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HR Tip of the Month

Did you know that Section 162 of the New York Labor Code states that it is mandatory that Alfred University provide employees with a 30 minute lunch break when they are working a shift of more than six hours, which extends over the noonday meal period?

It should be noted that while employees are clocked out on their lunch break, they must be allowed an uninterrupted meal period and must be free to leave their work area and engage in other pursuits. Under no circumstances will an employee work any time "off the clock" or fail to full report actual time worked during a payroll pay period.

Alfred University has an obligation to pay all employees for hours worked, if you are clocking out and continue working, we have to pay you for those hours worked. Please, refrain from this behavior, as it can become a conduct issue.
