# Alfred Town officials working on solar farm law

ALFRED-Alfred Town Planning Board member William Dailey reported on his entity's progress in developing a solar farm law, at the March 12 meeting of the Alfred Town Board.

Dailey told the Town Board that the planning board is looking at town laws in Independence and Angelica as models for an Alfred Town Zoning Law amendment. He said a representative from Buffalo Solar, along with solar farm developers Ly Kesse and Walter Mason, attended the last planning board meeting to discuss plans.

The solar farm developers have enlisted 127 subscribers toward a goal of

150 to 175 subscribers. Value of solar farm equipment is expected to be about \$400,000, with the group receiving an estimated \$20,000 per year return on their investment.

Dailey said planning board member Fred Sinclair was a real asset to the board in its deliberations with the Buffalo Solar sales rep.

He said the Town could either increase the property tax assessment or negotiate a Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILOT). Dailey said the planning board advises the Town negotiate a PILOT. In the event of default, ownership would then fall back to the Town of Alfred either to reactivate and operate the solar farm or to dismantle it.

Dailey said the planning board suggests the Town use the Association of Towns attorneys to review its law once proposed.

Dailey also reported that Planning Board Chairman Sean Hyland wishes to step down as chair, citing his lack of time to commit to the leadership role.

The planning board voted 3-1 to ask you to appoint me as chair," Dailey told the board, which immediately voted 5-0 to do so.

In other business, the Alfred Town Board

# Alfred University sets work-at-home policy for non-essential employees

ALFRED-Beginning Monday, March 23, all non-essential employees at Alfred University will work away from their official on-campus work site. The decision takes into account an executive order signed Friday by New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo, which mandates that 100 percent of the workforce across the state, excluding essential services, must stay at home.

Among those Alfred University employees deemed essential are public safety/security personnel; some facilities maintenance and custodial staff; and personnel caring for animals at the Equestrian Center.

The telecommuting policy will remain in place until such time that that the University receives additional guidance from New York State government.

"Our hope is that this crucial step, one of many we are taking as a University, state, and nation, will help bring the COVID-19 outbreak under control," said Mark Zupan, Alfred University president.

The implementation of the telecommuting policy follows a decision last week to suspend on-campus classes and move to online instruction of students for the remainder of the spring semester.

### Food pantries remain open with precautionary measures

ALFRED STATION-Despite the ongoing pandemic the Alfred Area Food Pantry in Alfred Station is remaining open its regular hours: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30-7:00 p.m. In order to best protect Food Pantry volunteers and patrons, some procedures have been changed.

Patrons will no longer come into the pantry to get their own food but will have their food delivered to them "curbside." 

# Health care providers offer coronavirus information

The following information gathered for the *Alfred Sun* by Alfred resident Alan Littell last week, is repeated for our readers:

•St. James Hospital, Hornell, has swab tests for coronavirus infection that are now available at the hospital. Anyone experiencing symptoms such as fever, coughing, shortness of breath, however, must first call Allegany County Health Department for authorization for test to be performed. Swab samples will be sent to labs outside St. James for processing.

 Word has been received from St. James Hospital, Hornell, that in response to rise in coronavirus cases regionally, families no longer will be permitted to visit patients admitted for treatment. The only exceptions are a single guardian for pediatric patients and, to be made on a case-bycase basis, limited visitors in the extreme circumstance of end-of-life patients. For more information call the hospital at 607-324-8000.

•Effective immediately, Jones Memorial Hospital, Wellsville, has instituted "a ZERO visitors policy for adult patients." In a press re-lease the hospital also said it had put in place a policy of one guardian visitor for pediatric patients and one support person for obstetrics patients throughout labor and delivery. The hospital is asking area residents not to come to the hospital for routine laboratory testing until further notice. Any visitors coming to the hospital will be screened. Vislobby and answer "a few basic questions before being allowed into the building." At press time, the hospital has not provided any information about testing availability for coronavirus infection nor has it given any guidance about permitted visitors for end-oflife patients. For questions, call the hospital directly at 585-593-1100.

•The Veterans Administration clinic in Wellsville, Riverside Drive, Route 19, was unable to provide information about testing at the facoronavirus cility for infection. For questions, area veterans can call the clinic directly at 607-664-4660.

•The Walmart store in Hornell reported March 17 that drive-through parking-lot testing for coronavirus infection was not yet available. There was no immediate word on future availability. For questions, call the store directly at 607-324-7019. •For further information,



#### Native Americans discovered tree water

[Editor's Note: Like most of the recipes she shared with our readers over the past couple of decades, Ellen Shultz's Sunny Side Up columns are worth repeating. ]

It was the Native Americans who discovered that sugar could be tapped from trees. They collected "tree water" from maple trees and cooked it down over an open fire. Once they boiled the excess water from the sap, the remaining maple sugar was stored in cakes for the entire year. The Algonquin name for maple sugar is sinsibuckwud (drawn from the wood), while the Ojibway called it sheesheegummavvis (sap flows fast).

The Native Americans taught the Pilgrims how to tap trees and make maple syrup and maple syrup was part of the menu at the 1621 Thanksgiving in Plymouth. This recipe is from a tiny cookbook called Very Maple Syrup by Jennifer Trainer Thompson. The biscuits go well at breakfast, lunch, or dinner.

**Maple Sweet Potato Biscuits** 

2 1/4 c. flour 1 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 c. unsalted butter

3/4 c. mashed cooked sweet potato 1/3 c. maple syrup

1/4 c. heavy cream 1 egg, lightly beaten

Preheat oven to 400°F. Line or spray a baking sheet. In a food processor combine the flour, baking powder, and salt. Pulse to combine. Add the butter and pulse until the mixture resembles coarse meal. In a small bowl, combine the sweet potato, maple syrup, and heavy cream. Blend until smooth. Add to dry ingredients and pulse until a soft dough is formed. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured work surface. Knead the doug five times, adding extra flour if necessary. Pat the dough into a 1-inch thick round. Using a biscuit cutter, cut out 12 to 16 biscuits and place on the prepared pan. Brush with the beaten egg. Bake for about 20 minutes, or until golden brown.



The Japanese must be having a good laugh while they use their bidets with impunity as we all strip the shelves of Charmin.

While we're on the subject of stockpiling...I do wish that everyone would quit that with the groceries. There actually isn't any issue with the food supply and delivery chain, and if everyone would just buy a reasonable amount of groceries, the stores would be stocked normally. Maybe we'll find out that Senators Richard Burr and Kelly Loeffler did just that with all the money they coincidentally pulled out of the stock market before it cratered. Their professions of innocence sound pretty lame to me, but to give them the benefit of the doubt...if they are guilty of that underhanded swipe, I propose that they be sent to the nearest Coronavirus ward for volunteer duty. Engaging in insider trading during a crisis while your constituents see their 401-Ks decimated is a special kind of low. All in all, as pandemics go, this one is actually pretty mild. I'm not trying to downplay the seriousness here, but considering that for the vast majority of people who get it it's no worse than the common cold, this could certainly be worse. The real threat, as has been pointed out, is less the virus itself, but the possibility of overwhelming our medical system by uncontrolled exponential transmission, rendering normally treatable cases untreatable. However, the news from China seems pretty positive on the possibility of limiting the virus's spread, even assuming some probable lack of transparency in their accounting. New cases have leveled off, with no new cases reported in Hubei province for the last 4 days and almost all new cases reported in the country being imported by travelers from abroad. Total deaths in China total around 3,200, which in a country of about 1.4 billion people is quite a remarkably small number.

For what it's worth, the S. Koreans seem to have had the best success in containment, with a relatively minor economic impact. The key there seems to have been mass testing with early identification and quarantine of infected individuals, making mass quarantine of healthy people unnecessary. S. Korea has only 111 Coronavirus fatalities which represents a great success considering their proximity to China and consequent duration of the outbreak there. The fact that they have been able to successfully contain the outbreak without resorting to draconian measures is heartening and should be emulated. The key seems to be that they learned their lessons from the MERS outbreak of 2015 and had a plan which would avoid cratering their economy like MERS did. It seems as though we are not able to take that course here, and the best we can probably hope for are some lessons learned for next time.

Coronavirus deaths seem to be averaging 4% of confirmed cases. This number sounds pretty serious, but loses a bit of bite when one considers that the majority of Coronavirus cases never make it onto the roll of confirmed cases. There are only those who are picked up in testing or are seriously ill enough to seek medical care. There is some unknowable number of cases, probably a majority, which have already recovered or never knew they had it, which lowers the death rates considerably. So statistics, as usual, are useful only to a point, and without full context about what is not counted can be somewhat misleading. For a bit of context, there were 40,000 traffic fatalities in the US last year. If the US doesn't totally bungle this, we shouldn't even get close to that number of deaths from Coronavirus. Imbibing too much Corona-beer before getting behind the wheel is still way more likely to do you in than Coronavirus.

If we all just stay calm, and take reasonable precautions, this can be put behind us with a minimum of disruption. It's certainly not the Black Death or smallpox, but probably won't be the last event we see like this, so hopefully we can try to learn some lessons and improve the resiliency of our society. And in the meantime, let's all approach this with a spirit of generosity and kindness. Quit stockpiling, and give someone you care about the gift that keeps on giving...a roll of toilet paper. After you've wiped it down with some hand sanitizer, of course!

ALFRED-Thomasina Zaengle, a senior in Alfred University's Kazuo Inamori School of Engineering, has been named a recipient of a 2020 State University of New York (SUNY) Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence

Zaengle, a native of Cooperstown, will be given the honor by SUNY Chancellor Kristina M. Johnson at a ceremony April 22 in Albany. She is pursuing a bachelor's degree in ceramic engineering from Alfred University while minoring in chemistry and business administration.

The Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence is presented to students from SUNY institutions who have best demonstrated and been recognized for their integration of academic excellence with other aspects of their lives, which may include leadership, campus involveathletics, achievement, community service or creative and performing arts. Zaengle is one of 215 students from 64 SUNY institutions to be named recipient of a 2020 Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence.

Zaengle is a leader on campus, serving in the Society for Women Engineers and as president of Keramos, the University's ceramic engineering honors society. She is

Dr. Gabrielle Gaustad, dean of Kazuo Inamori School of Engineering Vice President for Statutory Affairs, New York State College of Ceramics, nominated Zaengle for the Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence.

"She consistently volunteers with recruiting and outreach events and you can see that she has a real passion for inspiring young women to go into engineering and other STEM programs," Gaustad wrote of Zaengle in a letter in support of her nomination. "Thomasina serves as a mentor for underclassmen, especially women, I often see her offering advice and tutoring her undergraduate classmates.

She also served as a teaching assistant in our Integrated Science curriculum.

Zaengle excels in her research and scholarship as well, earning a place on the Dean's List each of her seven semesters at Alfred University. She has had two significant internships, one at Alfred University with Dr. William Carty, professor of ceramic engineering and materials science, and one at Pennsylvania State University with Dr. Clive Randall, professor of ceramic engineering and materials science.

In January, she published a first author journal article from her work in the Journal of the American Ceramic Society entitled "Single-step densification of nano-crystalline CeO2 by the cold sintering process.

"Cold sintering has incredible promise for new forming techniques which may enable additive manufacturing and 3D printing technologies to create products that are not possible to manufacture in such a manner today," Gaustad commented. "Having an undergraduate student lead such pioneering work is unique and speaks to the exceptional nature Thomasina's scholarship."

In addition to several presentations given at Pennsylvania State University, Zaengle recently presented the journal article at the Electronic Materials and Applications conference in Orlando, FL. "Quite significantly, she helped to facilitate collaboration between Penn State and Alfred University via this work. Faculty from both institutions were authors on this paper," Gaustad noted.

Zaengle is the daughter of James Zaengle and Mary Clarke and is a graduate of Cooperstown High School.



# Thriving Health Recipe: Bone Broth

ow are you doing? Staying healthy, strong, active, yet quarantined? This Lis a very hard and challenging season for so many reasons. Unprecedented challenges combat our regular routine. As I daily recover from change, I am learning that it is definitely a time of great opportunity. Opportunity to reset priorities and enjoy investing my time differently--even if only for a short

For many, it is a time to prioritize health. What have you been doing to maximize your health and support your immune system? Bone broth is a super food full of minerals, electrolytes, and healing proteins-- collagen and gelatin, and 19 essential amino acids.

Along with boosting the immune system, bone broth is recommended for joint health (arthritis) and digestive health (leaky gut, food allergies and intolerances) as well as to improve the health of our hair, skin, and nails.

Bone broth is super easy and even flexible! You can use different cuts of bone and enjoy flavor and benefits. The more marrow bones you use or chicken feet (yes, I did type chicken feet) the thicker your bone broth will turn out. This means there is more collagen and gelatin.

Feel free to also mix up the veggies. I often use celery, lemons or even apples!

<u>Ingredients</u>:

- 4 pounds beef bones or chicken carcass (preferably partial marrow bones or add in 4-6 chicken feet)
- 2 medium unpeeled carrots
- 1 medium onion
- 4 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoon cider vinegar

6-quart (or larger) stockpot or a large slow

**Directions**:

Fill the stock pot or slow cooker with ingredients. Add water to 1 inch of the brim.

Cover the pot and bring to a gentle boil. Reduce heat to a very low simmer and cook with 12 hours but up to 48 hours on the stovetop. The longer it simmers, the better the broth. Add more water if necessary to ensure bones and vegetables are fully submerged. Alternately, you can cook the broth in a slow cooker on low for the same amount of time.

Remove the pot from the heat and let cool slightly. Strain broth using a fine-mesh sieve and discard bones and vegetables. Use immediately for soups or drinking or cool and refrigerate.

## Diy Paleo Fried Cube Steak

Spring is coming friends, but it's not warm enough to grill just yet! In the meantime try this country fried steak.

What You Need: 1/4 cup bacon grease

1 lb grassfed cube steak

FLOUR MIXTURE 1 cup tapioca flour

1 teaspoon sea salt 1 teaspoon garlic powder

EGG WASH

2 large eggs

**GRAVY** 

1/2 cup of heavy whipping cream or full fat coconut milk In a skillet over medium heat add the bacon grease. Combine the tapioca flour, sea salt and garlic powder in a paper bag and shake to combine.

Crack the two large eggs into a large bowl and beat.

Take the cubed steak and, piece by piece, dip the steak in the flour mixture, then place in the egg wash and place back into the flour mixture for a final coat. Place the coated steak in the bacon grease and fry until golden brown, roughly 4 -5 minutes per side and flip and repeat. Once all the steaks have been fried, place the heavy whipping cream or coconut milk into the pan and whisk with the drippings until you have a gravy, roughly



# Andover's Walker invited to speak in Ireland Second Celtic Artists' Conference dedicated to Scotty MacCrea

ANDOVER - March is Irish American Heritage Month. Just as the celebration of Saint Patrick's Day in Ireland has been very much shaped by how Irish immigrants and their descendants have observed this day in America, Celtic artists, schol-

ars and art historians in Ire- art and symbolism. He comland have begun to appreciate how Celtic artists practicing outside of Ireland are contributing to this beautiful and mysterious art form.

Stephen Walker of Andover will be travelling to Ireland this spring to lecture on Celtic ments on this upcoming adventure, "I am thrilled that the next chapter of something we started here in Andover will be written in Ireland. It is especially touching that my mentor Scotty MacCrea will be posthumously honored for art."

The Second International Day of Celtic Art Conference has been announced in Downpatrick, Northern Ireland to be held from June 4 to 7, 2020 at the Saint Patrick Centre. The conference will be dedicated to the memory of William "Scotty" MacCrea of Alfred, NY. MacCrea, artist and art teacher, gave a stirring talk at the first IDCA Conference in Andover, last spring. He passed away October 19, 2019 at age 87. A video of this presentation will be shown as part of the program in Down-

patrick. The Saint Patrick Centre, in Downpatrick Northern Ireland, is home to the world's only permanent exhibit dedicated to Ireland's Patron Saint. Much of Patrick's mission to bring the Christian Gospel to Ireland radiated from his establishment in the northeast of Ireland near the Irish Sea. Legend has it that the grave of the Saint is in the graveyard of Down Cathedral, once an Early Christian monastery, whose inner and boundaries outer marked by two granite high crosses in the 8th and 10th






# Scholes Lecture postponed

ALFRED-The annual Scholes Lecture at Alfred University, scheduled for April 2 and featuring Alastair Cormack, the Van Derck Fréchette Professor of Ceramic Science and Founding Dean of the Inamori School of Engineering at Alfred University, has been postponed due to the University's response to the COVID-19 outbreak.

All on-campus gatherings, including lectures, career fairs, lectures, and speeches, have been suspended indefinitely. Cormack's lecture, "Disorder in Ceramics and Glass – an Atom's Eye View," will be rescheduled for a later date. The lecture will examine the application of atomistic simulations to some of the problems, in both crystals and glasses, undertaken by Cormack's students over the years.

'Many of the useful – or otherwise – properties of ceramics and glass can be blamed on disorder at the atomic scale," Cormack observes in an abstract for the talk. "However, this can be hard to characterize experimentally, particularly in the case of glasses. Forty years ago the field of Computational (Ceramic) Materials Science did not exist.

"...Much has changed over the past four decades, both in terms of hardware and software. Really quite complex problems can now be tackled, particularly with respect to chemistry, where multi-component systems are now the norm and chemical reactivity, involving dissociative reactions, can be followed.

Cormack joined the faculty of the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University in 1985. Since then, he has held a number of administrative positions in addition to his research and teaching.





#### **PROCLAMATION**

My Name is Allegany County Whereas, the citizens and government of Allegany County (the County) rejected the New York State proposal to locate a low-level radioactive waste dump in Allegany County; and

Whereas, the citizens and the County resisted this proposal with challenges in the courts, in legislation, in science, and on the land itself;

Whereas, non-violent actions by members of Allegany County Nonviolent Action Group (ACNAG) to deny entry by the Siting Commission to the proposed waste dump sites resulted in dozens of arrests: and

Whereas, ACNAG mem-Caneadea Bridge on April bers, upon arrest, identified themselves by responding "My Name is Allegany County," and

Whereas, several hundred citizens, using the principles of civil disobedience, made a stand at Caneadea Bridge on April 5, 1990, which resulted in Governor Cuomo suspending the siting process, and which finally, once and for all, denied the Siting Commission access to the land;

Whereas, a subsequent legal case, New York v. United States, argued before the Supreme Court found that the "Take Title" provision of the Low-Level Radioactive Waste Policy Amendments Act of 1985 exceeded Congress's power under the Commerce Clause; and

Whereas, this 1992 decision reaffirmed 10th Amendment states' rights and has been cited in case law hundreds of times since

Now, Therefore, I Curtis W Crandall, Chairman of the Allegany County Board of Legislators, herby proclaim April 5, 2020, as My Name Is Allegany County Day in Allegany County in commemoration of citizens and local government standing up for the environ-ment, their families, their land, and their home rule rights under the Constitution of the United States of Amer-\*\*\*

This document was entered into the permanent record of the Legislature by Chairman Curtis W. Crandall on March 23, 2020. Please thank your legislator.

And then, if you will, please spend a moment in quiet appreciation for the individuals who carried out this monumental, years-long effort to keep our county free of radioactive waste. We are all

indebted to them. We honor their perseverance, their commitment to protecting environmental and human health, and for keeping our county pristine for future generations.

She hit safely in nine of her 11 games played, tallying three hits against Penn. State-Hazleton and Minnesota-Morris. She hit her second and third career home runs against Haverford and Minn.-Morris, respectively and also stole a career-high four bases against Hazleton on March 9. Lugo finished the shortened season with a .441 batting average (15-of-34), driving in five runs, scoring 11 more and stealing 12 bases.

Wilcox had an incredible week, posting an 0.88 ERA in 31.2 innings pitched, going 4-2. She struck out an impressive 49 batters, only walking three. She saved her best for the end, striking out a seasonbest 13 batters against Concordia-Chicago on Friday, then recorded the first perfect game in Alfred University history in perhaps her last start, striking out 12 Minnesota Morris batters on Saturday. She also set the program record for career strikeouts against Penn State-Hazleton on March 9, and has a total of 396 career K's.



ith virtually everything in the world of sports on hold, and life for that matter, I reached out to few college athletic directors that I know, for their input on what they are doing during these trying times for everyone where it pertains to their respective schools. I asked each whether their classes are being rescheduled or continued online, and whether any seniors would return to compete in Spring 2021. Many thanks to Paul Vecchio of Alfred University, Andover native Pat Atwell at Culver-Stockton in Missouri and former Alfred State men's basketball coach Tom Curle at William Peace in North Carolina. After all, it's "a little" tough

writing a sports column with no sports going on!

Paul Vecchio, Alfred University: My next bunch of weeks. in the wake of games and sports being cancelled, will focus on assisting our head coaches to successfully bring in our recruiting class for this fall; spending more time on our five-year strategic plan in athletics which we began this year, beginning to analyze our current budget and make plans for next years; consider some future fundraising opportunities (although we are very sensitive right now about soliciting anyone with all the current uncertainties) and teaching my graduate class and learning how to do it in an online format! I'm sure there will be plenty of other things that will jump up and grab my attention but that's what I see as the immediate plans.

Students are – but for a few without a better situation to go to – off campus and in an online format for the rest of the se-

Kind of early to know on seniors wanting to return next vear but I would say there has been quite a bit of interest in at least learning how they can make that possible giving school-

Hope you and yours are both healthy and safe, this has been a wild ride and I know it's not going to stop anytime soon.

Pat Atwell, Culver-Stockton: We are spending a lot of time instructing staff-coaches on what they need to do. For me I am deemed essential staff so I can come to campus even though we have a shelter in place order in Illinois. The coaches will be working from home but they can spend all of their time recruiting and retaining our current student-athletes so that can all be done from home. There are other jobs like athletic trainers and sports information that are more impacted from a work standpoint with the lack of games being played. We will look at what they can do on an individual basis. For me personally there are a lot of policy meetings, I still have staff evaluations to do (I may not have the physical meetings but prepping with the paperwork takes forever), we need to submit budget requests for every area for 2020-21 along with all of the league and national items that we need to keep up with. At this point we are the point people for dispersing information from our national organization for us the NAIA and the league

Our classes are all online and we have postponed graduation. We are working with students who were student-teaching, had internships etc. on an individual basis. No students will be

punished for what we cannot provide.

We definitely have some (seniors) that have already spoken with us about returning. If is a very attractive option for some and not so for others depending on where they are at in their life. What is very interesting is our recruiting of junior college student-athletes. If they have their Associate Degree we are having much better luck than if they do not. The NJCAA also has allowed for another year of eligibility so they can either go back and play or come to a four year school and have three years of eligibility. We are honoring all athletic scholarships that our students had. They also can work on their Master's degree and play.

In future columns, you can always write about how great the Farm and Home softball teams were back in the day!!

Tom Curle, William Peace: Most of our facilities are rentals or shared agreements so we will begin to secure practice and game facilities for the Fall sports. At WPU we are an enrollment management driven institution so our coaches are focused on implementing recruiting strategies from remote locations. There are no tournaments or high school sports to attend but I still expect us to achieve our recruiting goals. Recruiting is a no excuses proposition. Everybody is in the same boat. The athletic administration will teleconference with coaches at least once a week.

We have also instructed coaches that they should maintain communication with current students so that our retention rate stays high. Online classes present a real challenge to some students. We want to be sure we have a handle on Spring grades. I will insure this happens through constant reminders and requested reports.


