Alfred University Spanish professor to present paper at seminar in Madrid 7/09/18

Kerry Kautzman, associate professor of Spanish at Alfred University, will present a paper this week in Madrid, Spain, at a seminar marking the 50th anniversary of independence of the republic of Equatorial Guinea from Spain.

The Fifth International Seminar hosted by the Center for Afro-Hispanic Studies in Madrid, titled "Revisiting African Decolonizations: 50 years of Independence in Equatorial Guinea," is being held July 2-13. On Tuesday, July 10, Kautzman will present a paper titled "El legado de la generatividad en Ekomo de Maria Nsue Angue," (translated to English: "The Legacy of Generativity in Maria Nsue Angue's Ekomo.")

Maria Nsue Angue (1945-2017) was a writer whose most famous work, Ekomo, was the first novel written by an Equatorial Guinean woman. She also served as the African nation's Minister of Education and Culture.

The mission of the Center for Afro-Hispanic Studies is to promote and coordinate multidisciplinary research of the Afro-Hispanic populations of the world, as well as to disseminate – through education and publication – the results of that research.
