Time for Tolerance Now

Symposium to address anti-Semitism, hate speech

ALFRED-Alfred State College's Department of English and Humanities, the School of Arts and Sciences, the School of Architecture Management and Engineering, the Department of Social and Behavioral Sciences, and the Center for Intercultural Unity are sponsoring a three day symposium of readings, discussions, and awareness focusing on the history of anti-Semitism and on the growing epidemic of prejudice and hate speech.

The events will be held at 6 PM on March 17, 18, and 19 on the Alfred State Campus.

On Tuesday, March 17, Alfred University Professor Gary Ostrower will speak on anti-Semitism through the Holocaust in Room 215 of the Engineering Technology Building.

On Wednesday, March 18, Alfred State College Professor Gerald Ianovici will discuss lessons of the Holocaust and its aftermath through video and dialogue.

On Thursday, March 19, in the Central Dining Hall's Allegany Room there will be a panel discussion of how statements of prejudice and malice occur both in the United States and

around the world and how they impact their communities and countries. Refreshments will be provided.

Tolerence Now is a symposium – and a reminder – of the power and effects of prejudice and discrimination in the world. Tolerance Now believes it is our duty as citizens of the world to fight intolerance and to educate ignorance.

Tolerance Now is organized by Dr. Aniko Constantine, SUNY Distinguished Professor of English and Humanities.



Lease will keep 32 C-W workers in Wellsville

BELMONT-P.M. Research Tuesday, March 3 announced that the company had entered into a lease agreement with the Steam & Air Solutions business of Curtiss-Wright to utilize a portion of the office space located at Plant 2 on Tarantine Boulevard in Wellsville, effective March 16. The lease agreement will allow 32 Curtiss-Wright employees to continue to work in Wellsville.

The former GE/Lufkin facility on Tarantine Road is currently owned by the Allegany County Industrial Development Agency (ACIDA). Since 2018, P.M. Research entered into a lease-purchase agreement, which included a Payment in lieu of Taxes (PILOT) agreement, with the IDA to acquire the facility in

order to expand manufacturing space for the company's Precision Armament division.

ACIDA Executive Director, Craig Clark, was fortified by the news that a lease agreement had been reached between the two companies.

"The ACIDA extends our thanks to Curtiss-Wright and P.M. Research for working together to reach an agreement at the ACIDA owned facility on Tarantine Boulevard," said Clark. "This agreement is a testament to the creative collaboration and willingness of Allegany County businesses to work together to find solutions that benefit our local employees, local economy, and our residents; their ability to cooperate to reach an agreement aligns with the ACIDA's mis-

sion to retain and expand business in Allegany County."

Curt Crandall, Chairman of the Allegany County Board of Legislators, echoed Clark's enthusiasm about the agreement.

"On behalf of the Board of Legislators, we are very pleased with the agreement made between P.M. Research and Curtiss-Wright that will allow these jobs to remain in Wellsville," said Crandall. "Utilizing the office space at the facility on Tarantine Boulevard to retain Allegany County jobs, while at the same time expanding P.M. Research manufacturing at the facility is great news for Allegany County."

Rep shares Governor Cuomo's budget at Alfred State

ALFRED-Alfred State recently welcomed a representative from Gov. Andrew Cuomo's cabinet to provide an overview of the governor's executive budget for the 2021 fiscal year.

Speaking to an assembled group of students, faculty, and staff at the Student Leadership Center on the Alfred campus, Denise M. Miranda, executive director of the New York Justice Center, told the crowd, "We must and we will continue to make progress happen."

Miranda then spoke about the highlights of the budget, some of which include:

 \bullet Å \$33 billion five-year plan to combat climate change.

• A \$25 billion expansion of New York's largest-inthe-nation building program, bringing it to \$275 billion.

• \$133 million for the Homeless Housing and Assistance Program.

An historic \$28.5 billion investment in education.
\$35.7 million in capital for State University of New York (SUNY) campuses.

•Expanding the Excelsior free college tuition program to include families making up to \$150,000 per year.

•Continuing middle class tax cuts.



Ellen's take on Grandma's Bean Soup

[Editor's Note: Like most of the recipes she shared with our readers over the past couple of decades, Ellen Shultz's Sunny Side Up columns are worth repeating.]

This is not from the slow cooker cookbook but it does use one. Whenever we'd travel to Pittsburgh to visit my grandmother, she always had a huge kettle of soup steaming on her stove and filling the house with delectable odors. She loved to make soup and, I'm sure, it was an economical way to feed all the extra people who were descending on her. With bread from one of the many bakeries available in the city and generous slices of her delicious pies, the soup made a much anticipated meal for all of us.

Grandma never really worked from recipes, so it was hard to pin her down to ingredients and amounts. After much experimentation, here is my version of Grandma's bean soup.

Navy Bean Soup

1 lb. dried navy beans 1/2 c. chopped carrots 3 or 4 smoked ham hocks 1/2 c. chopped onions one bay leaf salt and pepper to taste generous dash of Worcestershire sauce

Soak the beans overnight, drain and rinse. Put the ham hocks in your slow cooker. Add the beans, carrots, onion, celery, and bay leaf. Cover with water. Cook 4-5 hours on low. Remove ham hocks. Discard the skin, fat and bones. Chop the ham and return to the soup. Season to taste. (I set my slow cooker in the sink if I am leaving the house; it may buble over

March 20 deadline for comments on Invenergy's All-Catt Wind Farm


To the Editor:

Hey Lookout! The NYS Board on Electric Generation Siting and the Environment released its Recommended Decision on Invenergy's proposed 340 megawatt Alle-Catt Wind Farm.

This is big news of some urgency. If you're not aware of it, someday you might wish you'd looked it up by the March 20 deadline. A final decision will be made in May.

Invenergy's been trying to get permission to put about 116 industrial-sized wind turbines, each one as tall as a 50story building (and a 591 feet tip height with 380 - 492 foot long blades) on private leased lands. They want to put them in Rushford and Centerville through Freedom and Farmersville and westward all the way beyond Arcade.

These Power Plants will feed a brand new extensive underground electrical grid beneath our feet, nine miles of overhead collection lines, a substation, a 345 kilovolt switchyard, 69 access roads, and last but not least, a concrete batch plant to build the foundations -- all to supply a lot of insatiable people downstate who must have never visited the country and who can't find the "off" switch on their appliances. I'm pretty certain these Power Plant wind farms are all going to be built here and not where they



live.

The "Siting Board" as they are called is asking the public to read the 267 page decision and then send feedback by March 20. My guess is they think we can't read that fast but I happen to know the people of Cattaraugus County and the surrounding communities have been to school and know the land and they won't want to be left out. Here's how you get all the information:

Visit the Department of Pub-Service website, www.dps.ny.gov, then click the "Search" link on the upper center area of the page, then use the "Search by Case Number" feature, to search for case "17-F-0282." You will see all documents filed on the last 12-14 months and one of the most recent filings is the Recommended Decision. You can fact check it yourself. Start soon. When you're done go to the top right of the page, and click on instructions to post comments. Comments can also be submitted electronically to the Hon. Michelle L. Phillips, Secretary, at secretary@dps.ny.gov. 

The artists will also host a Gallery Talk at the Gallery March 19 at 4:30 p.m. The Gallery Talk is open to the public a free of charge.



MostArts' 2015 winner captures Chopin crown

ALFRED-The 2015 Grand Prize winner of the Young Pianist Competition, hosted by Alfred University's MostArts Festival, recently won first prize at the prestigious 10th National Chopin Competition, which concluded March I, in Miami,

Avery Gagliano, an 18-year-old student at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia, won with her final round performance of Chopin's Concerto No. 1 in E minor. She received a cash prize of \$100,000 and entry into the International Chopin Competition in Warsaw this coming October, as well as an extensive concert tour in the United States and Canada.

It was a resounding victory for a young classical pianist whose victory at the 2015 MostArts Festival brought the audience to its feet for a wildly enthusiastic standing ovation. Gagliano had won several classical piano competitions prior to the 2015 MostArts Festival; however, her 2015 victory was her most significant, providing her with the Festival's generous \$10,000 first prize award. Gagliano won the competition performing Mozart's Concerto No. 20 for her final performance. She returned to the MostArts Festival the following year, opening the 2016 Festival playing Chopin's Piano Concerto No 2.

Yuval Zaliouk, conductor of the MostArts Festival Orchestra, describes Gagliano's career as "meteoric" since her success at Alfred University, adding he was awed by Avery's maturity in playing the Chopin concerto. Even more astounding was the fact that it took her a mere three months to master the concerto. She was only 14 years old at the time of her performance.

Alfred University Professor of Music Lisa Lantz, founder and artistic director of the MostArts Festival, this week added her own best wishes for Gagliano's continued success: "Congratulations, Avery Gagliano. We wish you great success at the upcoming International Chopin Competition this October."

Thriving Health: Almond Crust Pizza

In keeping with the theme of pizza recipes, am providing you with a gluten-free and lower carb option. Two weeks ago I published "Mama's Pizza Crust" recipe made with sprouted flour. Sprouted flour is lower in starch and gluten than regular flour (but comparable to a potato for carbs per serving). However, if you do not tolerate gluten or need a still lower-carb flour for the purpose of weight loss, blood sugar handling, or other health reasons, I've got you covered. This is also a RESTART approved option.

<u>Ingredients</u>:

4 cups almond flour (or ground almonds)

2 Tbsps melted coconut oil

2 tsps. Himalayan salt 1/2 tsp. black or cayenne pepper

2 tsps. garlic powder

2 tsps. dried basil 1 tsp. dried oregano <u>Instructions</u>:

Preheat the oven to 375°F.

Beat eggs. Add other ingredients to form a dough. Press onto a baking sheet and shape into a "pie" (sometimes I have to oil my hands with coconut oil so the dough doesn't stick to

Bake for 10 minutes.

Add sugar free tomato sauce and your favorite toppings.

Bake for final 5 minutes or until the cheese* is melted!

Faith Community ponders health ministry

WELLSVILLE-With spread of the coronavirus in both New York and Pennsylvania, an Allegany County group is examining the potential for establishing a Faith Community Health Ministry Network of churches and other Christian organizations to help build awareness for this and other health issues encountered on an ongoing basis by county individuals and families.

The Hope Center, which helps equip churches to enhance outreach to congregants and community residents, is gauging interest after governors of both New York and Pennsylvania issued a state of emergency or disaster declaration as the deadly virus spreads within these states, the nation and internationally.

The local initiative is a broader application of national and international faith community nurses or parish nurse endeavors that focus on current and retired nurses working within and through churches to address a wide variety of public health needs.

The Center is determining interest by medical personnel, human services professionals and others who may be interested in such efforts.

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


