



The Sun in South Carolina

W. Richard Stephens Jr. named to replace Bill Hall as AU provost

ALFRED—W. Richard Stephens Jr., who is currently provost at Catawba College in Salisbury, NC, will join the administrative team at Alfred University as provost and vice president for academic affairs, effective July 1.

Stephens will succeed William F. Hall, who is retiring after 33 years at Alfred University, where he has been provost and academic vice president for the past three years.

"We appreciate Bill Hall's service to Alfred University and we will miss him, personally and professionally, but we are pleased to be able to fill this critical role with Rick Stephens, a seasoned chief academic officer," said President Charles M. Edmondson.

Stephens says he accepted the offer to join Alfred University's administration because "Alfred is an excellent small university, well-poised for this time in higher education when nimbleness is required."

Throughout the interview process, Stephens said he was impressed with the interest, enthusiasm and excitement he found among the faculty, staff and students at Alfred University.

"Every school has certain aspirations and opportunities," said Stephens, "but not every school has the human capital to take advantage of them the way that Alfred does. I was just really impressed by the people."

He and his wife Debbie agreed "Alfred is not just a university, but a community."

As a sociologist, Stephens said he's accustomed to listening to

people, to learning their stories, and that's what his Day 1 agenda will be at AU.

Stephens has a track record at several other institutions, and at each "I have been able to help the institution figure out how to deliver its mission." Alfred, he believes, understands its mission, and he can "help people give some real focus to that. That's something I am eager to do."

Stephens joined Catawba as provost in January of 2009. Among his accomplishments was the strategic hiring of 25 percent of the faculty. As positions became available, Stephens said he weighed how each should be filled to best advance the college's mission.

He created a Winter Term session, expanded summer school offerings; led the review, revision and implementation of the general education curriculum for the liberal arts college with 1,300 undergraduate students.

Stephens led the redevelopment of the School of Evening and Graduate Studies to include two off-site programs – one at Davidson County Community College and one at Central Piedmont Community College. The program at CPCC is a partnership with N.C.'s largest institution of higher education, with 75,000 students focused on business and early childhood education. The CPCC program was recently evaluated with highest of commendations by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Commission on Colleges.

In partnership with faculty, de-

velopment colleagues, and friends of the college, gifts and grants in excess of \$4 million were raised for use in academic program development in environmental science/sustainability and business, first generation student programming, classroom technology upgrades, internships, student and faculty international travel, a summer environmental summit for high school students, and a major National Science Foundation program for STEM education.

Stephens was involved in developing new programming for recording arts in music, graduate degrees in education, business, and athletic training, undergraduate health science such as nursing, and further facilities upgrades in theater and classroom space.

Stephens has also led Catawba's SACS accreditation efforts through fifth year interim reports, substantive change reports, focused visits, and the run-up to the college's decennial reaffirmation. Over the past three years, he has served on numerous SACS review teams.

A native of the southern Illinois area, Stephens earned his undergraduate degree in sociology from Greenville College, graduating *magna cum laude*. He earned two graduate degrees from the University of Kansas, one in sociology and the other in philosophy.

He was awarded a Pew Grant in the 1980s to study socialist reform in the Soviet Union and economic reform in China. While in the Soviet Union, he was also assigned to conduct baseball clinics as a roving instructor by the International Baseball Association.

Stephens has served as an assistant professor, associate professor, professor and chair of the department of sociology and social work at Greenville College in Greenville, IL; as a visiting professor of sociology at Nizhni Novgorod State University in Nizhni Novgorod, Russia; as vice president for academic affairs and as academic dean at Eastern Nazarene College in Quincy, MA.; and as chief academic officer and dean of the School of Graduate and Professional Studies at Husson University in Bangor, ME.

Rick and Debbie Stephens have two adult children and one grandchild.

Voters approve A-A \$12 million budget

ALMOND—They said yes.

Alfred-Almond Central School District voters Tuesday, May 21 approved a 2013-14 budget of \$12,174,412 by a 262 "yes" to 95 "no" vote.

Nadine Shardlow, unopposed in her bid for a third term on the A-A Board of Education, received 250 votes in being re-elected.

The purchase of a 32-passenger wheelchair school bus passed by a 272 to 76 vote while voters also approved expending \$100,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund to finance boiler repairs and building and safety improvements, 296 "yes" to 54 "no".

At its May 15 meeting, the A-A Board of Education...

...VOTED to participate in the cooperative bidding for all Cafeteria Supplies with GST BOCES for the 2013-2014 school year.

...APPROVED the contract with Aurora Audiology & Speech Associates, Inc. for the 2013-14 school year.

...APPROVED making budget adjustments to the 2013-2014 budget with Erie 1 BOCES, decreasing one line in the amount of \$20,810.00 while increasing another line in the

amount of \$22,500.00 to bring the amount in participation to the correct amount for the shared tech integrator service.

...APPROVED the purchase of on-line textbooks, *Discovering French 2*: published by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, to be used in Kirsten Calkins' French Classes; and *Descubre 1, 2, 3*, 2nd edition by Jose A. Blanco, published by Vista Higher Learning, to be used in Carol Amman's Spanish 4 Ace Classes.

...APPROVED Superintendent, Richard Calkins' attendance at the 2013 Rural Schools Association Conference in Cooperstown, New York, July 14-16, 2013.

...APPROVED an increase in prices for School Lunches in the amount of .05¢ for the 2013-2014 school year. Prices will be: Breakfast \$1.30; Lunch K-4 \$1.95; Lunch 5-12 \$2.15; Most Snacks-Sides .70/.80¢; Adult Lunch \$3.35 + tax and Adult Breakfast \$2.37 + tax.

...ACCEPTED Bob Woughter's letter of resignation as the Seventh Grade Co-Advisor, effective immediately, with regret and appreciation.

She was predeceased by her parents; husband; and a daughter, Patricia C. Stebbins.


Jean lived nearly all of her 88 years in Whitesville near her family. Jim and Jean were the heart of their family and gave them the gift of a lifetime of special memories.



White House Spinach Pie delicious!

I found this recipe in the May 3rd USA WEEKEND insert in our Sunday paper. I have always loved spinach, but no one else in my family does. I thought this just might get them interested and it turned out to be delicious!

It is a recipe created by the White House Chefs in honor of Michelle Obama's White House garden. She says it is a favorite of her daughters... "The kids like anything with cheese and a crust!"

I used a purchased pie crust, but you could try out my recipe from a few weeks back for No Roll Pie Crust.

White House Spinach Pie

- | | |
|---------------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 1 9" unbaked pie crust | 2 lg. eggs, beaten |
| 2 T. olive oil | 1 c. half-and-half |
| 6 cloves garlic, minced | 1 tsp. grated lemon zest |
| 1 sm. onion, chopped | 1 tsp. chopped thyme leaves |
| 1 lb. fresh spinach | 6 oz. Feta cheese, crumbled |
| salt and ground pepper to taste | 8 oz. Swiss cheese, grated |

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Place pie crust on a rimmed baking sheet lined with foil. In a medium skillet over med. heat, drizzle in the olive oil. Add garlic and onion and sauté until translucent, 5-7 minutes. Do not let the garlic burn. Add the spinach and cook until wilted. Season with salt and pepper; set aside to cool.

In a med. bowl whisk together the eggs and half-and-half. Add lemon zest and thyme. Add spinach, feta cheese and half the Swiss cheese and mix until well combined. Season with salt and pepper. Pour the mixture carefully into the pie shell and sprinkle the remaining Swiss cheese evenly over the top. Bake for about 40 minutes, or until the center is set. Cool for at least 10 minutes before serving. (Serves 8)

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
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A Different View...

Don't you think that Allegany County Legislator David Pullen ["From the Desk of David Pullen", *The Alfred Sun*, 5/30/13] paints a rather biased account of the NYS and Local Retirement System being responsible for over burdening county tax payers, especially when county man-

agement practices often reward long-term, loyal employees by allowing them to amass the greatest share of "overtime" work each year?

And, as we know, all salary payments go toward projecting the eventual future costs to the retirement fund, including those "retirement-to-grave" checks which are often times much greater than an employee's yearly base salary at retirement.

No doubt, it may be good for some employees, but not so good for the tax payers when the future retirement bill comes to be paid, as Mr. Pullen complains. If the county allows or supports such "gaming" of the retirement system, perhaps our county legisla-

tors need to tighten up their management practices before pointing the finger at the NYS and Local Retirement System as an easier target.

With so many private sector firms now days avoiding the offer of a traditional pension fund, to which the company contributes a share toward retirements, instead, will just provide an automatic electronic transfer of a partial amount of the employees' regular pay checks into a (401)k account. This leaves those private sector employees exclusively responsible for their own retirement capital. So we see the steady erosion of private sector job perks happening. This may be great for businesses, but not a good model for employees and their families, with salaries having remained "flat" for decades.

And, our nation is still experiencing a large number of private sector firms going into bankruptcy in the lagging economic downturn and defaulting on their retirement plans, that state and local fund retirees are thankful that NYS has continued to honor its promises to those in and approaching retirement. The NYS and Local Retirement Program is a wise and sound investment which helps to attract the best in the work force into public service jobs, especially now.

MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND – EVENTS AND IMPRESSIONS

Memorial Day weekend was memorable for several reasons. For us, the weekend began on Friday, May 24th, with a wedding rehearsal for my daughter, Elizabeth, and her fiancé, Vali Ciobanu. Saturday was filled with the wedding itself, reception, and lots of visiting with family and friends. Monday was spent attending the Fillmore Memorial Day parade, and getting things somewhat back to normal after everyone else had left town. It was an exhausting but wonderful weekend.

On Tuesday I returned to work in the morning, and then attended the Board of Legislators meeting, that had been pushed back a day because of the holiday. The session began with the Pledge of Allegiance, led by retired Army Sergeant First Class James Mitchell, of Fillmore. I have had the privilege of knowing Jim for many years and have observed his selfless service to our community. He is a living example of what has made America great, and (for me) he embodies what Memorial Day is all about.

Privilege of the Floor was granted to Reita Soback-Lynch, the new President of the Allegany Senior Foundation. She presented Chairman Curt Crandall with a check for \$2,000 from the Oriona Grove Lodge #229, to be used by the Meals on Wheels Program. She also invited everyone present to attend the upcoming "Swingin' 2 the Oldies" Gala sponsored by the Allegany Senior Foundation. The Gala will be held at the Alfred Tech Campus Activities Center on Saturday, June 8th. Tickets can be obtained from Foundation Board members or from the County Office For the Aging.

The Board then considered nine different resolutions. Resolution #84-13 granted salary increment increases to both unit and non-unit employees. Resolution #85-13 created two positions of Election Technician Level 1 and two positions of Election Technician Level 2. It also established the hourly rate of pay for both positions, and abolished the former position of Election Technician. These changes were required by State regulations. Resolution #86-13 created a job title of Election Inspector/Coordinator and set a per diem rate of pay for primary elections and general elections. This change was also required by State regulations.

Resolution #87-13 was intended to create the position of Correction Lieutenant and Correction Captain in the Sheriff's Department, and to abolish the positions of Correction Master Sergeant and Assistant Jail Administrator. This resolution was withdrawn to permit revisions to be made by the County Attorney before it is re-submitted to the Board.

Resolution #88-13 approved the apportionment of Mortgage Tax to the various municipalities in the County. A total of \$128,530.21 was authorized to be paid to those municipalities. Resolution #89-13 also approved the apportionment and payment to those municipalities from the "Additional Mortgage Tax" that was retained by the County Clerk. This resolution approved the payment of \$25,807.66 to those municipalities. Resolution #90-13 accepted a gift from the Village of Angelica of land located within the Town of Belfast. This gift related to the lands currently used as a launch site for Genesee River Wilds near Transit Bridge. Resolution #91-13 accepted a payment from NYMIR of \$225 to replace a cracked vehicle windshield. Resolution #92-13 approved the Allegany County Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan 2013 Update. This represents an update of the existing Transportation Plan.

Over the past week I visited several cemeteries and observed the flags and other markers at the graves of our veterans. This had a surprising impact upon me. It was very moving to think about how many veterans gave so much to protect our nation. It was also encouraging to see how our veterans' organizations commemorate the military service of their comrades. There is a special bond that exists among the "Band of Brothers" who have served and risked life and limb together. If possible, visit a cemetery and say a prayer for our veterans. Also, take time to thank any veterans that you know for their service. Remember, Freedom is never free.

In memory of her late husband, Pat Jessup

Art professor donates painting to Hornell Airport

ALFRED—Lise Lemeland, associate professor of drawing and painting in the School of Art & Design at Alfred University, has donated an original mural-sized painting to the City of Hornell, owner of the Hornell Municipal Airport, in memory of the late Patrick Jessup.

The oil-on-canvas was created specifically for Patrick and the Hornell aviation community.

Jessup was piloting a plane that crashed near the Lock Haven, PA, airport in June 2010, killing Jessup and two passengers. Associated with Sterling Airways, Jessup was a well-respected and popular charter pilot and flight instructor for more than 20 years. He is credited with teaching many local pilots to fly, including Lemeland.

More than that, however, Jessup was her husband.

Dedication of the painting in his memory was held at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, May 30 at the Hornell airport, with Mayor Shawn Hogan, as well as many of Jessup's family, friends and fellow pilots in attendance.

JetSmart Aviation, the com-

pany that now manages and runs the airport for the city, hosted the event.

With the dedication, the City of Hornell gains a distinction shared with The Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum; three of Lemeland's aviation-themed paintings are in the Smithsonian's permanent collection.

She has said that for her flying and painting are "inextricably entwined." She uses flying, particularly aerobatics, as inspiration for her work.

"Since Pat's death, I have continued to pursue my flying, specifically competition aerobatics," said Lemeland.

Last summer, the Federal Aviation Administration granted her a waiver for an "aerobatic box" right over the Hornell airport, which allows her to practice her routine right over the airport's

runway.

"This is quite a neat thing for me," said Lemeland. "Not only is it great for practicing my sequence, but if someone happens

to be at the airport while I am up practicing, they can see my flying upside down.

"Pat would be very proud, I know."

members may notice some unusual music coming from the carillon. You might say, 'that sounds like John Cage.' And you would be correct." Cage pieces are famous for their improvised elements, however many of his works demand precise timing and structure.

Carillonneur Buckwalter is a musician of many talents. One of her most recent pieces, an arrangement of the AU alma mater based on Debussy's "Clair de Lune" was paired with video work by AU's Rick McLay, a collaboration that won a Top 20 spot on Youtube.com's holiday video list.

While Buckwalter has never before performed a Cage work, she is enjoying the task.

"I decided to do this for the experience. You often learn to appreciate music more by spending time with it," she said.

WEIRD WEATHER

I call it weird weather: hot out of season then killing frosts, too wet, too dry, high winds much more frequently. Enough to make a gardener grumpy and the garden a hit or miss. If your plot is exposed to the winds, a windbreak, live or fence, will help. This was covered last month.

Mulching so far this year has been a mixed blessing. Moisture in the ground from winter snow melt was conserved but as this spring's shortfall in April-May barely wet the mulch, not enough to go through. We were short 4-5 inches for last year and so far this year down 3. Since I am on a well, I have put aside the sprinkler in favor of deeply hand watering the rows. If you have soaker hoses, use them.

My new rain barrels are to be installed. My 800 square foot roof equals the size of the garden that needs watering. An inch of rain a week is what is needed. The roof to barrel to garden supply gives an extra inch. If your house is downhill from the garden this won't work! Free gravity only works going downhill!

Another problem is the 80 degree days in May. Spinach and lettuce like cool weather or they turn bitter. Perhaps a lattice set over them would help.

All the problems aside, it has been a glorious spring, well appreciated after the old-fashioned winter. Hopes for a bountiful harvest abides!

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In The Alfred Sun 50, 25 and 10 Years Ago

FIFTY YEARS AGO, JUNE 6, 1963

The Alfred University School of Theology will send its last students into the ministry on June 9 when nine men receive their Bachelor of Divinity degrees at Sunday's Commencement convocation. The departure of the final class will mark an end to 96 years of theological education here. The Seventh Day Baptist General Conference is establishing a new training center for its ministers at its headquarters in Plainfield, N.J. Dean Albert N. Rogers has accepted the pastor of the Seventh Day Baptist Church in Denver, Colo. Dr. Melvin G. Nida, Associate Professor of Biblical Studies, will join the faculty of Salem College at Salem, W. Va. Dr. Alfred J. Gross, Professor of Theology, will be subject to a new appointment by the Methodist Conference. Leaders of the Seventh Day Baptist denomination were prominent in the history of local education and the establishment of Alfred University. Settlers of the area organized a Select School here in 1836 which provided education beyond the level of the public grade school of its day. This later became Alfred Academy and supports of that institution together with the Seventh Day Baptist Education Society led the way to creation of Alfred University. They sent Jonathan Allen, then an instructor in the Academy, to Albany where he was successful in winning legislative approval of the Charter which created Alfred University in 1857. That Charter provided for theological education and a curriculum which has since become Liberal Arts education. Theological instruction began in 1858 and a department was organized in 1861. A three-year program of theological studies was announced in 1864 and the first class of eight men graduated in 1874. Among the first teachers of theology courses were Jonathan Allen, then the second President of Alfred University, Darwin E. Maxson and Nathan B. Hull...

ALMOND—Here we are with the second in a series titled: God is Big Enough--Changing Our Ideas About God.

He dug and pried and pulled, but it didn't move.

Dad was watching all this go on and finally asked his boy, "What are you doing there?" His son told him all about the rock and that he had tried everything. Then his Dad said, "No, you didn't try everything. You didn't ask

me for help."

Great story, isn't it? Just like us way too many times, right? We have big problems---we do everything we can think of---but we didn't ask God for help. Granted, we are raised to work hard and 'do it ourselves', but there are plenty of times when we should ask for help.

There are lots of examples of God's help in scriptures. Consider the dreaded disease, Leprosy---curable now, but then it was a death sentence...a long, painful wait for death...so contagious you would be cast out on your own. What can we learn from the story about the Leper who approached Jesus for healing?

First, we see that he approached with confidence--he knew Jesus would listen and not drive him away. We never have to feel incurable--we can always go to Jesus--He will never drive us away.

Second, he approached with

humility. He did not demand to be healed. "If you wish to, you can heal me." Demanding is arrogant.

Third, He approached with reverence. The Leper probably didn't know much about Jesus--he wasn't allowed to live in the area where Jesus was teaching. Instinctively he knew he was in the presence of the divine. God was filled with compassion, touch the hand and be healed. Approach God in prayer. Be confident that you can approach God--He will listen. But don't get flippant about it--be humble and reverent.

Jesus told His disciples to preach this message: "The kingdom of heaven is near. Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons. Freely you have received, freely give."

Ponder this well. Aren't we also disciples? Perhaps there is a great deal of power at our disposal, power that we don't tap into, maybe because we just don't know it's there. Because we doubt. Because we lack faith. Ask. Ask with confidence. Ask with humility. Ask with reverence. Ask with faith. God has made a promise.

And God is Big Enough to keep that promise.

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Mueller Mullings

CABLE

Simple words have a way of both acquiring new meanings and possessing forgotten ones. For instance, imagine yourself dining with friends in a restaurant. What pops into your mind when you overhear only the word "cable" spoken at a nearby table?

Your dinner companions could speculate that any of several related topics are being discussed. One might come up with the transatlantic telegraph cables which first opened that form of communication between Europe and North America in the 1850's. Or, the successors, transatlantic telecommunications cables. Another might envision mountain and canyon climbers using cables.

You might suggest that the speaker is recommending a particular TV cable service. Someone else might assume that nationally newsworthy storm damage which knocked down various kinds of cable wiring is being brought up.

I wonder if any of your hypothetical fellow diners would hear the word "cable" and immediately picture a spinet piano? In approximately the year 1940 that is precisely what would have come to my juvenile mind. I probably knew very little, if anything, about other meanings of the word. It was at that time that my father bought a spinet, and enrolled my mother, big sister, and me in piano lessons. My mother quickly mastered playing it for an enjoyable purpose. On many evenings she would accompany our family of four while we sang the words to a variety of songs. As I realized years later, in some cases I had been too deaf and too young to understand the actual words.

I routinely scan used book shelves in various places, such as thrift stores or the Planned Animal Life (P.A.L.) booth near the bus stop on West University Street in Alfred, New York. One type of item which I am always hoping to find is a song book with contents dating from no later than the 1940's. I want to fill in my blanks.

Recently I turned one up. Hastily flipping through it, I discovered some songs which I was seeking. Once at home the book became buried in a pile of items reserved for future examination. Eventually it worked its way to the top. When I acquired it I had only noticed its title, "The One Hundred and One Best Songs." Now more thorough scrutiny left me astonished.

The slim, aged, little paperback, 8 1/2 inches tall and 5 1/2 inches wide, had other words on its front cover making it particularly meaningful to me. They included "Published by The Cable Company, Cable Building, Chicago. The World's Greatest Manufacturers of Pianos Inner-Player Pianos and Organs." Also, "Copyright 1913 The Cable Company."

That was the manufacturer of my family's spinet! As I recall, the word "Cable" appeared above its keyboard. Gracing the songbook's front cover is a drawing of a family of four gathered near a piano which a daughter is playing. And that is not all.

In faded ink there is an impression of a rubber stamp at the top of the front cover. It reads, "N.Y. State School of Agriculture." I can make a reasonable assumption as to why that institution discarded the book. Still, I would like to know how they acquired it.

On the back cover is a smaller rendition of the family group picture and advertising jargon for "The Kingsbury Piano." It begins with the admonition, "Men of Modest Means Should Not Speculate. From such homes as theirs and yours come the musicians of today and the future. Provide these young people with a True Toned piano and one that retains that Tone."

By now I have looked up The Cable Company in Wikipedia. The article says that it made instruments bearing several different names. And there were several different "cables," too. The company was founded by Herman D. Cable in 1880. His brothers, Fayette S. Cable and Hobart M. Cable, joined it in 1890 but also continued to build pianos under their own names.

As for the de-mystification of various song's words, even with it in print before me I cannot pronounce correctly the second verse of Auld Lang Syne: "We twa ha'e run a-boot the braes, And pu'd the gow-ans fine..." Oh well, I never stay awake until midnight on New Year's Eve anyway.

Actually it is the words in very fine print at the foot of each page in the book which have entranced me. No, not the ones touting The Cable Company's or its associates' products, but the others. These are quotations, requiring no musical accompaniment, which nevertheless strike a note as resonant today as when printed there in 1913. "The law of the worthy life is fundamentally the law of strife. It is only through labor and painful effort, by grim energy and resolute courage, that we move on to better things." -- Theodore Roosevelt

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

ALFRED—Dave Conrad said he was looking forward to bicycling with fellow Alfred University (AU) alumni May 31-June 7 from Albany to Alfred for Reunion Weekend, June 7-9. A rider for at least 25 years, Conrad, AU Class of 1976, says bicycling has introduced him to many interesting people and areas of the country.

"It's gotten me out to smell the smells and feel the feels that are out there when it's just you and the bike on the road," says Conrad.

The ride to Reunion Weekend inspired Conrad to rediscover his passion for bicycling. In 2000, he suffered an injury in a Burlington, VT bike race, leading to an 11 and a-half year hiatus from cycling as he fell out of his training schedule and his bicycle gathered cobwebs in his Putnam, CT home.

After reading an article about the alumni bike trip, he decided to retrain and participated in last year's trip. He says camaraderie and reminiscing among the alumni makes the event successful.

"What really brings people back is the fact that you have fun," says Conrad. "You have a pre-ride meal at the crack of dawn, you're on a bike basically all day and at the end of the day, you sit down and have a nice beer."

1958 graduates Elliot Lasky and Russ Fahey began this tradition in 1998, when they biked to their 40th Reunion from Colmar, PA, Lasky's hometown, through the Pocono Mountains to Alfred. Ten years later, they repeated the journey with classmates Andy

The past three routes have taken the alumni cyclists through

the Catskill, Adirondack, and Allegheny mountains in 2010, 2011 and 2012, respectively. The riders stop at the end of each day at hotels to sleep and refresh. They partake in lunches and dinners during the journey, sometimes with fellow alums from the area where they are passing through, culminating with the "Triumph Celebration" dinner at the Sunset Inn in Hornell, where a group of local Alfred alumni and former and current faculty and staff members greet them.
