
Here comes the Sun!

MASTER'S: Provost to address Downstate grads

BROOKLYN--W. Richard Stephens, provost and vice president for academic affairs at Alfred University, will address graduates of Alfred University's Downstate program during the annual exercises at 11 a.m. Saturday, June 14, at the Brooklyn Bridge Marriott in Brooklyn

During the ceremony, 105 students will received their master's degrees in counseling or literacy education or a certificate of advanced study in mental health counseling. They join the 579 students who have completed their master's degrees from Alfred University through the Downstate program since it began in the fall

Students enrolled in Alfred University's Downstate programs attend classes weekends at locations in Brooklyn and on Long Island, and spend two weeks in the summer on Alfred University's main campus in Alfred, taking additional courses.

Stephens is completing his first year as AU provost, coming to AU after serving as chief provost at Catawba College in Salisbury, NC. Since coming to AU, Stephens has re-introduced the Allen Term during the mid-winter break between semesters, and has actively promoted expansion of off-site programs and on-line courses.

Additionally, he was instrumental in guiding the final phase of the recent campus self-study that successfully led to Middle States reaccreditation for the University, and hosted the review team that visited campus in April.

While at Catawba, Stephens expanded summer school offerings; led the review, revision and implementation of the general education curriculum; led the redevelopment of evening and graduate offerings to include off-site programs; and encouraged a focus on instructional technology and classroom pedagogy.

Work could begin on AU art museum this month

ALFRED—Construction will begin this month on a \$10 million Alfred Museum of Ceramic Art. The University has received a private donation to cover the cost of the new museum, said Charles M. Edmondson, president of Alfred University.

new museum greatly enhance our educational programs, particularly those in ceramic art, for which we are already internationally known," said Edmondson. The University has had a museum of ceramic art for a number of years, but exhibition space has always been limited. "For the past 30 years, much of the collection has been in storage because we have not had sufficient space to display many of the objects at the same time.

Second, the new building will provide the University's fine arts program with a signature building, just as the Miller Performing Arts Center and Theater do for the performing arts program. "We are exploring the synergies between fine and performing arts, trying to develop new academic programs that will enrich

The museum design is the work of Architect Bruce Wood of Kallmann McKinnell & Wood Architects, Boston, who designed the performing arts buildings. The museum design echoes that of the Miller buildings; all are brick, with large expanses of glass and dramatic roof lines

The new building will be located on the site of the former Davis Gym, on Pine Street just past its intersection with Main Street. The front of the building will face west, toward Main Street. The proximity of the site to the School of Art & Design facilities made it the ideal location for the new museum, said Edmondson.

Plans call for a 20,000-square foot, two-story building. The 4,000-square-foot main gallery will be located on the upper floor, which will be accessible from Pine Street. On the lower level will be the collection storage and management areas, administrative offices and restrooms, said Michael Neiderbach, executive director of capital projects for the University.

Neiderbach said the design is "elegant in its simplicity." In addition to being attractive and functional, it will also be "green." The University will be seeking LEED --Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design – certification. LEED is a green building certification pro-

gram that recognizes best-inclass building strategies and practices. The new museum will have a geothermal system for

ergy-efficient roof system.

A construction contract was signed late last month with Le-Construction Chase of Rochester, the same firm that

built the Miller Theater. Neiderbach estimates actual work could begin by the middle of the month, and will take about a year to complete.

Curry holds a Ph.D. in English from the University of Connecticut; a master's in English from California State University, Chico; and a bachelor's in creative writing and comparative literature from San Francisco State University.

The staff were just as friendly and helpful as the old staff. We certainly recommend you pay a visit.



Red, White, and Blue Salsa


1 c. fresh blueberries 1 c. strawberries, diced

It's hard to believe that the traffic light has been around for forty years. The light was installed under the watch of then Alfred Village Mayor Gary Horowitz when I was a senior in high school. It was about that time that I passed my driver's road test, although it's too long ago to remember exactly when that occurred. It was like yesterday that the auctioneer explained that the car (which had been in storage in a damp basement and certainly qualified as a "rust bucket") might have some transmission problems. It seems the owner had been down to the Old Mill Inn one night and before getting the car out of the parking lot, had managed to hit six cars. Well, at least that's how I remember it. I think it was written up in the Alfred Sun.

So the auctioneer asked if anyone would offer \$100. No one moved. After a look of frustration came upon the auctioneer, I raised my hand and said I'd offer him \$50 for it. He looked relieved. And after a brief call for any other bids, he banged the gavel and declared,

I was thrilled. Upon completing the necessary paperwork, I took the car to my cousin Ron, who looked it over and concurred that there was indeed a transmission problem--there was no transmission fluid! After topping it off, the transmission worked just fine. Once again, I was thrilled!

As it turned out, the 1962 Plymouth Valiant, which was a rusty gray with a red interior (and the radio worked great), served me faithfully for two or three years with all my trips back and forth to Morrisville my senior year at MATC. FACILITIES UPDATE

For the past several years I have served as Chairperson of the Facilities and Communications Committee ("F&CC") of the Allegany County Legislature. One of the major responsibilities of that committee is to analyze and respond to issues involving the various county facilities. In this article I want to review some of the recent capital facilities projects handled by the F&CC.

The biggest project that the County has undertaken in recent years was the Jail or Public Safety Building. That project actually commenced before I was elected to the County Legislature, but was completed during my first year on the Board. That \$23 million facility houses both the County Jail and E-911 Program. Both are functioning well. The capital expense for the Jail has been covered by revenue collected from federal agencies for housing their prisoners. The Sheriff's Department is not making money, but at least the building is not costing local taxpayers anything out-of-pocket, at this time. Hopefully this pattern will continue until the facility is totally paid for.

The next big project involved the Court Facilities. The first step of that \$14.5 million project involved constructing an addition to the courthouse. Once that addition was completed the court operations moved into the new space, and the courthouse was renovated. All of that work has been completed, along with several additional renovation projects. The Department of Motor Vehicles moved into newly renovated space in the Courthouse. The District Attorney's Office relocated from the County Office Building ("COB") to the Courthouse Addition. The County Attorney's Office facilities were enlarged and renovated in the COB. The Probation Department's offices, located in the basement of the County Courthouse, are being renovated while remaining in service. This was all completed under

The F&CC has several other projects currently underway. The County Museum has moved from its location across Court Street from the Courthouse. That old building is scheduled for demolition over

the next several months. That space will be used to provide additional parking. Many of the historical artifacts from that building were recently moved to the County Fairgrounds in Angelica. Those items should be available for inspection over the next several years. We are also exploring ways to meet record storage needs for all County agencies. Records storage is an ongoing challenge.

The most recent "controversial" facilities project involves upgrades to the old Jail elevator in the COB. A 40-year old public elevator provides access to the 3 lower floors of the COB. The top floor of the COB served as the County Jail for about 30 years. A separate elevator that only opens onto the ground floor and top floor of the COB., provides the only handicapped access to the third floor. Lack of appropriate access has been a barrier to development of the old Jail space for other departments. However, the single greatest need in the COB was for a back-up elevator to use if/when the main elevator was out of service. The public elevator has broken down on several occasions over the past few

The old "Jail elevator" is now being renovated to provide a second means of ingress/egress to all floors of the COB. The ground floor entrance has been reconfigured to provide better security screening, and more efficient traffic flow. Otis Elevator Company is upgrading the elevator. When renovations are completed the elevator doors will open on all four floors, providing 2 different options for access to other floors.

Once the elevator work is completed we can begin analyzing the best ways to renovate the old Jail space. We are exploring options that will allow us to do that in innovative and cost effective ways. Alfred State College has agreed to have their design program assist us in evaluating our space needs and in designing new facilities. We also hope to use the technical trades programs available in the County to perform construction services.

Amazingly, the County is completing these "smaller" projects without borrowing, and without raising taxes. That's the best news of all.

Fifty Years Ago, June 8, 1939—Driving south from Alfred Station on Route 17-F, five miles from Andover, passersby see a sign "Octupus Tree" that piques their curiosity. Crossing the Erie tracks to the home of Charles Lusk, retired Erie track foreman, they find a unique collection of oddities in stone and tree root, together with amusing cement models made by the owner of the small museum. Added to this, Mr. Lusk's fund of local historic facts and community folk lore, makes the trip, three miles beyond Alfred Station, well worthwhile. Picking you way across the creek that comes down the Old Gorge Road, you find the grass and fern covered way of the first road built from Railroad Valley to Alfred in 1815, running to the right of the Gorge Road as Alfred People knew it, but still discernible. Along the cool, leafy path, watching for deer tracks sometimes to be found, you come to the site of the first grist mill built in Alfred by Stephen Coon in 1821. It was fed by water from the Gorge Creek and the Withey Cold Spring. The flood of July 1935 washed away earth enough to show the remains of thirty feet of the old mill's wall, and the spillway. A grass-filled depression still marks the wheelpit. On the site, Mr. Lusk cast a cement historic

TEN YEARS AGO, JUNE 10, 2004

Alfred University will build its new Schein-Joseph International Museum of Ceramic Art at Alfred University on the site where Davis Gym now stands, AU President Charles M. Edmondson announced today. "There were several reasons behind our decision to move the proposed location for the new museum, not the least of which was the community's response to the South Hall site," said Edmondson. Initially, the University had proposed to tear down South Hall, which had been built in the early 1900s as the Alfred community school, but in recent months, community residents petitioned the University to reconsider its plans. "Residents raised valid concerns about parking and traffic," said Edmondson. "We agreed that there might be other locations with greater visibility from Main Street and better access and parking for visitors." In addition, use of the South Hall site would have forced the University to tear down and rebuild Crandall Health Center. "That would have been an additional expense not included in our original estimates," he said. Alfred University received a total of \$9.2 million through the State University of New York Construction Fund to build the new facility...Edward G. Coll, Jr., chairman of the Committee of 44, an economic development advocacy group that includes representatives of industry, higher education, non-profit agencies and government, said he endorses the new site because of the enhanced visibility the Davis Gym site will afford


