Accounting For Time Due to the Weather Emergency

In order for the Payroll Department to properly account for time, please note the following instruction

for the days of March 14 and 15:

Tuesday, March 14: The University closed to all but essential personnel. For non-essential personnel, time should be recorded as "excused" depending on the employee's normal schedule (7 hours, 7.5 hours or 8 hours). In the comments section please indicate "weather closing".

Wednesday March 15: Alfred University is open for classes and regular business today, March 15. Due to the weather conditions and safety concerns, some employees may have chosen not to come to work or may have been delayed in their arrival. The University respects the judgement of the employee as to the safety of reporting to work. If an employee is delayed coming to work they may use "Personal" or "Floating Holiday" time in one-hour increments to account for the delayed attendance. The employee also has the option of a shortened lunch period (but no less than 30 minutes is required to be taken) to make up the time or, with the approval of the supervisor, can make up the time by staying a little later.

If an employee made the decision not to come in due to the weather, he/she will be required to use a vacation day, personal day, or floating holiday for the absence.

On Sunday, March 26, there will be a free organ recital on the Rosebush pipe organ in the Alfred Seventh Day Baptist Church. The organ recital is in memory of Margaret "Peggy" Wingate Rase, a lifetime resident of Alfred and the wife of AU Professor Emeritus Daniel Rase. All are invited to attend.

The recitalist will be Dr. Judy Congdon. The program which starts at 3 pm will include Prelude and Fugue in C major by J. S. Bach, a Chorale Partita by Johann Pachelbel, Two Antiphons by Marcel Dupre, Trumpet Tune in C major by David Johnson, Three Hymn Preludes by Craig Phillips, and the Allegro from Symphony Op. 42, No. 6 by Charles Marie Widor.

Congdon is Professor of Organ at Houghton College, Houghton, New York. She holds music degrees from Wheaton College, the University of Colorado, the Musikhochschule in Frankfurt, Germany where she was a Fulbright Scholar, and the Eastman School of Music. She has performed organ recitals in the US, as well as in Germany, Italy, and Russia, and has recorded 4 CD albums.

While the concert is free and open to all, the Rase family is encouraging donations to the Organ Restoration Fund. A basket will be available for those interested in contributing in Peggy's memory. Peggy's father, Dr. Ray Wingate, was professor of organ at Alfred University as well AU's first carillonneur. The Wingate Foundation started by Danny and Peggy funds the annual summer carillon recital series on the Davis Memorial Carillon at Alfred University.

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IEA Visiting Artist: Zorica Colic

May 8-12, 2017

The IEA welcomes Zorica Colic of New York, NY, as our artist in residence over the week of May 8th. Zorica, who received her MFA from the Electronic Integrated Arts program of the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University. Zorica's work researches how contemporary life is structured and manipulated, with particular emphasis on the implications of the biopolitical management of human life. Through various hybridized forms of display, her works explore the complex relationships between politics, art and consumer worlds, examining how our lives are regulated or defined by taste, by products, and by mass-distributed role models. The goal is to identify new ways to subvert normative mass culture in order to re-contextualize images and signs that have become inflated from over-proliferation.

During her residency Zorica intends to further develop a video project titled Well-beings. These videos bring into focus a person defragmenting into commodity through the technological virtual, while investigating themes such as subtle manipulation of human emotions and behavior amidst current conditions that are hyper-mediated, and increasingly focused on self-presentation. A face no longer functions as the site of identity but rather a terrain equally inhabited by intimacy, familiarity, strangeness, and the anxiety. For her residency, Zorica plans to extend her project into a multi-channel video installation with surround sound, presenting different "heads" or "creatures" put into a conversation.

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A Day's Work

Rebekah Modrak (Class of '92) and Nick Tobier present "A Day's Work" at the Cohen Gallery, March 1-April 1, 2017. The joint show features distinct but related bodies of work that serve to challenge viewers' social expectations. "A Day's Work" opens March 1, 6-8pm, with a closing reception on April 1 at 6-8pm.

Rebekah's installation, Re Made Co., is a multimedia artistic intervention satirizing the brand narrative of Best Made Co., a New York City-based company that sells painted axes and a range of "outdoor" consumer products using calculated and false associations with manual labor. Evolving since its launch in July 2013, Re Made Co. works across genres, including Fluxus art whose distribution channels circumvent and subvert the gallery system; critical design that challenges the values of design practice; and activist art or "culture jamming" that attempts to introduce a critical discourse into passive consumption.

Re Made Co. at Cohen Gallery will create a storefront space on Main Street in Alfred with both the products and the critique of luxury consumer culture that seeks to appropriate the work of labor. Nick will conduct performances in the gallery and in the community during the month of March. He will present, "Marvelous Guests," which lends new working conditions and meanings to several trades by inviting professionals to conduct their business in unusual locations. As a guest. Each encounter will produce its own forms of communication on location. We see the relationship between guest and host as dynamic, and not without friction as each adjusts to the other.

Both artists taught at the School of Art Design at Alfred University before joining the faculty at the Stamps School of Art & Design at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, where they currently live and work.
