CENTER FOR HIGH-TEMPERATURE MATERIALS CHARACTERIZATION

AU dedicates addition to McMahon Building

ALFRED-Alfred University Thursday afternoon dedicated an addition to the McMahon Engineering Building that contains some of the most advanced analytical equipment in the nation.

Located within the \$9 million "infill" – it was built in the courtyard of the existing building – the addition contains an array of analytical equipment capable of characterizing materials while they are at elevated temperatures, rather than after they've cooled, giving researchers better information about how the materials function in at high temperatures. Collectively, the suites of equipment make up the Center for High-Temperature Materials Characterization.

Dedication of the new space, and the Center, marks the end of a journey that began more than 10 years ago, when representatives from Alfred University and Corning Incorporated approached State Senator Catharine Young with a request for funding, said Thomas Hinman, a trustee of Alfred University and a senior vice president at Corning prior to his retirement.

The University and Corning believed the Center would have great value for industries in New York State, and for the Inamori School of Engineering, part of the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University, where the next generation of scientists and engineers is being educated.

"Senator Young went to bat for us, and we got \$4 million in 2008 to start the Center," said Hinman. The University secured another \$2.9 million in 2012 through the Western New York Regional Economic Development Council, part of Empire State Development, and again Senator Young was an advocate for the project.

"This initiative has already had a significant benefit," said Hinman, noting that the Center has been integral to

the receipt of \$7 million in state and federal research funding since 2011, and more than 30 companies have done work through the Center.

"Beyond the economic benefit," said Hinman, has been the benefit to the students. As an alumnus, he said he knows one of the "hallmarks of an Alfred University education is that our students come out prepared to do hands-on work, and this is adding to their capabilities."

The Center and the School of Engineering also contribute to the economic vitality of the area," said Hinman. "On behalf of the Board of Trustees and Alfred University, I want to extend our heartfelt thanks to Senator Young for her help.'

Senator Young, who is chair of the Senate Finance Committee, was detained in Albany by negotiations on the state budget. She sent William Heaney, her community liaison, in her stead.

"New York State has long been a leader in the glass and ceramics industry," said Heaney, "and Alfred University and the New York State College of Ceramics have been fundamental" in the development of the industry. "You are educating the next generation, and pioneering technology" that leads to the development of new products.

He said Senator Young asked him to convey how pleased she was to be able to help secure "the resources needed (for the College) to continue to innovate...Here, at Alfred University, the future is now."





Come and get it' veggie sauce

Combine all ingredients in a small pan and heat gently while stirring. Don't allow it to boil. Pour over steamed veggies. (Don't forget broccoli and cauliflower. They are especially good with this sauce.)



Okay, folks – it's time! Go find your boots, sharpen your pruning shears and head out to the ditches which line our roads. Here you will find pussy willows and red twig dogwoods. Both shrubs enjoy the damp soil found at the edges.

Take cuttings, 8 inches long – wrap in wet paper and head home. Remove lower buds, leaving 4 to 6 at tip. Place both into a glass of water. The chemicals in the willow will aid both to produce roots. Place in bright, cool (60 degrees F.) light – no direct sunlight!

About early May, transplant into a small pot and fill with sand. Place in a south window for two weeks. Come mid-May, harden off for five days and plant outdoors in yoru damp spot.

After three years, start to prune in March – for pussy willow branches and to rejuvenate the young red growth on the dogwood. Enjoy – what can be a better harbinger of spring than a bunch of silvery pussy willow branches? Good hunting!

Disappointed by 'extreme' label

Reed's campaign literature has characterized the people who attend his Town Hall meetings as "extreme" groups of "liberal activists" who want "higher taxes, and cuts to funding for our military and veterans" and who "put global warming ahead of taking care of our veterans." I attended two Town Hall meetings over the last couple of months and I never heard people asking for higher taxes or for cuts to the military and veterans.

Many of us did question Trump's budget proposal which would RAISE spending on the military by 52 billion and pay for it by CUTTING or eliminating popular domestic programs that assist many in our district (including veterans) such as Meals on Wheels, Head Start, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (which will be eliminated), etc. We also questioned the need for spending billions on the wall along our southern border given that illegal immigration from Mexico has in fact been going down recently, not up, and many farmers in our area rely on immigrant labor.

As for global warming, people attending the meeting raised objections to Trump signing an executive order to undo the Clean

Power Plan, put in place to help I was disappointed that Tom reduce emissions from power plants. This executive order, in addition to making it difficult to keep our commitments on the Paris Accord, will support coal over other types of energy, which economically is not particularly helpful for our area since we don't produce coal and we do produce alternative energy. The executive order affects regulation, not funding, and it has nothing whatsoever to do with funding for veterans, which all of us at the Town Meeting were actually in favor of.

> I don't consider these positions to be in any way extreme. At his Town Hall meetings, Tom Reed says that he wants to find common ground. Characterizing his constituents as extremists is not a strategy that is likely to achieve that goal.

Does cruise missile strike in Syria hold up under closer scrutiny?

We are all familiar with the facts in Syria. On April 4th the government of Bashar al Assad launched a chemical attack on rebel held Khan Sheikhun in Idlib province killing 75. President Trump, impressed by the enormity of his humanitarian duty and brushing aside Syrian claims denying responsibility, responded decisively, launching 58 Tomahawk cruise missiles at a Syrian air base. Now the U.S. government has set the stage for regime change to again dominate the conversation and to justify further increased military intervention as stated explicitly by H.R. McMaster in his

interview on Fox News Sunday. This is the narrative as it has officially unfolded, but does it hold up under closer scrutiny, or are we witnessing a rush to judgment replaying the Iraqi WMD craze which wrongly justified the disastrous Iraqi war to the American people and the International community in 2003?

The first question that came to my mind when I first heard of the gas attack is, who benefits? Just days before the chemical attack, the US, France, and Britain announced that regime change was no longer an objective in Syria. With Syrian government forces making comfortable and sustained gains militarily, it seems incredible that Assad would be looking desperately for ways to turn Western opinion irrevocably against him by launching a strategically negligible chemical weapons attack to kill less than 100 people. It really beggars the imagination!

On the other hand, the rebel groups would have a prime motivation to stage such an attack to excite renewed calls for regime change to reverse their debilitated position. President Trump has also benefited substantially, garnering bipartisan acclaim from as diverse a collection as John McCain, Hillary Clinton, and Fareed Zakaria, who joyfully proclaimed, "I think Donald Trump became president of the United States, I think this was actually

But even laying aside the the extremely questionable motivations dominating the official narrative, the US acted far too quickly to establish any sort of attribution to the attack. Less than 24 hours after the attack the Trump administration was releasing statements ascribing guilt to the Assad regime, and launched the cruise missile attack only 2 days afterward. How can a forensic investigation be conducted in a war torn area held by Al Qaeda so quickly? It can't and it hasn't. There have been calls for a UN investigation by Canadian Prime Minister Trudeau and others but it will take time, which at the current pace of military escalation will be meaningless. What proof has the US government given to support it's de facto declaration of war in Syria? Not a shred.

There is another burning question surrounding the whole incident. In 2013-14 Syria surrendered it's chemical weapons stockpiles for destruction by Western governments under supervision by the UN Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons. As recently as Jan 16th on NPR Obama National Security Advisor Susan Rice boasted that We were able to get the Syrian government to voluntarily and verifiably give up its chemical weapons stockpile." . So, how does a country with no chemical weapons launch a chemical weapons attack? One would certainly think that it seems like a reasonable question to ask. Was Assad hiding weapons? Were the inspectors incompetent? Were the chemical weapons from rebel stockpiles? The administration doesn't seem interested in finding out and has moved onto action.

The past also provides ample reason to be suspicious of hasty rushes to judgment when it comes to chemical weapons in Syria. We all remember in 2013 when Assad used chemical weapons, nearly leading the Obama administration into direct intervention. The narrative was portrayed as conclusive, but the case was always murky and ultimately inconclusive. Director of National Intelligence James Clapper characterized the intelligence to Obama as "robust" but not a "slam dunk". This may have been an understatement. US News and World Report reported "But the leader of the U.N. investigation tells U.S. News he actually is unsure of who committed the attack. The U.N. report completed in December 2013 by Ake Sellstrom's team determined a sarin attack happened but did not assign blame.

A large part of the case for the Damascus bombings relied on the much touted "vector analysis' front page story in the New York Times which 'proved" that two missiles with sarin gas came from a Syrian military base. *The Times* later retracted the bulk of its "proof" on a story buried on page 8, below the fold, 18 paragraphs into a story under the not-so-eye-catching title, "New Study Refines View Of Sarin Attack in Syria.". In the story the *Times* reported that a new analysis by two military experts concluded that the Aug. 21 rockets had a range of about three kilometers, or less than one-third the distance needed to intersect at the Syrian military base northwest of Damascus, plus the discovery that the Moadamiya missile contained no Sarin, making its use in the vectoring of two Sarin-laden rockets nonsensical. Since the Obama administration had released no verifiable proof that Assad could be connected to the attack, the collapse of the "vector analysis" story took away the only "smoking gun" connecting Assad to

Where are we going with the Trump administration's hasty policy of regime change? We have been militarily active in Afghanistan for nearly 16 years and active in Iraq for 14 years with no end in sight to either deployment. The American people deserve answers and evidence before another President commits this nation to a course of war and regime change

The cruise missile attack also represents a flagrant abuse of Executive power, since I'm quite sure that firing nearly 60 cruise missiles at another countries' air base constitutes an overt act of war. There has been absolutely no debate or case made in Congress for such an action. We need to be skeptical when the government claims humanitarian justification for waging war. The proof of the past and the blood of too many American soldiers and innocents in Afghanistan, Libya, Yemen, Iraq, and Syria are too much to ignore.



Daisy Wu lectures on 'Sound of China' for Buffalo group

ALFRED-Zhongbei (Daisy) Wu, visiting associate professor of music in the Division of Performing Arts in Alfred University, presented a lecture entitled "Sound of China" for the Twentieth Century Club in Buffalo, April 5.

Over 100 club members attended the lecture, which included performance by Wu on the Guzheng, a traditional Chinese musical instrument, along with information the history and development of Chinese music.

'Should not be pessimistic,' women's rights activist says

ALFRED-"I don't think we All that activity, she said, "stems pessimistic," renowned women's and human rights activist Charlotte Bunch said this week, as she delivered the 2017 Riley Lecture in Alfred University's Nevins Theater.

Bunch, founding director and a senior scholar at the Center for Women's Global Leadership at Rutgers University, reviewed 50 years of local, national and international feminist activism in her speech, beginning with her years as an undergraduate at Duke University. She has been a key participant in the effort to have women's rights recognized internationally as human rights and continues to advocate for that "intersectional feminism."

Bunch noted the times do not appear auspicious for further advancement. The United States recently announced it would cut by 50 percent its funding of the UN Population Fund, which supports UN efforts to improve women's reproductive health internationally. And yet, she said, the past 20 years have seen steady growth in the international recognition that violent victimization occurs not only in public but in private, familydominated spheres. This advance, she said "is transforming women around many world."

In January, she added, that gradual transformation was seen in the hundreds of women's rights demonstrations organized in countries around the world.

constructed in the early 1970s. A photograph of the original kiln showed a structure that looked more like a backyard shed than a modern kiln facility. Edizel singled out Alfred University Kiln Specialist Freddy Fredrickson – "legendary kiln builder Freddy Fredrickson" -- as an advocate through the years for an improved kiln building.

Fredrickson was given the honor of cutting the ribbon on the new facility (see accompanying photo) flanked by Alfred University Trustee Tom Hinman '79; Professor Alastair Cormack, interim dean, Inamori School of Engineering; Edizel; and Ceramic Art Professor Linda Sikora and John Gill.

The new facility, constructed in post-and-beam style, shows off the warm reddish hues of Douglas Fir timber shipped to Alfred from Tennessee. The building design allows for the easy flow of air, a critical issue given the chemical reactions taking place within each kiln, while also providing necessary protection from the elements. There are currently four gas-fired kilns in the building and one woodfired kiln. An additional kiln will be added in the fall, constructed

by Alfred University students studying kiln design in the School of Art and Design and supervised by Shawn Murrey, a kiln specialist in SOAD.

Edizel noted the new facility was built with funds from the State University of New York Construction Fund and expressed amazement at "the distance we have traveled" since the original kiln building was erected in the 1970's. He said at

least seven more kilns will be added to the news facility, one by one, over the next several years.

Joining him at the dedication ceremony were Fredrickson; Alfred University Trustee Tom Hinman '79; Professor Alastair Cormack, interim dean of the Inamori School of Engineering; and Professor of Ceramic Art Linda Sikora.

The DIY Farmer's Wife Approach

DIY Challah Easter Bread

Baking bread is one of my favorite things to do in the kitchen. Challah Easter bread is my traditional contribution to our family gatherings. In Jewish custom challah bread is prayed over especially during the "kneading" process. It is a time to pray for your family and loved ones. During the lent season it is custom for my Italian family to put a colored egg at the end of the challah braid.

Here's what you'll need:

1/2 cup warm water 1/2 T. salt

1/2 T. active dry yeast 1 egg lightly beaten 2 T. unsalted butter, melted


2 T. honey 1 3/4 cups flour 1 hard-boiled Easter egg

Proof yeast in warm water. Slowly add ingredients to a large bowl one at a time, stirring with wooden spoon. Turn dough out onto floured surface and knead for 8-10 minutes until smooth and elastic. Cover with damp muslin and let rise until doubled in size. Separate into three sections and braid placing Easter egg in the last loop of the braid. (For more traditional challah braiding check out YOUTUBE.) Cover and let rise 80 minutes. Preheat oven to 425 and bake until brown, around 40minutes.



For the Birds...

After a week of icy winds and snow up on Jericho Hill, it was a welcome change to get a spring-like day for the annual April Bird Census held April 9.

Members of the Allegany County Bird Club, in cooperation with the Buffalo Ornithological Society, have participated in these bird counts for over 50 years. There is a bird count in April, May and October each year, as well as the annual Audubon Christmas Count.

I had put my bird feeders up the morning after returning from Texas, when the cold and snow was so hard on the birds that had returned north too soon. I thought I'd feed the birds for a few days to get them through the cold and snow. Little did I know that 'a few days' would turn into a month!

a month!
At one time, I had both American Tree Sparrows (a winter sparrow in Alfred) and Chipping Sparrows (a breeding season sparrow in Alfred) feeding sideby-side on the feeder. I was so happy to see two Fox Sparrows in the yard for the past week ... usually they are one of the winter species I miss seeing because they have already migrated to their breeding grounds in the north when I get back to Alfred

On Sunday, April 9, the day of the April census, I was able to tally 30 species including two Barred Owls vocalizing off the Wireworm Road, a Hooded Merganser in the pond along the Waterwells Road, a Red-shouldered Hawk and a Red-breasted Nuthatch calling in the State Reforestation land along the Brown Road, my first Brown Thrasher of the spring in the back yard, and two Eastern Meadowlark singing in the field behind the house.

This Monday morning, the day after the census, two Tree Swallows were back flying around the nestbox Dick had made which I put up in the field. Last year, a pair came back too soon and I found two dead Tree Swallows frozen together in that nestbox. I think the pair this spring timed their return better.

One day this week, when the weather cooperates, I will be going up to Braddock Bay to help set up the banding station for the spring season, which will begin on Saturday, April 15. Stormy weather along the lakeshore this winter caused considerable damage. Volunteers have already removed two large trees that were victims of the wind earlier this spring.

Of course, Smiley will be going with me for the day and then later he'll come with me for the weekdays I'll be up at Braddock Bay. Pets are not allowed in BBBO's house where the banders and students stay during the season. But a friend has built him a sturdy dog house so he can stay outside in the fenced-in yard. I'm keeping my fingers crossed that he is okay with the new arrangements!


