## Reinventing Spring Break

### Alfred State students take a 'break' to volunteer

ALFRED—While spring break is typically considered a time for students to relax and recharge, for Alfred State College (ASC) Pioneers, it's an opportunity to make a difference.

During their recent spring break, a number of ASC students volunteered for one of two out-of-state civic engagement trips in an effort to help those in need.

On the trip to Myrtle Beach, SC, a group of 11 volunteers were led by Amy Miller, residence hall director, and student leader Elisabeth Rebmann, a human services management major from Attica. Participants included Colin Blatz, mechanical engineering technology, Buffalo; Spencer DiSalvo, heavy equipment operations, Mount Morris; Felicia Fiacco, architecture, Elbridge; Dalton Fries, architecture, Olean; Nicole Grandall, human services, Bath; Rachel Marsh, business administration, DeRuyter; Matthew Murphy, electrical construction and maintenance electrician, Buffalo; Alex Serrano, computer engineering technology, New York City; and Rachel Von Hagn, nursing, Bath.

During the trip, the group worked with Habitat for Humanity of Horry County at a construction site, where they helped build an affordable house for a mother and her three children. The group performed a variety of exterior work, from installing windows, to hammering, to landscaping, as well as interior work such as installing insulation, installing beams, and calking. The trip marked the seventh straight year that the college has partnered with Habitat for Humanity of Horry County.

Once the group arrived, Miller noted, the students were ready to "dive head first into construction."

"I was impressed with how the students were so dedicated to helping," she said. "The students were eager to get their hands dirty and make an impact on the community. As students who are familiar with hands-on learning, they jumped right into the tasks they were assigned on day one."

On a separate trip, student leaders RJ Sturtz, a construction management major from Marion, and Esthefany Gordillo, a financial planning major from Woodhaven, led a team of four

who partnered with All Hands and Hearts – Smart Response. The group engaged in disaster recovery efforts in

Former AU music professor arraigned in County Court

BELMONT—A former Alfred University Instrumental Music professor was arraigned Thursday, April 4, 2019 on an indictment charging first-degree reckless endangerment, trespass, unlawful fleeing a police officer, speeding, fours counts of failure to stop at a stop sign, reckless driving and driving while ability impaired.  
Those charges are filed against 45-year-old Christopher Foster. The Allegany County District Attorney released this description:  
“This is from an incident that took place in the Village of Alfred on July 6, 2018. The defendant did, under circumstances evincing a depraved indifference to human life, recklessly engage in conduct which created a grave risk of death to the victim when he recklessly accelerated and drove his Honda SUV at her, narrowly missing her and causing his car to go over a curb and hit a nearby tree. At the time, the defendant had no license or privilege to be on the Alfred University Campus after given notice that he was not allowed to be on campus property. Police heard the car accident and immediately responded, at which time they commanded the defendant to stop and exit the vehicle. The defendant attempted to flee the Officers by leaving the Ford Street parking lot and driving at least 25 mph over the speed limit, which was a posted 30 mph limit. The defendant continued to evade police by blowing through stop signs into four different intersections and attempting to run Officers off the road by jerking his car toward their Public Safety vehicle. At the time of these offenses, the defendant was operating a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol.”  
This matter has been adjourned to 1 p.m. Tuesday, May 28, 2019 for motions in Allegany County Court.

Cuba man pleads guilty to robbery

BELMONT—A Cuba man who kidnapped two people in Alfred and then forced them to drive away in an attempt to escape has pleaded guilty in Allegany County court to first-degree robbery. Steven Cox, 37, entered his plea Thursday, April 4. This is a summary of the crime as provided in a press release from the Allegany County District attorney:  
On Nov. 14, 2018, Cox "knowingly and unlawfully entered the Economy Inn in Alfred to commit the crime of robbery. He threatened two victims while he brandished a 13-inchknife and had his face covered to conceal his identity. He stole checks and money, then made the victims get in their car and drive him to Andover. In Andover, one of the victims told the defendant that her car needed gas and stopped at a gas station. The victims escaped and called police while the defendant took the car and fled." A massive two-state manhunt ensued and Cox was taken into custody just over the state line in Pennsylvania. Cox will be sentenced June 5 in Allegany County court.



WWII Museum curator to speak in Almond

ALMOND—The Almond Historical Society has invited the public to an open house program featuring Steve Appleby, curator at the Eldred PA World War II Museum at 3 p.m. Sunday afternoon, April 28 in the Almond Union Church fellowship room.

Appleby spoke at the Kanisteo Historical Society meeting last year, and the program was so interesting that the Almond group has invited him to share the museum story here locally. His talk features a variety of weapons and WWII relics, which enhance his fast-paced, enthusiastic presentation.

The Eldred PA WWII museum, located at 201 Main Street, Eldred, provides an interesting road trip destination. Their impressive facilities include the Robert A. Anderson Library, which now exceeds 8500 volumes, including rare or out of print books available to researchers. In addition to books, researchers also have access to veteran statements and interviews, various wartime periodicals, videos, and documents within the museum's archives.

The museum is situated on the site of a former munitions plant which operated during WWII. Approximately 1,500 people worked in this facility and once the local boys went off to war, 95% of National Munitions Company's employees were women. During peak production the plant stretched across 1,800 acres with proving grounds in New York State.

**SUNNY SIDE UP**

A great Mexican Beef Stew recipe

[Editor's Note: Like most of the recipes she shared with our readers over the past couple of decades, Ellen Shultz's Sunny Side Up columns are worth repeating.]

I first was intrigued by this recipe because I like to collect chili recipes and I thought this was one, but it has a few twists that make it more of a stew. I've developed some short cuts for its preparation which I will include at the end. There seems to be no difference in the taste.

Mexican Beef Stew

- |                             |                             |
|-----------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 1 lb. Roma tomatoes, halved | 2 onions, thinly sliced     |
| 6 flour tortillas           | 1 1/2 c. beef stock         |
| 1-2 red chillies, chopped   | 3 T. tomato paste           |
| 1 T. olive oil              | 1 (13 oz.) can kidney beans |
| 2 lb. stewing beef, cubed   | 1 tsp. chili powder         |
| 1/2 tsp. black pepper       | 1/2 c. sour cream           |

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grill the tomatoes, skin side up for 6-8 minutes or until skin is black and blistered. Cool, remove the skin and roughly chop the flesh. Bake 2 of the tortillas for 4 minutes, or until crisp. Break into pieces, put in food processor with the tomato and chili and process until almost smooth. Heat the oil in the pan. Stir in the tomoato mixture, stock and tomoato paste and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat, cover and simmer for 1 1/4 hours. Add the beans and chilli powder. Grill the remaining tortillas for 3 minutes each side, cool, cut in wedges. Serve with the stew and sour cream.

My slight adjustments: brown the onions and beef together, peel the tomatoes, quarter the tortillas and toast in your toaster, use canned beef bouillon. Sorry, if you're a purist when cooking, but all of this is easier, less time consuming and equally delicious. Note the spelling of chilli in this recipe; the confusion continues.

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





Nutrition in a Nutshell

Thriving Recipes: Coconut Flour Pizza

One of my favorite jobs as a nutritional therapist is to lead small groups through the RESTART program. This is a 5-week class where individuals practice lifestyle change as a group while gaining invaluable education to better understand their body's nutritional needs.

In Alfred last week, I just graduated five individuals from the Restart class. What a dynamic time! They dove into the challenge with great creativity in the kitchen—trying so many new recipes. Here is one they tried and shared with me. I am always looking for a simple yummy pizza recipe—and this one is a keeper!

Tip: They topped it with Sunny Cove Farm's grass-fed organic ring boloney!

Coconut Flour Pizza

3 Tbsp coconut flour  
3 Tbsp almond flour  
1 tsp baking powder  
2 egg whites  
4 eggs  
3 tsp Italian seasoning (use 1 tsp. basil, 1 tsp. oregano, and ½ tsp. thyme in place of Italian seasoning)

garlic and onion powder- optional  
1 Tbsp butter  
Your favorite cheese and toppings  
In a large mixing bowl, whisk the eggs/egg whites until opaque. Sift in the coconut flour or almond flour and whisk well until clumps are removed. Add spices and continue to whisk until completely combined.

Grease a 15" frying pan with the Tbsp. of butter then heat on medium-low.

Once frying pan is hot, pour the batter in the pan and ensure it is fully coated. Cover the pan with a lid/tray for 3-4 minutes or until bubbles start to appear on top. Flip onto a cookie sheet then back into frying pan, cook for an extra two minutes and remove from pan. Place back onto cookie sheet and add sauce and toppings per taste.

Bake for 5-7 minutes at 350 F or until toppings are warm and cheese is melted.

## AU staging of 'The Tempest' opens tonight at Miller Theater

ALFRED—The Alfred University Division of Performing Arts will present three performances of William Shakespeare's "The Tempest" in April. The powerful play with its stormy metaphor will reunite much of the team from the last November's production of "Waiting for Godot."

The production of "The Tempest," directed by Becky Prophet, professor of theater at Alfred University, opens at 7:30 p.m. tonight (Thursday, April 11), in Miller Theater. It will also be performed Friday, April 12, at 7:30 p.m. and in a 2 p.m. matinee Saturday, April 13. Admission is free.

"The Tempest" is a tapestry intricately woven with political intrigues and sibling rivalries. It is also an unveiling of love, honor, and personal power to renounce revenge in order to forgive.

Prospero, from his isolated island, raises a storm that runs a ship aground — a ship bearing those who conspired to overthrow Prospero years before. As the play unfolds, Prospero reveals to his daughter Miranda the history that brought them to this island and she begins to discover the powers that he commands to punish or to forgive his abusers. The mutable weather of the island, controlled by Prospero, is reflected in his stormy moods and his gentle care for his daughter.

Assisted by spirits in carrying out his plans, Prospero calls upon the lithe Ariel who serves his master with the promise of freedom. Ariel brings the prince Ferdinand to Prospero and the prince and Miranda fall in love at first

sight.

Prospero's slave Caliban grovels in pain as he angrily plots his master's demise. Caliban swears loyalty to a butler and jester, two clowns who are drunk on wine and besotted with a false sense of power. The trio's crude actions, including falling into a cesspool, grotesquely mirror the cruelty of the royals' earlier transgressions. Less dangerous and more ridiculous, the drunks are ridiculed by the now transformed and forgiven royals. And, of course, even though Miranda and Ferdinand have known one another for less than five hours they are set for a life together as any happy ending demands.

Fifteen actors from last fall's production of "Waiting for Godot" are part of the cast for "The Tempest." Performing Arts has reassembled the "Waiting for Godot" team by bringing GD Kimble, Andrew DG Hunt and Ao Li together again for "The Tempest." Kimble, who was actor-guest artist and director of "Waiting for Godot," creates a Prospero who must choose between his justified revenge against his human compassion. Ao Li designs the set — Prospero's world of gritty reality enhanced by magic — and Hunt designs lighting for Prospero's world, especially where magic and reality cross over.

Senior psychology major Meredith Prato is the costume designer. Zachary Hamm as technical director and Deb MacCrea as costume shop manager fill out the team of professionals creating this delightful and thought-provoking play.




## New culverts to reduce flood risk in Andover, Independence

ANDOVER—The New York State Department of Transportation Wednesday, April 3 announced that construction will begin in mid-April on a \$1.4 million project to replace culverts on State Route 417 at Best Hollow Creek in the Town of Andover, and on State Route 248 in the Town of Independence, both in Allegany County. The new culverts will reduce the risk of flooding and enhance safety along two roadways vital to the flow of commerce in the Southern

Tier.

State Route 417 and Route 248 are both critical delivery routes for agricultural products in Allegany County. State Route 248 is also a commonly used trucking route that runs through the Southern Tier.

State Route 417 also provides access to Interstate 86 and Interstate 99, giving local businesses – including industries in nearby Wellsville that regularly ship large loads – a vital portal to the Southern Tier and beyond. The project

will also help patients and staff headed to Wellsville Hospital.

As part of the project, the aging concrete structures at both locations will be replaced with larger, more modern precast concrete box culverts that will allow water to flow more efficiently underneath the roadways, improving resiliency to high water and reducing maintenance demands.

Consistent with Governor Cuomo's Drivers First initiative, these projects have been designed to minimize impacts

to drivers. Traffic at the Route 417 site in Andover will be maintained on the existing alignment with the use of temporary construction signals, while the Route 248 culvert will be replaced using an off-site detour with a limited 12-day closure. Work is expected to be complete by September.

Assemblyman Joseph Giglio said, “I'm thrilled that the Department of Transportation has begun this critical project to provide enhancements to the infrastructure of these roadways in Allegany County. Safe travel for business and industry, medical transport, students, residents

and visitors has always been a priority, and it is gratifying to see funding provided to make these projects a reality. This is also an opportunity to remind motorists to be cautious during construction and to obey New York's Move Over Law to protect our construction workers.”

Motorists are reminded that fines are doubled for speeding in a work zone. In accordance with the Work Zone Safety Act of 2005, convictions of two or more speeding violations in a work zone could result in the suspension of an individual's driver license.

## Schools compete in Science Fair

ALFRED—More than 100 outstanding scientific projects by students from 13 area school districts were featured in Alfred State's 20th annual Regional Science and Technology Fair.

Participating districts included Addison, Alfred-Almond, Archbishop Walsh STCS, Bolivar-Richburg, Cassadaga Valley, Friendship, Hinsdale, Hornell, Houghton Academy, Lima Christian School, Portville, Prattsburgh, and St. Ann's Academy.

A total of 180 students presented 158 science and technology projects to the judges for a chance at a share of the \$1,590 in prize money. Participants were divided into three divisions: senior (grades 10-12), junior (grades seven through nine), and novice (grades four through six).

Winners in the senior division included first-place winner (\$250) Laura Wilhelm from Portville with “Liquid Ice Melt for the Common Consumer,” second-place winner (\$150) Gail Patton from Hinsdale with “What's in a Face?,” and third-place winner (\$100) Nathan Armstrong from Hinsdale with “It's Time to Strike.”

Winners in the junior division included first-place winner (\$250) Catherine Pryzbyla from Archbishop Walsh with “Self Control: The Marshmallow Test,” second-place winner (\$150) Christy Childs from Hinsdale with “Preserving?,” and third-place winner (\$100) Lemuel Fiegl from Lima Christian School with “Hacking the Air Gap.”

Winners in the novice division included first-place winner (\$50) Nicholas Gray from St. Ann's Academy with “Slippery Slopes – Investigating the Angle of Repose and its Impact on Slope Stability,” second-place winner (\$25)

McKenzie Calderwood from Prattsburgh with “Power of Precipitation,” and third-place winner (\$15) Clayton Cheney from Prattsburgh with “Tap, Sap, Boil.”

The grand prize (\$500) went to Shayla Wilhelm from Portville with “Aluminum SiO2 Coated Optical Mirror Deterioration with Epoxy Resin.”

The People's Choice Award resulted in a tie between (Certificate/Ribbon) Matthew Robinson from Hornell with “The Making of the Grand Canyon” and Aurelia Hoover from St. Ann's Academy with “Separating Ink: Water vs. Alcohol.”

Winning Outstanding School awards were Prattsburgh (novice division), Hinsdale (junior division), and Portville (senior division). All Outstanding School winners received a silver tray.

Each participant received a certificate of participation, and individual ribbons were presented to first-, second-, and third-place prize winners in all divisions. The Science and Technology Fair was sponsored by Otis Eastern of Wellsville, with additional funding provided by ACES, Thermo-Fisher Scientific, Alfred State Student Senate, Alfred State Science Society Club, the Physical and Life Sciences Department, the American Chemical Society, and Wards Scientific.

Additionally, about 80 volunteers consisting of faculty, staff, students, community members, and alumni assisted with the fair. Alfred State thanks everyone who helped make the 20th annual Regional Science and Technology Fair possible.



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

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

**Increasing property taxes** and declining state aid was the theme of a public budget hearing of the Village of Alfred Board of Trustees Tuesday evening, April 5, 1994. According to Alfred Village Mayor William Hall, state aid revenues have been reduced by \$430,244 from 1988 to 1994. Reductions in state aid is a problem plaguing communities across all of New York state. The Village of Wellsville is receiving about \$700,000 less in state aid. Because of the continued reduction of state aid, the Alfred Village Board has been forced to raise property taxes for the 350 to 360 taxable village parcels to make up the difference. Hall explained that the general fund budget has principally remained constant over the last seven years while the amount of state aid has decreased sharply over the same period. The general fund budget for 1994-1995 is \$832,151. This is an overall increase of about 3%, from last year's budget of \$803,398...



## AU names Miller Outstanding Senior Award winners

ALFRED—Alfred University students Nurila Kamar and Dillon Smith have been named recipients of the 2019 Marlin Miller Outstanding Senior Award. They will be honored at Alfred University's commencement ceremony on May 18, where they will address the graduating class, faculty, administration, trustees, and guests.

"The selection committee did a great job selecting Nurila and Dillon. These two students represent the best of Alfred University on both a logical and an emotional level. They have been so generous in the time they devote to improving this valley that is so important to all of us," said Kathy Woughter, vice president of Student Affairs at AU. "Dillon's determination as he completes college despite stop-outs for his military service is a case study in resilience, and Nurila's similar determination to succeed academically, athletically and as a leader is truly inspiring."

Nurila, from Almaty, Kazakhstan, is a materials science and engineering major (physics minor) who has a cumulative GPA of 3.80 and has been named to the Dean's List

during her time at Alfred University. She is the daughter of Zhanat Tileumuratova and Orazkhan Abiltaev.

She is a member of several academic honor societies – including Tau Beta Pi (the engineering honor society, for which she serves as treasurer), Phi Kappa Phi and Chi Alpha Sigma – and for the last three years has served as vice president of the Society of Women in Engineering at Alfred University. She received an Applied and Experiential (APEX) grant from AU.

Woughter nominated Nurila for the Marlin Miller Award. She said she has known Nurila since the fall of 2017, when Woughter was instructor for the Women's Leadership Academy capstone/practicum class. Nurila graduated from the Academy in May 2017.

Nurila has been a resident assistant for three years and has been active in a variety of groups and activities during her time at Alfred. She served as a STEM Panel moderator for the Robert R. McComsey Career Development Center; is a member of the Peer Review Board; and served two summers as a tour guide for

Nurila was a four-year member of the women's tennis team, last fall helping to lead the Saxons to a berth in the Empire 8 Conference championship tournament. She is an Empire 8 Athletic Conference President's List (recognizing academic excellence) honoree and an Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Scholar Athlete.

Dillon, from Pine Bush, double majors in criminal justice and experimental psychology (sociology and public law minor). He carries a cumulative grade point average of 3.80 and has been named to the Dean's List throughout his time at Alfred University. He is the son of Christopher and Adrienne Smith.

He is a member of numerous academic honor societies at AU: Pi Gamma Mu, Phi Kappa Phi, and Omicron Delta Kappa; and Psi Chi (psychology honor society). He is a recipient of Alfred University's John Allen Scholarship and Byong Min '59 and Yoon Min Scholarship, and received an APEX grant from Alfred University.

## ATV driver arrested after accident

On Saturday, April 6, 2019, State Police Amity Troopers arrested Leon J. Dumas, 39, of Spring Valley, for Driving While Intoxicated and 1st Degree Aggravated Unlicensed Operation.

Following an ATV accident on County Road 12 in the town of Alfred, Dumas was exhibiting obvious signs of

intoxication. He failed limited standardized field sobriety tests at the scene. Dumas was then arrested and transported to Strong Memorial Hospital for treatment.

Dumas was issued appearance tickets for Alfred Town Court, where he is due to appear later this month.

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I live but half a mile from the top of the watershed. To the East, the water flows down hill eventually reaching the Mid-Atlantic. To the west it finds the Genesee River, Lake Ontario and the North Atlantic.

To the north the woods, south a swale. At 2240 feet, a good 1000 feet above surrounding river valleys, a swale is a high altitude, grassy depression usually with a high water table resulting in wet meadows. As such my 10-acre meadow has four ponds.

The first is 34 years old, only 25 feet in diameter and no more than 2 to 3 feet deep. It was dug to provide cover for the raised leach field. It soon became the home for noisy peepers and galunking green frogs. Both tree swallows and dragonflies skimmed its surface finding dinner.

On the west bank I planted a pussy willow and day lilies, on the north Blue Flag and Siberian Iris all of which prefer damp soil. Finally, I added one hardy water Lily, blooming white in June.

That was all of 25 years ago. I let Mother Nature do her thing, me being too busy elsewhere in the gardens. About five years ago, it took me by surprise: the lavender Iris were everywhere. The Water Lily was spreading, now covering 10% of the surface. The Green Frogs now sat every three feet around the edge (making for two dozen or so). A Blue Heron showed up to take advantage.

Reeds and Sedges moved in and lovely neon blue damselflies clung to the round, green reed stems. Once I saw a painted turtle, but only once.

If the spring is very windy, the parent geese bring their offspring (3 to 7) over to where the little pond is sheltered by the now 40-foot white spruce windbreak 150 feet to the west.

This May during my annual Woods Walk, we will detour out to the pond for a look see. You never know what Mother Nature will provide.

## #11 Stevens snaps AU men's lacrosse team's streak

The Alfred University men's lacrosse team had its three game win streak snapped on Saturday by nationally ranked Stevens Institute of Technology. The Saxons (6-3, 2-1) fell by a score of 20-5 to the 11th ranked Ducks.

**Women's Track & Field:**


