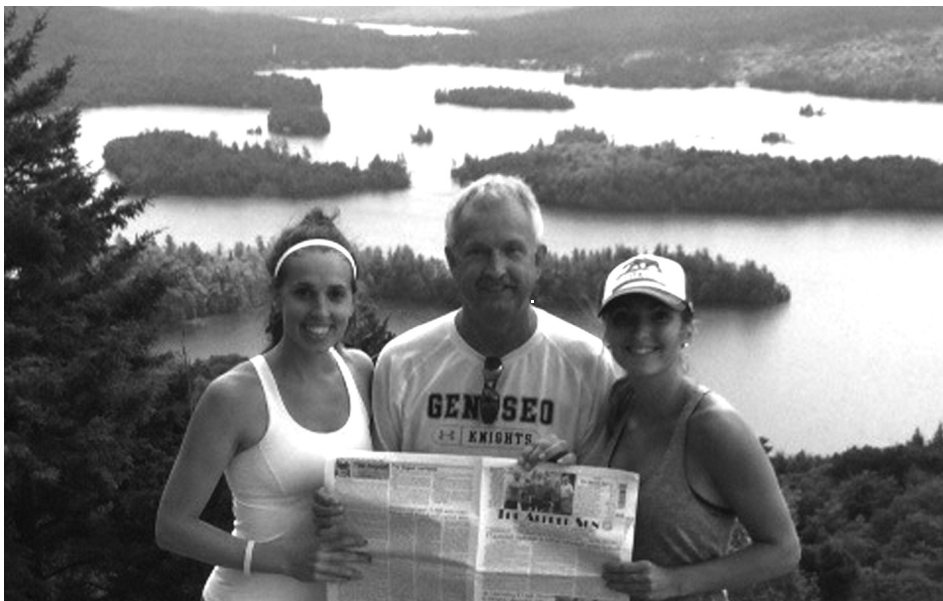

A-A alumni will see a mountain in front of their alma mater

ALMOND—When out-of-town alumni take a tour of Alfred-Almond Central School this Saturday as part of their Alumni Reunion, they will be greeted by a "mountain" in front of their alma mater.

Construction of the school's new all-weather track and field facility is well underway. While the new track may be taking shape, it will circle what is now a mountain of topsoil. Depending on the last time they've been back to their alma mater, they may be in store for a number of other changes.

But when it comes to the Board of Education, not much has changed in a number of years. Earl Pierce, who was re-elected in the May district election, was reelected president of the school board at the July 1 reorganization meeting. Nadine Shardlow was elected vice-president of the board.

'Saxon Pride' debut a success

ALFRED--A program aimed at boosting camaraderie in the Alfred University varsity athletics program and making an impact in the local and campus communities had a tremendously successful first year.

The Saxon Pride Board, developed and initiated by AU Director of Athletics Paul Vecchio and graduate student Brandon Harrison, rewarded teams for community service, academic excellence, athletic achievement, and support of fellow student-athletes.

"The Saxon Pride Board is a tool that measures the impact that our student-athletes are making in the classroom, within the community and on the fields of competitive play, and by every measure this first year was a rousing success," Vecchio said. "I want to thank our staff and student-athletes for their buy-in to the concept and express the great pride I have in their efforts in helping to create the well-rounded experience we are hoping to produce here at AU."

Vecchio recently announced category winners for the 2013-14 Saxon Pride Board. The men's basketball team won the "Saxon for Saxon Award"; the women's soccer team won the award recognizing community service; the men's tennis team was honored for academic achievement; and the women's softball team was cited for athletic accomplishments. The softball team was also named the overall winner in the Pride Board competition.

The Saxon for Saxon program encourages teams to support their fellow student-athletes by attending other teams' contests. Each team designates a home contests as its Saxon for Saxon event. In 2013-14, the men's basketball team had 95 percent attendance at Saxon for Saxon events.

The women's soccer team posted the most points in the community service component, tallying 169 hours of service time. Vecchio requires all AU athletic teams participate in some type of community service initiative during the year, and in 2013-14, Saxon varsity teams logged more than 1,400 hours in the Alfred area.

Alfred University's 19 varsity athletic teams

posted a combined grade-point average of more than 3.0. Men's tennis led the way with a team GPA of 3.36. Saxon sports teams in general enjoyed a solid year in the classroom in 2013-14. For the spring 2014 semester, 57 AU student-athletes earned Empire 8 Conference President's List recognition for achieving a GPA of at least 3.75, and five Alfred teams - men's and women's tennis, men's and women's soccer, and women's volleyball - earned Empire 8 All-Academic honors for having a team GPA of at least 3.20. In the fall 2013 semester, 65 AU student-athletes were named to the President's List and three teams - men's and women's tennis, and softball - were awarded All-Academic honors.

More than half the men's tennis team earned either President's List or Dean's List honors, or both, throughout the 2013-14 academic year.

The softball team was recognized for an outstanding season on the playing field. The Saxons finished the year with a 29-12 record, with the 29 wins representing the second-most ever in a season in team history. AU finished as runner-up in the Empire 8 championship tournament and earned a bid to the NCAA Division III tournament, where they finished runner-up to eventual College World Series participant Rochester.

The overall winner for the 2013-14 Saxon Pride Board competition was the AU softball team. The overall winner was chosen based on points each team accumulated for athletic and academic achievement, community service, and campus involvement. The softball team accumulated 9,912 points to outdistance runner-up women's tennis (8,318 points). Women's soccer was third (8,299), men's tennis was fourth (7,952), and men's soccer was fifth (6,796).

"I'd also like to recognize head softball coach Gino Olivieri, his staff and student-athletes for earning the first Saxon Pride Board team champion designation," Vecchio said. "They certainly have set the bar high for our department for future years by excelling in all three areas - academically, athletically and in the community - in 2013-14."

The Alfred Town Board, at a special meeting held Thursday, July 17 in the Town Highway Building, appointed John Eddy to serve as interim highway superintendent effective immediately through Dec. 31, 2014. Eddy will fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Highway Superintendent Jamie Mansfield, who accepted the same position with the Town of Almond recently. The highway superintendent position will be on the ballot in November in order to fill vacancy for the second year (2015) of Mansfield's two-year term.

Colonial Library in Richburg (\$11,747 for external wall and foundation work, replacement of beams and fire escape) and the Essential Club Free Library in Canaseraga (\$2,800 for stained glass window restoration) are two of eight public libraries in Senator Cathy Young's (R-I, Olean) district to receive special construction grants for 2014. Each of the 59 public libraries in Senator Young's district will receive a \$2,700 grant as a result of funding secured in this year's state budget. The funds will support valuable library initiatives and help meet basic operational

expenses.

Average retail gasoline prices in Rochester have fallen 2.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.78/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 319 gas outlets in Rochester. This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.3 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.57/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com. Including the change in gas prices in Rochester during the past week, prices yesterday were 4.4 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 3.3 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 10.7 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 10.4 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

Former railroad engineer ALMOND—Charles F. "Chub" Lockwood, 92, of 83 Main Street, Almond, was hatched on July 31, 1921, attached on October 17, 1943 with his marriage to the former Marilyn MacMichael, and dispatched on July 6, 2014 after a

short stay at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Bath.

Born in North Hornell, the son of Charles F. and Amelia Mae Rogers Lockwood Sr., he had resided in Almond since 1950. Chub had served his country as a member of the United States Navy from 1942-1945. He had been employed as an engineer for the former Erie and Erie Lakawanna Railroads as well as Conrail prior to his retirement in 1981 after 39 ½ years of service.

He was a member of the Almond Union of Churches, the Almond 20th Century Club, the Almond Historical Society and a former member of the Almond Fire Department.

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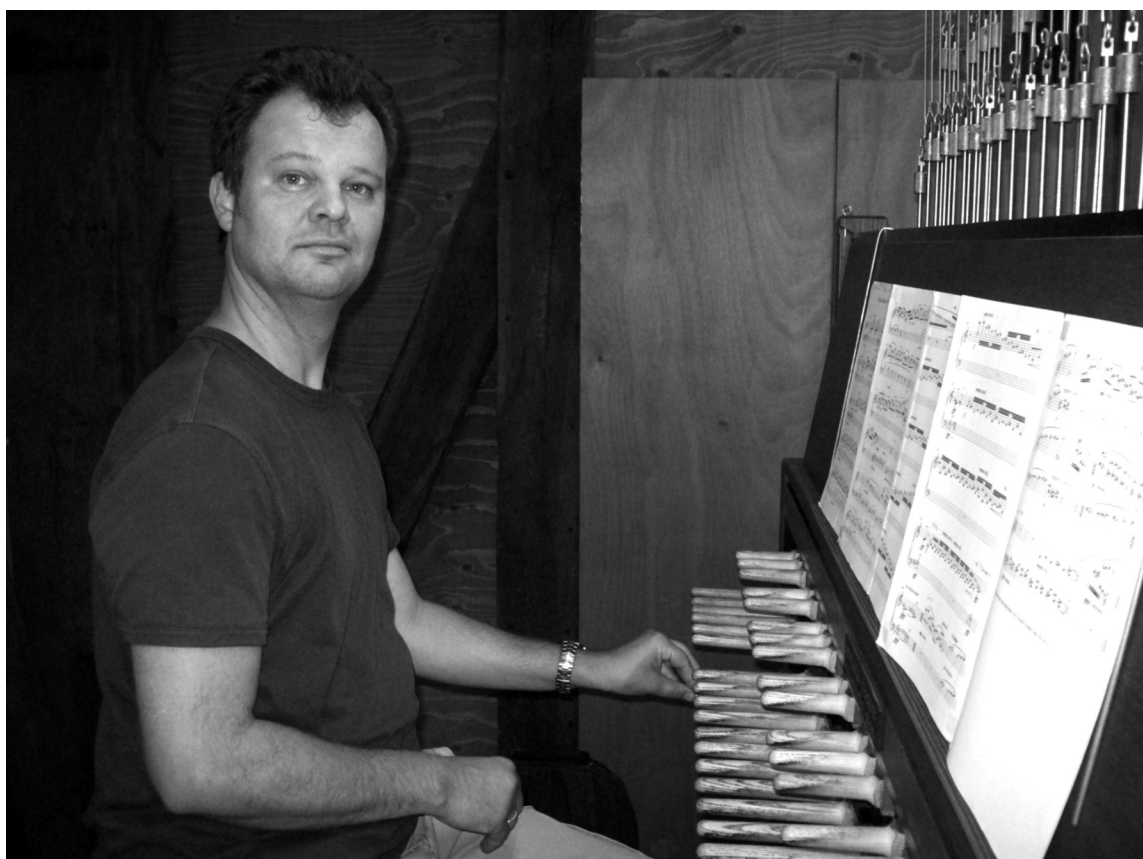

Dutch carillonneur will perform in finale of Carillon Recital Series

ALFRED—Alfred University (AU) will host Klaas R. R. de Haan of The Netherlands, on Tuesday, July 29, in the fourth and final performance of this year's Wingate Summer Carillon Recital Series.

This free recital begins at 7 p.m., and will include several self-arranged selections, songs by famous composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, and medleys from "The Sound of Music" and "Annie, Get Your Gun."

The recital will be held rain or shine. If inclement weather persists, Howell Hall will be open for indoor seating.

De Haan is a carillonneur in Laren, Rhenen, Bolsward, Sloterveer/Amsterdam, and Heerenveen. He is also the cantor-organist of the Morgenster Church in Hilversum. He gives concerts in Europe and the United States and composes modern music for the carillon.

De Haan studied organ at the Utrecht Conservatory and earned a master's degree from the Dutch Carillon School, where he studied with well-known carillonneurs Arie Abbenes and Bernard Wijnsemius, and the late Todd Fair.

The Wingate Memorial Carillon Recital Series honors Dr. Ray Winthrop Wingate, who was a professor of music at Alfred University for 56 years. After the installation of the bells in 1937, he was appointed university carillonneur and continued in the position until his death in 1968. He arranged more than 5,000 selections for the carillon and composed nine suites. The series is funded by the Margaret Merrill and Ray W. Wingate Memorial Carillon Foundation.

The carillon at AU is made of a double row of rounded oak levers, called batons, with a

pedal board of an octave and a fifth. The ground-floor display by the carillon has information on its history. Guests are welcome to climb the 69 steps to the top to enjoy the view and watch the guest artist at work.

Celery and blue cheese coleslaw

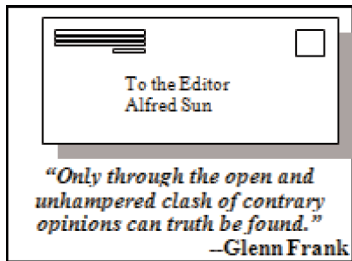
Carla Hall who is currently one of the chefs on the television program *The Chew* recently published a cookbook called *Cooking With Love*. There are many somewhat complicated recipes in it, but also, here and there, something simple and unusual. This is a different use for celery. She says she uses the slaw to garnish hamburgers and it could also be used as a side dish. The recipe serves 4.

Celery and Blue Cheese Slaw

4 celery ribs, thinly sliced	½ tsp. grated lemon zest
½ sm. red onion, sliced thinly	¼ tsp. kosher salt
½ c. flat-leaf parsley leaves, chopped	1/8 tsp. ground black pepper
1 T. red wine vinegar	¼ c. crumbled blue cheese
1 T. plus 1 tsp. olive oil	

In a large bowl, combine the celery, onion, and parsley. Add the vinegar, oil, lemon zest, salt, and pepper and toss well. Gently toss in the blue cheese.

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Cuomo let us down

To the Editor:

Andrew Cuomo let down New York's school children by abandoning the education tax credit, even after he promised to pass it this session.

The education tax credit provides an incentive to private citizens to make donations to public and independent schools and is widely supported by large majorities in both houses of the legislature all but the most extreme elements of the Democratic Party.

Alternative schools like charters and parochial schools can succeed where traditional public schools fail, and they deserve our support.

I speak from my experience as a founder and former chair of both SUNY's Charter School Committee and the Student Sponsor Partners organization, which supports and mentors inner-city high-school students in parochial schools.

Prior to the start of this year's legislative session, Andrew Cuomo made a personal pledge to New York's independent school leaders, including Cardinal Timothy Dolan, that he would personally fight for the education tax credit this year. As the session closes, Andrew Cuomo has abandoned his pledge and betrayed New York's children.

Cuomo is apparently so afraid

of teachers unions and Democratic Party and Working Families Party radicals that he has turned his back on schools that have proved to be an effective first rung on the ladder of upward social mobility.

Cuomo's cowardice just made it more difficult for these schools, and the children they serve, to succeed.

DOING BUSINESS AT THE COUNTY FAIR

For the fifth consecutive year the County Legislature held one of its July sessions at the Allegany County Fair. This is good for several reasons. It allows a different segment of the county population to see and hear how county government actually runs. It gives Legislators a chance to meet and visit with residents and visitors they wouldn't otherwise see. Legislators get to visit the 4-H and agricultural exhibits, and those operated by local businesses. It helps make government more transparent and approachable.

The Board meeting convened shortly after 2:00 p.m. with the presentation of the "colors" by members of Angelica Boy Scout Troop 736, comprised of Connor Cockle, Gunther Krohn, and Jonathan Rizzo. We were led in the Pledge of Allegiance by former Navy Petty Officer 3rd Class John Stengel of Friendship. Several individuals were honored during Privilege of the Floor, including 4-H Member Honoree Christian Lewis and Rod Biehler, who had the 2014 County Fair dedicated to him. All fifteen Legislators were present.

Several State and federal leaders were either present or represented by members of their staff. Assemblyman Joseph Giglio addressed those present, noting that it was good to be back in Allegany County, and away from Albany. Senator Catharine Young missed the County Fair this year for the first time since we started holding meetings there. She sent a letter that was read by her local representative, William Heaney. Congressman Tom Reed couldn't attend, but was represented by Joe Sempolinski.

Six resolutions were considered by the Legislature at this session. Resolution 128-14 appointed Deborah Marshall to the remainder of a four-year term on the County Community Services Board.

Resolution 129-14 was passed expressing opposition to a "draft guidance" to the Clean Water Act, proposed by the Environmental Protection Agency. Numerous groups have come out in opposition to the proposed guidance that would allow EPA to regulate roadside ditches and other "channels" that far exceed what Congress ever intended.

Resolution 130-14 was passed in support of the proposed "Oil and Waste Management Act of 2014, requiring that a permit issued to a solid waste facility accepting waste oil and gas drilling contain screening and rejection criteria for radioactivity in such waste.

Resolution 131-14 approved the 2014 Resource Allocation Plan Agreement with the State Office of Children and Family Services.

Resolution 132-14 approved 2014 Office of Children and Family Services subcontract agreements for youth programs.

Resolution 133-14 approved a contract with NYSEDA to develop the Allegany County Comprehensive Planning School, and accepted and appropriated grant funds. The Board then approved the audited bills for the past 2 weeks, totaling \$5,031,807.44. Legislator Ted Hopkins noted that as of this audit the County has paid \$5,795,580 for the State Medicaid Program. No other state requires local governments to contribute towards the cost of Medicaid.

My family joined me for the meeting at the Fair. After the meeting we toured the Fair Grounds to enjoy the sights. We visited the animal barns, and marveled at the skill of our young people in raising and preparing animals to show at the Fair. They, their families, and their leaders can be justifiably proud of their accomplishments. We visited the "Shawmut" Railroad cars and were once again impressed with the opulence of a bygone era. We looked at equipment, both old and new, that was on display. We looked at exhibits in the 4-H building, and toured other exhibits. One of the highlights was the new County Museum Display. We inspected artifacts that had not been publicly seen for 40 years.

This year marks the County Fair's 170th birthday. It also marked the retirement of Martha Roberts who has served as President of the Allegany County Agricultural Society, or County Fair for 15 years. Martha's tireless efforts have helped our County Fair improve and grow. Martha, we owe you a huge debt of gratitude. Thanks for everything. God Bless.

vided the aural treats, both were delicious.

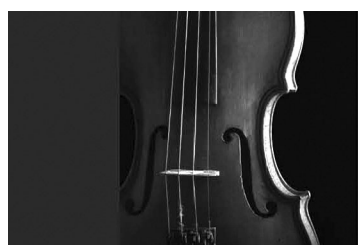

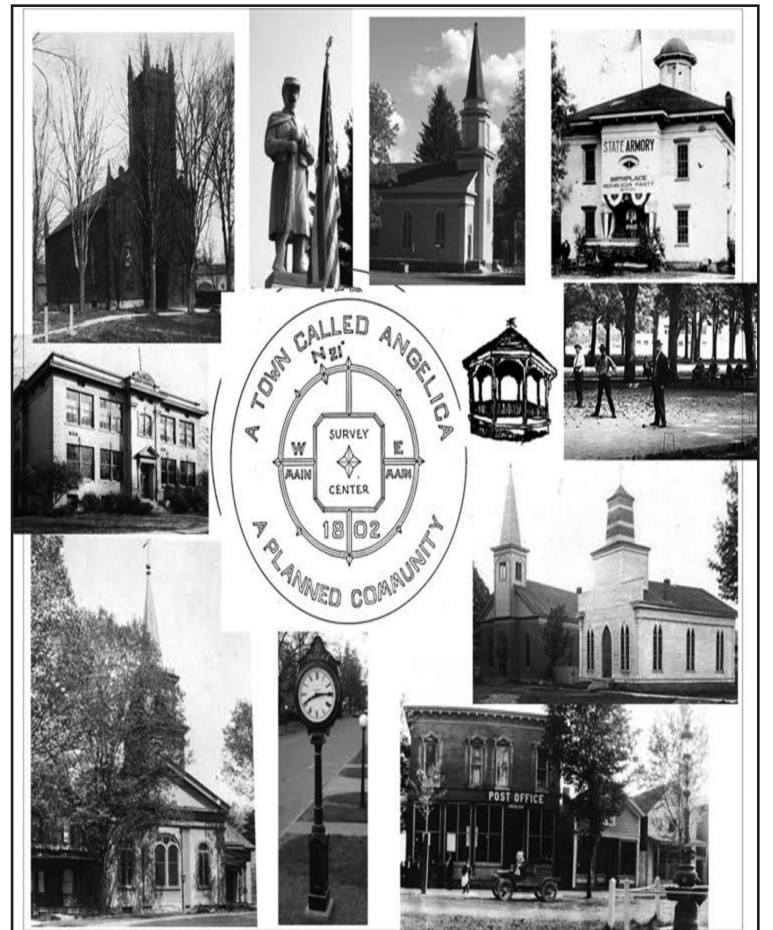

AU, ASC students collaborate

ALFRED—Over the next year and a half, students on 20 teams representing a number of disciplines, from environmental engineering to mathematics to mass communications, will design, fund, and build a solar-powered, net-zero home, test it, disassemble it, and transport it for competition in fall 2015 at the U.S. Department of Energy's Solar Decathlon 2015 at the Orange County Great Park, Irvine, CA.

One of those teams is made up

of students from Alfred University (AU) and Alfred State College (ASC). Their task is to build a solar-powered, highly energy-efficient house that combines affordability, innovation, and design excellence. The competition is based on architecture, interior design, construction, engineering, media, and market appeal.

The AU/ASC team will be competing against students from institutions ranging from Clemson University, New York College of Technology and Stanford University to the State University of New York at Buffalo, California Polytechnic State University and Yale University.

"The Solar Decathlon can be a positive, life-changing experience for participating students," said Richard King, the program director. "In addition to developing leadership, team spirit, and problem-solving skills, this competition bridges formal education with hands-on experience that helps decathletes excel once they enter the workforce."

This summer, the AU/ASC team has had some assistance from area high school student Cameron Schmidt who will be a sophomore at Canaseraga Cen-

tral School this fall. Schmidt participated in the summer Renewable Energy Camp where he became involved with the solar house design. He looked at the Solar Decathlon 2013 House, currently in Wellsville, and examined designs made by the AU/ASC team this past spring before recommending changes to roofing and the placement of each room including an electric car garage charging station, said Zingwu Wang, AU professor of electrical engineering and an advisor to the AU/ASC Solar Decathlon 2015 team.

Following his summer camp experience at AU, Schmidt wrote: "One common issue that has brought nations together or driven them to competition is energy and how to alter today's main usage of fossil fuels and other non-renewable resources. When most people hear presentations about renewable energy, they start thinking what is the price included to install these renewable energy systems? Most people do not realize the upfront cost will pay off in the long run, and they might be able to live "off the grid", and even formulate enough electricity to make a profit!"

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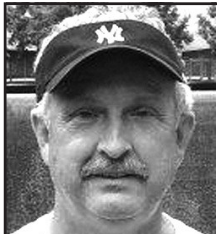
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The Dugout

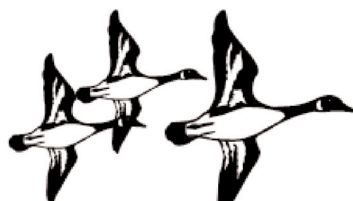

For the Birds...

Some local birds are causing a stir in the Alfred area. Walter Mason called my attention to the Merlins that have been hanging around Bartlett Hall, on the Alfred campus.

Merlins, a falcon intermediate in size between an American Kestrel and a Peregrine Falcon, are not very common in this area. I was surprised that Merlins were not even covered in the 1988 New York State Breeding Bird Atlas. Jim Kimball found an active nest two years ago right on the campus of SUNY Geneseo. Maybe they like college campuses??? Information about them on the Lab of Ornithology website indicates that "Merlin populations have largely recovered from twentieth-century declines, thanks to a ban on the pesticide DDT and their ability to adapt to life around towns and cities."

I like to walk on the 'Wireworm' Road (the extension of Randolph Road) in the evenings. Last weekend, I heard two Barred Owls calling from the State Re-forestation land. Almost immediately, several coyotes began to call back to the owls! Shortly after that, I realized I was so mesmerized by the vocalizations, I was missing three hot-air balloons from the Wellsville Balloon Rally that were floating in the distance!

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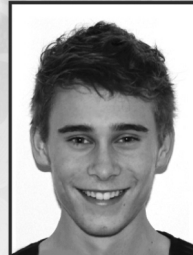
