There are 96 students presently enrolled in the Washington Semester Program.

The Washington Semester is a cooperative arrangement between The American University and approximately 80 colleges and universities throughout the United States. Honor students from these schools spend a semester of their junior year in Washington studying American national government in action.

The Center is located on State open early in February, replacing Street, on the site of the former Kenyon Hall, facing the Herrick Memorial Library. The new Center has three floors: a ground floor, main floor, and second floor. A student lounge will be located on the main floor. The Parents' Association has launched a drive to raise \$20,000 to furnish the lounge.

A Television Lounge and Music Room equipped with stereophonic sound will be available to all students for their pleasure and relaxation. Included on the main floor will be student and faculty dining rooms, with seating facilities for one hundred and fifty. Spacious picture windows will overlook the campus.

On the second floor will be a large meeting room facing Herrick Library. There will also be two smaller, private meeting rooms, and an office to be used by various student organizations.

The ground or basement floor will include offices for the Fiat and Kanakadea, and a darkroom for use of both publications. A large-size game room will also be located on this floor.

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




