Take a ride up to Legare's
with Major & Allen - Organize
an escort for Major -
Finish my leather tent -
The cattle ran away & did
not come at night. Will
send 2 men after them to
morrow -

February

SUNDAY 10

1878

Weather Misty & cloudy then clear.
Receive news that the big
Camp is moving to-day. So
Major J. decides not to go
there but strike for Cypress
immediately - I expect he
will see them all at that
place pretty soon -
Cattle returned at 2 P.M. -
Did not escort the Major -

MONDAY 11

Snowing - About 8 inch. this morn
ing. Set at work to finish my
sleigh. Work till 11 at night -
18 lodges of Minneconjou & others
arrive to-day & camp near
the Post - Work at my sleigh
till 11½ P.M.

February TUESDAY 12

1878

Cold, windy & driftly. Work all day & evening up to mid-night at my sleigh. It is nearly finished. Give a guide, Intend to start to-morrow at 12 m. Very windy in the evening - Start at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pm with 7 horses - Douglas, Christie, Mcintosh, Hurley, Supry, Hart & Daniels, guide. Rations for 8 days. Camp at 5 miles from leg place to camp place.

X WEDNESDAY 13.

Give weather. Finish the sleigh - Start at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pm. 7 horses, 4 men, 1 dog & guide. Camps at 3 miles from Leg place. Snow threat. at night. Drove about 25 miles. Beautiful road.

February THURSDAY 14

1878

Weather fine. Late start after a horse which ran back to leg. Misty all day - Drove about 25 miles. - Beautiful night.

FRIDAY 15

Windy & cold - Start at 8 $\frac{1}{4}$. Camps at 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ - Snow at night. Horses do very well - Roads pretty good for sleighing -

February SATURDAY 16

1878

Weather mild & misty. Started at 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ a.m. Stormy at 9 - arrived at Musky Coulee at 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ a.m. Started to come back at 1 P.M. (See Memo.) Drove 16 miles & camped at 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ p.m.

SUNDAY 17

Started at 7 $\frac{3}{4}$ - Drove to Red Willow Island & across the hill arrived at Little Wousy Mountain at 5 - Beautiful day - Drove about 32 miles.

1878

Rainy & windy. Prepare to go to Indian
camp about 10 m.

Start at 1 p.m. Camped at 5.
Drove about 25 miles -

SATURDAY 9

Very windy & cold -
Start at $\frac{9}{2}$ a.m. arrive at Camp
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ a.m. Storm commences about
at 4 p.m. & continues in intensity
till 10. Continuous all night,

March

SUNDAY 10

1878

Stormy in the morning. Clear
up about 12 m.

The Indians coming in from the
States are some of the best who
have been sent west.

Start at 1 3/4 - Drove 12 miles &
camped in a very nice place,
well sheltered; no water though.

Very stormy - Start at 8 a.m.
Drove at 10 a.m. - Lost
the road. Very much
afraid to be obliged to clear
out of air - Reached the
Post at 6 p.m. - and

Bright & lovely day. Mr. Webster & wife return, all the Ory-Peas are gone now hunting north. The Ind. who came in yesterday move camp this morning. Gone to day's place. Sitting Bull out hunting. Send out Hall with team to map Douglas.

Wrote at my job. Rode to Leg. Gibson will go to Wolf 12th on Tues. Send letters by him.

March

MONDAY 18

1878

Pretty cold & dark. Wrote to Lambert & L. H. G. & de Geer.

White Butte comes in & says he am afraid Beck invited him & all other Sioux to go back to the U.S.

TUESDAY 19

St Joseph

Cold & windy. S. Wilson. Wilson starts for Wolf Point with White Butte.

Rain commences at 5-6 p.m. Expect Douglas in through night.

Rain at 8 p.m. Weather cleared a little. Douglas not in —

Beautiful summer day. My car comes
at 1:30 PM.
Lift my seal & part of watch

Mrs. McThree comes in

Elliott got married one of Col. Richardson's daughters
at night went to fetch her when he was threatened
by the Col. with 14 years penitentiary for abduction.
They were confined & Elliott was tortured so much

Same day - Macdonald - pa-o-mi-ni

at 9 a.m. Lapierre comes

1878

Return from the mountains
exper. pretty tired. Come in
at 11 a.m.

Sleep in the afternoon. -

MONDAY 25

McIlroy starts in the
morning. -
Am 1st. comes at night to tell me that
the visitors have been seen to day. I
saddle up & go out & find George &
Rango returning to say the old man
the 3rd. brought in.

March

TUESDAY 26

1878

Cold & windy

Lo. Marin starts in the morning
for Ft. Walsh - Christie held
arrest. Prepare to send
him to Ft. Walsh for
trial -

WEDNESDAY 27

Cold & windy. Francis, Douglass &
Clarke acc'te. Christie to Ft. Mc. They start
at 12 m. Lydon comes home & warns
Hudson & Francis in Ch's camp - Mc. going
to Wolf Point to day.
The calf is 15 days old.
Expect Gillson to make out.

March

THURSDAY 28

1878

Cold & windy. Hear that a priest is
Lifg - He is sick, go to see him in
the afternoon. His father J. B. M.
Gemin O.J.M.

March

SATURDAY 30

1878

Snowy & stormy. The cow was
found in the morning,
Cleary under aust & admonished.
Spent M 29, to engine of there will
be Mass to-morrow. The father
is too sick to perform the
service.

FRIDAY 29

Cold & windy. Lost the cow at
night.

Rcc² 45 bushels coal,
(P. Morin heard thunder at the Pile of stones
He snowed a good deal here, 18th p.)

SUNDAY 31

Beautiful summer day.
There was Mass at Lfg's but
I did not know it.
Ride up to Lfg, after the reception
of an official communication
from the Missionary with regard
to the movements of Indians. Will send
a messenger to-morrow or Tuesday to
Cypress Hills. The Basson Train was
to Lfg & at 11th from, went back, & living
there were deserted.

April

MONDAY 1

1878

Beautiful day, scarcely the two men here deserted. Sent to the A.C. camp. They were not near there.

Sent swift messenger to Ft. Walsh with reports of desertion & Indian movements. Father Casin came in to stop with me. He is dead.

No news at night.

TUESDAY 2

Beautiful summer day.
Had mass this morning, Christ a little better. A party of H.B. from Mick River come in at 4 p.m. Andrew Dugaylais.
Received a letter from Grassback.

The Sioux have a white calf skin & have no pony to have against me. meeting to drive the Buffaloes near them.

April

WEDNESDAY 3

1878

Windy but mild. Lefare came from W. B. last night. Tom H.A.G. came to town this morning — Andrew Dugaylais claims the ox that was found & this winter, I will write to Col. Dodge about it. Sent Suppy to Ind. Camp at the McDonald's coast to try & know what are the projects of Ind. but he can't get any information. Surprised that Lefare did not come to see the priest. — White Earth, comes in from Rayford.

THURSDAY 4

Fine weather. My messenger ought to be in Ft. W. to-night. Would like to know what they think of my news. Mrs. La Morin pays a visit to the father — 5 great fires are laying on the plains - N.W. - N - 128 - E 1/4, N. N. E.

Nothing new.

April

FRIDAY 5th

1878

Nice cold day. It rained a little during the night. Great number of men at camp send word to them what passed. Father Génin will go to the camp to-morrow.

The Dr's have received a kind of message from U.S. & wanted advice about surrendering - They seem to wait for advice from Setting Bull's Camp.

SATURDAY 6th

Fri. day. Sent for Lacerte who tells me that he, hunting the big, himself yesterday. Légaré says no. The Dr's wanted to have news from M. Pointe. I send supplies to the Camp to invite Pretty Bear & 4 men to visit me to-morrow.

Mr. McLean of Du'Appelle came in again in the afternoon & evening.

April

SUNDAY 7th

1878

Rained a good deal last night. Mass at 9th. Half B. come in number Indian, Pretty Bear, White Cook & 6 men came to interview the Father & Mr. McLean. Very windy at night.

MONDAY 8th

Clear, cold & very windy. Wind N.W. - Ind. come from Cypress & say that S. B. is on Swift current Creek with a great number of lodges of Sioux. Mr. Ranch &c.

I expected Douglas to-day but he did not come.

Hired Lacerte as hunter. Stannard in the Ponds.

April

TUESDAY 9th

1878

Wind & snow - N.W.

At 14.13th came from Coffey H. & said that
100 lodges of his had crossed the Miss., but
he did not know where they were.
It was colder & raw all day. At night a snow
storm is feared.

WEDNESDAY 10

Clear but cold & windy,

Mr. McLean left for Grappler at 24/12/77
The wind falls at sunset. I am much more
used than the morning or Douglas does
not turn up. As I write this Dr. Morin
comes in right. He brings 2 letters to
one day news paper - No news
as yet but that Major Devine
will probably be here shortly.

April

THURSDAY 11

1878

Fine day, strong W.W. wind -
Dr. Morin says that Dr. Rolette told him that
some troops were coming from Canada.

No arrivals. Splendid night.
McKee writes that Major Devine was
gone to Benton when Christ arrived
& my men were kept for the trials -
Col. J. was expected back on Sat.
and ay or Sunday.

FRIDAY 12

Fine day. Take a drive out to see
if any body comes but myself! —

April

SATURDAY 13

1878.

April

MONDAY 15

1878

The calf I mentioned to day -
Clear day but very strong wind. S.-E.
Got the father's wagon fixed.

A very large fire was started out
in the afternoon at ~~4½~~ miles N. E. &
lasted all night going Westward.
The father's mare stray'd to day &
could not be found.

No news yet from Choff, H. I do not
understand why my messenger is not
back yet.

SUNDAY 14

Palm Sunday.

Strong wind S. E. Had divine service &
some 35° H. G., now present. Found the
father's mare. Fire razing N. E. - W. & N. W.
Wind changed to N. E. - at 12 m. a very severe
snow came on at 3 p.m. Poor travelers will have
no cover on the plains.

Put the father's mare in the forge with her colts.

The storm continues all night very
severely - At 12 m. it seems to increase -
it must be fearful at Choff, H. I wonder if my
men will ever come back.

Storm all day.

The wind stopped at about
12 p.m.

TUESDAY 16

Fine mild day. Snow falls very lightly still.
Snow stops at 11 a.m. & melts away very fast.
Getting chilly at night.
No animals yet.

April

WEDNESDAY 17

1878

Foul moon to-day.

Wind recommended to blow from N - during the night & in the morning we have another snow storm.

At 3^{1/2} p.m. snow changes into heavy rain which lasts till all night.

Wind falls a little at sunset.

Killed the calf to-day. It is a great treat after so long a fast.

The ground comes down from the walls & makes a fine prairie in the hollows.

THURSDAY 18

Rain continues till 12 m., N. wind very strong & cold. Pitch my tent to dry. Sun shines part of the afternoon & dries the ground a good deal. The square now like a lake this morning.

April

FRIDAY 19

1878

Good Friday.

Rain came again at midnight & lasted till 10 a.m. Fine weather in the afternoon. No rain again at night. Wind seems to change to the W.

SATURDAY 20

Weather seems to settle fine. McDonald drives to Chey. with the father -

No arrivals yet. Everything seems quiet. Very few Indians seen or heard.

April

SUNDAY 21

1878

Easter Sunday.

Mass at 10 - Numerous congregation.
Weather very cloudy & indecisive -
alternate rain & sunshine all day.
Sent Roger on the road to see if camp
was coming. Saw nothing.
The weather is fine at night.
No arrivals yet -
Rain begins again at 10th p.m. -

MONDAY 22

Fine weather all day.
Addition to the gymnasium of
a leaving bar -
Mr. messenger comes in
at 10-12 m. with 3 m. papers
pay receipts & letters -
not a word of communication
from us slightly anxious still &
very unsatisfactory. -

April

TUESDAY 23

1878

Fine weather - I sent 3 men to
the lake to hunt geese &
duck to keep the weight of the
gates. Pretty Bear & White Wolf
moved their camps to-day.
They are going towards old work.

No arrivals.

WEDNESDAY 24

Fine weather. The hunters
come back with 1 g. over
& 6 ducks -

April

THURSDAY 25

1878

A 4 a.m. a mighty hurricane blew from N.Y. for 23 hours -
I see day. Not one of us if anybody
will turn up to day. It is now
25 days since I sent my dog
& not a word of answer has
come. His father & a man bear the name
but can't find him. Took advice in regard
to his LaFourche wife, 18th came from C.H.

FRIDAY 26

Very full. Rains slowly now & then.
At 10 a.m. meat from LaBourne ^{as} afternoon.
Gets cold in the after.

An Ind. from "Medicine Bear" says
that Mr. Nathan is on one branch of
the Muddy the other side of Line.

Rained pretty heavily until 1 p.m. -

April

SATURDAY 27

1878

Fine day. S.W. wind - It is now 25 days
that Douglas & party went away with Christy.
I have no news of them yet. It is strange to say
the least.

Drove out this aften' but
saw nothing on the road.

No arrivals.

SUNDAY 28

Quasimodo. Clear day but
strong wind S.W. Mass., 40 N. Prescribes
Baptismal comes in the aften'.
I cannot imagine what is keeping me from
having news from G.W. I know a member
who will go to-morrow. I will not
hear that suspense any longer.
I strongly suspect that my men were
sent from G.W. but that they lost them
selves in the storm -
