

To the indigenous people who first settled the area where Alfred University is located, Kanakadea meant "where the earth meets the sky," so it is fitting that "EarthCloud" is the title of ceramic artist Wayne Higby's "first piece about Alfred. I want the piece to reflect what Alfred is and what it has meant to me."

have been so influenced by the idyllic landscape of this area," said Higby, but it is not the physical beauty of the Kanakadea Valley alone that affected his work. "I have been inspired by the young people I have taught," explained Higby, a professor of ceramic art in the School of Art & Design for more than 30 years. "But it is even more than that. It's the sense of community, the history, and the environment. It's all kind of interwoven."

The piece is also about his long-standing friendship with Dr. Marlin Miller '54, a member of the AU Board of Trustees who donated the funds to build the original Miller Performing Arts Center and who is supporting its expansion. Miller and Higby began talking about a tile installation for the performing arts center – symbolic of the fusion between fine arts and performing arts on the AU campus – in 1995, when Higby created a smaller tile installation for the headquarters of Arrow International, the medical device manufacturing company Miller owned in Reading, PA.

But perhaps most of all, "EarthCloud" became a tribute to Higby's wife, Donna, who died April 3, 2004,

three weeks after they had celebrated their 38th wedding anniversary.

Her diagnosis of cancer came at the beginning of the "EarthCloud" project, and at times, Higby admits, he was tempted to give in to the despair of watching his life partner's illness and death. "At one point, I wanted to stop, and Donna was very insistent that I not stop. She could 'see' the finished piece, and she kept me going."

After her death, it was the work, the challenge, that became his solace. "It was my lifeline," he said, although because of Donna's illness, "EarthCloud" was "really challenging, emotionally as well as technically."

All those elements are evident in "EarthCloud," believed to be the largest hand-cut porcelain tile installation in the world. To create it, Higby and his assistant Lee Somers '99/06, extruded, cut and fired 40,000 pounds of porcelain, creating 4,955 tiles that cover an area 30 feet high by 56 feet wide.

Installing "EarthCloud" – each piece precisely placed to capture Higby's vision – was a monumental undertaking, so Higby turned to the best: Alfred University alumni and students.



"I knew they had the skills," explained Higby. "We say we graduate the best – and we do." Each one asked to join the team was "someone I had admired as a student and liked as an individual," he said. And each "has a focus, a commitment and an intensity about what he does." Among the crew there was a "bond of friendship and mutual respect."

As ceramic artists, they had not just an understanding of, but an appreciation for, the material, and that was extremely important to Higby. "They were savvy about hand-made objects; they had a sense of the nature of the material, the fragility and its tolerances."

"Once we got the team together, it felt as though the project was do-able," said Higby. "I loved the collaboration. If a problem came up – and they did – we solved it. Everyone had an idea. We had a conversation about the best solutions."

Somers had the advantage as Higby's assistant of being involved in the project from its early stages, helping to build the equipment designed by Don Kaake of Angelica, who is an artist and craftsman who has worked with Higby in the past. "A huge amount of detail had to be worked out," said Somers. "The studio had to be outfitted and we did testing, testing and more testing" to determine composition of the clay body and the glaze.

Then, he said, it was "slow, steady production," following the sketches and detailed charts Higby had made to capture his ideas. Tiles were made section by section, each piece numbered to indicate where it belonged. Some pieces were smooth and shiny; others rough-textured with a matte finish so they would reflect light differently.

Once the tiles for each section were completed, they were assembled on the upper floor of his studio in 20-foot sections, numbered, packed and set aside to make room for production of additional tiles. The piece was not seen in its entirety until it was laid out on the floor of the black box theater in Miller. "I had to keep the image of the finished piece in my head," said Higby. "There was not any point prior to laying it out in Miller that I could see the whole thing."

As an emerging artist – Somers earned his MFA from Alfred in 2006 – "to watch all that unfold is professionally huge." He found it exciting to "be involved in all phases, to watch the evolution of the piece and to be able to interface with the various people involved," from Miller to the members of the "EarthCloud" crew.

"The pieces were made by hand," and therefore have inherent variations in size and shape. "The tiles were consistently inconsistent ... yet they needed to fit within a grid, within limits," said Higby, who worked with Kaake to design metal brackets and a grid system to hang the tiles individually on the wall, which had to be rebuilt to bear the weight of the finished installation.

Ian McMahon '04, who has taken Somers' place as Higby's assistant and technical specialist, was also a member of the "EarthCloud" crew. "I came in later," just as the piece was ready to be hung, said McMahon. Being involved in "EarthCloud" gave him a "different



understanding" of how to approach a project of that complexity and magnitude. "It gave me a much better insight," said McMahon. "You have to break it down into pieces or steps," and work through each one.

His participation in the "EarthCloud" project will affect his work in the future, McMahon said. "I've seen the potential" in such a large-scale undertaking. "I think it will be easier in the future" to work "on a grander scale."

Hongwei Li, who received his MFA in May '07 and who is teaching Freshman Foundation this year, was honored to be part of the crew. "I had an opportunity to see something really special," he said.

It has already influenced his art. "I learned that to do an installation like that you have to plan everything in advance, work through it from beginning to end," Li said.

But he was nervous about it, too. "There were so many potential problems – the tiles could crack, or they wouldn't fit – but we solved them all. We had to learn to trust ourselves, to keep going and keep trying to find solutions."

Peter Pincus, an '05 graduate and "definitely the youngest" member of the "EarthCloud" crew, agreed that learning to trust himself was important. "At first, I lacked the confidence to understand why I had been chosen" for the crew, he said.

"It was really so inspirational to be part of something so large," said Pincus. "It was a beautifully simple way of teaching. There were so many units, and they all had to work together." While he doesn't envision creating a tile installation of that scope himself, "I love units, I like to make sets of things. Working on 'EarthCloud' made me realize I had to work really tight" to think about clay, and glazes and how things fit together.

Even Somers, who had been so involved in the production, admitted "At times the numbers were daunting, and I wondered if we'd ever be able to finish." What made it possible, he said, was that neither Miller nor Higby had a deadline for completing the project. "That gave us room to breathe, time to work through the problems and overcome any technical difficulties."

Li agreed that lack of deadline pressure was important. "Wayne kept telling us to relax, to take our time and to remember safety first."

There were times when tiles were broken and had to be replaced. "There was tension" when that happened, McMahon said, but then he, too, realized that Higby "had picked people he had confidence in," and knowing that helped. "Everyone sort of figured out what he was good at" as the work progressed, McMahon said. "Everyone had a part."

"Yeah, we were like a well-oiled machine," Somers added.

"Each of us had a really great skill," said Pincus. "Ian and Rob Marzinsky '04 were so awesome at woodworking, and I was able to do some metal-working."

'EarthCloud' inspires musical compositions

"EarthCloud" has inspired original music that will be performed during the festivities marking the official dedication of the installation, which begin at 5 p.m. Oct. 19 at the Miller Performing Arts Center.

The first piece, "From Earth to Cloud," was a matter

of serendipity. Adrian Gebruers, past president of the World Carillon Federation and carillonneur at St. Colman's Cathedral in Cobh, Ireland, was on campus to perform at the dedication of the new Davis Memorial Carillon bells in June 2006.

As part of his tour of campus, he visited the "black box" theater in Miller Performing Arts Center and there, spread upon the floor, were the porcelain tiles for "EarthCloud."

"I took him up on the catwalk in the theater so he could see what the piece would look like," Higby recalled.

They climbed down, Gebruers' tour continued, and Higby didn't think anything more about it until "Six months later, I opened my e-mail, and there's a piece of music" inspired by "EarthCloud" and written by Gebruers for the carillon, Higby said.

Neil Jacobs, a 12-string guitarist and frequent guest artist on the Alfred University campus, will present pieces of original music during the "EarthCloud" dedication. He and Dr. Lisa Lantz, associate professor of music and director of the Alfred University orchestra, will perform "Morning at Ragged Point," and "Adena River" as well as a "piece that will be specially written for the performance, and dedicated to 'EarthCloud'"

said Jacobs. "I've been inspired by Wayne's work, his creativity and his dedication to his art."

"The Making of 'EarthCloud'," an exhibition that traces the piece from its conceptual stage through production and finally installation, will be on display at

the Fosdick-Nelson Gallery from Oct. 18-Nov. 29. A reception, open to the public, will be held from 7-9 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 18.

"The Making of 'EarthCloud'" includes some of the specialized tools and equipment built to create the tiles, as well as sketches, still images and video. Also featured will be earlier Higby works in which the genesis of "EarthCloud" can be seen.

The Fosdick-Nelson Gallery

is open Mondays-Fridays from 11 a.m. - 4 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays from 1-3 p.m.

The making of the piece is also chronicled in *Wayne Higby – Earth Cloud*, printed by Arnoldsche, a German art book publisher. (See www.arnoldsche.com/). The book, which is actually two attached volumes contained in a hard-cover sleeve, contains more than 300 images.

Dr. Marlin Miller '54, chairman emeritus of the Alfred University Board of Trustees, commissioned "EarthCloud" for the Miller Performing Arts Center. He has written the introduction to Wayne Higby – Earth Cloud. Also included are an artist's statement by Higby, and essays by Dr. Mary Drach McInnes, professor of art history; Dr. Ezra Shales, assistant professor of art history; and Helen Drutt, Higby's gallerist. It also contains an interview with Bruce Wood of Kallman, McKinnell and Wood, the architectural firm that designed the original arts center and that is now designing the theater addition.





Given the fragile nature of the tiles, and the fact that each tile was uniquely made for a particular spot created some tension on site.

"I was the first person to break a tile," said Pincus, but Higby "was really forgiving." At one point, he put a tile on the floor and started to move a ladder. Wayne called my name, then walked over to me and put his hands on my shoulders. I realized I nearly made a huge mistake."

The worst moment, several of the crew recalled, was when an outside workman "jumped up on the scaffolding," tool in hand. "Wayne kept saying to him, 'Be careful. Please be careful,' and as he was saying it, the workman smacked the tile and broke it," Pincus said. "It was one of the tiles that was really hard to replace."

Regardless of the tensions and the challenge, each of the "EarthCloud" crew was pleased to have been a part of installing the piece.

"I got to work closely with (Higby,) one of the world's leading ceramic artists," said Albion Stafford '99, but he said each of his colleagues, some of whom were his classmates and others he met for the first time through the project, is an outstanding ceramic artist in his own right.

Stafford's work is "utilitarian, functional," but the experience of working on the installation was valuable nonetheless. "I am working in porcelain, and anything that bolsters my feeling for the material" is beneficial.

For Higby, having his students and former students complete the work with him just enhanced the meaning of "EarthCloud." "Their hands are in the piece," he said. "I see their hands all over it. That folds into what my career has been about."

Some art professors describe themselves as "artist-educators" or "educator-artists," but Higby "refuses to accept the hyphen," which implies that one facet is more important than the other.

That he has succeeded in eschewing the hyphen is apparent in the many and varied tributes to his work, both as an educator and as an artist. One measure of his success: Higby has received both the "distinguished educator" and "master of the media" awards from The Smithsonian. Few others, if any, have been so honored.

Upcoming Class Notes deadline: March 1, 2008

Wallace F. Davidow of Amagansett, NY, and Pompano Beach, FL, recalls the fortuitous way he came to graduate from Alfred University. His older brother graduated in the class of 1941, but when it came Wallace's turn to go to school there was no money, so he got a job in a jewelry store making \$12 a week. Then things changed on Dec. 7, 1941. Two weeks later he answered an ad for free training to become an aircraft mechanic. In three months, he was working full-time for \$60 a week and saving money for college. He began studies at New York University College of Engineering in fall 1942. "They said that I would not be drafted out of college that year if I joined the enlisted reserves and if I stayed in college until April 10 I would get credit for the whole year ... I stayed, got credit for the year, and on April 23 ... was given a uniform." He served in Okinawa, under Douglas MacArthur. He was sent home in 1946. In the meantime, Congress passed the GI Bill. In 1992, they turned the practice over to Wallace's son Lawrence.


