AU alumnus and spy thriller novelist to speak at Writers Workshop 3/29/04

Robert Littell, a 1956 alumnus of Alfred University who has written 14 spy novels including The Company, published in 2002, will be among the featured writers for Alfred University's annual Writers' Workshop, a three-day conference that opens Thursday, April 1.Littell began his writing career with his novel, the now legendary spy thriller The Defection of A.J. Lewinter. Christopher Lehmann-Haupt of The New York Times called it "a perfect little gem, the best Cold War thriller I've read in years," and the praise kept coming with critics hailing Littell as "the American Le Carr" (New York Times) and raving that his books were "as good as thriller writing gets" (The Washington Post). For The Company, his 14th novel, Littell created an engrossing, multigenerational, wickedly nostalgic yet utterly candid saga, bringing to life through a host of characters-historical and imagined-the over 40 years of the CIA-"the Company" to insiders. At the heart of the novel is a stunningly conceived mole hunt involving such rivals and allies as the MI6, KGB, and Mossad. Littell appears on a panel with novelist Megan Staffel of Alfred and poet Thomas Krampf of Hinsdale at 4 p.m. Friday in Room 114, Seidlin Hall on the Alfred University campus. The Writers Workshop opens at 8 p.m. Thursday with a poetry reading by Krampf, also in Room 114, Seidlin Hall. At 8 p.m. Friday, Staffel will give a reading of her work in Howell Hall on the AU campus. A series of workshops for registered students on Saturday morning concludes the Writers Workshop.
