

A Bigger and Brighter Future for AU

After being announced as the fourteenth president of Alfred University, Mark Zupan spoke about the magic that was present at AU and who he couldn't wait to contribute

AU is a place of magic and he can't wait to be apart of it, Zupan said.

Before AU, Zupan earned his B.A. degree from Harvard University in 1981 and earned his Ph.D. degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology while teaching in the Economics Department at Harvard University until 1987. Then, he went on to the University of Arizona and from 1997 to 2003, Zupan served as dean and professor of Economics.

From 2004-2014, Zupan was the dean of the University of Rochester's Simon Business School. Currently, he is the director of the Bradley Policy Center and is also the Olin Professor of Economics and Public Policy at Simon.

During the Zupan's speech, he spoke of the things that made AU great and distinguished it from



other universities and summed it all up in one simple acronym, "TLC."

"During my first visit to AU, I was captivated and charmed," Zupan said, "by the student, the faculty and all of the staff."

According to Zupan, the "T" in the acronym "TLC" stands for transform as in AU transforms lives. After speaking to alumni and current students, all agreed that AU is a place that stays with students,

even years after they've left.

Next, the "L" stands for love. Love is the reason alumni and trustees give back to AU, Zupan

Lastly, the "C" stands for four things. First is creativity. Zupan referenced the accomplishments in the universities ceramics program and the pieces displayed all around campus. Second is commitment which is represented by the campus's work to make

AU the gold standard. Zupan even commented that the symbol for the element gold is AU.

The third is collaborative spirit which Zupan saw just from taking a walk around campus. Everyone was so willing to offer help, even to a stranger.

The last thing "C" stands for is cheer. Zupan said he saw how much the community enjoys this campus and the energy students have. He said that he has heard of and seen the meaningful work everybody does at AU. He also added that AU is a campus that could really come together during tough times.

Zupan's final words were about his promise to contribute to continuing "TLC" at Alfred University and making sure this campus stays great.

"I will do my part of the four "C's" with the AU community and together, we can continue to build a bigger and brighter future for Alfred University," Zupan concluded.

To wrap up the interview, Keshawn had this advice for new student leaders: "Make sure you have an open mind, and open ears. Keep your eyes open around campus, because you are a major connection between the student body and the administration. You have the opportunity to effect real change."




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

AU hosts a mere 92 clubs, according to the 2015-2016 Club List. How can any student possibly choose a suitable club from such a pitiful selection. According to Eliza Ordway, the administrative assistant in the Center for Student Involvement, in order to start a club, students "must have

five members and a Faculty/Staff Advisor. Each club is required to submit a constitution stating their mission, membership policies, and other goals." Ordway explained that clubs must also abide by safety regulations.

As if the poor selection and difficult new club process weren't enough, the clubs that are available do little in the way of resume building. Clubs like Model United Nations, where, according to the United Nations Association of the United States of America, students participate in "an authentic simulation of the UN General Assembly, UN Security Council, or other multilateral body" and learn

about "diplomacy, negotiation, and decision making" couldn't possibly impress a potential employer.

The list also includes other such useless clubs as Guiding Eyes for the Blind, which pairs students with up-and-coming seeing eye dogs to be raised, trained, and eventually partnered with a visually disabled person. 

Based on the 1996 movie of the same name by Robert Rodriguez, From Dusk Till Dawn is a show about two bank robbing brothers, Seth and Richie Gecko, and their crazy adventures with the supernatural beings called culebras, vampires with snake-like fangs. Seth Gecko (D.J. Cotrona) is

the smooth-talking, gun wielding brother who lands himself in jail. Richie Gecko (Zane Holtz) is the brother plagued with visions and voices of supernatural creatures and explosively violent tendencies. From Dusk Till Dawn also stars Wilmer Valderrama, known for portraying Fez in That '70s Show, as a Spanish conquistador turned vampire named Carlos or Carlitos and Eiza Gonzalez, an up-andcoming Mexican actress, as a sacrifice-become vampire queen and goddess named Santánico Pandemonium or Diosa.

From Dusk Till Dawn is not

for the faint of heart as it does have more blood and gore than other vampire shows and movies that have come out in the past few years. One of the Gecko Brothers, referred as Los Hermanos Geckos by most Spanish-speaking main characters, gets shot in the palm and he has a hole for the entire season, while multiple people in one sequence get ripped apart by a cult of exotic female dancers turned vampires. From Dusk Till Dawn uses the sexuality held by Santánico as a weapon to help her in her mission against the Nine Lords while also using it appeal to the male target

audience. She is never shamed for being a dancer by the main characters as they are aware she was forced into the role by her captors.

From Dusk Till Dawn has swearing in both English and Spanish with sexual themes to both empower the female characters and to seduce the male characters for nefarious purposes (extra male characters are used as a feeding source). Overall, the show has a good dynamic between the characters and the storyline is definitely different from the movie it is based on.

Alfred University day of hoops celebration will honor two of Saxons' greatest teams

ALFRED, NY —Alfred University has planned a day of celebration around its men's and women's basketball programs, inviting fans of the Purple & Gold to campus for the Saxons' season home finale, during which two of the greatest men's teams in the 98-year history of the program will be honored.

On Saturday, Feb. 20, the Saxons' men's and women's teams will take on Empire 8 Conference rival Elmira College. The men's game starts at 2 p.m. with tipoff for the women's contest to follow at 4 p.m. Senior players – forward Jeremy Johnson (Martinsburg, WV/Martinsburg) for the men and guard Sarah Kichman (Portville, NY/Portville) – will be recognized as they play their final home games.

Alfred University will also honor two of its finest teams: the Ron Frederes-coached 1984-85 and 1985-86 squads that each played in the NCAA Division III championship tournaments. The 85-86 Saxon team, which this year celebrates its 30th anniversary, posted a 25-3 record, with the 25 wins representing a school single-season record. That team won its first game of the NCAA tournament (88-86 over Nazareth) before falling to eventual unbeaten national champion Pots-



dam in a regional final. Two former Saxon greats - guard Brian Andrews and forward Mike Wing – played on both teams before graduating in 1987. Wing is third on the AU career scoring list (1,617 points) and tops the AU career list in rebounds (923). Andrews ranks sixth on the school's career scoring list (1,474 points) and holds single-season records for three-point shots made (96 in 1986-87) and single season and career marks for assists. Wing and Andrews were inducted together into the AU Athletics Hall of Fame

Another player from the 84-85 and 85-86 teams, Chris Tighe, ranks among the top 25 at AU in career scoring (901 points) and career rebounding (618). Frederes coached the team for 11 seasons, compiling

in 1997.

a career record of 159-137. His 159 coaching wins are the most all-time at AU.

Members of the 1984-85 and 1985-86 teams who return to campus will be honored at an on-campus reception Friday evening. They will be joined by other former Saxons for the men's basketball alumni game at 10 a.m. Saturday, prior to the men's-women's doubleheader against Elmira. Following the alumni game, the men's basketball team will host a luncheon for basketball alumni at 11:30 a.m. in the main lobby of the McLane Center.

The University will introduce and recognize members of the honored teams in attendance at halftime of the men's game against Elmira. They will be joined by other men's basketball alumni, along with

members of the current team and parents, at a post-game reception and meal, also in the main lobby of the McLane Center.

Saxon basketball fans are invited to attend Saturday's games as part of the University's first-ever Community Appreciation Day. The event is being held to recognize fans from the University and local community and to thank area businesses for their support of AU. Businesses have donated door prizes that fans attending Saturday's games can win. Each fan will receive a raffle ticket when they arrive that will be used in the drawing of prizes during full timeouts of the men's game and in between quarters of the women's game.

clinic



ALFRED, NY – The Alfred University women's soccer team will be hosting a day-long College ID Clinic on Saturday, April 23, on the AU campus.

The clinic – open to girls high school players in grades 10-12 – is designed to give those who have shown interest in Alfred University and the AU women's soccer program a comprehensive look into what life is like as an AU student-athlete. It allows players to showcase talents while getting

to know the AU coaching staff and current players.

Clinic Information

The morning portion of the clinic will take place at Alfred University's Admissions Office and will include an informational session about the University followed by a campus tour. The afternoon will include instructional and training sessions focusing on the technical and tactical aspects of soccer.

This clinic is open to female student-athletes graduating in the classes of 2016, 2017 and 2018. The cost is \$100 and includes dinner. Registration is at 9:30 a.m. at the Alfred University Admissions Office, located in Alumni Hall. and the clinic runs from 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Men's Indoor Track and Field

ITHACA, NY – The Alfred University men's indoor track and field team finished sixth during the Empire 8 Championships held at Ithaca College on Saturday.

Senior Ian Bishop (Bronx, NY/ Bronxwood Prep) earned himself All-Empire 8 Conference First Team honors with his first place win in the shot put. His toss was 9.75 inches farther than the rest of the 25-athlete field with a final throw of 14.88m (48' – 10.00"). He earned the bulk of the points for the Saxons with 10 of the team's 19 points.

Fellow thrower, Jeffrey Nunez (Wurtsboro, NY/Ellenville) earned his spot on the All-Empire 8 Conference as a Second Team honoree in the weight throw. The junior earned eight points with his throw of 15.18m (49' – 9.75").

Sophomore Seth Spicer (Corning, NY/Corning-Painted Post) finished sixth in the 60 meter hurdles with a time of 8.89.

The Saxons will next travel to College at Brockport on Saturday, February 20.
