

The metamorphosis takes but minutes. A cold, whitewashed classroom becomes a welcoming, multi-hued gathering space, much like the message to soon be delivered — diversity and equality bring color and depth to the world.

At first, there are only several students methodically hanging posters and arranging tables with art supplies — pencils and pipe cleaners, drawing pads and paper — and hanging a "stage curtain." Soon the room is filled with more than a dozen workers transforming the area into a mini theater/art room.





All of the AU students sport colorful

aprons as their work garb; five of them, the Art Force Five (AF5), wear brighter hues and each carries a tool depicting his/her art. This quintet will lead today's production for a group of middle-school aged youngsters. Each Art Force member showcases a specific art talent and an impressive grasp of history. They are: Zoom, the photographer; Graphite, the illustrator; Runway, the fashion designer; Brushstroke, the painter; and 3-D, the sculptor. Their task is to carry out the mission of Alfred University's "Drawn to Diversity" (D2D) movement, a nonprofit, educational program that champions equality and appreciating differences through art and artistic expression.

The classroom instructor for this part research class/part community outreach production is Dan Napolitano '93, '98, AU director of student activities. There are 14 students in the fall 2008 "Drawn to Diversity: Service Learning Through Art" class. They take turns in the roles as the Art Force Five and student mentors. The weekly class is a long-running test of their knowledge and growing ability to communicate a seamless compatibility of art and diversity, culture and classmates. Using the annual topic/theme, the students preparing the presentations continued on page 4

.... Meet the Art

research art history and current trends.

It's obvious there is a lot of outside-theclass

work necessary to produce this "show" weekly. There are a myriad details for set-up, lines to be learned, history to be read, child psychology to brush up on. Dan, who serves as host/moderator of the production, quickly rattles off several subtle reminders and a few questions, assessing whether all is in place for the audience scheduled to arrive at any minute. To an outsider, it's organized chaos; for the D2D staff it's energized confidence.


"Who has the history part? Did you remember you're adding a few lines? How do you plan to enter? Who's helping backstage (a makeshift area behind a small curtain hung from a clothes line)?" Following a hasty run-through, there are assurances that all is ready.

Soon, a group of 20-plus students arrive with their teachers. Time for this week's lesson.

The visitors are in rapt attention as the college mentors spin their words of muticulturism amidst slide shows, fast talk, and an art project or two. The action is fast-paced but the young people seem to hang on every word and enthusiastically respond when called upon. Sometimes it's a listening exercise; at other times it's an interactive discussion between the youngsters and their new college friends.

Zachary Smith, a senior from Elmira, NY, majoring in accounting and minoring in marketing, says D2D has "given me the opportunity to broaden my horizons," noting his high school world was just studies and sports. "It's not just a resume builder," he adds, but a vehicle to show there is "more to life than just sports. And you can use it for a bigger purpose, helping other people and having an impact on people's lives." Today he uses his new skills to engage the youngsters at his table in lively discussion.

"Coming out of high school I was just focused on school work," says Gustavo Galvan of Dallas, TX, D2D club president and a junior bachelor of fine arts degree major minoring in marketing and art history. He says he "got hooked" after attending his first event involving diversity in comic strips. Today he is portraying 3-D, the sculptor.



why not use comic book characters

Program students on campus. His interaction with them touched a chord and he realized there was a need to spread the word in a non-threatening, enjoyable way about culture and gender, diversity and equality.

That first year, bolstered with some in-house assistance, Alfred students dressed as famous comic book characters and presented a history lecture with a twist. Dan knew that Alfred Trustee and current chairman of the board Peter Cuneo '67, was CEO of Marvel Comics. Why not use comic books and comic book characters to spread the message? It wasn't long before Peter donated Marvel's services in creating a limited-edition poster which featured some of the most diverse characters in the vast Marvel archive to help launch the program. That same

year, the group applied and received a small grant from MTV's college division.


On the surface, Drawn to Diversity

is a straightforward education program designed to teach history, inspire artists, cultivate dialogue, and fight ignorance. But there is more. Using creative exhibits and programs, Drawn to Diversity has also built an impressive academic research component that explores diversity in identified art or media forms each year. As for the outreach component, sometimes

lecture, other times it is story-telling and art workshops. Depending on the audience's age and needs, the program can take many forms but finds value in promoting visual literacy.

In 2007, Alfred University as a whole began to refocus on service learning. Along with such other initiatives as Green Alfred, Joel's House, and now the Gary Horowitz Service Learning House, D2D realized its potential as a community service initiative. An interactive presentation was created and performed at elementary schools, professional

conferences, and NYC schools for incarcerated youth.

The 2007 theme explored

diversity in newspaper comic strips. Morrie Turner, who in 1965 was the first nationally syndicated African American cartoonist with his Wee Pals comic, created the program's poster. Professional cartoonists visited Alfred and provided drawing lessons

In the spring of 2008, the program evolved into an academic course with advertising as the research topic. Students created educational displays which were presented to Wegman's Food Market executives for in-store consideration. Topics

ranged from the history of the fictional

Aunt Jemima to real successful business entrepreneurs. Alfred received support from Wally Amos, Pepsi Cola, and the family of Madam CJ. Walker.

The fall 2008 semester course has received

grant funding to allow the presentation of the educational program at rural schools in Allegany County.

Although the program has always been open to all students, during fall 2008 more emphasis is on a cross-curricular approach.

"Certainly the art students are invested but there is strong involvement by business, communication studies, history, psychology, education, and performing arts students," says Napolitano. "We also have plans to involve more engineers this year."

The two-credit course is taught on Wednesdays from 3:20-5:10 p.m., except when travels to community groups may require a longer time commitment. Dan is the instructor, with Callie as his co-op assistant. Audiences are not limited to school groups; nursing homes, community centers, libraries, and professional gatherings are all part of the mix.

And it doesn't stop there. The group is continually searching for new partners and resources to enable the program to become firmly established in the University's permanent program list. With hopes of acquiring additional grants and sponsors, Dan believes D2D has the potential to expand in numerous

Dan and some of the newer D2D participants are already researching activities for upcoming years. It's already been decided that in 2009, students will research diversity in film and television animation as Disney plans to unveil its first African-American princess in "The Princess and the Frog." "I can't wait to see how Disney may respond," said Dan.

Plans for Drawn to Diversity in 2010 are under way with Strong Museum of Play, Rochester, NY. The plan is to collaborate on an exhibit which examines diversity in toys and toy design.

One of Dan's bigger "theme dreams" is to get Drawn to Diversity to 2019, the 100th anniversary of the early Harlem Renaissance, the epitome of art intersecting with equality.

"I'd love to have a presence in New York
City by then, with student
internships, perhaps for an entire

semester!"

Art Force Five, the traveling outreach program continues to accept invitations to present in such venues as the NYC Comic Con (vention, the East Coast's biggest and popular culture convention, Feb 6-9, 2009), numerous schools, DC Comics, Nickelodeon, and additional corporate partners.

"Each year we've grown beyond our expectations," Napolitano reflects. "I



<u>The Force Behind</u>



an Napolitano '93, '98 is animated yet low-key when he talks about the program which has evolved from an extracurricular activity to an academic offering and a community outreach program. Typical of his nature, he takes little or no credit for the continually growing success of this program he initiated a little more than three years ago.

"There are dozens of students who have donned these aprons/costumes, sharing their creative talents and using academic research to better the world. They truly are heroes and activists for change," says Dan.

During a presentation to a group of Higher Education Opportunity Program students three years ago, Dan noticed they had a much better response to the visual images he brought than to his lecture. "Visual images are much more powerful as a tool," he says.

With the creative juices flowing and relying on the skills honed while obtaining a bachelor of fine arts degree and a master of science degree in education, he developed a blueprint for taking a diversity message to AU students as well as young people in the area, faculty and staff, Alfred community members, and off-campus professionals. He led the first group of students in the program in working out the specifics as to how to champion equality by exploring various media and art forms.

Dan is no stranger to the good that can be accomplished






when learning is packaged into something fun. He was instrumental in initiating AU's Cultural Café, recognized as best multicultural program in the nation by the National Association of Campus Activities (NACA), and launched the campus "Alfies," — AU's version of the Academy Awards, earning recognition as Best Social Program in the East Coast Region by NACA. He also coordinated the ALANA (African, Latino, Asian, and Native American) organization from 1994-2007, building it into an extracurricular activity in which many

former and current students take pride. Along the way, he was named Outstanding Professional in the Field by NACA-East Coast. (Of course, alumni may best remember him as a founder of "Friday Night Live.")

He's believed in D2D from the start, but the number of people outside the AU community who have taken an interest has surprised him. As much as the success is fulfilling, Dan and his students have much more work to do as they focus their efforts toward raising funds to bring the art and equality message to a national audience.

What he most likes about D2D is that the program "brings out the potential in students as well as Alfred University. It truly uses Alfred's history of equality and creativity through the arts. It's the perfect marriage of two of our greatest strengths."

ome of these artifacts were given away or stored for safe-keeping. Others simply walked away, souvenirs of a late-night dare fulfilled.

Now, Lenka Clayton, artist and the Theodore Randall International Chair in the School of Art & Design, wants to restore the collections – at least through photographs.

Clayton has launched what she calls the "Amnesty for the Lost Artifacts of the Steinheim Museum Project," something she hopes to complete by December when she is scheduled to return to England.

She's been soliciting leads on lost artifacts from alumni, local historians and area residents. She's conducting interviews, trying to track down where pieces of the collection might have gone. Her interest, she stressed, is not in reclaiming the artifacts for Alfred University, but in documenting them in their new surroundings through photographs, just as

photos from bygone days catalog what was once within the Steinheim.

"An eclectic cabinet of curiosities" is how Clayton, a documentary artist, describes the Steinheim in its heyday. "The Steinheim housed an extraordinary collection that included birds, shells, corals, fossils, plants, pottery, glass, American Indian articles, oil paintings, statuary, shoes, stuffed animals, basketry, crockery, costumes, ancient and historical implements, relics, rocks and minerals, and other curios and curiosities, including the skeleton of the first woman prosecuted in Allegany County for murder."

"There are rumors as to the whereabouts of many of the artifacts," said Clayton, who has been collecting the tales since her arrival in Alfred. "A stone lion sits in a garden in Hornell. Some coins are safely stored in the attic of a former faculty member, a portion of the mollusk collection is in a museum in Philadelphia, and two of the oil paintings hang in the Fasano House, Alfred University's new Welcome Center."

How the bits and pieces of the various collections became dispersed is not a happy tale.

Construction on the Steinheim – "stone house" in German – began in the 1870s, when Prof. Ida Kenyon decided to construct a residence on what was then a hillside overlooking the campus of the fledgling university. The Alfred Select School was founded in 1836; by 1857, Alfred University had come into being from those early roots.

Kenyon completed the basement, and then gave up the project. Jonathan Allen, the second president of the University took it over. With memories of English and German

castles as his inspiration, but no formal plans or blueprints, Allen began constructing the castle using 8,000 different varieties of stone collected within a three-mile radius of the museum, Clayton's research found. Allen is said to have wanted "to show men and women what sort of earth we live on."

As his collections grew, so did the museum. Allen simply added on to the structure. Clayton said Allen reportedly said "if there was anything in the world like any portion of the building, he would immediately tear that portion down."

[Clayton's] interest... is not in reclaiming the artifacts for Alfred University, but in documenting them in their new surroundings through photographs.

The interior was just as unique, and a collection all on its own. The woodwork, shelves and cabinets were "made from more than 700 varieties of wood, many with histories of their own," said Clayton. "'There is a railing... made from the spars of vessels sunken by the Merrimac in Hampton Roads, on a piece of the stairway Colonel Ellsworth was shot, a limb of the apple tree under which (Union Army General Ulysses S.) Grant received the surrender of (Confederate Army General Robert E.) General Lee and many other historic relics."




An archival photo showing an interior view from the second story of the Steinheim.

For more than 50 years, the "museum was an inspiration to thousands of students and visitors who travelled from all over the country to visit," Clayton said.

The Museum, she noted, was the first museum to open in Western New York and at one time it had the distinction of being the second-oldest college science museum in the country.

But with Allen's death in 1892, the museum's champion was gone. Over the next 50 years, the museum began to crumble and the stories began to grow. Students dared each other to make midnight forays into the museum, and to prove it with a piece of the collection. It became a rendezvous place for young lovers (back in the days when men and women had separate residence halls, and illicit visits by students of the opposite sex resulted in disciplinary action).

As the structure became more and more dilapidated, the collection was threatened and what Clayton called "uncoordinated rescue efforts" began, leaving "artifacts strewn around various departments of the University and other undocumented safekeeping places in the village."

The Fleet, 16 U.S. battleships painted a blinding white with golden accents, circumnavigated the globe at the behest of President Teddy Roosevelt from December 1907 to February 1909. Ostensibly a gesture of friendship, the Fleet was really a demonstration of America's growing naval power as it visited ports around the world.

Steve says the voyage was intended to "re-establish American might on the world stage of military power. When Roosevelt said 'Speak softly but carry a big stick,' he was referring to the Great White Fleet," explains Steve. Nonetheless, countries, including Japan, welcomed the Fleet's arrival. With six months' advance notice, Steve says, what resulted was "the biggest party Yokohama ever threw for visitors."

It was during the early 1980s, when tensions between the U.S. and Japan were high over trade imbalances created by the influx of Japanese-made cars in the American market, that Steve and Michiko began collecting postcards celebrating the Great White Fleet, and a time when their two countries were cordial.

"I'm glad we started collecting when we did," says Steve. They were able to amass a sizable collection before others entered the market. By 1996, memorabilia was beginning to appear on E-bay, which both made their search easier, and more competitive as other collectors became interested.


While the Levines have collected the full gamut of memorabilia relating to the Great White Fleet in Japan, it is the postcards that perhaps most intrigue them. Steve calls ephemera "the accidental archive." In an article on Great White Fleet ephemera Steve wrote for DARUMA magazine (No. 52, Autumn 2006) he said,

t started as a way to celebrate their bicultural marriage, and their sons' bicultural heritage. After graduating from Alfred University in 1961 with a degree in biology, Stephen J. Levine received his DDS degree from Fairleigh Dickinson's School of Dentistry in 1964. After completing graduate work in prosthodontics at New York University, Steve entered the U.S. Navy and served as a dental officer at the U.S. Naval Base in Yokosuka, Japan, for three years. While there, he fell in love with the Japanese culture, and Michiko, the woman who would be his wife.

Married in 1970, they have two sons: Jonathan, a 1995 alumnus of AU who now lives and teaches in Japan, coaches his school's kendo team and is married to Chihiro, a native of Japan. They have given Steve and Michiko two grandchildren, Naomi who is 5 and Jouji who is 2½ years old. Their other son Michael, also married, is an officer with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, who spends much of his time aboard a NOAA ship.

More than 20 years ago, Steve and Michiko began collecting memorabilia – postcards, medals, invitations, guidebooks, photographs, theater programs and other souvenir items – commemorating the October 1908 visit of the Great White Fleet to Yokohama, Japan.

"Most would agree that the postcard is one of the most ubiquitous of written messages and likewise, that the postcard is one of the most ephemeral of written records... the

postcard might, in fact, turn out to be a historical document and a most unique graphic representation of an important event, one that might not necessarily replicate itself in printed accounts of a more enduring nature."

Postcards, he said, were just beginning their "Golden Age" 100 years ago. Technology had advanced enough to permit more rapid printing of postcards, capturing events, rather than just duplicating formal portraits, and the variety of postcards he and Michiko have collected demonstrate that.


With the 100th anniversary of the Great White Fleet's voyage approaching, the Levines found others interested in their collection. More than 30 images from their collection are included in

Items from their collection are centerpieces of a current exhibition at the History Archive Museum in Yokohama. Steve and Michiko gave a lecture at the Museum in September, and were featured in an article in *Yomiuri Shimbun*, one of Japan's major newspapers, published the day after their lecture.

a book by the Naval History Center.

"We are absolutely amazed at the attention all this has gotten," says Steve, "It has given us even greater pleasure than we imagined in being able to share this with so

many." The Yokohama exhibition closes at the end of the month, but already, a museum in Tokyo has expressed an interest in showing the Levines' collection, as 100-year-old pieces of ephemera forge solid bonds of friendship between Steve and Michiko's two nations.



The new space should be ready for occupancy by the spring semester of 2011.

Manley Memorial Trust to create a lighting laboratory which will complement facilities in the existing Miller Performing Arts Center and the planned proscenium theater. The lighting laboratory will serve as a functional classroom for teaching and training theater students in lighting technology and professional practices, using both contemporary and historic lighting equipment.



Since then, Alan was approached by St. Martin's/Dunne to rework the book, described on the jacket as "A powerful novel of a storm at sea and the crew that tried to survive it," which will be released in late November 2008 as a hardback novel called "Courage."

A Sept. 1, 2008 review by Publisher's Weekly reads: "An authentic-feeling ocean adventure, this slim novel is as much about the craft and lifestyle of seafaring as it is of the sea itself. The story involves a cargo ship in distress during a storm 150 miles off the coast of Ireland in the winter of 1950, and a second ship that sends part of its crew on a

rescue mission. The protagonist, John Driscoll, overcomes a childhood fear of the water to follow the path of a life at sea. Throughout the book, Driscoll, who is dispatched to save the shipwrecked crew, comes to symbolize an attraction to the sea felt by many of the salty characters. Littell's affection for the lifestyle is palpable, and he's especially adept at turning mariner jargon into sharp-edged if strangely musical prose. Readers lacking at least a nodding acquaintance with the seagoing life will want to take a pass, but those with saltwater in their veins will not want to pass this up."

"Alfred International," the first-ever Master of Fine Arts exhibition to be held in an international venue, was held at the School of Design, China Central Academy of Fine Arts (CAFA) in Beijing, People's Republic of China in September.
