The lush melodies of Duke Ellington will usher in the festivities Friday night at 9 p.m., with the presentation of the Queen high-lighting the evening.


The regal ruler will then continue her reign through the finale of the weekend's activities Saturday night on the University and Ag Tech

Friday night's Ball will be held at the University's Men's Gymnasium; it will run from 9 to 11 and 12 to 2 with an hours intermission at the individual fraternity houses.

Festivities will draw to a close that night at the home basketball courts of the Ag Tech and University, and parties after that in the nine houses on campus.

### Friday Night Dance at Gym Will Have the Swinging Mood As Keynote of Annual Weekend

Duke Ellington and his orchestra will provide the royal touch for the annual Interfraternity Ball.

The man whose recordings of "Mood Indigo," "Sophisticated" Lady," "Solitude" and "Caravan" swept the nation grings his full swinging orchestra into the University's Men's Gymnasium for a date on December 6, to highlight the big Interfraternity weekend.

Featuring the Ellington touch on the piano, the orchestra will fill the gym with the tops in music of all varieties from 9 p.m. through 2 a.m. with the famous strains of the many Ellington classics leading the way. Taking the spotlight should be such all time favorites as "In a Sentimental Mood," "Don't Get Around Much Any More," "I'm Beginning to See the Light," and "Liza."

Born Edgar Kennedy Ellington, in Washington, D.C., he received his now famous nickname of Duke from a friend who admired his regal air.

#### Ellington, the Creator

His big decision to go into the music field full time was made in 1923 when Duke took his five-piece band to New York. Success cameto the group almost immediately, with Ellington becoming the creator of a new musical idiom.

During the years 1933 and 1939, when he toured Europe, it was stated in the foreign countries that the only two original American contributions to world culture at the time were Ellington's music and Walt

His first claim to fame came in 1931 when his rendition of an original composition hit the top. This was his "It Don't Mean a Thing if it Ain't Got that Swing."

Following the European tour of 1939, Duke went into new paths. This time it was his original, "Jump for Joy," a musical revue. During this same period he wrote "Flamingo," "Perdido," and "Take the 'A"

#### "Veni, Vedi, Vici . . ."

Looking for new fields to conquer, in 1943 he became the first big-band leader to appear in Carnegie Hall, setting a fashion which has since seen jazz welcomed in the so-called "longhair" surroundings from Newport to the Hollywood Bowl. Since that time Ellington and hisorchestra have been featured in the Hall at least once in every year.

During 1947 he wrote and scored the original musical, "Beggars Holiday," which catipulted Alfred Drake, Marge Champion and Valerie-

Unique in the field of bandleaders as a world famous composer, Ellington is also unique among composers as one whose works whether three minutes' long or forty-three minutes' long-have universal appeal. At the Duke once said, "There's no longhair music and no jazz music, there's just music."

### Universal Acceptance

A favorite from coast to coast, the Duke has appeared in all major cities including the Paramount Theatres in New York, Los Angeles and Buffalo, along with such places as Las 'Vegas' Thunderbird and Flamingo; the Riviera in St. Louis; Chicago's Blue Note and New York's Cotton Club and Birdland.

Ellington, his music and orchestra, have been found from the beginning, a package of talent impossible to duplicate, although the ranks of the imitators grow from year to year. As a result, Duke has always been a big box office attraction, playing in every part of the United States, Canada and Europe to every kind of audience, young and old, highbrow and lowbrow, in dance as well as concert halls.

No matter what Duke's repetoire for the occasion, it is sure to be a surprise, rich in experience and enjoyment for all, as the Ellington band "Takes the 'A' Train" into the Men's Gym on November 6 for

the Interfraternity Ball.
