SPRAGUE & WEST Russell Allen and Nancy Burdick

We visited the Sprague cemetery in the Van der Mark road near Waterwells Road. It is approximately 40×20 fenced in by $1\frac{1}{2}$ " pipe. There is one nice monument with this info on it:



PINGREY HILL CEMETERY Thelma Palmiter, Russell Allen and (probably) Evelyn Thomas

October 2, 1995 went with Thelma Palmiter and Russell Allen [written by Evelyn Thomas, probably] to a family cemetery on Pingrey Hill, just over the town line between Alfred and Andover.

In a fenced area, 8 feet by 8 feet there is a headstone for Shadrach Austin born in 1790 and died in 1837.

SHADRACH AUSTIN Died March 16, 1837 In the 47th year of his age.

Grass had recently been cut from the road to the grave site and around it.

Shadrach married Mary Polly Miller, born 1790. She may be buried there also.

A son Stephen Marvin Austin was born 1818 and married Elmina Pingrey daughter of Solomon and Eliza Pingrey — the family for whom Pingrey Hill was named.

Stephen's family eventually moved to McFall, Missouri.

Although in the obit. on Fred S. Austin it calls his sister Florence May Austin, in May 1966, Daphne M. Brownell copied the following headstone from the "Mead Cemetery" up on the hill near Yorks Corners and found the following:

Florence <u>H</u>. and Mary E. – Children of Stephen M. and E. Austin Florence died 1863, age 1 yr 10 mos and Mary E. (dates covered).

About 1888 Stephen M. Austin, wife and children moved 'West' to McFall, Missouri. D. M. Brownell has copied a number of census records which are helpful but also confusing for places of birth have changed from record to record. Each time something is different compiler has underlined them. Also note the various spellings of the name Elmina – Almina, Elmira, etc. – Baritt, Buritt, etc. – No headstone has been found for the mother of Stephen M. Austin who lived with the family in both the 1850 and 1855 census. Probably she too is buried by Shadrach Austin, the settler and father but Mary Austin [sic] without a headstone. Compiler is curious as to whether there were more children than the Stephen Marvin Austin.

ALFRED RURAL CEMETERY Report given by Mary Frances Saeger at the Baker's Bridge Asso. in Nov. 1995

Location: About 1 mile north of Alfred on Route 244.

As the village of Alfred grew the cemetery in the village was no longer adequate. The information I used for this report are articles in the Alfred Sun; information from A. Rogers who was secretary; the Allegany County Book 1879 and materials from the History Library in Ag. Tech.

July 8, 1847 a corporation was formed with Maxson Greene as chairman; Lorenzo Greene, Sec.; Ashbel Smith; Luke Greene; Jeremiah Place; John. Penny and Russell Burdick had filed papers in the County Clerk's office. They bought five acres farther north outside the village. In 1857 they bought eight acres farther north from Mary Stillman or Greene (I found both names). This seemed an ideal location as there was a knoll 40 ft higher than the road and seen from three sides. The state legislature gave permission in 1857 to remove the graves in the other cemetery and the Thatcher cemetery to the new one. These graves are scattered throughout the cemetery and easily located as the markers are less elaborate and the date of death before 1857.

I read recently the first tombstones were heavy with the purpose to keep the "spirits" where they belong. Stones eventually began furnishing information.

Early settlers did not have the time, know-how or money to honor their loved one with elaborate markers. A smooth field stone marked the grave. As time went along, and time, money and stone masons offered more and larger tombstones. The larger and elaborate were status symbols.

We see the Pilgrim influence as the early carvings were death's head with empty eyes and grinning mouth that life was real and earnest. Then the cherub's face with wings that the body may lie beneath the sod but the soul is in Heaven-ward bound. Popular subjects were the weeping willow with or without leaves, the broken stems of flowers symbolizing a young life cut down before maturity, pillars, fingers pointing upward. Stone masons had books with suitable patterns. All of these can be found in Alfred Cemetery.

Epitaphs became popular – a lesson or a wish. The one which was very popular is found on a marker just past the right side of the Y. "As you are now, so once was I. As I am now, so you will be. Prepare for death and follow me" — a definite threat to do better before too late.

One can follow the history of a local community. Ray Crandall's lot shows several graves of children all dying within a short time of each other — a diptheria [epidemic] wiping out a young family. Men with two or three wives.

Childbirth was often a killer; a widow left with a big family after the death of a husband – falling trees; a lone gravedid the family continue West.

Even roadsides record tragedy. Near the entrance to Maple Lawn cemetery a lone rose bush flowered year after year. A gypsy family buried a child. The road widening has left the rose gone and a grave under concrete.

We can follow names which were popular. We find names never used now — there's Thankful, Lorenzo, Elijah and even Enough.

Alfred Rural Cemetery is open to all color, faith or creed. There are around 4000 graves representing 350 families.

The general plan of the cemetery has changed little — there's the knoll — a circle with the flag pole. Burial here doesn't go to only the "rich and the famous." There Rev. Nathan Hull died 1881, 72 yrs. 10 months, 13 days old; Phalla Vincent died 1887 — children Joseph d. 1840, Julie died 1871; Nathan Lanphear d. 1879 a deacon in the Goose Pasture and Seventh Day Baptist Church 87 years old.

There are two Rev. War Veterans; Jonathon Palmiter Sr. died 1848 – 71 yrs old; and Edward Green d. 1832 age 79.

79 Civil War Veterans include Henry Shaw d. 1864, 14 years old

2 Spanish American War Veterans: Steteson Sherman and Frank Place Warden.

Count not in for other wars

George Parker, a slave, now has a special place. He was befriended by Dr. Sayles during the Civil War. He had a farm on Spring Hill and gave his farm to the U. at the time of his death.

The oldest are Dara Deagon Norwood at 102 years old and Esther Prosser Warden, 106 years old.

Some others buried here are: Joshua Clarke 1822-1895- a 7th Day Baptist minister for 54 years. Susan Minerva Burdick 1861-1937 a missionary in Shanghai, China. The group planted and dedicated a tree in her memory. There is a plaque on the tree; Lydia Maxson Green who owned the land where Alfred U. is.

In the early days plots usually contained room for 8 graves. Controll paid \$7. I have the deed for an eight grave plot for \$25.

Care of the cemetery has changed from families to association. Perpetual care could be purchased which entitled the owner to a once-a-year mowing with a scythe. In 1873 a \$5 fee was levied. By 1931 a capital fund abolished perpetual care. Today Donna and Keith Rogers have assumed this care.

Early sextons were C. A. Mason;, C. N. Gavitt; Ira Pierce was a sexton for 35 years. Today Bob and Florence Lewis have this job.

Improvements: 1897 the pump was installed for water for horses and plants. In 1914 the tool shed was built, in 1915 the Barber Mausoleum was built for the memory of Mrs. Barber of Bradford; in 1935 the trees along the entrance were planted.

Today the Board of Trustees include Lyle Palmiter, Chuck Jessup, Dan Rase, Burr Woodruff, Gertrude Obuhanick and Mary Frances Saeger still are care-takers at this peaceful place. Vandalism has not been of much trouble so far.

WOODRUFF HILL CEMETERY THORP - HASKINS

Burr Woodruff

This cemetery is located on high ground on the farm purchased from Will and Carie Burdick by Agnes & Eldon Woodruff in the 1920s. It is on the north side of the Hartsville Hill Road, which goes east above the railroad at Alfred Station toward where the Hartsville S.D.B. Church used to be. It is just inside the woods at the north west corner of the large field.

Two commercial stones were found face up on the ground and several field stone markers that still stand after 150 years or more. Some marked gravesites were less than four feet long, which indicates that, the local story of several small children being buried there due to an epidemic of some sort could be true. Some thought remains that families were passing through when the sad events happened.


Dr. Richard Langworthy Burdick, son of Will and Carie, believes that Charity Burdick and "Hod" Eaton may be buried there. Both owned farms north of the Cemetery site.

The cemetery is about 20 x 35 feet. There are at least eight marked graves and most likely twelve or fifteen in total. Some depressions are noticeable and some of these are unmarked.

One stone has a weeping willow and urn design at the top and reads: Eleanor, wife of Eri Haskins who died March 19, 1825 — in the 23rd year of her age. A footstone with E.H. etched on it is also present. These stones are either limestone or sandstone.

The second stone has a flowing rounded top and reads: JOEL son of John & Betsy Thorp Died Dec. 26 1829 Aged 3 years 3 mos and 3 days. This stone and its footstone are marble.

Both headstones are very legible.



LANPHEAR VALLEY CEMETERY

Located near the intersection of Route 21 and Kenyon Road about 80' – 100' north of Steve Tomm's house close to the railroad tracks. It is a raised plot of land about 35' x 50' overgrown with myrtle, berry bushes and trees. This cemetery was probably first used in 1840 when Elizabeth Lanphear was buried on her husband's (Squire Jonathon) farm. Other burials followed and it soon became a community cemetery. We found only:

9 stones above ground, illegible

However we know 2 stones were used for a walk — that of a man named Beebe and a man named Thorton. We also understand that Rowland and Quin Ormsby's first baby was buried here. At one time 24 burials were counted here.

Another cemetery was close to the railroad tracks about on the town line of Alfred-Andover, on part of Clifford Burdick's / D. F. Langworthy / Jessie Saunder's farm. These graves were taken up and moved to the Langhear farm cemetery sometime around 1900. Truman Burdick helped move these — all were moved except 2 children — never found. (Some from this cemetery could be moved to Alfred Rural).





LEE CEMETERY Evelyn Thomas, Russell Allen and Thelma Palmiter

Located at "Tip Top" across from the building Glenn Zweygardt lives in. The cemetery is on the E hill side about 100 yards off Route 21 and to the right of a ravine. It is enclosed by a metal fence with gate — an area about 30' x 40'. It was overrun with tiger lilies and Barberry bushes. One large old Balsam tree down near the gate.





Located on knoll on east side of Highway 21 about ____ mile from East Valley Road and about 1 mile south of Alfred Station. It is close to the state highway and very well maintained. Maplewood Cemetery Association, a membership corporation, was incorporated June 7, 1906 in the town of Alfred. Russell E. Burdick, Frank M. Beyea, James I. Saunders, and Fred Withey were lot owners and original subscribers.

Before incorporated it was known as Burdick Cemetery, being part of the farm owned by Russell W. Burdick. Russell Burdick and Frank Beyea donated the ground for the cemetery.

"Burdick Plot" to be set aside for burial place for descendents of James C. and Hannah Elexander Burdick. The plot is in the S.W. corner of the cemetery.

BURDICK CEMETERY Vic Stuck, Russell Allen, Thelma Palmiter, Pete & Terry Finlay

Located about ½ mile N.W. of Five Corners near Alfred-Ward Town Line about 100' back of Leon Wheeler's house. It is a lot about 30' x 50' overgrown with ash and cherry trees and lots of woodchuck holes.

Comparing a survey taken in 1984 we found the same number and names of burials except one tombstone.

THATCHER CEMETERY Evelyn Thomas, Russell Allen, Thelma Palmiter

Located on east hill side of Palmiter Road just back of Vockovic's house on the curve of the road. The cemetery was about 75' x 100' and possibly originally it was larger. Lots of myrtle and trees including ironwood, maple and at least two very large old pine trees.

- 1- *Large* (*limestone*) *tombstone flat on ground in good condition. Weeping willow at top and heart at bottom.*In memory of <u>William Saunders</u> Died Dec. 9, 1814 in the 28th year of his age.
- 2 Large (limestone) tombstone flat on ground in fairly good condition (broken in half). Fan in top corners with circle of flowers and wreath of leaves in center of stone.

Sacred to the memory of <u>Asa Stillman Crandall</u> – son of Clarke and Amelia Crandall who died June 19, 1816 aged 5 years 1 mo. 3 days.

Several other small head stones of field stone – illegible

One base for a rather large head stone.

This was a burial ground of some of the earliest settlers including Reuben Monroe, Abel Burdick, Edward Green, Nathan Green, Samuel Thatcher, etc. The land was originally owned by Samuel Thatcher. (One of the earliest burials- Edward Green, D. October 28, 1814).

About 1933 "the remains of some of the first settlers were moved to the Alfred Rural Cemetery and placed together in a plot reserved for them." We believe some people are still buried in Thatcher Cemetery. It needs cleaning.



EAST VALLEY CEMETERY

Location – 2 miles east of Route 21 on left side of East Valley Road. To the rear, left, of the home of Harold Perry. It is assumed that there is a right of way to the cemetery as there was when the property was owned by F. J. Pierce.

Cemetery is enclosed on three sides by a fence, fourth side is kept clean and mowed by Mr. Perry. Lonely, quiet spot among the trees with a ground cover of myrtle.

Sixty graves (approx.) with possibility of fifty more spaces. Oldest gravestone was that of Edward Green, 1845, Revolutionary War veteran; most recent marker, 1925, that of Samuel Kenyon.

Several veterans of the Civil War. Two women, Eliza Lusk and Varnum Hart, were listed as members of the 141st Women's Volunteer Regiment, 1886.



SMALL CEMETERIES OR BURIAL GROUNDS MOSTLY FAMILY PLOTS

SMITH - on former Leon Lewis property across from Lewis house

A. W. WESCOTT – 5 graves, moved May 1900. 4 to Alfred Rural Cemetery and 1 to East Valley (one buried for 52 years – 1848)

<u>INDIAN BURIAL GROUNDS</u> – on east hill side along Highway 21 in Town of Alfred almost on Alfred-Andover town line. One grave on Sugar Hill Ridge.

<u>SWEET FAMILY PLOT</u> – Town of Almond – in field on the right side of road as you go north on Clarke Road and approach the first curve near the top of the hill.

GRAVE AT PHILLIPS CREEK - 1 burial - 5-6' from house.

PALMITER GRAVES – Hartsville Hill.



(Philando) [Philander?] Phimila Reynolds Died Apr. 11, 1860 50 yrs 4 mo 11 days

Located back of farmhouse on North Rd. (Burlingames). About 5-6' from house. Inside a concrete footer – the only grave. It was broken. Will be mended.

ORMSBY ROAD CEMETERY

There are four stones at the Hartsville Museum owned by Richard Call and Randy Webb. These came from a field west of the old road which ran from the Ormsby and Cook Road junction to the Burdick Road to the south. These stones were carried out by Call & Webb. The field is south of the Cliff Ormsby buildings at the Ormsby and Cook Road junction. Property above now owned by a family named Costo.

The current story about this Cemetery is that the stones were removed and placed at the edge of the road so the field could be worked without interference. It is said that the daughter of the farmer was real mad about this event.

One of the stones reads: "In memory of Eliza Baker, wife of James Baker who died June 21, 1828 aged 21 years." The verse reads, "Sleep sweet consort unmolested till all earthly things shall cease. Then, mayst thou with glory vested, rise to meet our God in peace."

The second stone is a footstone with E. B. on it. Another stone reads: Thomas Benjamin – Died Sept. 18, 1837 – Aged 11 years 2 mos 18 days.

The other is a footstone with J.P. on it and is anyone's guess whose this was.
