Electronic W2

Did you know that you can receive your W2 (the form that reports an employee's annual wages and the amount of taxes withheld from his or her paycheck) electronically in BannerWeb? This feature will be available late-January.

Advantages of receiving Form W-2 electronically

- -Your W-2 will be available sooner than a printed copy
- -You can reprint a copy of your W-2 anytime during the year
- -No possibility that a Form W-2 might be lost, stolen, delayed or misplaced by the U.S. mail service or by the employee
- -Multiple levels of security protects all information within the BannerWeb system
- -Access can be obtained anytime via the internet-anywhere in the world

If you do not choose to receive your W-2 electronically, a paper copy will be mailed to your home address (current students receive their W-2 in their campus box). Faculty and staff, please ensure the Office of Human Resources has your up-to-date mailing address.

Coronavirus

Recently, a new coronavirus - 2019 Novel (New) Coronavirus - was detected in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China that has not been previously found in humans.

This coronavirus can lead to fever, cough, and shortness of breath. There are hundreds of confirmed cases in China, including cases outside of Wuhan and additional cases being identified in a growing number of countries internationally, including the United States.

Important Health Information For Those Who Have Recently Traveled to China:

If you recently traveled to China and feel sick with fever, cough or trouble breathing, or you develop symptoms, you should:

Seek medical care right away. Call ahead and tell them about your travel and symptoms. Avoid contact with others.

Stay home if you're ill and isolate yourself from roommates, except for seeking medical care. Avoid further travel until the illness resolves.

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when coughing or sneezing.

Wash hands often with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds. If unavailable, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

Symptoms:

Human coronaviruses commonly cause mild-to-moderate illness in people. Symptoms can include:

- * Runny nose
- * Headache
- * Cough
- * Sore throat
- * Fever

How Does 2019 Novel (New) Coronavirus Spread?

Since this virus is very new, health authorities continue to carefully watch how this virus spreads. It is known to spread from animals to humans, and it also may be spread from person to person. It's not clear yet how easily Novel (New) Coronavirus spreads from person-to-person. It's important to know

this in order to better understand the risk associated with this virus.

Prevention:

There are currently no vaccines available to protect against human coronavirus infection. To reduce your risk of infection:

- * Wash your hands often with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds.
- * Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth with unwashed hands.
- * Avoid close contact with people who are sick.

Treatment:

There is no specific treatment available for any coronavirus. People infected with coronavirus should receive supportive care to help relieve symptoms.

What to do if you have recently traveled to Wuhan China and become sick?

Alfred University Wellness Center is in communication with the NYS Health Department and carefully monitoring the emerging situation concerning the coronavirus. Please be advised that if you meet the criteria listed above, you should come to the Wellness Center.

Business Travel - Motor Pool and Car Rental Guidelines

As per the University's travel policy, a University Motor Pool vehicle should be the first vehicle of choice when travelling for business purposes. The reservation process is simple, and the cost is only \$.40 per mile which includes fuel (ask for a gas card).

However, if your request is denied because there are no cars available, it may become necessary for you to rent a vehicle. In those cases, the rental company of choice is Enterprise. There are two ways to handle paying for your Enterprise Rental:

- 1. Call the local Enterprise office in Hornell and have them direct bill the rental to the appropriate FOAP. The team there is always happy to help!
- 2. Complete your online reservation using your University One Card.

It is important to note that employees cannot use a personal credit card when renting a vehicle for business purposes. This is due to the fact that it is not tied to the University and therefore would not be eligible for our Corporate discount or tax-exempt status.

University employees are, however, eligible to receive discounts from Enterprise for personal trips under a separate program. Feel free to contact Procurement Services to learn more.

Saying Glass at Cohen Gallery

January 24-February 23, 2020 Reception: January 24, 5-8pm

Cohen Gallery

Alfred University's Cohen Gallery presents Saying Glass, an exhibition of the work of five Alfred University-affiliated artists working in cast glass, curated by Karen Donnellan.

Saying Glass celebrates two recent developments at Alfred University's School of Art and Design: the appointment of Michael Rogers, whose work is included in the exhibit, as Artistic Associate at SOAD; and the renovation of the National Casting Center glass studios.

The exhibition brings together the work of Rogers and four SOAD alumni: Andrew Erdos (BFA '07), Joanna Manousis (MFA '12), Zora Palova (Randal Chair '16), and Anjali Srinivasan (BFA '02). Their work extends from the gestural and experimental to the meticulously crafted and engineered, and the exhibition reflects the far-reaching edges of the visual, material, and conceptual potential in glass today. The title Saying Glass is a reference to the artist Roni Horn, whose metal and cast-glass sculptures are meditations on the element of water.

The artists featured in Saying Glass:

Andrew Erdos' multi-disciplinary works often combine cast and blown glass, video, photography and installation. Erdos has exhibited internationally at venues including The Toledo Museum of Art; Corning Museum of Glass; National Center for Contemporary Art, Moscow; Beijing BS1 Contemporary Art Center; and the Kemper Museum.

Joanna Manousis is a British-American artist working in glass and mixed media. Her work has been recognized with nominations for the Louis Comfort Tiffany Foundation Award, a Bombay Sapphire Award Nomination for 'Excellence in Glass' as well as the Hans Godo Frabel Award.

Zora Palova was born in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, in 1947. She studied at the Academy of Fine Arts, Bratislava, specializing in painting and later in glass and architecture. She became President of the Association of Applied Arts and Designers in 1995 and Research Professor at the University of Sunderland in 1996.

Michael Rogers recently retired as Professor in the Studio Arts Glass Program at the Rochester Institute of Technology. Previously he returned to the United States after spending eleven years in Japan where he was head of Glass at Aichi University.

Anjali Srinivasan's studio processes focus on developing ways to discover, access and restructure information held in a material. She is currently invested in notions of "biological craftsmanship". She lives and works between India and the United States, as Assistant Professor at Massachusetts College of Art and Design, Boston, and Director at ChoChoMa Studios, Bangalore.

Saying Glass has been curated by Alfred University Assistant Professor of Glass Karen Donnellan. Born in Wicklow, Ireland, Donnellan also serves as director of the National Casting Center glass facility at the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University. Her work is held in public and private collection and has been shown at venues internationally, including the Corning Museum of Glass; the Irish Museum of Contemporary Art; Tushanwan Museum, Shanghai; and the National Glass Center, Sunderland, England.

Confluence displays the wide-ranging work of more than 20 first- and second-year graduate students in Alfred University's School of Art and Design. It will be the first SOAD graduate student exhibit that includes both the work of MFA students in Alfred University's Painting program, based half the year in Dusseldorf, Germany, and the work of MFA students on the Alfred University campus.

An opening reception will be held from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm Friday, January 24, and the exhibit will close with a reception on Friday, January 31, also from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm. Both receptions are open to the public and free of charge.

Confluence has been curated by four graduate students - Francesco Gattuso of Alfred/Dusseldorf Painting; Sam Horowitz of Sculpture/Dimensional Studies; Leslie Rollins of Electronic Integrated Arts, and Kirstin Willders of Ceramic Art - representing all disciplines in SOAD.

"By placing artworks from a myriad of disparate materials, mediums, and styles in direct conversation, ample opportunity will be created for productive dialogue and new perspectives on the work as singular objects as well as placing them in larger material- and theory-based contexts," organizers of the exhibit say in a prepared release.

Confluence further will highlight "the many parallel and interesting aesthetic and conceptual directions of the diverse student body as well as the divergent practices that create a dynamic environment of exchange within the studio."

Alfred University inaugurated its graduate MFA Painting program in 2017. Confluence will exhibit the work of the first class to receive their MFAs in that program.
