64 awarded master's in AU Downstate Program

BROOKLYN—The 64 graduates of Alfred University's Downstate Program who received their master's degrees in counseling or literacy education during the sixth annual commencement ceremonies at Kingsborough Community College Saturday, June 15 each know what it is to be hero, said AU Provost William M. Hall.

Among the characteristics of a hero, said Hall, who is retiring at the end of the month after a 33-year career at Alfred University, are "courage, determination and independence."

The graduates of AU's Downstate Programs who attend classes weekends and during the summers while working full-time and taking care of family responsibilities needed those same characteristics to make it through the program to earn their degrees.

Earning their master's degrees is "more than just learning the facts in the curriculum," Hall said, telling the graduates, "You have taken the challenge, and you have met the challenge."



ALFRED—The Allegany County Youth Court Board met Monday, June, 3 for its annual dinner at the Terra Cotta Coffeehouse in Alfred. The Board recognized former Board Chairman Dr. Robert Heineman and graduating student member Elissa

The evening began with Jessica Jennings, Youth Court Director, recognizing Elissa Carls for her service to the Court. Elissa contributed more than 97 hours, participated in additional fundraisers and programming, and assisted with training new members each year.

Jennings noted that Elissa would take on any role necessary, and never with a poor attitude. "She always worked hard to see both sides of every case, even when it was hard to do so. She has been a great role model for her peers...a significant part of our Youth Court for the past five years."

Elissa, the daughter of Ed and

The dinner continued with Keith Slep, Allegany County District Attorney, presenting a plaque to Dr. Robert Heineman in recognition of his contributions and diligent service to the Youth Court. Dr. Heineman, a Professor of Political Science at Alfred University and former County Legislator, recently resigned after 12 years with the Youth Court Board. Mr. Slep shared that the Youth Court has had a rocky road, but Dr. Heineman kept it moving forward.

Thanking the Board for the honor, Dr. Heineman also recognized several key influences for the Court including the Youth Court Board, Ms. Jennings, Genesee Valley School (where the Youth Court Office is located), Dr. William Hall from

Alfred University, and Bill Penman and Kim Strauser from the Allegany Council on Alcoholism & Substance Abuse, Inc. (provides organizational overhead for youth court)

The evening concluded with Dr. Heineman sharing his belief that peer groups are the biggest influence in keeping kids headed in the right direction.

"That's what Youth Court does; it supplies role models for kids who need them," he said.

Each spring the A.E. Crandall Hook and Ladder Fire Company, the Village of Alfred's volunteer fire department, recognizes members who have gone the extra mile.

At this year's Annual Dinner, the A. E. Hook and Ladder Company honored the following eight individuals. They all responded to 100+ calls. Nancy Furlong – 575 calls The Company responded to 975 calls during the past year, according to Wendell Peters, outgoing Fire Chief. Of those calls, 407 were responses to automatic alarms. The company hopes the serious problem of false alarms will be resolved in the future. Many of Furlong's calls were to ascertain whether the automatic alarm was false. Last year there were 469 Emergency Medical Services calls, which averages out to 1.3 calls per DAY, a large number for an all-volunteer company like Alfred's.

The Member of the Year was Lawrence "Mac" McCormick, Captain of Alfred 9, the ladder truck. Mac spends a great deal of time doing maintenance work and cleaning up and clearing out

in the fire hall. He is very committed to the smooth functioning of the fire hall and making sure that the company is ready "for the next big one.

Many hands make light work. The Fire Company needs many hands to help with the work of saving lives and property in our community. A recipe with fresh garden peas... We had garden peas this week, not raised by us, and they were

so good, I remembered this recipe that Alice Heineman submitted several years ago to be included in the Alfred Community Cookbook, compiled by the Alfred Community Theatre, and still available at Hair Care, by the way.

CRANDALL HOOKS FIRE CHIEF ZACH HAMM

Give it a try-fresh or frozen peas, it is delicious!

Gurkebraten Mit Erbsen Braised Cucumbers and Peas

8 cucumbers 3 T. butter salt, pepper 3 c. peas

½ c. stock 1 tsp. chopped parsley 1 tsp. chopped chives

Peel cucumbers and cut in chunks 1½ inches long. In a heavy skillet, over high heat, melt butter. Add cucumbers, season with pepper and salt, and sauté for 5 minutes. Reduce heat to medium, then add shelled peas and stock and continue cooking another 5 minutes for frozen peas or 8 minutes for fresh. When cucumbers have a glassy look, remove from heat; sprinkle with chopped chives and parsley and transfer to a heated serving dish. Serves 8.

Jay Cerio, director of the Downstate Program that the University offers through the Center for Integrated Teacher Education, and Robert Bitting, associate director, presented a framed print of the Brooklyn Bridge to Hall for "building bridges between Brooklyn and Manhattan and Alfred."

While Cerio and Bitting have led the program since it began during the 2006-07 school year, it took the "visionary support" of Hall to make it happen, said AU President Charles M. Edmondson.

COUNTY PLANNING PROGRESS

The first regular meeting of the Board of Legislators for the month of June took place on Monday afternoon, June 10th. Former Navy Petty Officer Jeffry Spencer led the Pledge of Allegiance. After serving in the Navy from 1978 to 1984 Jeffrey has continued to serve our community. He is currently a teacher at Cuba-Rushford Central School District. He was recently recognized as an outstanding teacher at the Allegany County Area Foundation Annual Education Awards program.

Privilege of the Floor was granted to Allegany County Agricultural Society President ("County Fair") Martha Roberts. She gave a summary of changes and improvements for this year's County Fair. It will be held July 15th-20th in Angelica. The County Legislature will hold one of its regular meetings at the Fair at 2 pm, on July 18th. I hope to

"see you at the Fair." The Legislature considered eight resolutions at this session. Resolution 93-13 expressed unanimous support for the Solar Energy Project proposed by Houghton College in the Town of Caneadea. When constructed the 9 acre solar panel array will be one of the largest solar energy projects in the State. olution 94-13 approved the appointment of Sarah Decker as Journal Clerk for the Board. She will replace Adele Finnemore. Adele is retiring after many vears of dedicated service. Resolution 95-13 approved the Board Chair's appointment of members to Southern Tier West Regional Planning and De-

velopment Board. Resolution 96-13 created the Sheriff's Department position of Correction Lieutenant, and abolished the positions of Correction Master Sergeant and Assistant Jail Administrator. Resolution 97-13 proposed creation of a Correction Captain position, but was tabled. Resolution 98-13 accepted and appropriated three donations to the County Office For the Aging. The Oriana Grove Lodge (\$2,000) and National Fuel (\$1,500) donated to the Meals-On-Wheels program. Alfred-Alfred Station Community Chest donated \$676 to the Lifeline Program. Resolution 99-13 accepted and appropriated \$368,997.50 from NYS under the Consolidated Highway Im-

provement Program ("CHIPS") for state fiscal year 2013-14. This will help finance additional capital improvements to our roads and bridges.

Resolutions 100-13 and 101-13 must be viewed together. Resolution 100-13 proposed approval of an agreement with Cattaraugus County for the Workforce Investment Board, operated jointly by Cattaraugus and Allegany County. County Attorney Thomas Miner, Esq., requested that this resolution be withdrawn and replaced by Resolution 101-13. That was done and Resolution 101-13, approving the "Local Plan" for the period from July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014, was unanimously approved.

Several other important matters were handled in Committee meetings on Monday, June 10th. At the Ways and Means Committee meeting held before the Board session, County Treasurer Terri Ross reported that the County's sale of the "Refunding Bond" had been completed and would save the County almost \$46,500 over the next 4 years. This was possible because of the extremely low (favorable) interest rates currently available. She also submitted a report about the 2013 tax sale of foreclosed properties. The Ways and Means Committee approved the sale of approximately 70 parcels

Following the Board session a Committee of the Whole meeting was convened to receive the updated County Comprehensive Plan. County Planner Kier Dirlam presented the updated Comprehensive Plan and gave a brief report regarding the work done by the Allegany County Comprehensive Plan Review Committee and County Office of Development. Copies of the Updated Comprehensive Plan were distributed and the Board discussed the procedure for adoption of the updated Plan. This will involve holding a public hearing in approximately one month. I strongly encourage that everyone interested in the history and/or future of our County obtain a copy of the Updated Comprehensive Plan. Please pay special attention to the summary of "Accomplishments that have occurred since 2008 in Allegany County" and "Project Priorities" found on pages VII-3 through 6 of the Updated Comprehensive Plan. We have come a long way, but still have a long way to go.



HIGH IN THE SKY

Recently I completed a solo driving round trip of 1,671 miles, leaving from and returning to Alfred, New York. My main stop was at the Conference Center in Green Lake, Wisconsin. There, with 25 other participants, I attended a five night Elderhostel Road Scholar program.

Unfortunately, the less conscious part of my brain tells me to fall asleep behind the wheel when I have been travelling for several hours. Fortunately, as I left the Village limits this time, my more conscious brain part had a brilliant idea which would create wakefulness. I should look for "modern" landmarks along the way which would surprise my resurrected father, if he were along.

In the summer of 1947, my father, mother, big sister, and I took my first long car trip to the east coast from our home in Joplin, Missouri. My father, Felix Eliot Mueller, who lived from September 21, 1895- August 28, 1951, did most of the driving. Among the states which we passed through were New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois. I was doing that now.

There were a couple of old fashioned windmills along my way, apparently being preserved as a comfort toy for people like me. He would have been surprised by their overall disappearance from the landscape. And, by the appearance of many center pivot irrigation

Several varieties of towering structures which I saw would have baffled my father. He would have questioned the purpose of the huge number of wind turbines, blades whirling, seen at one locale. Similarly astonishing is how the various kinds of towers which make cell phone use possible now are dominating elements in the countryside.

Most of the roads on which I drove were four lane or six lane stretches of the Interstate Highway System. It had been advocated by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, and authorized by the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956. On that earlier family trip, we were thrilled to try out some of the four lane Pennsylvania Turnpike, which had opened in 1940. It included some of the same, worthy features as the now existing Interstates, such as easy graded curves allowing year round use. Of course, having four lanes also made the Turnpike safer than the former two lane cross country highways.

What other differences could I point out to him? Well, for this child who grew up reading them with my father, there is now a lamentable lack of Burma Shave six-signs-in-sequence advertising. Gone are messages such as: "The wolf is shaved so neat and trim Red Riding Hood is chasing him - Burma Shave."

Since returning home, I have consulted Wikipedia on the Internet for answers to additional questions my father might raise. It has told me that advertising is now restricted, according to the law which President Lyndon B. Johnson signed on October 22, 1965. This Highway Beautification Act of 1965 (23 USC 131) begins "Billboards are allowed, by statute, in commercial and industrial areas consistent with size, lighting and spacing provisions as agreed to by the state and federal governments.'

I have not checked laws regarding rumble strips. Driving around New York State I have grown accustomed to them along road shoulders. Both my father and I shared partial deafness. I congratulate the inventor of the strips which my father never experienced. For me, the "feel" of them provides just as good a warning, or awakening, as their diminished sound. However, I was startled to discover middle of the road "center rumble strips" on my recent trip. These must be especially useful after dark on the narrow two lane roads where I found them.

By now it is taking much more than graded curves and a mere four lanes to keep the highways safe. From all appearances, our tax dollars and tolls paid are insufficient to keep the roads repaired. I was relieved that three of the four days I drove were weekend ones. On that fourth day I was passing by repair zones with road workers in them trying to earn a living while speeding motorists seemed bent on killing them.

Throughout my trip most drivers, other than truckers, appeared to believe that it was mandatory at all times to ignore speed limit signs and to drive a minimum of five miles per hour faster. At the entrances to some work zones there was a radar sign displaying vehicle speeds and messages. Most drivers did not abruptly brake when the truth of their speed was revealed to them. I do hope that road workers have good life insurance policies.

Traversing work zones one views orange traffic cones, feels speed bumps, and sees heaps of dug up roadway. I feel certain that my father and I would have found a "ground up" pun in there somewhere.

AU to welcome 80 football recruits

ALFRED—The Alfred University football team First Team All-Monsignor Martin honors; and was will welcome 80 new recruits when preseason camp opens in mid-August. The new players include a trio of transfers and 13 high school all-state selections, 12 from New York State.

Among the new recruits are three New York State all-stars from Hornell High School: quarterback Dominic Scavo, linebacker Zack Bacon and wide receiver Brendan Buisch.

Other New York State all-stars in the Saxons 2013 recruiting class include: **Tyler Johnson**, quarterback from East Syracuse-Minoa High School; Lee Girard, linebacker from Glens Falls High School; Ryan McDonnell, quarterback/ kicker/punter from Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake High School; T.J. Crve, quarterback from Avon High School; Sean Murphy, offensive lineman from Bishop Timon-St. Jude High School in Buffalo; Kyle Abernathy, cornerback from Canisius High School in Buffalo; Justin Delgado, tight end from Chester High School; Jason Dorsainville, defensive tackle from Ramapo High School; and Justin **Riccio**, quarterback from Woodlands High School. The Saxons also have a Michigan state all-star coming in this fall in quarterback Mitchell Myler of Sacred Heart High School in Mount Pleasant,

Scavo, a two-time New York State Class B First Team all-star (2010, 2011) and 2011 NYS Class B Player of the Year, transfers to Alfred from Ithaca and will begin his AU playing career as a freshman. A two-time All-Greater Rochester First Team pick and two-time Livingston County Athletic Association (LCAA) all-star (2010, 2011), the 6-3, 210pound Scavo was the starting quarterback at Hornell High his sophomore, junior and senior seasons, leading the Red Raiders to three straight unbeaten seasons, each culminating in a state Class B championship.

Bacon is a two-time New York State First Team all-star. He earned Class B honors as a linebacker in 2011 and First Team Class C honors as a running back in 2012. Bacon (6-0, 230) also played on Hornell's three state title teams and on the 2012 squad that lost in the state Class C title game. A state wrestling champion as a senior, Bacon was a twotime All-Greater Rochester First Team (2011, 2012) all-star and a four-time Livingston County Athletic Association all-star (2009-12).

Buisch (6-3, 205) earned NYS First Team Class C honors and was a First Team All-Greater Rochester all-star in 2012. He was also a Livingston County Athletic Association all-star as a senior last fall.

Johnson comes to AU after transferring from Division II American International University (Springfield, MA). He was a Second Team New York State Class A all-star and Central New York Co-Player of the Year as a senior in 2011, when he led East Syracuse-Minoa to the third of its three straight Section III Class A championships. Like Scavo, Johnson transfers to AU with four years eligibility.

Girard (6-0, 215) was a Second Team Class B all-state pick as a senior at Glens Falls High. He was also a Section II Class B West First Team all-

McDonnell (5-10, 180) was a First Team Class A all-star as a placekicker/punter in 2012. He also earned First Team All-Section II and First Team All-Area honors last fall. McDonnell is the son of Alfred University Hall of Fame quarterback Paul McDonnell.

Crye (6-1, 185) was a two-way player at Avon High School last fall, when he was named a Team New York State Class D all-star at linebacker. As a quarterback, he was also a First Team All-Greater Rochester all-star, a Livingston County Athletic Association all-star, and the Section V Class DD Offensive Player of the Year in 2012.

Murphy (6-1, 275) was an honorable mention NYS Class AA all-star as a senior last fall. He also earned First Team All-Western New York honor, a Western New York Football Weekly First Team all-star.

Abernathy (5-10, 170), was an honorable mention New York State AA all-star and Third Team All-Western New York selection in 2012. He was also a Western New York Football Weekly First Team all-star.

Delgado (6-3, 220) was a New York State First Team Class D all-star as a linebacker last season at Chester High School, where he also played tight

Dorsainville (6-1, 240) was an honorable mention NYS Class AA all-star defensive lineman in 2012. He also earned Section I all-star honors and was named a league and county all-star as well.

Riccio (5-8, 170) is a two-time all-state Class C quarterback at Woodlands High School (Hartsdale), earning Third Team honors in 2012 and honorable mention in 2011. He was also a Section I all-star and all-league performer in 2011 and 2012.

Myler (5-10, 175) was a First Team Michigan state all-star as a senior in 2012 and was a member of the Sacred Heart team that won a state championship in 2010.

- Ryan Friebis (6-0, 200), linebacker from Elmira Free Academy (New York State, Section IV). Friebis was a First Team Section IV all-star in
- Wes Sanders (6-0, 165), defensive back from Ithaca High School (New York State, Section IV). He was a First Team Section IV all-star in 2012.
- Andy Miller (6-2, 215), linebacker from Hilton High School in Rochester (New York State, Section V). Miller was a Monroe County First Team all-star and an All-Greater Rochester honorable mention pick last fall.
- David Sylvester (6-4, 255), defensive lineman from Perry (NY) High School (New York State, Section V). Sylvester was a three-time Livingston County Athletic Association (LCAA) all-star (2010-12) and a First Team Super 22 all-star and All-Greater Rochester honorable mention selection as a senior in 2012.

Coach Dave Murray enters the 2013 season--his 16th at Alfred--with a 100-57 record at AU, having reached the century mark for wins in the regular season finale at Hartwick last season. With stints at Cortland State and Lebanon Valley prior to coming to Alfred, Murray has a career coaching record of 144-97-1 in 23 seasons.





The gift to create the Terry S. Galanis Family Arena at the McLane Center is part of the ongoing Score One for Alfred campaign to improve athletic and recreational facilities on the AU campus. Alfred University President Charles M. Edmondson announced the gift during Reunion Weekend.

"Whatever I have achieved in life, I owe to Alfred University," said Terry Galanis, Sr., founder of Sealing Devices in Buffalo. He admitted that he "busted out of college after six months," but the late Murray Rice, professor of physical chemistry, "took me under his wing, got me back into school and helped me get through. I wish everyone could get as much out of their school as got from Alfred University."

We are pleased to be able to make this donation to Alfred University," said Terry Galanis, Jr. "My father has always been in love with the University.'

The project, which will include a new floor, new bleachers, and a new sound system, represents the first major renovation of the gymnasium since it was built in 1971, noted Paul Vecchio, director of athletics for the University.

Calling the gift "transformative," Vecchio said the renovated facility will allow the men's and women's basketball programs and the women's volleyball programs to better compete for Division III athletes against the schools in the highly competitive Empire 8 athletic conference.

It will also be a more attractive facility for hosting major University events, including opening convocation, honors convocation and commencement.

"The Galanis family's gift will impact generations of AU student-athletes, as well as the general student body because of the McLane Center gymnasium's constant traffic, including recreation and intramurals," said Vecchio. It is anticipated work will begin in May 2014 and be completed for use in fall 2014.
