For more than 34 years Anton Reijnders has been active as a sculptor. In his works he combines ceramics with different materials, like wood, textile or found materials.

Besides sculptures Reijnders makes installations and site-specific works. Through his work Reijnders wants to offer opportunities for reflection and concentration. He hopes his works evokes awareness of the automatism in which we attribute meaning, and our conditioned way of looking.

Reijnders has worked as artistic adviser at the 'Keramisch Werkcentrum' in Heusden, the Netherlands (1987 - 1991), and contributed to the creation of what in 1991 was to become the European Ceramic Work Center (EKWC) in 's-Hertogenbosch, the Netherlands.

As Head of Studios and Workshops (1991 - 2004) he was involved in dialogue with artists from all over the world. He was the driving force behind setting up the material research programme and is author of the book 'The Ceramic Process' jointly with the EKWC published by A&C Black in London, and Pennsylvania Press in the USA.

Besides having taken part in exhibitions throughout the world, Reijnders has contributed to conferences, symposia, workshops, and was visiting artist in countries such as Australia; South Korea; the United States; Austria; Belgium Germany; Great Brittan, Ireland; Norway; Spain, and Switzerland.

He is has been twice visiting professor at the College of Ceramics at Alfred University. Currently he is teaching at the Gerrit Rietveld Academy and Sandberg Institute, Amsterdam, the Netherlands.
