

## Justin Grigg to chair grant advisory board

ALFRED--Alfred Village Mayor Craig Clark and the Village Board approved the formation of the Main Street Grant Advisory Board to oversee all activities related to the Main Street Grant awarded the village last August.

Named to the Board are Planning Board members Justin Grigg, who will serve as Chair, and Charlotte Rice; Mandy Burns, PCC Director at the Box of Books Library; Tricia Debertolis, Assistant Dean for New Student Programs at Alfred University; Dan Lee, owner of Alfred Almond Chiropractic; and former Planning Board members Larry Greil and Drew McInnes.

The Trustees expressed their appreciation to Justin Grigg and Mandy Burns for the work they have done for the village regarding the grant. The job description for the position of grant administrator was also approved, with the administrator to be hired as an independent contractor for the term of the grant contract.

At next month's Nov. 9 meeting, a representative of Casella Waste Management, which holds the contract for garbage pickup in the Village, will be asked to attend for clarification of the standards for large-item pickup.

The appearance was at the request of John Ninos, who stated that their service has stopped picking up items which were formerly removed on large pickup day, held on the third Tuesday of the month.

Police Chief Tim O'Grady reported that the level of arrests in the village this fall has risen, equaling that of April, which is usually higher in incidents and arrests than other months.

On a related note, the requests for a revenue discussion with the two colleges to address the fiscal problems faced by the village due to public safety concerns have not yet received a response.

Trustee Joe Dosch, Chair of the Village Tree Committee, asked for and received Board approval on recommendations for the trimming of branches to allow streetlights to illuminate the sidewalks at night, and allow

a 16-foot clearance for vehicles.

Since the village crew has neither the time nor expertise to trim the trees, quotes will be solicited for the work. At the next meeting of the committee, a Department of Environmental Conservation representative will be present to advise members on tree maintenance.

Other announcements and approvals were given to the following agenda items:

--Leaf pickup by the village crew will start Oct. 18 and continue through the first two weeks in November. Leaves should be raked to the edge of properties along the road, taking care to keep the piles out of the road so drains are not blocked.

--Halloween Trick-or-Treat hours have been set for Sunday, October 31 from 6-8 p.m.

--Board action was taken on an election resolution to fill the capacities of Village Justice for a term of four years to succeed Wende Bush, of Mayor for a term of two years to succeed Craig Clark, and of two trustees for terms of two years to succeed Virginia Rasmussen and Joe Dosch.

--The Board accepted the Zoning Board of Appeals resignation of Pat Crandall and approved the appointment of Ellen Bahr to fill the vacancy.

**Planning Board meets**

At the Oct. 7 meeting of the Alfred Village Planning Board, an application by Phil Curran for the railing design on the roof of West Side Wine & Spirits building was approved. Two other applications were denied on zoning issues, and applicants were advised to go to the Zoning Board of Appeals to appeal.



## SUNNY SIDE UP

### Save the seeds from your Jack-o-lantern!

As you are carving that Jack-o-lantern for Halloween, save the pumpkin seeds and turn them into a tasty treat. This recipe was developed by the Taste for Life test kitchen and appeared in the October Wegmans Nature's Marketplace magazine.

#### Roasted Pumpkin Seeds

- 2 c. pumpkin seeds
- 2 T. vegetable oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- ground cinnamon or ginger, optional

As you carve, separate seeds from pumpkin flesh. Clean seeds by placing them in a large bowl of water and rubbing them between your fingertips to remove any strings and excess flesh. Using a strainer, drain the water from the seeds. Place seeds on a baking sheet for about 30 minutes, or until they have completely dried. Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Transfer seeds to a large bowl. Drizzle oil over. Add salt and any other seasonings desired. Stir until all seeds have been coated with oil and seasonings. Spread seeds in a single layer onto a baking sheet. Bake for 10-20 minutes or until seeds turn brown and become slightly crisp, stirring every 5 minutes to prevent burning. Allow to cool. Store in an airtight container.





**A look at tea partiers**

Dear Editor:

Last year when obviously organized interlopers disrupted town hall meetings on health care, I thought - as I do when ignorant loudmouths drown out civil discourse - of the lines in Irish poet W.B. Yeats' "The Second Coming": "The best lack all conviction, while the worst/ Are full of passionate intensity." Recently, commenting on the current situation, E.J. Dionne of the *Washington Post* used the same lines (without attribution), and Frank Rich of the *NY Times* used them twice (also no attribution).

Well, they say all great minds run in the same channel, but since at least one of us is not Mensa material, perhaps the coincidences regarding Keats' lines reflects rational people's fears that corporate-sponsored irrationalists such as the tea partiers are harbingers of another apocalypse for ordinary Americans such as monied interests visited on them with the Wall Street debacle.

The "passionate intensity," of course, belongs to the tea

partiers and their Republican doppelgangers. Tea parties deny party preferences, but they all turned up in Republican primaries. Republicans no doubt thought they could use this movement, but after the primaries, the tea partiers seem to be the Turks and the Republicans the Janisaries. As Kevin Janes observes in the current issue of *Mother Jones*, "...tea partiers aren't a fringe part of the conservative movement. They are the conservative movement." Their ugly lies and distortions can only be designed to destroy a presidency - along with the meager progress he has made to take this country from its current robber barons.

Tea partiers are wont to see themselves as populists fighting an oppressive government. If so, they differ in important ways from populists and anti-government rebels in the 19th century. For one thing, they represent no part of an underclass. Reporters at their meetings call them "affluent," surely an exaggeration, but when people discuss their summers in Italy, their second seashore vacation homes, at least they don't represent too many even of their own members, who are apparently not impoverished. When Catherine O'Donnell won the Delaware primary, she was reported to have received 300 thousand dollars from the tea party. Now that's populism with a corporate smell!

Earlier protest movements, the eMolly Mcguire's of the Pennsylvania coal fields, the West's so-called Wobblies (Industrial Workers of the World), were made up of working men, an underclass protesting intolerable working conditions at slave wages. They involved beatings, shootings, hangings. But they were seeking for themselves, justice, not demanding that entitlements for other working people be taken away. The later agrarian populists accused the government and Wall Street of colluding to depress farm prices.

However vocal the tea party is, it is not an oppressed minority. Rather it's just the current Republican Party on speed. More ditzzy, more radical, but only marginally so. After all, didn't Rep Dan Burton execute a watermelon to prove Bill Clinton murdered his friend Vince Foster? No tea party then. But the teas and the Repubs share the same contempt for intelligent reason, science, truth, and the hardships of ordinary people. So who's surprised that they have no empathy with the current job-

less, homeless, or foodless? Otherwise, what would we do with the word "sociopaths?"

Perhaps the best evidence that tea partiers and Repubs have the self-awareness of loblolly pines is their conviction they are devout Christians. They can't all be hypocrites; some of them no doubt believe it. But if either were to tell me he is a Christian, my response would be, "No, you are not!"

It's elementary logic. If a leader acts a certain way, believes certain things, and you agree, you are a follower. If not, not. Christ was a healer and consolator of the poor. He didn't cotton to the rich and advised a man who coveted heaven to give away his riches and follow Him. We know what He did with the moneychangers. And there's that camel and the needle's eye. Christ confounds the right on sexual morality. A woman caught in adultery? "Let him who is without sin cast the first stone." That's liberal Democratic speak!

Note that I am not arguing that tea party and Republican apologists for the rich are not religious. Perhaps somewhere in the Old Testament... But Christians..uh uh! Just compare Christ's ministry with the Republican agenda or the tea party rhetoric. It clarifies the meaning of anti-theological.

Unlike the Pope, I don't claim infallibility in matters of faith and morals. I would invite, even challenge, local church leaders to prove me wrong. Just don't tell me to judge not. If ever there was a time for dumbed-down Americans to open their eyes and think - and judge - it's now.

**BUDGET TIME**

My County duties this past week began on Monday, Columbus Day, notwithstanding it being a holiday. During the afternoon I met with fellow Legislator Ted Hopkins to review County issues. Curt Crandall and I then attended a District 1 meeting at 6:00 pm that was held in Short Tract. All day Tuesday was spent on County business, starting with a special morning meeting of the Committee of the Whole to review the proposed 2011 County Budget. At 1:00 pm I attended a Ways and Means Committee meeting. The regular Board session started at 2:00 pm.

The Board Meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance that was led by Navy Veteran Philip Carlson of Fillmore. I have been privileged to know Phil for many years. He is a gifted artisan, and has served our community in many ways. Privilege of the Floor was then granted to Youth Bureau Director Linda Edwards who spoke regarding Cyber Security Awareness. Later in the meeting Chairman Crandall issued a proclamation declaring October 2010 to be Cyber Security Awareness month in Allegheny County.

Legislator Dwight Fanton introduced Local Law No. 4-2010 that provides increases in compensation for certain County officers. This local law is required annually to raise salaries and compensation for certain officials. The Board then began consideration of five filed resolutions. The first resolution set October 25th at 2:00 pm as the date for a public hearing on Local Law No. 4-2010. The second resolution set November 10th, 2010 at 7:00 pm in the Legislative Chambers as the date, time and place for a public hearing on the 2011 tentative County Budget. The third resolution established a procedure to promote reductions in the size of the County workforce. The County is participating in an early retirement incentive program, and hopes to be able to reduce the workforce by eliminating positions vacated by retiring employees. The fourth resolution approved the sale of a tax sale parcel in the Village of Almond. The fifth and final resolution approved corrections to the county and town tax rolls. All resolutions were approved unanimously. The Board then considered and approved payment of the audited bills by a 12 to 1 vote.

This is the time of year when the Board focuses on developing and adopting next year's budget. This Tentative Budget proposes an increase in the tax rate of 0.56%, or 9 cents per thousand. This is the lowest increase in many years. Total appropriations increased substantially from the 2010 budget, but only because NYS required us to add over \$7.7 million in costs for Department of Social Services programs (HEAP and Food Stamps). Both of those programs are currently funded 100% by federal and state money. This accounting change will not result in any local tax increases. The Tentative Budget includes funding for repair or replacement of 6 bridges. This is an important and much needed increase. This Tentative Budget also includes funding for the first payment on the Courthouse Project. The Budget Officer and Budget Committee have worked hard to contain costs and find savings wherever possible. They have done an outstanding job.

There is currently a great deal of discussion about a "real property tax cap" law. The proposed law is unworkable. As proposed this law would limit annual real property tax increases to 2% or the rate of inflation, whichever is lower. However, that "cap" wouldn't apply to funding for capital expenditures (bonds), payments for judgments, or mandated social welfare program increases. Those exceptions effectively swallow the rule. Surprisingly the 2% property tax cap would apply to Medicaid cost increases even though the State has capped those increases at 3.5% per year. That means County contributions towards Medicaid will increase at nearly twice the rate of any permitted tax increases. This demonstrates how Albany operates on both a literal and figurative double standard. We don't need a tax cap. We need a spending cap and an end to mandates.

# Dr. John Mauro receives Weyl Award

SALVADOR, BRAZIL--The Pennsylvania State University and the International Commission on Glass announce the presentation of the 2010 Woldemar A. Weyl International Glass Science Award to Dr. John Mauro of the Science and Technology Division, Corning Incorporated, Corning.

The Weyl Award is presented every three years to recognize a young scientist whose work in glass has shown ingenuity, initiative, and, above all, innovative thinking. John received the prestigious award at the XXII International Congress on Glass held in Salvador, Brazil September 21 - 25, 2010. John is recog-

nized worldwide as an expert in the modeling and characterization of the relaxation behavior of glass. He is noted for a series of highly cited papers on statistical mechanical models of structural relaxation and for his development of computational techniques to implement his theory. John presented a plenary award lecture at the Congress entitled "Recent Advances in Liquid and Glassy Dynamics" wherein he presented new models for predicting the temperature and thermal history dependence of viscosity in glasses, a topic of crucial importance to the glass industry for developing new glasses and manufacturing

processes.

John, a native of Hornell, N.Y., is a graduate of Alfred-Almond Central School. He received a B.A. in Computer Science, B.S. in Glass Engineering Science, and Ph.D. in Glass Science, all from Alfred University. His Ph.D. thesis with Dr. Arun K. Varshneya established the groundwork for his later studies on the relaxation dynamics of glass and glass-forming liquids. John joined Corning in 1999 as a summer intern and was hired full-time in 2001 in the Modeling and Simulation department. Currently he is a Research Associate in the Glass Research department at Corning.

John is the author of 60 publications in international peer-reviewed journals, including such prestigious journals as the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences and Physical Review Letters. Last year his publication on the "Nonequilibrium Viscosity of Glass" was selected for Corning's 2009 Outstanding Publication Award.

His most recent publication on predicting the hardness of glass was selected as an Editors' Suggestion by the editors of Physical Review Letters and highlighted by the American Physical Society online journal Physics. John is also the author of three book chapters. He has been granted four U.S. patents and has five additional patents pending. He has given 40 invited presentations at conferences and seminars and an additional 41 contributed presentations at international meetings.

John is highly active in the external research community. He served as chair of this year's American Ceramic Society Glass and Optical Materials Division meeting in Corning, N.Y., drawing the largest attendance in the history of the conference. He also served as co-organizer of last year's International Workshop on Topology, Structure, and Dynamics in Non-Crystalline Solids in Paris, France. John is the founding chair of the Technical Committee on Atomistic Modeling of Glass as part of the International Commission on Glass. He is also editor of the special "GlassWorks" issue of ODYSSEY, a science magazine for children ages 12-16. John serves as co-advisor for two Ph.D. students in Glass Science at Aalborg University in Aalborg, Denmark.

John lives in Corning, together with his wife, Yihong, and daughter, Sofia, and spends most of his free time trying to keep up with the latter. John and his family are active members of All Saints Parish in Corning. John is the son of Ronald and Susie Mauro of Almond, an Alfred-Almond and AU grad.





## Focus on managerial industrial forests at next AU environmental seminar

ALFRED — Angela Fuller, assistant leader of the New York Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit, U.S. Geological Survey and assistant professor at Cornell University, will host the next Environmental Studies Seminar at Alfred University with a discussion titled, "Landscape-scale Spatial Modeling and Biodiversity Conservation in Managed Industrial Forests."

The lecture will take place on Friday, Oct. 22 at 12:20 p.m. in Roon Lecture Hall (Room 247), the Science Center, on the Alfred University Campus.

Fuller earned master of science and Ph.D. degrees in wildlife ecology from the University of Maine. Her master's work evaluated the response of American martens and their primary prey to partial timber harvesting; her Ph.D. research centered on multi-scalar responses of forest carnivores to habitat and spatial pattern, including movement patterns of Canada lynx and ecological thresholds for American martens in Maine and Newfoundland.

Fuller has been the assistant leader of the New York Coop Unit since November 2009. Her current research includes modeling black bear habitat relationships and evaluating landscape permeability of black bears across their range in New York, a DNA mark-recapture study using hair snares to be used for population abundance estimation for black bears, and an evaluation of northeast regional population structure of black bears.

The Environmental Studies Seminar series at Alfred University is held every Friday during the fall semester when the University is in session. All the lectures are free and open to the public.

Sponsored by the Division of Environmental Studies within Alfred University's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the series brings a range of speaker to the campus, including scientists, activists, and policy-makers, with the mission to better understand our environment and what we can do better to sustain our world.

"There are some very helpful people around you today." Oh, yes? Where are they! "An important person will soon be involved in your life." Wait, while I look out the window. Aha, the postman is approaching. He can be considered helpful as well as important. Or maybe these "people" are friends. "Place special emphasis on old friendship." "Your friend is trusty and true." "You will always be surrounded by true friends."

"As we advance in life, we learn our abilities." Hmm. Not too sure about that. I am, however, wising up to my physical disabilities, such as stiffness after sitting too long. 

ANGELICA--His style is born of old-time Delta blues, from the Mississippi to the Appalachian regions. His music is like that of Robert Johnson, Doc Watson, David Bromberg, and Keb Mo. Remarking on his musicianship, Frank DeBlase of City Newspaper said, "He dances across old National strings with red clay overtones in the swampy air, crisscrossing with Appalachian, bluegrass & Delta blues, arising from the smoke of an impending collision."

## Spanish prof to present Bergren Forum on '1930s Hollywood and Argentine Literature'

ALFRED—Erin Redmond, assistant professor of Spanish at Alfred University, will present "1930's Hollywood and Argentine Literature: Melodrama in Manuel Puig's Betrayed by Rita Hayworth" on Thursday, Oct. 21, during AU's Bergren Forum at 12:10 p.m., in Powell Campus Center's Nevins Theatre. # Ridge Walk, Run, Ride... something for everyone

WELLSVILLE--Sunday, October 17, 2010, was crisp; clear sometimes, cloudy at times, but a perfect day for it.

"It" was a most enjoyable event for those who love the outdoors and our beautiful county, the annual Ridge Walk...which is much more than that. Events offered to 1100 participants were; a 2 mile educational, "in the woods" experience, a 6 mile walk, a 9 mile walk, a 15 mile walk, a 3.1 mile (5K) run, a 6.2 mile (10K) run, a 15 mile memorial run, and a 25 or 33 mile bike ride.

Nine events to choose from, and each took participants over gorgeous trails and roads. The people who facilitate these experiences, from the check-in people at the school, to the school bus drivers who take participants to their starting points, to officials along the trail who guide and encourage the hordes of hikers, runners, and bikers, and to the blessed ones who dispense Gatorade and snacks...all, all of these dozens of people are kind, friendly, and helpful. What a wonderful experience! It's my particular favorite of the ones we participate in all year.

We (son Dan, granddaughter Claire, and I) were walkers. After a bus ride that would have done a roller coaster proud, we were let off for a short walk along the road, then followed the blue-and-white tape markers into the woods.

While the trail was muddy at times, it was mostly good footing on lumber roads and a newly cleared path. There were steep climbs, followed by steep descents, and one spectacular passage through a cleft between a huge pair of Olean Conglomerate boulders, reminiscent of Rock City, if you are familiar with it.

I told Claire there is a song about a cleft in the rock and she

wanted me to sing it for her as I puffed up the steep incline in the declivity. I declined.

We looked at brilliant green mosses, scaly bluish lichens, tatty aging ferns, and an occasional spectacular flaming scarlet leaf abandoned on the ground by the biology of the season. The leaf cover hid roots and rocks, so we had to watch our footing and were very glad to have our hiking poles.

A few times along the way, Dan hoisted (6-year-old) Claire to his shoulders to give her a rest. This generated comments from hikers and runners, including one (adult) person who offered to take Claire's place.

Some distance along the trail we spotted thoughtfully provided Port-a-Potties, and soon after, emerged onto a road where a table was set up, with a smiling young man dispensing fresh fruit, snacks, Gatorade, and water. After a refreshing break, punctuated by happy greetings from two of my students, we went back into the woods.

At the top of Alma Hill, we

noticed a working oil well. As we walked along the very long arm from an unseen engine powering the pumping, we began to smell the oil. A large storage tank, a picturesque shed, and a very strong smell of oil and sulfur told us when we reached the source of the power. A gentleman, Dale Vossler, whose pickup truck stood nearby, was waiting beside the path to talk to anyone interested in what was going on. The hike would have been worth it, just to see this old, amazingly productive site, and to hear Dale explain about oil. As we walked away, Dan commented to Claire that she might never again see such a sight.

Down the trail, we boarded a school bus for another roller coaster ride to the finish on a beautiful horse farm on a hillside outside of Wellsville. A huge white tent sheltered live music, vendors, and a delicious lunch of hot dogs, soups, potatoes, and homemade cookies for all participants. We greeted friends and neighbors and met some new ones, or ones we hadn't known before. We saw Pat and Bill Lacourse making their way up the hill to the farm finish with their bikes, as we were leaving. What a delicious day we all had!

Saxons Take Statesmen 13-0; 4500 Attendance.

Joe Renwick, 165-pound sophomore from St. Mary's, Pennsylvania, is challenging records. It was his passing that carried the Saxons to a 13-0 victory over Hobart last Saturday to bring Alfred's season mark to 2-2. Against Hobart, he completed 7 out of 8 for 177 yards. One was a 44-yard pass to John Shea of Mt. Vernon and set up the first touchdown. In four games, Renwick has completed 29 out of 51 for 424 yards. No Saxon passer has matched this pace in the last decade...

**Pleas for changes** in the domestic pets section of the proposed new Alfred village zoning ordinance and three other recommendations for change were made last night at a public hearing at the village firehall. Edward K. Lebohner, chairman of the seven member village planning commission that drew the proposed code, presided at the 90 minute meeting. Many of the twenty persons attending the meeting objected to the restrictions regarding domestic pets in the proposed new code. The code as listed prior to the meeting restricted animals within village limits to "domesticated dogs and cats except animals to be used by educational institutes for educational and instructional purposes." Several felt that the passage was discriminatory. The discussion on the domestic pet issue was punctuated by several humorous remarks including one by planning commission member Truman A. Parish who observed that "I'd hate to see a youngster deprived of having a couple rabbits. ## THE GLORY OF AMERICA

Thursday, October 21

On this date in 1864, Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation for a second annual Thanksgiving on the last Thursday in November.

ALMOND--James was one of Jesus' brothers although he never boasted about it. As a matter of fact, he considered himself a servant of Jesus. His book is one of the oldest in the New Testament and it was written more as a letter with the principles of how to live life. At this point in history, Christian theology was not filled out yet so James' book was really a "wisdom book".

Verse 2 in the scripture today says to 'consider it joy'. In other words, make a decision now to be joyful even through all your trials and temptations. We're not talking about the joy which manifests itself in giddiness, giggles, etc.

It's a deeper sense--it's the sense of the presence of God in your life. It's that sense which enables us to withstand all the 'stuff' that life sends our way.

Through experience we know that 'this too shall pass' so keep on going.

A simple example is the changes at our Walmart: you go in looking for something, and finally find it, although it no longer is in the same place it always was. Fine. However, go in the next time and...voila! It's moved again! Happens one more time at least until they finally have everything in place. It's frustrating, perhaps, but we know that at some point soon all will be in order and we will know where our items can be found.

Be joyful when surrounded--making the decision before troubles arrive allows you to carry that sense of God's presence in your life and it will help you withstand the 'attacks'. As each trial, trouble arrives on the scene our faith is tested. That testing produces experience which lets us know that we will make it through--we will endure. Whatever the Devil wants to do with us, our faith has him whipped---because we endure. As we work to perfect ourselves, we grow into maturity. That's what it takes---this perfection cannot happen overnight.

A child will not play piano perfectly overnight--he must learn the skills, how to play a musical performance. Just as in the case of this child, we cannot perfect our strength overnight. It takes time to mature into it, but it does happen.

So, when you find yourself on the receiving end of an attack, circle the wagons and remember that Joy, the sense of the presence of God, will allow you to endure. My grace is sufficient for you. Therefore, Consider It All Joy.



# Energy workshop to be held Monday, Oct. 25

ALFRED--Alfred Alive member and Institute of Sustainability Director (ASC), Brian Baker, announced an energy workshop to be held at the Alfred State College Engineering Technology Conference Room (Lecture Room 215) at 7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 25.

The Energy workshop is the third workshop in a series to promote awareness of Alfred's desire to promote sustainability, generate greater awareness and to encourage conservation in the community.

This workshop will repeat an earlier workshop held in Wellsville. Two speakers, Jeff Stevens and Glenn Brubaker will discuss solar, geothermal and wind energy.

At the earlier Alfred Alive workshops Kasey (and Mark Klingensmith) covered pesticide use in the garden and lawn. This evening included testing attendee's soil.

The second Alfred Alive energy workshop included three speakers: John Werner (Wellsville contractor and ASC instructor); Bob Volk, (community member and Tinkertown owner); and, Keuka professor and local grower, Kasey Klingensmith.

Their tips bear repeating.

--- for every one degree you lower your thermostat you save about 3% on the heating bill;

--- a poorly insulated/sealed house has a heat escape route the equivalent of a 2' by 2' hole;

--- properly installed insulation has the foiled paper to the heat sources--not towards the cold;

---compressing insulation reduces its effectiveness;

---heat loss sources include:doors-11%, windows-10%, sills/walls/ceilings- 31%, fireplace-14%, ducts- 10%, electric outlets- 2%, plumbing- 12%, flues and vents-4%

---insulating window frames can be accomplished with the use of low expansion foam insulation.

--- there are 30% tax credits and rebates available for purchasing energy saving appliances; however, these opportunities may end soon.

--- You should examine your lighting possibilities.

\* CFL or the compact fluorescent light last 14 times longer than incandescent.

\* LED or light emitting diode light last 50 to 100 times longer than the incandescent. Please consider changing your bulbs out!

---Vampire or phantom energy is electric current consumed when appliances that are not in use continue to draw a current. This "sleep mode" or "standby" consumption is 10 to 15% of your total household consumption.



# Late field goal blows away AU unbeaten season, 27-24

TROY--A 37-yard field goal with six seconds left in regulation gave host RPI a 27-24 victory Saturday afternoon over the previously unbeaten Alfred University football team (5-1, 2-0 Empire 8) on a windy day in Troy in which all scoring occurred at the south end of the new stadium.

The loss spoiled Alfred's comeback from a 24-point first quarter deficit in which the Saxons scored 24 unanswered to tie the game late in the third.

RPI scored on each of their first four possessions to take a 24-0 lead with 28 seconds left in the opening stanza. A field goal and a touchdown during the out-

burst came after Alfred fumbles in Saxon territory. RPI booted a 21-yard field goal to open the scoring and scored on three touchdown passes.

Alfred got on the board with 59 seconds left in the second on an eight-yard run by freshman tailback Austin Dwyer (Hornell) that capped a nine-play, 67-yard drive. Dwyer, Alfred's leading runner, finished with 160 yards on 26 carries.

A 33-yard field goal by Eric Rockwood (Allegany-Limestone) midway through the third made it 21-10, RPI. Two TD passes by junior quarterback Tom Secky (Bemus Point/Maple Grove) to senior wideout Ryan

Thon (Victor)—with 4:46 and eight seconds left in the third—knotted the game at 24-24.

Neither team mounted much of a scoring threat throughout much of the fourth. Alfred punted on each of its fourth-quarter possessions, while RPI punted once and turned the ball over on downs on its first two possessions of the final frame. Secky completed 28 of 45 passes for 246 yards and two scores. Freshman wide receiver Josh Phillips (Syracuse/West Genesee) caught nine passes for 126 yards and Thon finished with seven catches for 67 yards and two scores.

## Three brothers playing soccer together

HOUGHTON—The referee blew his whistle. As the 17-year-old, full of nerves, slapped the hand of his outgoing teammate and jogged to his position on the field, he didn't realize the gravity of this moment. Two parents in the crowd did. In jubilation, Troy and Susan Martin watched their three sons, Aaron, Devon, and Cory, share the soccer field. For 143 fleeting seconds, three brothers played together for the Houghton Highlanders.

Playing Highlander soccer is a culmination of the brothers' lives up to this point. It is a rare day for Aaron '11, Devon '12, and Cory '14 not to be involved in sports in some way. It could be playing soccer, basketball, and baseball throughout junior high and high school, watching virtually any sporting event on television — whether it's their favorite team or not — following their favorite team's game on the internet, or simply reading articles on ESPN.com or in the latest issue of *Sports Illustrated*. Growing up in a small town like Houghton, they simply did not have a lot to do, so they played sports.

As their boys grew up, Troy and Susan hoped that their children could play collegiate athletics. Watching them play against each other in the front yard five nights a week decked out in shoulder pads, pants with thigh pads, and football jerseys and helmets, the parents knew that the kids would want to play sports competitively as long as they could. What shocked them was that the boys grew up to play soccer.

Even now, the guys admit that as they made their college decision, the number one choice for each of them was to play basketball. They had grown up with basketball, going to numerous college games with their parents. When Aaron was in junior high, Jamie Mullen '86 (Houghton College), Fillmore Central School varsity soccer and basketball coach, tried to persuade the oldest brother that the merits of soccer far surpassed those of basketball. The man who would later coach Aaron in both sports told him, "You watch, the great irony is that some day you and your brothers will be playing college soccer at Houghton or some such place, and basketball will be a pastime at best." Aaron's response? "Not a chance."

By chance, none of the brothers ended up being tall enough to play basketball. By their own admission, they also lacked the talent to play meaningful minutes on the court. By the time college decisions came around, soccer had become a viable option. The clincher came when they each stayed a weekend with the Houghton men's soccer team and knew they wanted to be a part of this great group of men.

Aaron was the first to join the Houghton College soccer team in August 2007. After being switched from forward to defender, his senior season is being spent covering the midfield. While embracing every position

change, Aaron has excelled off the field with a 3.8 GPA, double majoring in English and education. Devon became the second Martin to play soccer for the college in the fall of 2008. Although the forward is unsure what he wants to do with his communication and intercultural studies double major, his younger brother, Cory, knows that he wants to teach. As the first-year student signed his letter of intent only months ago, what Troy and Susan never thought of as a possibility became a reality: their three sons would play collegiate soccer for the same team.

Coach Mullen described their Godfather-like bond, "Like most brothers, they acted antagonistically in front of other people, but not too far below the surface, they were fiercely protective of each other and admired the others' abilities." Aaron agreed. "A brother goes deeper than any friendship could."

It is odd that in a story about three soccer players, there is little mention of athletic skill or statistics. This is not because they are not good enough — Aaron plays all 90 minutes of every match, Devon plays an average of 20 minutes and has made three starts this season, while Cory has appeared in eight of the first 12 matches. The real reason lies in who they are and how they act. Anyone who spends time with them under-

stands it is not necessary to mention soccer. Ten seconds after the interview ended, Devon had picked up and began strumming a guitar, while Aaron and Cory began a conversation with a Houghton student they had never talked to before. It was as if soccer did not exist. These are not soccer players who happen to be nice guys; they are gentlemen who feel fortunate to be able to play soccer.

The gentlemen did not always get along when they were younger; they found it easier to get on each others' nerves rather than just getting along. Despite the brotherly disputes of their younger years, the three brothers also created fond memories while they were little: playing snow football in the front yard, watching American Gladiators and then recreating it in their basement with Nerf guns, and the annual chopping down of the Christmas tree — that inevitably turned into 45 minutes of chasing and tackling each other. These bonding times are some of their proudest moments.

None of those memories, however, compare with the pride each brother felt as they shared the soccer field together. They now wonder were those two minutes the last time the three will play as one? Not a chance.
