TRADITIONS



THE BELLS

Whenever an Alfredian thinks of his campus one of his first recollections is of the carillon, for it is impossible to think of Alfred and not think of the bells. The carillon, the only old world one in this country, was brought to Alfred from Belgium in June 1937, and at the present time is composed of thirty-five bells. Nine Hemony bells will be added as soon as they can be shipped from Europe, where they were buried for safekeeping, during the war. The derrick-like structure that houses the bells is soon to be replaced by a tower of native fieldstone. You too will soon be looking forward to Dr. Ray W. Wingate's Friday and Sunday afternoon concerts.

THE HELLO COMMUNITY

Alfred prides itself on its friendly spirit. It has long been a custom to say hello to everyone, students or townspeople, whether or not you actually know them. This tradition adds a great deal towards increased friendliness among students and also between students and townspeople.

One of the first things that impress newcomers to Alfred is the fact that all stores, including the Post Office and the Bank, are closed on Saturdays and open on Sundays. This causes a few mistakes during the students' first week or two here, but one becomes easily familiar with the set-up and after a while shopping on Sunday instead of on Saturday turns into a regular habit. Another interesting point about Alfred is the close relationship between the college and the townspeople. The University is the center of village life, and the townspeople here are very friendly towards the students.

HOME COMING

Homecoming is the first big social event of the year. This is the time when all the grads return for a "big week-end" which includes an alumni banquet, a football game, and maybe a dance. The campus is flooded with strange beaming faces, and everywhere you look people are shaking hands and saying "Remember the time when?" Their excitement is contagious and soon the whole campus is buzzing. All the fraternities and sororities hold open houses, and the big event, which is, of course, the football game, will be with the University of Buffalo this year. Needless to say, a good time will be had by all.

MOVING-UP DAY

Moving-Up Day comes in May, just about three weeks before finals. At a special assembly the seniors appear in cap and gown, tapping is done by honorary fraternities, and the results of campus elections are made known. Immediately after assembly a step-singing contest is held on the steps of Kenyon Hall, and most of the residence houses on campus participate. A cup is awarded to the group that the judges select as the winners. Later in the afternoon a pushball contest takes place between the Frosh and Soph men, and a softball game is played between the Frosh and Soph women.

PAINTING THE BARN

Very early in the school year, freshman men try to paint their class year on the barn on the hill beyond University Street. Sophomores, however, do not idly sit by, but try to prevent their year

being painted out and new numerals put on. If the sophomores succeed, the freshmen try again until they succeed. Very often, the incoming class finds it rather difficult to accomplish what it set out to do.

ST. PAT'S DAY

St. Patrick is the patron saint of Alfred University's ceramic engineers, and they celebrate with so many festivities that St. Pat's is now considered one of the greatest events of the college year. Although there is not a strict program of activities, they usually follow a certain pattern. Last year, there was a tea dance, a breakfast, a parade in which most residence units and clubs entered a float, movies, and a formal ball to climax the holiday. The senior ceramic engineer who acts as St. Pat makes a speech at the parade and crowns the campus queen. An all-campus election is held to determine the seven most attractive and popular senior women. Then an outside group picks the queen from the photographs submitted. The six runners-up act as her attendants at the Ball. Last year, Marines stationed at Quantico selected the winner.

OTHER FORMALS

Student Council of the Agricultural and Technical Institute sponsors an annual formal or semi-formal dance each year. Although held in May last year, it will be held in the early fall hereafter.

Both the Interfraternity and Intersorority Councils hold formal dances during the college year. Last year the Interfraternity Ball was held late in the fall, and the Intersorority Ball after rushing, in the spring.

FRESHMAN RULES 1947-48

1. All Freshman men and women shall be required to wear the regulation green cap with yellow button from Freshman Week in September until a five-weeks period is up. The cap shall be worn without alteration in any way from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday, and at all home athletic contests.
2. Freshmen shall be required to observe all rules of common courtesy and shall show due respect to University faculty, and upperclassmen by giving preference in entering campus and village buildings, etc.
3. Freshmen shall greet all faculty members, campus guests and students with the customary "hello" or similar greeting.
4. The regulation freshman button shall be worn conspicuously from time of registration until four weeks after classes begin.
5. Freshmen shall learn the Alma Mater and all Freshman rules and shall be required to pass an examination on the same.
6. Violations by men of the above rules shall be handled by the Freshman Court; by women by the Women's Student Government.

THE WOMEN'S STUDENT GOVERNMENT is the body that makes and enforces the rules for all the women on campus.

ADMINISTRATION REGULATIONS

When a freshman woman enters the University and the Women's Student Government, she has a chance to try her new freedom and responsibilities within the established framework of the standards of the University. Part of that framework lies in three university rules:

(1) Men guests in the sororities and university dormitory must leave by 10 p.m. on Sundays through Thursdays and by 12 midnight on Friday and Saturday nights.

(2) No woman student is allowed to visit a fraternity except for a social event scheduled in the office of the dean of women. Announcement of all scheduled events will be made in the social calendar section of the FIAT.

(3) A woman student who contemplates staying out over night must receive permission and a signature on the sign-out blank from her house mother or head resident before she leaves for her destination.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE WOMEN'S STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Preamble

The Women's Student Government has formulated the following rules and regulations in an attempt to adapt its members to accept one's own responsibility.

This Association expects its members to be guided by the underlying principles of wholesome social relationships in all situations whether covered by the following definite statements or not. Because this organization is self-governing and makes its own rules and regulations, it expects its members to follow the honor system in living up to them.

ARTICLE I.

Sec. 1. All W. S. G. rules and regulations are in effect as long as women are on the campus. It is expected that women at all times whether on or off campus will conduct themselves in a manner fitting a representative of Alfred University.

Sec. 2. All women are expected to sign out when leaving their places of residence after 8 p.m., indicating their destinations. This is for the convenience and protection of everyone in case of any emergency or calls.

ARTICLE II.—CLOSING HOURS

Sec. 1. Closing hours for women:

UPPERCLASS WOMEN (Junior, Senior, and Graduate Students)

Sunday through Thursday 11:00 o'clock
Friday and Saturday 1:00 o'clock

SOPHOMORE WOMEN

Sunday through Thursday 10:30 o'clock
Friday and Saturday 1:00 o'clock

FRESHMAN WOMEN

Sunday through Thursday 10:00 o'clock
Friday and Saturday 12:00 o'clock

Sec. 2. A first semester freshman woman not maintaining an index of .8 must observe, Sunday through Thursday, closing hours one hour earlier than the prevailing hour for her class.

Sec. 3. All other women not maintaining an index of 1.2 or better must observe, Sunday through Thursday, closing hours one hour earlier than the prevailing hours of her class.

Sec. 4. During vacation periods, women must be in by the closing hours of the house, 12 o'clock, Sunday through Thursday, and 1 o'clock on Friday and Saturday.

Sec. 5. Seniors may have one week-end 2 o'clock permission a month to be granted at the discretion of the head of house; freshmen may have one week-end 1 o'clock permission a month too be granted at the discretion of the head of house.

Sec. 6. Unlimited second show permission will be granted to everyone. A woman attending the second show must present upon her return to her residence a time slip signed by the W. S. G. member in charge that night. No slip will be given to a woman entering the movie after her own closing hours.

Sec. 7. Any woman desiring to work outside her residence after her own closing hours at the Ceramic School, Allen Laboratory, or South Hall, must present to her representative upon returning to her

place of residence, a slip signed by the faculty member in charge. The approval of the head of house must also be obtained for such work before the student leaves the house or dormitory.

Girls, who because of economic necessity must work, are permitted later hours at the discretion of the Dean of Women (not later than the closing hours of the houses, however). Application for permission to work should be made through the head residents.

Sec. 8. Those attending the four formal dances of the year, St. Pat's, the Interfraternity Ball, the Intersorority Ball, and the Ag-Tech Ball, will be accorded 2 o'clock permissions.

ARTICLE III.—FRESHMAN REGULATIONS

Sec. 1. Freshman women shall be subject to the freshman rules prescribed by the Student Senate.

Sec. 2. Freshman women shall be required to learn and to pass an examination on the Alma Mater and the W. S. G. rules and regulations.

ARTICLE IV.—SPECIAL REGULATIONS AND DEFINITIONS

Sec. 1. Women shall not smoke on the campus.

Sec. 2. A "campus" means that a woman must observe 8 o'clock closing hours and must not leave the town of Alfred at any time.

Sec. 3. A "social campus" means that a woman may not leave the town of Alfred, may not attend any places of social recreation, and may not have any social engagement of any kind, although she may observe her own closing hours. Any meeting with men will be considered a social engagement.

ARTICLE V.

Sec. 1. In case of disciplinary action, the Women's Student Government Council retains the right to make such restrictions as are deemed necessary.

Sec. 2. The W. S. G. Council shall have the power to recommend any woman to the Dean of Women for suspension.

All students are invited to the open Senate meetings and are urged to bring with them any suggestions, complaints or ideas for consideration.

The principal object of the fraternity is to promote and emphasize scholarship and character in the thoughts of the ceramic students, to stimulate mental achievement, and to promote interest in ceramic engineering. Membership is based on scholastic record and interest in ceramics, and is the highest honor a student engineer can attain.

BLUE KEY

The Blue Key is an honorary fraternity composed of upperclassmen, recognized for their character, scholarship, student activities, leadership, and spirit of service on the campus. As a service organization, the Blue Key welcomes visiting groups to the campus, arranges intramural athletic contests, and performs other services as occasion arises.

THETA ALPHA PHI

The New York Alpha Chapter of Theta Alpha Phi, the national honorary dramatic fraternity, is located at Alfred University. It membership is made up of those who have shown unusual interest in, and have particular aptitudes for, dramatic production in its various phases. Theta Alpha Phi, with the assistance of the Footlight Club, presents the "Frosh-Soph Plays" in the fall in the attempt to ferret out outstanding material from among the lowerclassmen on campus. They also present one or two full length plays during the year.

ALPHA TAU THETA

This is an honorary athletic fraternity for women at Alfred. Its aims are the development of loyalty to the ideals of true sportsmanship and the recognition and emphasis of worthwhile achievements in sportmanship and leadership.

ETA MU ALPHA

Eta Mu Alpha, honorary scholastic fraternity, has for its goal the promotion of better scholarship and keener interest in things intellectual among the student body. Only Juniors with an accumulative index of 2.4, and Seniors with one of 2.2 are eligible for

this honor. Members are tapped at Moving-Up Day exercises.

PHI SIGMA GAMMA

Phi Sigma Gamma, the women's honorary fraternity of Alfred, was founded in 1925 to provide an incentive for achievement among the women students of the university. Each year those women who have best expressed outstanding loyalty to the university, personal character, scholarship, and service are elected to membership.

PI DELTA EPSILON

The national honorary journalism fraternity is composed of a group of students who by their constant endeavor to raise the level of the collegiate publications on campus have shown their interest in an improved type of journalism. Members are selected after having served two years on some campus publication, showing outstanding ability during that period.

PI GAMMA MU

The national honorary social science fraternity was brought to the campus in 1927 to awaken interest and encourage underclass study in the field of social science. Membership includes a limited number of the faculty and upperclass members who must have an average index of 2.0 and 20 hours of study in the social sciences.

SPIKED SHOE

The Spiked Shoe is a branch of the National Collegiate Society of Spiked Shoe which is for the promotion of track and cross country. The purpose of this organization is to bring together in a closer

bond all those interested in track and cross country and to this end, the members may be chosen not only from the letter men but also from among those whose main interest lies in those directions. The society fosters interclass and intramural track meets, and inculcates interest in sub-collegiate institutions, and to further the aims of track and cross country by serving as officials for meets among undergraduates and high schools.

RELIGIOUS LIFE

All student religious activity at Alfred is voluntary. This does not mean that the University Administration is indifferent toward religion. The University employs a full-time Chaplain and Director of Religious Activities and Alfred's united religious program in which all denominations cooperate has been so successful that other colleges have studied or copied the Alfred plan.

Aim is two-fold: 1. to provide regular worship services of quality such as will awaken and expand the student's awareness; 2. to establish religious organizations which give students experience and purpose in controlling religious groups.




ADMINISTRATION

SCHOOLS and COLLEGES of ALFRED UNIVERSITY

Oldest schools of the University are the College of Liberal Arts and the School of Theology. Liberal Arts classes are held in various campus buildings, and the office of Dean M. Ellis Drake, Liberal Arts, is in Kanakadea Hall. School of Theology is housed in the Gothic, and dean is A. J. C. Bond.

The College of Ceramics, head of which is Dean S. R. Scholes, was established in 1900. Classes in Industrial Design, Glass Technology and Ceramic Engineering meet in Binns Hall, Physics Hall and the new Ceramic building. Both the College of Ceramics and the Agricultural and Technical Institute are State schools. The office of Director Paul B. Orvis of the Ag-Tech is in the Agricultural building.

During the summer of 1946 the School for American Craftsmen became affiliated with Alfred University. Assistant Director Frances Wright Caro's office is located in the Arts and Crafts Building.

ABSENCE REGULATIONS

1. Students are, in general, allowed to exercise a personal discretion in regulating their attendance at classes. This discretion involves a consideration on the part of the student of the effect of his absence from the classroom not only upon his own work

but also upon the group as a whole. Furthermore whenever a student cuts a class he should realize that he has no right to ask the assistance of the instructor in making up the work which he has thus missed.

2. Absence from University exercises 2 days before or after a vacation is regarded as interfering with the collective interests of the University. Such absences will cause either an hour's reduction in credit or a lowering of a grade by one letter, the exact penalty to be applied at the discretion of the Absence Committee. Excuses before or after the vacations may be granted only by the personnel deans.

3. Instructors are expected to investigate causes for absences, and should promptly report to the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women those who are absent three or more times consecutively. This is especially important in the case of students enrolled under the G.I. Bill of Rights. The University is required to report to the Veterans Administration those who are absent five times consecutively.

4. Instructors are expected to keep records of absences on the class cards, and to be ready to make reports of all absences to the administration if requested. This is also necessary to enable the faculty to determine the success or failure of the new absence regulations during the trial period.

5. No excuses for any reason will be granted for absences from Assembly. Three absences from Assembly per semester are allowed.

6. Three unexcused absences will be permitted each semester in Physical Education. Unexcused absences beyond the three permitted, up to and in-

cluding six in number, may be made up during the last week in the semester. Students with unexcused absences beyond three and up to and including twelve, which are not made up during make-up week, will automatically receive an incomplete. The incomplete may be removed the following semester by making up two hours for each absence. Students with more than twelve absences, excused or unexcused, will receive a grade of F for the semester.

LIBRARY

The Carnegie Library, located on Main Street, was erected in 1912 as a gift of Andrew Carnegie. The regulations are:

1. Library hours—The library is open for regular work from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and from 7:00 to 9:30 p.m., each day from Monday through Friday. On Saturdays and Sundays the library is open from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. and from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

2. Loan of Books—

(1) Most books may be withdrawn for a period of two weeks, with the privilege of renewal. Recent popular books may be withdrawn for but one week without the privilege of renewal. Reference books, such as dictionaries, encyclopedias, etc., may not be withdrawn at any time.

(2) An overdue charge of two cents a day, holidays included, is made on all books overdue.

(3) Students whose accounts are in arrears must settle the same before receiving their final standing at the end of each semester.

(4) All books must be signed for at the delivery desk before being moved from the building.

Wait for the librarian to check and stamp each book.

3. Reserved books—

(1) Reserved books may be obtained by calling at the delivery desk. Such books should be returned to the desk as soon as you are finished with them, as others may be waiting for them.

(2) Reserved books may be withdrawn from the library a half hour before closing time each night, and must be returned to the library by 10:00 o'clock the following morning, except that books withdrawn on Friday or Saturday night must be returned at 3:00 the following afternoon. Failure to comply with this regulation on the part of any student will subject him to the following overdue charges: 10 cents for the first hour (or fraction thereof) and 5 cents for each additional hour, including hours the library is closed.

4. Periodicals—The current issue of any periodical does not circulate. Unbound back numbers may be withdrawn for one week. Bound periodicals circulate as books.

INFIRMARY

The Clawson Infirmary, located on State Street south of the Brick, provides facilities for the treatment of student illness. The staff consists of the two University physicians, who are assisted by registered nurses. It is equipped for minor X-ray examinations, infra-red and short wave therapy and ordinary clinical laboratory examinations. The regulations of the infirmary are:

1. Office hours at the Infirmary every morning at 9 o'clock except Saturday and Sunday. Students

wishing to see Dr. Hitchcock must be at the Infirmary promptly at nine.

2. Students must have a written order from the Infirmary to see Dr. Hitchcock in his private office.

3. Only in an emergency is a student justified in calling Dr. Hitchcock directly.

4. Students calling at the Doctor's office without a written order will be charged the regular price, except in an emergency, that to be determined by the Doctor.

5. Students living in private homes must notify the Infirmary when ill and before calling the Doctor, except in an emergency.

6. Students in their own houses must notify the Infirmary and the nurse will visit them before an excuse can be given.


7. All excuses for illness will be issued at the Infirmary and must be filed at the Registrar's office not later than one week after the end of the absence period.

8. Students' visiting hours at the Infirmary are from 3 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 8 p.m.

9. After being admitted to the Infirmary students are not allowed visitors for the first 24 hours without special permission.

10. Permission to visit the opposite sex must be obtained from the Dean of Women.

PREAMBLE

Fully realizing and accepting the difficulties of self-government and recognizing the need for close cooperation with the administration and faculty, we, the students of Alfred University, including the College of Liberal Arts, New York State School of Ceramics, New York State Agricultural and Technical Institute, the School of Theology, and the School for American Craftsmen, in order to promote mutual understanding, to advance our common interests, and to gain that democratic experience vital to good citizenship, establish this constitution for the Student Association of Alfred University.

ARTICLE I

All regularly enrolled students of Alfred University shall be considered members of this association.

ARTICLE II

Sec. 1. All legislative and judicial powers of the Association shall be vested in a Student Senate composed of representatives from each chartered sorority, fraternity, and residence unit, of each of the class presidents, and of representatives of the Independents, all of whom shall be elected in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

Sec. 2. Each sorority, fraternity, and residence unit, shall, upon proper application to the Senate showing sufficient cause, be granted a charter for the year, allowing one representative for each 30 active members of said group. All chartered groups shall have at least one representative regardless of numbers and shall in no case have more than three representatives.

- A. Applications for such charter shall be submitted for approval by the Senate within fifteen days after the beginning of classes.
- B. Each chartered group shall elect its own representative or representatives at its first meeting in April, and shall submit the results of this election to the Senate before the second Monday of April.
- C. Any representative who becomes an active member of a group different from that from which he was elected shall be filled by another election in his original group.
- D. Each group shall have the power to recall and to replace its representative with the consent of the Senate.
- E. No person elected president or vice-president in the general election shall lose his office by either of the above two provisions. Any representative with more than three absences from meetings shall be replaced by a new representative elected from his group.

Sec. 3. Each class president shall become a member of the Senate at the time of his election.

Sec. 4. Any senator other than the president and vice-president of the Senate may be impeached and removed from office by a three-fourths vote of the Senate for failure to carry out his or her duties in an unbiased, trustworthy, and efficient manner.

ARTICLE III

Sec. 1. The Student Senate shall possess the highest student authority over all phases of campus life and student activities.

- A. It shall have the power to review and to veto any rule, law, or provision of any other or-

ganization. The provisions of this section shall not apply to the rules and regulations set forth by a national organization or to the internal rules of sororities, fraternities, and other residence units.

- B. Every member of the Association shall have the right to appeal to the Senate for a review of any regulation, law, or decision of any other student organization.
- C. All other student organizations shall derive their powers and authority from the Senate and no outside group except the Senate shall have power over them.
- D. All rules made or approved by the Senate shall be subject to review by the administration of Alfred University and, if necessary, the Senate, after consultation with the president of the University, shall make such changes and alterations as seem best.
- E. All student organizations shall submit to the Senate a copy of their constitution for recording within thirty school days after the adoption of this constitution.
 - 1. All constitutional amendments shall be reported to the Senate within two weeks after their passage.
 - 2. All by-laws and rules affecting the daily life of any members of the Association shall be reported to the Senate.

Sec. 2. The Senate shall represent the Association or any member thereof in relations with the Administration, Faculty, Alumni, Trustees, and other non-student bodies.

- A. It shall mediate in all misunderstandings be-

tween students and any of the above mentioned groups and shall strive at all times to promote harmonious relations between them.

- B. It shall be the duty of the Senate to keep the Administration and Faculty informed as to the activities, feelings, and sentiments of students on matters of mutual interest and concern.
- C. It shall be the duty of the Senate to keep itself informed as to all University policies and plans affecting students and to disseminate such knowledge to the members of the Association.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Senate to cooperate with the administration in keeping the campus life of Alfred on a high moral and intellectual plane. It shall condemn all parties not in keeping with the true Alfred spirit and in cases of proven misconduct shall inflict such penalties as it shall deem expedient.

Sec. 4. The Senate shall govern the following elections:

- A. Officers of the Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior classes.
- B. Student Senate president and vice president.
- C. Athletic Governing Board.

Sec. 5. The Senate shall have charge of all the financial transactions of the Association.

- A. No funds shall be granted to any group until its books have been audited and approved for the preceding year.
- B. No funds shall be granted to any group whose constitution has not been approved and recorded by the Senate.

Sec. 6. Two-thirds of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

ARTICLE IV

Sec. 1. All executive power shall be vested in a president elected by the student Association.

Sec. 2. Election of the Senate president for the following year shall take place before the election of the Senate representatives from the various organizations. Any member of the Senate who is entering his final year of study at Alfred University shall be eligible. Any other student who is entering his last year of study, and has served on the Senate for one year may, upon presentation to the Senate of a petition signed by 25 students, also run in this election. In the event that there are more than 5 candidates a primary election will be held to choose three candidates.

- A. The student receiving the most votes in the final election shall be president of the Association and the Senate.
- B. Election for vice-president shall be held one week following the election for president. Any junior member of the Senate and any sophomore member representing the Agricultural and Technical Institute shall be eligible to run for the vice-presidency.
- C. In case of a tie for either of these two offices, a new election shall be held to determine which of the candidates concerned shall take office.

Sec. 4. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Senate and of the Association.

Sec. 5. The president shall have the power to

vote only in case of a tie vote by the other members of the Senate.

Sec. 6. The president and vice-president may be impeached and removed from office by a majority vote of the total Association membership.

Sec. 7. The vice-president shall fill the office of the president whenever he is temporarily or permanently prevented from doing so, and shall record all the constitutions submitted by the various organizations for recording.

ARTICLE V

Section. 1. The Senate shall elect a secretary whose duty it shall be to keep the minutes of all meetings, to attend to the correspondence of the Senate and Association, and to perform all other secretarial duties.

Sec. 2. The Senate shall elect a treasurer to take charge of its funds and its financial transactions.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. The Senate shall elect, subject to confirmation by the president of the University, a faculty advisory and consultive committee of three members whose purpose it will be to give advice and consultation to the Senate, to promote better relations between faculty and student groups by keeping each informed of the activities of the other, and to serve as custodian of the Senate's records and papers while the Senate is not in session.

Sec. 2. Of the three members first elected to this committee, one shall have a term of one year, one a term of two years, and one a term of three years.

Sec. 3. Each succeeding member shall be elected to a term of three years, and shall replace the person whose term expired that year.

Sec. 4. No person shall serve two consecutive terms of office in this committee but shall become eligible for re-election after a lapse of one year.

Sec. 5. This committee shall meet with the Senate whenever it is deemed advisable and shall be available for consultation and discussion at other appropriate times.

Sec. 6. This committee shall serve also as auditor for all financial transactions of the Senate and other student groups.

ARTICLE VII

Sec. 1. This constitution shall go into effect within thirty school days after its ratification by the Student Senate and the Student Association of Alfred University.

- A. The present Senate shall continue to function until a new election can be held each year under the provisions of this constitution.
- B. When the new election is finished, the present Senate shall resign and turn over the government to the newly elected Senate.
- C. All members of the Senate shall be eligible for re-election.

ARTICLE VIII

This constitution may be amended by a unanimous vote of the Senate at any regular meeting except the one at which the amendment is introduced, or by a three-fifths vote of the Student Association.

CAMPUS UNION CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

Realizing that cooperative enterprise is one of the aims of a democratic college education, we the students and staff of the School of Theology, the College of Liberal Arts, the New York State College of Ceramics, and the New York State Ag-Tech Institute of Alfred, N. Y., do hereby establish the Alfred Campus Union in order to provide a place where all Alfredians, irrespective of political, social, or religious affiliations, may gather to share the mutual enrichment of social activity in its largest sense.

ARTICLE I: NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Alfred Campus Union.

ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization is to establish a recreational center controlled by and for the mutual enrichment of the students and staff of Alfred University which is understood to include the College of Liberal Arts, the New York State College of Ceramics, the School of Theology, and the New York State Ag-Tech Institute at Alfred, N. Y.

ARTICLE III: MEMBERSHIP

Membership of the Alfred Campus Union shall consist of all students and staff of Alfred University who are hereafter referred to as members.

ARTICLE IV: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Sec. 1. The board of directors shall be composed

of twelve members elected at the time of general campus elections.

Sec. 2. In addition to these twelve, the University Treasurer shall be a permanent member.

Sec. 3. The twelve members shall include at least one staff member and two students from each of the Colleges and the Institute.

Sec. 4. The members shall be elected by the members of the Alfred Campus Union.

ARTICLE V: ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

Sec. 1. At the first election one-half the board members shall be elected for a period of one year; one-half for a period of two years. After that all new members shall be elected for a period of two years, except as provided in Article IX, Section 5.

Sec. 2. After the first year no Senior may be elected to the board, except those students enrolled in a two-year program.

Sec. 3. No member shall be eligible for re-election until a period of one year has elapsed.

Sec. 4. A panel of names shall be submitted to the members as stated under Article VI, Section 4.

ARTICLE VI: DUTIES OF THE BOARD

Sec. 1. The Board of Directors shall meet at least once a month and as many additional times as they see fit. The board shall decide upon the time of meeting. Attendance at board meetings shall be compulsory. Any member who is absent more than two consecutive times, except in the case of illness or excused absences, shall be dropped from the board. The Chairman, with the approval of the board, shall decide the validity of excuses.

Sec. 2. The Board of Directors shall have the power to approve all minor repairs, to approve all prices, to approve all private parties and meetings held in the Campus Union quarters, and such other matters as may be necessary.

Sec. 3. The Board of Directors shall have the power to drop any officer or board member who shows evidence of incompetence.

Sec. 4. The Board of Directors shall serve as a nominating committee, and two weeks prior to the elections shall present a panel of candidates. This panel shall contain at least twice the number of names necessary to fill the vacancies on the board.

Sec. 5. If at any time, there is a vacancy on the board the Board of Directors shall fill the vacancy. The new members shall serve the portion of the two-year term which remains.

ARTICLE VII: ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The retiring members of the Board and the new Board of Directors shall conduct the nomination and election of a chairman; the new Board shall conduct the nomination and election of the secretary.

Sec. 2. This election shall take place within one week following the election of the Board.

Sec. 3. The Chairman shall be a student and, after the first year, shall have served one year on the Board before he is eligible for election.

ARTICLE VIII: DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The Chairman:

- A. Shall call and preside at all meetings of the board.
- B. Shall appoint, with the approval of the board,

such minor officers as publicity chairman, social chairman, etc.

Sec. 2. The Secretary:

- A. Shall, in the absence of the Chairman, preside at the meeting of the board.
- B. Shall keep all minutes of board meetings.
- C. Shall carry on all correspondence for the Union.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer:

- A. Shall keep all books, and pay all bills for the Union.
- B. Shall give a report of the financial status of the Union at least once a month.

ARTICLE IX: FINANCE

Sec. 1. All funds received by the Alfred Campus Union, (as distinguished from such concessions as the dairy counter operated by the Ag-Tech Institute), shall be placed in the custody of the University Treasurer. Reports of the amounts received by the Agricultural and Technical Institute shall be reported to the University Treasurer in order to determine properly the proportion of the fixed and operating costs to be borne by each department.

Sec. 2. Monthly reports of receipts and expenditures, and such other reports as may be requested, shall be made to the board.

ARTICLE X: AMENDMENTS

Sec. 1. This constitution may be amended by a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors or by a 2/3 majority vote at an election under the supervision of the Student Senate.

Sec. 2. Amendments may originate from the

Board of Directors or by a petition signed by one-hundred of the members.

Sec. 3. Article IX shall be considered inoperative.

Sec. 4. The Board of Directors shall be specifically empowered to retain or contract for the services of a manager, as is generally implied under Article VI, Sec. 2. The board is hereby further empowered to delegate responsibility and authority for the ordinary transactions of business by the manager and for which the manager shall be required to make a full and complete accounting to the board.

Sec. 5. The University Treasurer shall be the permanent treasurer of the Board of Directors.

Sec. 6. All funds received by the Alfred Campus Union shall be placed in the custody of the University Treasurer, and the Campus Union's books shall be kept by the Treasurer's office.

Sec. 7. At the end of the fiscal year, after the Campus Union's accounts have been audited by the University's Auditor, all cash assets, except certain funds deemed necessary for operating expenses with the approval of the Board, shall be transferred to the restricted account known as the Campus Union War Memorial Building Fund.
