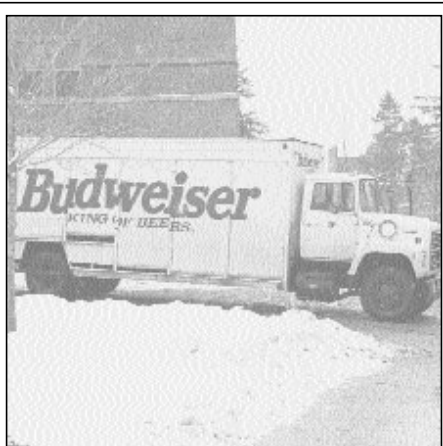

D-train coming to AU

With the increase of students attending Alfred University from the New York City metropolitan area, talks of extending the D-train path into Alfred have been confirmed.

After a year of debate and research, city officials, AU administration and the Metropolitan Transportation Authority have agreed to build a subway system along Route 17. The funding would come from various sources.

Although it was AU administration that proposed the project, other schools along the way pitched in.

"It's only natural for them to hitch onto the bandwagon," said big guy at AU of the cooperative schools.

"A lot of city students have to ride up through 17, anyway," he added.

One such school is SUNY Binghamton. Over 63 percent of the student population at Binghamton reside in New York City.

After the D-train's last stop in New York City, Norwood 205 Street, the train would then go express straight to

Binghamton. After a 10-minute stop, the journey would continue into Alfred.

Once in Alfred, the train would loop into the city of Hornell a couple of times before swing back towards New York City.

Other schools are also interested in participating in the new D-train project.

Ithaca College and Vassar College have expressed interest in extensions to

veer off from the main line and into their colleges.

Proposals have been raised to make the B-train the local partner of the express D-train.

For now, the D-train is the only project passed and ready to go.

Students are very enthusiastic about the proposal.

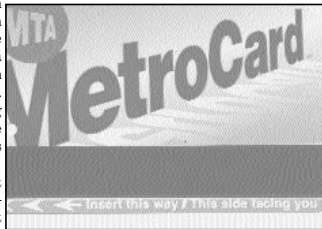
"What's a subway?" asked a freshman.

Stadium upgrade plans hit snag: enough fans?

AU's big move to D-I sports hit a snag when it was announced by the Stadium Expansion Committee that there may not be enough fans to fill the proposed Kenyon Stadium at Merrill Field.

"We are unsure if we can fill all 60,000 seats on a continuous basis," said SEC's chair William William Williams.

The design met with raves when first announced.

Merrill Field would be upgraded to a full-scale stadium, complete with two levels of seating and multiple concourses.

The most striking feature of the stadium plan was that it allowed for the Miller Performing Arts Center to maintain its imposing view of the field, incorporating it into the stadium design. Performing arts students would have the equivalent of skybox seating.

"We suddenly realized that there are only about 6,000 people in Alfred at a given time," Williams said.

Duh.

But Williams maintained his optimism about the project.

"This can still happen," he said, "We just have to determine if fans in Buffalo and Rochester would come down to watch teams like Penn State and Ohio State come in to town."

AU, of course, has been admitted to the Big Ten, which has long been looking to add a 12th team.

Another possibility Williams is looking into would be the relocation of the Buffalo Bills to the Southern Tier.

"Sure, they just renovated [Ralph Wilson Stadium]," Williams said, "but we can offer the Bills a state-of-the-art athletic facility down here."

The NFL and the Buffalo Bills said that this was in no way, ever, ever going to happen.

The stadium issue must be decided soon as the NCAA requires D-I teams to meet a high standard for stadium seating capacity.

"This is going to go through," Williams said, "one way or another." □
