Mission Statement

The mission of the International Museum of Ceramic Art at Alfred, a non-profit educational institution, shall be to collect, preserve and conserve, research, interpret, and exhibit ceramic objects for educational and aesthetic purposes, which encourage and promote the advancement, understanding, enjoyment, and diffusion of knowledge of the history of ceramic art.

The collections shall include important examples of contemporary American ceramic art, ceramic objects which illustrate, technically and aesthetically, the broader history of world ceramic art, and the ceramics created by Alfred-trained ceramic artists, which shall function as a national repository and research center for the investigation and study of the history of American studio ceramics from 1900 to the present.

The audience shall consist of three primary targeted constituencies including the general public wishing self-education and an extended awareness of the ceramic arts; the university community, especially the student population in the School of Art and Design, who will utilize the Museum collections to explore the technical, stylistic, iconographic and aesthetic history of ceramics; and the specialist, both scholar and artist, who will want to explore the ceramic collection and related archival materials pertaining to the collections.

From Annual Report: 1990-91

History

In 1900, Charles Fergus Binns was appointed as founding director of the New York State School of Clay-Working and Ceramics, now known as the New York State College of Ceramics. Thus, the study of ceramic art and science was established as the educational focus at Alfred and has remained so for a century.

In the early 1900s, Binns established the first "museum" devoted to ceramics at Alfred. This "museum" augmented his teaching of pottery making, ceramic science including glaze and clay recipes, and ceramic history. Its establishment on the top floor of the original ceramics building on campus provided a location where student and faculty work could be displayed for study, enjoyment and discussion. Although not a museum in the professional sense of the word, as early as 1903, Binns wrote about the idea in the popular journal *The Craftsman*, "Although at present there is no important ceramic museum at Alfred, the private collection of the Director is at the disposal of the students, and in the University Museum there are numerous examples of historic American pottery. A distinctive collection of the pottery of the world is contemplated at the State School, and the idea will be carried out as soon as the necessary funds are available." (Charles F. Binns, "Education in Clay," *The Craftsman*, June, 1903, p.

165) Collections were amassed almost independent of scholarly direction. Nearly ninety years later, in 1991, Dr. Margaret Carney was appointed ceramics historian, and a Museum was formally established at the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University. Dr. Carney became the founding director and chief curator. Today the Museum celebrates American ceramics, but within the broader context of worldwide ceramic creativity and history, a history representing thousands of years.
