and across a great diversity of sports as well," said Paul Vecchio, Director of Athletics. "I am also excited to welcome our first Distinguished Saxon and Golden Saxon honorees which will add greatly to our celebration and, hopefully, lead to many more nominations in those deserving categories as well. I hope to see plenty of former Hall of Famers, alumni, family and friends as we usher in a new era by moving the Hall of Fame to its own weekend in early November."

Mark Baker was a four-year member of the AU swimming & diving team from 2005-2009, leading the Saxons to three consecutive Upper New York State Collegiate Swimming Association (UNYSCSA) Championships in 2007, 2008 and 2009. During that period, Baker secured 16 Empire 8 Championship titles including four titles in the 200-free relay and the 400-free relay. He also aided the Saxons in winning the 200-medley relay three times, the 400-medley relay twice and the 800-free relay twice. The 200-medley relay team of Mark Baker, Matt Baker, Brian Agro and Zach Mix holds the AU school record with a time of 1:32.34.

Matt Baker was a four-year member of the AU swimming & diving team and four-time NCAA All-America Honorable Mention in the 100 backstroke (2007, 2008 and 2009) and the 200 backstroke (2009). He is a two-time Empire 8 Swimmer of the Year (2006-07 and 2008-09) and 23-time Empire 8 Champion, including 13 relays and 10 individual events. Baker was named the Empire 8 Swimmer of the Meet in 2007 while aiding the Saxons to their first of three consecutive UNYSCSA Championships. Over the course of his career he won 54 individual events and 42 relay events during dual meets.

Calfee is the fourth AU women's tennis player to be inducted into the AU Sports Hall of Fame and enters the ranks as one of the most decorated tennis players in school history. She was a member of the team from 2004-2008. Calfee was recognized on the Empire 8 All-Conference team every year at AU earning Empire 8 Rookie of the Year, Empire 8 First Team singles and Empire 8 Honorable Mention in doubles during her first-year campaign in 2004. She continued on to earn First Team singles and second team doubles in 2005, Player of the Year, First Team singles and Second Team doubles in 2006 and First Team singles and Second Team doubles in 2007. She was also a member of the 2004-05 team that went undefeated (12-0) and won a program record 50 singles matches. Calfee won a school record 44 singles matches in her career as well as 30 doubles matches. She is the overall winningest player in pro-

gram history with 74 total wins.

Jaenecke was a four-year member of the AU swimming & diving team from 1980-84 under legendary AU head coach Michael Schaeberle. Jaenecke was a member of the 1982-83 and 1983-84 undefeated AU swimming & diving teams – the first two in program history. He was also a two-time All-American, earning recognition in the 400-medley relay (1982) and 800-freestyle relay (1984) while setting AU school records in the 50 free and 100 free.

Keeley was a three-year quarterback of the AU football team from 2005-2007. In 2007, he was a Gagliardi Trophy semifinalist, competing for the National Player of the Year honor. Over the course of his career he was a two-time D3Football.com All-Region honoree, three-time Empire 8 All-Conference honoree, two-time ECAC Bowl Championship MVP, team captain and team MVP. Keeley currently holds the AU football program record for passing yards in a season (3,015 in 2007), passing touchdowns in a season (34 in 2007), passing touchdowns in a game (six vs. Hartwick in 2007), passing efficiency in a season (166.31 in 2007), passing efficiency in a career (145.21), passes completed per game in a career (17.6), passing completion percentage in a game (82.1% vs. Norwich in 2007 going 23-of-28), passing completion percentage in a season (64.4% in 2007 going 221-of-343) and passing completion percentage in a career (59.0% going 580-of-982).

Henderson is the inaugural inductee and recipient the Golden Saxon Award. The Golden Saxon Award was created in 2018 to honor student-athletes from early eras (40 years prior to today) at Alfred University for outstanding athletic achievement but may lack statistical information that puts nominees at a significant disadvantage when assessing them against contemporary student-athletes. Consideration for the Golden Saxon Award will include conventional aspects of the Hall of Fame selection process with the addition of reference and first-hand accounts of a student-athletes' impact on the field of play.

Henderson was a four-year football and golf player at AU where he played under legendary coach Alex Yunevich. Henderson contributed to a 26-7 overall record for the football team during his tenure playing with the Saxons, winning the Lambert Bowl in 1971 and another Independent College Athletic Conference (ICAC) Championship in

1972. On the golf course, Henderson carried a handicap of four throughout his career while serving as the #1 player on the Saxon golf team.

Another AU Hall of Famer from the 1982 induction class and former AU Athletic Director, Jim Moretti '72 cited in his letter of recommendation, "I'll end with this short story told to me by Gregg Maurer. Gregg was struggling with his (golf) game his senior year and asked Coach Yunevich for advice on his swing and stance. 'Don't ask me - go over there and ask Henderson for some pointers.' Yunevich said. "Henderson was a freshman at the time."

Richardson is the first former student-athlete to be recognized with the Distinguished Saxon Alumni Award. The Distinguished Saxon Alumni Award was created in 2018 to recognize Alfred University student-athletes for outstanding achievement following their playing career at Alfred University. This award is not necessarily based on athletic achievement, but on the nominees' career success following graduation via leadership, service, advancement or other similar means.

Richardson, who was a volleyball player at AU from 1979-82 under head coach Shirley Liddle, is currently a Professor of Optics and Materials Science and Engineering at the University of Central Florida. Since 1989, Richardson has made significant contributions to the world as a whole. She began her impact in 1989 when she earned the IR 100 Award from Industrial Research Magazine for one of the most significant technical advancements of the year – Liquid Crystal Polarizer/Isolator. In 2003, she was named a Fellow of the British Society for Glass Technology before being chosen to sit on the Board of Directors at Alfred University in 2006 where she is still active today. In 2008, she expanded her Board of Directors role to the American Ceramic Society. Later that year Richardson was named a Samuel R. Scholes Lecturer for her contributions to Glass Science and Education. One year later, she earned the Outstanding Educator Award from the American Ceramic Society. In 2012, Richardson became a United States Representative to the International Commission on Glass before taking up the role of President of the American Ceramic Society in 2015.

Aside from her prestigious awards, Richardson also founded a high-tech optics company, IRadiance, which was recently purchased by Rochester Precision Optics.

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Former Alfred State men's basketball head coach and Hall of Famer (2001), Tom Curle is stepping down as the men's hoop coach at Plattsburgh State and is now the athletic director at William Peace University in Raleigh, NC. Curle departs the Cardinals program, where he is an alum, after 16-highly successful campaigns in the SUNYAC's.

Curle, a native of Waterloo, was at the helm of the Pioneers from 1988-97 and became the second all-time winningest coach in the history of the basketball program at (170-91) to the great Dick Gioldin. Included in Curle's resume is a 23-win season in 1996-97, four Region III championships, three District VII titles and three trips to the NJCAA's. Curle gathered in Region III Coach of the Year honors four times, three in District VII and guessing they coincided with those trips to the playoffs for Alfred State. (Current ASC coach, Jerry Jusianiec now has the most wins in program history)

Prior to Alfred State, he was an assistant coach at SUNY Geneseo and after Alfred it was off to D2 Post University, then a one year outing at SUNYIT, before taking over the helm of the Plattsburgh program. He is the all-time winningest coach in their history, with five SUNYAC titles and Coach of the Year honors galore from the conference, NABC and D3Hoops.com.

Have gone down to Geneseo a number of times of late to see Curle's squad play versus the Knights in league play, hooking up with Gary and Mary Moore at the game. Have always enjoyed talking to Curle after those contests and will miss that. Also saw his team play a memorable NCAA game at SJ Fisher a number of years back when his team won on a last-second, three-quarter court bomb to top their opponent in round one. Can't remember the team, wasn't Kornaker's Cardinals, but an exciting game.

Coach Curle is now AD Curle in North Carolina at a small private school that I had never heard of before getting this news from Alfred University athletic director, Paul Vecchio. "Guess" Curle forgot to give me the exclusive on this breaking news of a new position!

In a note of irony, Curle will head the Pacers athletic department in the same area that another former Alfred State hoops coach now resides, that being the once-legendary Kaz!

Best of Luck to former Coach Curle and perhaps will hook-up with him next spring in that area to see Mark & Barb Stuckey, the one and only Kaz, plus a trip over to the fabled Cameron Indoor Stadium at Duke University!
