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New Toshiba Multi-Function Devices being deployed now!

PaperCut for ALL:

As a part of the deployment, we are adding the PaperCut feature, previously only used by students on the public access printers, to every device on our MPS lease. This will give you the flexibility to securely print/scan from ANY Toshiba MPS device on campus. We are working to distribute fobs that can go on your keychain for use with PaperCut. They will be going out over the next several days via inter-office mail by Department. In the mean-time, you can simply log in to your device using your AU username and password. The instructions for authenticating and using your fob will be included in the bottom drawer of every device.

XMedius Fax:

Sending faxes will now be easier and more efficient than ever before. Through XMedius, we will now be able to send and receive faxes right from your computer. Training following in the near future.

Managed Print Services:

If there are non-MPS devices (desktop printers) in your area, when you return to the office there should be a Toshiba sticker on it with Toshiba and the Alfred University logo at the top. This means that your device has been added to the program. Toshiba will now monitor your toner levels online and will send you toner for that device as required. You no longer need to order your own toner/ink cartridges. In addition, the service of these devices is also under contract. While we will still contact ITS Help Desk when we have an issue, they will work with Toshiba to find the solution. If, for some reason, your printer does not have a sticker when you return, please reach out to **procurement@alfred.edu**, and we will help to resolve the issue.

PrintReleaf:

As a part of the redeployment, Toshiba has added us to the PrintReleaf program. In this program, trees are planted in targeted reforestation areas based on the print activity from our devices. This includes the desktop devices on the Managed Print program as well as the leased devices. This is an excellent way for the University promote sustainability and help the environment.

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Teaching Through the Moment

Tue. Aug. 4. 1:30-2:30pm. GUEST SPEAKERS: Maura Brewer and Abigail Glaum-Lathbury (Arts Research Collective), "Teaching Through the Moment"

Artists and teachers Maura Brewer and Abigail Glaum-Lathbury will speak about how to catapult a craft-based in-person course into an online modality. As part of the Arts Research Collective, Brewer and Glaum-Lathbury have been engaged in discussions around radical purpose-built education for many years. This summer they offered their course, Jumpsuit: How to Make a Personal Uniform for the End of Capitalism, online for the first time. They will discuss what they found in their process, and how teaching online exposed new ways of engaging learners, and also the difficulties with teaching through screens.

Founded in Los Angeles and New York in 2017, Arts Research Collective (ARC) offers classes, workshops, and events throughout the United States and online. ARC creates rigorous, ethical, and radical educational experiences for scholars, artists, and designers of all backgrounds. Maura Brewer's work in video, performance and experimental fashion design explores the construction of female subjects in mass culture. Brewer's projects, videos and performances have been shown at MoMA, New York; MCA, Chicago, MUMOK, Vienna and the Centre d'Art Contemporain Gen ve. Brewer is a founding member of the Rational Dress Society, a counter-fashion collective, and Arts Research

Cooperative, an experimental art school. She lives and works in Los Angeles. Abigail Glaum-Lathbury is a Chicago based artist and designer. For nearly a decade she produced a women's ready to wear collection that showed during New York Market week and sold nationally and internationally. Her recent work takes the form of a counter-practice within the emergent field of critical fashion. In 2014 she cofounded the Rational Dress Society, a collective that raises questions around identity and consumption through a radical approach to inclusive sizing. Her work has been shown at the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago, the Nevada Museum of Art, Art in General and the Elizabeth Foundation for the Arts in New York, and the Dome of Visions in Copenhagen. Her projects have been covered in the Guardian, the Paris Review, the Huffington Post and Surface Magazine among other publications. Glaum-Lathbury is an Assistant Professor of Fashion Design at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. See Zoom link on the Canvas OFD site / in next week's email.
