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### **Lecture: 1812 - New York's War, New York's Impetus**

While the Battles of Sackets Harbor or Plattsburgh do not carry the cachet of a Gettysburg or Saratoga, the War of 1812, now in its bicentennial, was very much New York's war. New Yorkers responded to the conflict militarily and otherwise and the war exposed serious inadequacies in the state's infrastructure and the nation's military capacity.

This presentation with slides and period quotes examines the impact of the war and its aftermath on the people of New York and the public improvements made to roads and canals partly in response to the war.

This program, which is free and open to the public, is made possible through the support of the NY Council for the Humanities' Speakers in the Humanities program.

Additional information on the speaker:

Robert W. Arnold III is a public historian and historical consultant. He was for 17 years the Chief of Government Records Services at the NYS Archives.

Arnold was Albany County Historian for several years, directed archaeological excavations in the Capital District and the historical structures inventory of hundreds of Albany's buildings. He is a longtime Commissioner of Historic Resources for the City of Albany.

Arnold has taught Albany's history, colonial American, 19th century US, NYS, and local and regional history for 29 years at the College of Saint Rose. He also teaches Civil War, Colonial Revolutionary, and diplomatic American history courses at Excelsior College.
