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ALFRED, NY -- Thirteen people will join the faculty of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Alfred University this semester. Four of the new faculty members will work in the math division. Three will teach education, and the rest are spread around the College's divisions. The 13 are: Division of Mathematics Dr. Darwyn Charles Cook, assistant professor of mathematics, was an associate professor at Daniel Webster College in Nashua, NH. Hired to revitalize Daniel Webster College's freshman-sophomore math curriculum, he helped redesign two core courses and was responsible for math placement. Cook holds a bachelor's degree in computer science and a master's degree in math, both earned in 1990 at SUNY College at Potsdam. He has a Ph.D. from Louisiana State University.Dr. Aaron T. Ekstrom, assistant professor of mathematics, has taught since 1993 at the University of Arizona in Tucson. He has been a graduate teaching associate and a summer-session instructor, has coordinated workshops given by graduate students to high school students, and since 1996, has been involved in Arizona's summer math program for gifted junior high students. Ekstrom has also worked on professional development for math teachers in college, high school, and middle school. He holds a bachelor's degree from Worcester Polytechnic Institute in Massachusetts and a master's and Ph.D. from the University of Arizona. Dr. Eric C. Gaze, assistant professor of mathematics, has been an assistant professor in Kentucky's Berea College since 1996. He holds a bachelor's degree from the College of the Holy Cross in Massachusetts and both a master's and Ph.D. degree from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. His dissertation topic area is Hodge Theory.Dr. Debra J. Waugh, assistant professor of mathematics, has been an assistant professor since 1997 at the University of Texas of the Permian Basin, Odessa, TX. She has bachelor's degrees in both linguistics and mathematics from Michigan State University and a master's degree and Ph.D. in mathematics from the University of Michigan. Her dissertation topic was "Quotients of Coxeter Groups under the Weak Order." Division of EducationDr. Beth Bader-Paetschow, assistant professor of education, has worked as a classroom teacher, mostly with primary-age children. She has also been a principal twice and has counseled children with severe behavior disorders and their families, as well as serving as a support, trainer, and coach for classroom teachers. She holds a BS. degree in elementary education from DePaul University in Chicago and a Master's of Counseling and an Ed.D. in elementary education, specializing in reading, both from Arizona State University, Tempe.Dr. Patricia Goodspeed, assistant professor of education. has been an adjunct professor in Alfred University's Counselor Education Program since 1999. Before that, starting in 1992, she was a counselor at Monroe Community College in Rochester. She holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from the State University of New York Empire State College in Rochester, a master of science degree in industrial and organizational psychology from Springfield College, Springfield, MA, and an Ed.D. degree in counseling and human development from the University of Rochester.Brian C. Ludlow, instructor of education, has most recently been teaching a graduate course in writing instruction for the Department of Elementary Education at Brigham Young University. Also, since 1996, he has been training some 70 sixth-grade teachers to implement a recently adopted reading program in the Provo, UT, school district. He holds a bachelor's degree from Brigham Young University H.C. in Hawaii, with a minor in Japanese; and California teaching credentials in multiple subjects from National University in Stockton, CA. He is working toward his Ed.D. in elementary education at Brigham Young University. Division of Human Studies Dr. Laura Greyson, professor of political science, comes to AU from the Department of Politics at Rollins College in Winter Park, FL., where she has served three times as department chair (1998-2000, 1990-92, and 1984-87.)
