

Richmond Jan^Y 1854

My dear William

Your affectionate letter dated 2nd January we received on the 1st it was opened at home of course, it may have got there a day or two before we got it, we were very glad to hear you got safe home, and found all well. I am thankfull to say I feel much better than when you left me, Isreal sent up some Wine, and some Tanning. I am making use of both of them, and I feel much stronger tho' I am not able to do any work, but sewing, but I can ^{walk} with more ease.

on Tuesday your Brother Joseph came home, he has been trying to sell one of his Houses, the one he lived in here, the man is to get it in April next, and to pay him then 400 dollars, which Joseph says is about all that he will get out of it after the Morgage &c, is paid, he sold it for 13~~0~~ hundred dollars, Tom says he expected you would have bin to see him on your return home, we told him you would be glad to do so, but you could get back by him in ^{to} ~~then~~ with less expence, they ware all well, when he left, he is quite tired of keeping boarders, and as soon as he can do better he will give them up, and live more to themselves, when Victoria pays us another visit she must stay longer, if we sell the Farm and we live so long, I hope we shall be in the town, where she can enjoy herself better, I hope Mary and the little girls will come in the spring to see us, give our love to Joe & Willy tell them we hope to see them here this summer, you say in your
