GENERAL
INFORMATION

FRESHMAN WEEK

Matriculating Freshmen will form the first ties of their acquaintance with Alfred in the week preceding the beginning of instruction. During this period, they will have an opportunity to gain an insight into the spirit of Alfred's purposes, ideals, and traditions, through an orientation program designed with that end in view.

Freshmen Week will enable members of the incoming class to become settled in their places of residence, and find themselves, in a measure, before the varied activity of actual college begins. A sense of class fellowship and unity can be derived from the intimate associations of these introductory college days, and when the Freshmen are finally welcomed at the annual reception held by the Christian Associations at the Brick, they will have actively stepped into their beginning of Alfred life.

FACULTY RULES

STUDENT ADVISERS

Each student on entering college will be assigned to some member of the Faculty who will act as his adviser until May 1 of the student's sophomore year. At that time the adviser will report to the faculty the student's choice of major and minor subjects. The professor who has charge of the student's major work will then become his adviser.

REGISTRATION RULES

Students will register at the Registrar's office on registration days. A fee of five dollars (\$5.00) will be charged for late registration.

Students are expected to register for no more than 17 hours, but if a student has an average standing of B in the preceding semester he may register for 18 or more hours upon the approval of the Dean and Registrar.

Physical Training and Assembly may be taken in addition to the maximum of 17 hours.

Regulations concerning standings to be maintained by students to entitle them to the privilege of registration the following semester:

Freshmen are required to have an average scholarship index of 0.

Sophomores are required to have an average scholarship index of 0.15.

Juniors are required to have an average scholarship index of 0.25.

Seniors are required to have an average scholarship index of 0.30.

For graduation it is required that a student have an average scholarship index throughout his course of 0.80.

There is no scholarship requirement for major work.

Scholarship indices are explained on page 20 in the college catalogue.

Students desiring to drop a subject for which they have registered, must obtain permission from the instructor, and report to the Registrar's office.

ASSEMBLY

On each Thursday morning at 11:15 o'clock, there is a College Assembly before which one of the instructors or an outside speaker presents a prepared address. One-half a semester hour credit will be allowed for attendance at Assembly, provided absences do not exceed three for the semester.

STANDINGS

The standings of students are reported to them only by letters, and not by percentages.

"A" signifies excellent or superior work; "B" signifies good work or above the average; "C" signifies average or fair work; "D" signifies poor or unsatisfactory work, and is the lowest passing mark; "E" signifies conditioned failure which may be made up by re-examination, or other conditions imposed by the instructor; "I" signifies that work is unfinished; "W" signifies that course has been dropped; "F" signifies failure, which may be made up only by repeating the course in which the grade was received.

A condition or "E" grade shall be given whenever a student has failed to do work of a passing grade, but has done sufficient work to be able to complete the course without repeating the class work. A condition may be removed any time during the following semester. Upon report from the instructor that the condition has been removed, the office will change the grade from "E" to "D."

An *incomplete* (designated by the letter "I") shall be given to the student whose work has been of passing grade but who has not completed the full amount of work required by the end of the semester. An incomplete may be removed during the following semester, when the student has satisfactorily completed the required work. In the semester in which the incomplete is being removed the student shall register for the same and shall pay with his tuition an "incomplete fee" of \$1.00 per hour credit to be obtained for the course.

The grade "W" will be given to all students who drop a course after the second week of the semester and within two weeks prior to the beginning of final examinations. If a student drops a course within two weeks of examination time, the final grade shall be "F". The "W" shall count as (-1) in determining an index. A student may be excused from these penalties by

vote of the faculty for good and sufficient reasons.

When a student has failed to complete one-half of the work required in a course, the final grade will be "F" and not "I."

An incomplete or a condition which is not removed during the next following semester of residence in the college, shall automatically be changed in the office to a failure (F) grade.

No credit is given, except by special vote of the Faculty, for one semester of any course which the instructor has designated to be pursued for a full year.

EXAMINATIONS

Final examinations are held at the close of each semester, and sometime near the middle of each semester, mid-semester examinations are given. Occasionally, written tests are held during the semester. Fees will be charged for all examinations taken by those not regular members of classes or for examinations or announced hour class tests taken at other times than those appointed. The fee for a special examination to take the place of a final examination or a mid-semester examination is \$5. The fee for any special test to take the place of an announced one-hour class test is \$1.

When the student wishes to take a

special examination or class test, he shall bring to the instructor a receipt from the University Treasurer, saying that the fee for the special examination or test has been paid. This receipt must be countersigned by the Dean (or by the Registrar in the absence of the Dean) to show that permission has been obtained to take the special examination. No special examination will be given by an instructor unless this receipt, properly countersigned, has first been presented.

Seniors whose semester standing during the second semester is "A" or not less than "B" in any subject, shall be exempt from final examinations in that subject.

REGULATIONS ON ABSENCES

1. The maximum number of absences allowed per hour credit per semester is three (3). That is, in a two hour course, six (6) absences are allowed; in a three hour course, nine (9); in a five hour course, fifteen (15). Overcutting will reduce the student's grade to "F."

2. In case less than the maximum number of cuts is taken, the instructor will decide to what extent the cuts have affected the student's work, and will give grades accordingly.

3. Students representing the University in athletics, debates, glee club, etc., are to be given special and fair consideration.

4. Students with an index of 2.4 or higher, as determined by the most recent semester or mid-semester standings, are to be exempt from any regulations on absences.

5. Absences two days before and two days after vacations are to be considered as triple cuts.

6. A committee on absences appointed by the President is to be the body of final appeal in all cases where, for any cause whatever, the number of absences exceeds the allowed maximum.

7. Students are to notify the committee of any serious or prolonged illness. Such notices are in all cases to be accompanied by a statement of the attending physician.

8. The coaches are to supply the committee on absences with the names of the students composing the teams playing away from home.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS

1. Books may be retained three weeks with the privilege of renewal except in cases of books for which there is frequent call.

2. A fine of one cent a day, Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays included, will be imposed for all books over due.

3. Books are transferable on cards at the desk. Borrowers are not expected to pass books from one to the other, and in

the event of loss by such practice, the *original borrower* will be held responsible for the value of the book, the amount being determined by the Librarian.

4. Any person abusing the privileges of the library or violating its regulations will be subject to suspension from library privileges at the discretion of the Librarian.

5. **LIBRARY HOURS**—The Library is open for regular work from 8:30 A. M., until 12:00 o'clock, and from 1:30 to 5:30 P. M., on week days. It is also open from 3:00 to 5:00 P. M., on Saturday and Sunday, and from 7:00 to 9:30 P. M., every evening except Thursday and Saturday, on which evening it is open from 7:30 to 9:00 P. M., at which time neither books nor magazines can be drawn, as this time is for study and reading only.

ATHLETICS

All students, unless excused by the Director of Physical Training on the advice of a physician, are required to do one hour in physical training each semester during the freshman and sophomore years, under the supervision of the Director. The required work of the freshman year shall include lectures and gymnasium practice. Sophomores shall elect either advanced gymnasium practice or athletic sports supervised by the department of physical training.

THE HONOR SYSTEM

Art. I. PREAMBLE—The student body of the College of Liberal Arts and the New York State School of Clay-Working and Ceramics at Alfred University creates an Honor System under which each student by his attendance pledges himself to be just; to be fair; to be honorable in all matters relative to or pertaining to scholarship and conduct at this University.

Art. II. ORGANIZATION—The members of the Student Senate shall be a committee to represent the Student Body and deal with all cases involving violation of the Honor System.

Art. III. VIOLATIONS—Sec. 1. Each student is honor-bound to prevent violations. In case of violation of the Honor System in an examination, evidenced by papers on or about a person or by conspicuous open books, or by actions which would indicate cheating, such violation shall be subject to discipline under the Honor System. For work done in the laboratory or at home, the instructor shall define what constitutes breach of the Honor System. Failure to live up to his decision shall be considered a violation. A person detecting a breach of the Honor System shall at once make his displeasure known, if possible, in some fashion as by shaking his head or speaking to the one whose actions indicate a violation, and at his discretion, report the violation to the Senate. Continued violation after the warning, or violation for the second time, must be reported to the Senate. The report to the Senate must be made in person or in writing. A report in writing must be signed.

Sec. 2. The Senate shall have the power to summon the accused and witnesses and

conduct a formal investigation. Punishment for the first offence shall be determined by the Senate. In case of a second conviction during the remainder of the student's college career, recommendation shall be made to the student by the Senate of his separation from college, and, if such separation is not made, the Senate shall then make the same recommendation to the Faculty with a brief resume of the case.

Art. IV. TRIALS—Sec. 1. The trial of the accused shall be conducted as follows: Witnesses against the accused shall be examined first and their testimony taken in full. The accused shall then be called separately and allowed to make his statement, presenting his defense. All witnesses and the accused may be questioned by members of the committee. A decision shall be made, rendered according to the evidence.

Sec. 2. Six (6) out of seven (7) votes shall be necessary for conviction.

Sec. 3. All evidence possible shall be procured in every case, and in no event shall a man be tried the second time for the same offence, except in the light of new and important evidence.

Art. V. OBSERVANCE—Sec. 1. Each student must, in order to make his or her examination or test valid, sign the following pledge: "I pledge my honor that I have neither given nor received aid in this examination," or the declaration: "I do so declare."

Sec. 2. Members of the Faculty shall insist that the above declaration or pledge be attached to every examination paper. Any examination paper lacking this pledge shall be considered void by the instructor

in charge. The instructor must notify any student whose paper lacks the pledge, and give the student the opportunity of signing the said pledge.

Art. VI. DECISIONS—The Student Senate shall keep and preserve a record of all cases acted upon. In no case shall a member of the Student Senate make mention publicly or privately of any case brought before the committee through action of the committee as a body.

Art. VII. ENFORCEMENT—Every student is honor-bound to aid in enforcing this Constitution.

Art. VIII. AMENDMENT—This Constitution may be amended by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of those present at a student body meeting, or a revision may be authorized by a unanimous vote of said student body, and the passage of the revised Constitution shall be secured by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of those present. Notice of this meeting shall be given at least one week previous to time of action, by its reading before the student body or by its publication in "Fiat Lux."

Art. IX. PUBLICATION—Sec. 1. The committee shall make provision for interpreting the Honor System to the members of the Freshmen Class during the first semester of each school year.

Sec. 2. Copies of this Constitution shall be posted in recitation rooms, on College bulletin boards, and in the Library.

Sec. 3. The Constitution shall be published three (3) times during each college year in the "Fiat Lux,"—the first issue of the first semester and the last issue before the final examinations of the first and second semesters.

THE MERIT SYSTEM

1. All officers and members of any student organization or activity in Alfred College or in the New York State School of Clay Working and Ceramics shall be classified according to a definite system of credits, the number of which shall be in proportion to the demand of each office upon the time of the student, as well as upon the honor of the position..

2. An index of 0.5 must be maintained in order to hold any office upon the campus.

3. All teams, organizations, and groups, recognized as existing upon this campus, shall be conducted in accordance with the following eligibility rules:—

At the beginning of the functioning periods of these said bodies, the faculty advisors or executive heads shall submit to the Student Senate a list of those in whom they are interested. The Senate shall obtain their indices for the first preceding official index and notify the responsible parties of any who may not be eligible according to section two above, and any other rules in force at that time.. At the request of the before mentioned parties the Senate shall ask the Dean to obtain the current indices of those previously found to be ineligible, and to determine if they are then eligible. All former ineligible, found to be eligible, shall be allowed to continue in that organization until again found ineligible. All those found ineligible shall not be permitted to represent that organization during the time in which they remain in such state.

4. The activities in which anyone may engage during *any one time* shall be limited to 15 units, subject to such requirements as are otherwise stated.

5. In order to insure that the Merit System shall not work injustice to anyone, the President of the Student Senate, and the President of the Athletic Council, shall sit with a faculty committee, to be known as the Merit System Scale Committee.

STORY OF ALFRED UNIVERSITY

To you young men and young women coming upon the campus of Old Alfred for the first time, coming to make yourselves Alfred's and Alfred yours; to you I say the questions will naturally arise: "How and when and why did Alfred University start," "What has it been?" "How has it become what we now see?" To be sure, there is a spirit and ideal here that you can learn about only by contact and experience with it; but glimpses at the story of its past can be given, which will aid you to learn of its spirit.

It was ninety years ago the fifth day of next December that thirty-seven young people got together in an upper room in one of the eight or ten houses that made up Alfred Center, as it was then called, forming the select school, the seed of Alfred University. The teacher was a young man named Bethuel C. Church. He taught one winter, and was succeeded the second winter by a student from Union College, named James R. Irish. The school was already a success and people had said, "Go to, let us build a school building for our new school." This was done by the fall of 1837. The new building had 28 by 38 feet floor space and was ten feet high to the eaves. It was surmounted by a cupola which caused the students to dub it the "Horned Bug," but more dignified people called it "The Cadmus." It cost \$550.

In 1839, when Mr. Irish resigned, another Union student, famous in Alfred history, took charge and gave his whole life to the building up of Alfred University. When the little select school was chartered as an academy in 1843, his title became Principal, and when it asked in 1857 for a

college charter, but got a university charter, his title was changed to President. He died in the presidential harness ten years later.

Although "The Cadmus" was enlarged, still bigger ideas were incubating. A tract of forest land was bought on the lower slope of Pine Hill (perhaps you are sitting somewhere on it as you read this) and was slowly made to resemble a campus. By 1846, three new buildings appeared on the hillside. Lumber and labor were cheap, much of both was donated, so that the total cost of these structures was \$16,000. There was North Hall, a dormitory, which had a checkered career. It stood about where the Steinheim now stands. In 1868 it was sold to the school district and moved down to the present site of Kanakadea Hall and used as a school house. But its "moving down" propensities had not disappeared, for it was acquired by a private individual and moved still further down the hill and fitted up as a hotel. This private individual was Mr. William C. Burdick, who, in 1896 allowed the University to use the building as a dormitory. Later his heirs gave it to the school. Have you guessed it? Yes, that's it, its present name is—Burdick Hall.

Then, there was old South Hall, a girls' dormitory. It stood where the little observatory now is, and went up in smoke one cold February morning in 1858. Middle Hall, a boarding place, and a home for some of the teachers, stood on that old cellar site south of the Steinheim. Later it came to be the home of President Allen, and just after being wholly remodelled as a college dormitory, it was burned early in 1912.

Meantime the old Chapel (Alumni Hall,

with the quill-pen weather vane), 1852, and the Brick, 1859, so-called to mark its contrast with all the other buildings, which were of wood, appeared. In due time (1863-66) was completed the William A. Rogers Observatory, introducing the name of one of the most famous men in the field of science Alfred has ever possessed.

When President William C. Kenyon ended his labors in 1867, all eyes turned to a member of the faculty, Jonathan Allen, as his logical successor. Professor Allen had been a student in that first select school, and like some of his classmates, had paid his tuition by chopping six cords of four foot wood. He shrank from the task imposed upon him by the trustees, but proved that they and other friends had been right in naming him president, for under his direction Alfred University prospered, and his influence spread far and wide in the land.

In 1879 the unique and beautiful structure called the Steinhelm was finished. It represented many things, including a Rhine castle, the geological formation hereabouts, and in its interior finish, many local woods. The building and its collections were given to the University by its owners, President and Mrs. Allen.

At President Allen's suggestion, a suitable monument to President Kenyon was erected (1882) in the beautiful Kenyon Memorial Hall. The Gothic was a faculty member's home, and was purchased by the University in 1885.

President Allen managed Alfred's affairs for an even quarter of a century, dying in 1892. Professor A. B. Kenyon, as acting-president for a year, and Dean Arthur E. Main as President for two years, brings our story to 1895, when President

Davis began his long and successful service as builder of the New Alfred. Then came others of our familiar buildings: Babcock Hall of Physics (1897), the Ceramie School (1900), Kanakadea Hall (1908), the School of Agriculture (1909), the Carnegie Library (1912), the central heating plant (1917), and Allen Memorial Laboratory (1923). These buildings constitute the ob-vious Alfred of 1926. Again let it be remarked that knowledge of the inner Alfred—the soul of these building and campus—is a matter of slow growth in appreciation. Let me drop one hint. It is said that when South Hall was on fire in 1858, one of the loyal supporters of the school, accompanied by his wife, was riding to town in the old farm wagon. When the pair reached the crest of the hill west of the village and saw the flames and smoke, the wife exclaimed: "South Hall's afire! I see where I wear my old dress another year."

Incidents like this enable us to sense more vividly the meaning of a stanza of Alma Mater which runs:

"She was founded in toil, cemented with blood,
And nurtured through yearnings and tears.
Her treasure, the hearts of brave heroes
who stood
Undaunted throughout trying years.
Each stone was a prayer and her battle-
ments there,
Have memories of purposes strong.
Staunch daughters and sons are her monu-
ments fair.
And they lift up the grateful song."

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

THE STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Students' Association of the College Department of Alfred University.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

Realizing that the Faculty has supreme authority over all matters connected with student life and yet knowing that they are willing to co-operate with the students to promote the welfare of the school, the students have organized themselves into the Students' Association of Alfred University in order to develop a wise and intelligent self-control, to preserve and regulate beneficial customs and traditions of Alfred, to have charge of, and control all college elections, and to assume, whenever expedient, the control of student affairs, all subject to the further provision of this constitution.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. All persons enrolled as students in the College of Liberal Arts and in the New York State School of Clay Working and Ceramics of Alfred University, shall be considered members of this Association.

Section 2. No tax shall be levied for the support of this organization except as may be voted by the Association for any

purpose that the Association may deem necessary.

ARTICLE IV—ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Students' Association shall be headed and represented by a Senate consisting of seven members, three from the Senior class, and two from the Junior class. There shall be in addition to these, one consulting member from each of the two lower classes, and also the President of the Women's Student Government, each of whom shall have a vote.

Section 2. The Senate shall have a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, and such other officers as it may deem necessary. The President, Vice President, and Secretary and Treasurer, shall also act as officers of the Students' Association.

Section 3. The Student Body of Alfred University establishes the principle of official responsibility for the actions of any class upon occasions of class functions. In the event of the class officers' being unable to cope with a situation, they shall report to the President of the Student Senate or any member thereof, who shall take immediate action regarding the situation. If no member of the Student Senate can be found, the officers then shall report to an executive member of the University, such as the President or the Dean.

ARTICLE V—ELECTIONS

Section 1. On the first Thursday in May of each year the Junior and Sophomore classes shall meet and nominate candidates for the Student Senate.

Section 2. Each class shall elect as nominees twice as many as it is entitled to members on the Senate for the following year, namely, six for the Junior class, four for the Sophomore class, and two for the Freshman class. A list of the nominations shall be placed on the bulletin board immediately after the nominations are made.

Section 3. On the following Thursday the election shall take place in a meeting of the Student Body. This meeting shall be presided over by the President of the Senate. He shall appoint tellers to take and count ballots.

Section 4. Nominations from each class shall be listed separately on the ballots. Ballots shall be provided for each, with the names of the candidates written thereon. Each student is entitled to vote for as many candidates as there are members to be elected from each class, which is done by marking off the names of those for whom they do not wish to vote.

Section 5. The three candidates in the Junior class and the two in the Sophomore class having the largest number of votes respectively, shall be declared elected.

Section 6. In case the required number of candidates do not receive a majority of all the votes cast, balloting shall continue until an election is made, the lowest being eliminated at each ballot.

Section 7. The Freshman class shall elect its member some convenient time prior to May 25th of each year.

Section 8. The incoming class of the following year shall elect its member at some convenient time prior to October, 1st.

Section 9. The President shall be elected on the Wednesday following the election of the Senators at a joint meeting of the retiring Senate and the newly elected Senate, presided over by the retiring President.

Section 10. The new Senate shall complete its own organization.

Section 11. A vacancy on the Senate shall be filled by the election by the student body of one of two persons nominated by the class lacking the senator or representative.

ARTICLE VI—ELIGIBILITY

Section 1. The President of the Senate shall be a Senior, and it is desirable that he shall have served on the Senate either as a Senator or a Representative prior to his Senior year. Of the Senior members elected to the Senate, only those who have served such a term on the Senate shall be eligible

for the presidency, unless another be declared eligible by a two-thirds vote of the old and new Senates electing the new president.

Section 2. Members of the Senate shall be eligible for re-election.

Section 3. No member or representative of the Senate shall lose his seat on account of a change in his college ranking.

Section 4. Three consecutive unexcused absences from meetings by any member shall terminate his membership. Excuses shall be presented to the Senate for acceptance or rejection.

Section 5. Any member is liable to impeachment for misconduct in office by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, and can be removed from office by a two-thirds vote of the entire Students' Association.

Section 6. Not more than two members of the Senate shall belong to any one fraternity or sorority. In balloting, no one shall vote for more than two students belonging to any one fraternity or sorority. In the advent of more than two being elected from any one house, a new election shall be held.

ARTICLE VII—MEETINGS OF THE SENATE.

Section 1. The Senate shall hold regular meetings each week at a time set by the Senate at the beginning of each year. All

of the regular business must be performed at this time.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the President at any time.

Section 3. Four members shall constitute a quorum in these meetings provided both Junior and Senior classes are represented.

ARTICLE VIII—POWERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Senate, of the Association, and of the Student Body.

Section 2. The Secretary and Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Senate and of the Association; he shall attend to the correspondence of the Association and perform such other duties as are usually performed by the Secretary of such an organization. He shall also have charge of such funds as are voted by the Association.

Section 2a. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to report to the college office as soon as possible all dates placed on the Calendar.

Section 3. The Senate shall have final authority over all college customs and traditions; it shall regulate and supervise student activities as stated in the constitution and regulations of student activities; it shall have complete charge of all

student elections, except such as are incorporated in the other constitutions; it shall represent the Association in all its relations with the Faculty, Alumni, Trustees, and other exterior bodies; it shall be authorized to use discretionary power in all matters requiring immediate action.

Section 4. The Student Senate shall have power to take cognizance of violation of the Campus Rules and shall be a Court of Last Resort in the interpretation of these rules as provided in the Campus Rules.

Section 5. The Senate shall deal with all cases involving violations of the Honor System as stated in the Honor System Constitution.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Senate to condemn any practice which may be deemed not in accord with the true college spirit; to summon to its meetings individuals indulging in such practice or violating Campus Rules, and in case of proven misconduct, to inflict penalties which it shall deem expedient.

Section 7. In all cases its power may extend to public censure of individuals or groups of individuals for misconduct.

Section 8. The Student Senate, either on its own initiative or upon the suggestion of college officers, shall assume a vigorous control of situations arising in the field of student activities and student government,

for the purpose of preventing excesses and improprieties.

Section 9. Violation of all rules, excepting those set forth in Article II, under Campus Rules, shall be referred to the Student Senate for settlement. The Student Senate and the Campus Court may, or may not, publish the names of convicted offenders, in the Flat Lux.

ARTICLE IX—MEETINGS

Section 1. All meetings of the Association, called for the purpose of elections and amending and revising the Constitution and By-Laws, shall be called by the President through a notice in the issue of the Flat Lux preceding the meeting. All items to be considered shall be included in the announcement of the meeting.

Section 2. Special meetings may be held at the call of the President.

Section 3. Two-thirds of the student body shall constitute a quorum at these meetings.

ARTICLE X

1. The Students' Association shall pay the Christian Associations one dollar per page for publishing in their annual Handbook the revised Constitution and By-Laws of the Students' Association.

2. Any person entitled to the major A may wear the regulation sweater.

3. The Senior Seal shall be worn by Seniors and Alumni only.

4. Dances for the benefit of the Athletic Association shall be managed by a person appointed by the Athletic Council.

ARTICLE XI

Any student transacting any financial business for any student organization or in any activity involving students of Alfred College or School of Ceramics, shall be responsible to a faculty member chosen annually by the student body from among a number suggested by the faculty. Such responsibility will be interpreted to mean a strict accounting of methods and finance at whatever time the auditor chooses. Should any officer fail so to do, the auditor shall suggest an action to that body which placed him in office.

ARTICLE XII—AMENDMENTS

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting, provided such amendments have been read before the Student body; and published in the Flat Lux one week ahead; and have been passed by a two-thirds vote of those present.

Section 2. The Athletic Association Constitution, the Women's Student Government Constitution and the Honor System Constitution may be amended as stated in the different Articles under their respective Constitutions.

Section 3. The Junior and Sophomore classes shall each elect three members from a list of six recommended by the Student Senate, and those elected, with a Junior member of the Senate as Chairman, shall act as a committee for the purpose of amending or supplementing these rules. Such measures as they adopt shall become part of said rules when adopted by the association.

Section 4. This Constitution shall go into effect upon its ratification by the Student Body.

WOMEN'S STUDENT GOVERNMENT

ART. I—NAME

This organization shall be called the Women's Student Government of Alfred University.

ART. II—MEMBERSHIP AND VOTING

Sec. 1. The membership of the Women's Student Government shall consist of all the women students in the College of Liberal Arts of Alfred University. Membership is not compulsory with those whose parents are residents of Alfred. All members shall have equal power of voting, except that the dormitory women (i.e. those residing in Abigail Allen Hall) may not vote on matters

pertaining exclusively to non-dormitory women (i. e. those not residing in Abigail Allen Hall), and that non-dormitory women may not vote on matters pertaining exclusively to dormitory women.

ART. III—PURPOSE—POWER

Sec. 1. The Women's Student Government shall have power to deal with all questions concerning the conduct of its members in their College life, insofar as these are not regulated by the Student Senate, and come within a list of regulations approved by a two-thirds vote of the Women's Student Government, and granted by the Student Life Committee. It shall have power to inflict the penalties to enforce its decisions.

ART. IV—COUNCIL

Sec. 1. The executive and judicial power of the Women's Student Government shall be vested in a council, composed of the president of the organization, the president of Abigail Allen Hall (Brick) and seven other members one of whom shall be an upperclass representative of Morgan Hall, Pi Alpha Pi, and Sigma Chi Nu.

Sec. 2. The president of the Women's Student Government shall be a member of the Student Senate.

Sec. 3. A woman from the Freshman class shall be elected by the class as Fresh-

man representative on the council, without the power of voting.

Sec. 4. All business transacted in council meetings shall be kept secret unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of council.

ART. V—LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES

Sec. 1. The presidents of Abigail Allen Hall, Morgan Hall, Pi Alpha Pi House, Sigma Chi Nu House, and the three dormitory members, shall constitute the legislative committee for said halls.

Sec. 2. The non-dormitory member of the council shall be chairman of a committee of three, members of which shall be elected by the non-dormitory women. This committee shall constitute the legislative committee for non-dormitory members.

ART. VI—ELECTIONS

Sec. 1. The election of the council shall take place the last week in April. At least three weeks prior to the election of the council, the president shall appoint a nominating committee of five members, two of whom shall have been members of the council. The nominating committee shall confer with the president to nominate the members of the council. These nominations shall be posted on the College Bulletin Board at least two weeks prior to the election. After the election of members of the council in April, the new council shall hold joint meetings with the former council un-

til the end of the school year, under the chairmanship of the former president. Both councils shall co-operate and co-ordinate in all the duties of the council, and the new president and council shall assume their duties in September.

Sec. 2. In case there is a vacancy in the council at any time, this vacancy may be filled by vote of the council.

Sec. 3. The representative from the Freshman class shall be elected by the class every two months. No Freshman shall be eligible for representative for more than two months in the year.

Sec. 4. The committee appointed by the president to nominate members of the council shall also act as a committee for the revision of rules.

ART. VII—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The president shall be the executive officer of the organization, and shall call together and preside over all meetings of the organization and council.

Sec. 2. The duties of the vice president shall be to assume the duties of the president in the absence, or at the request of the president.

Sec. 3. The duties of the secretary shall be to keep the minutes of all meetings of the organization.

Sec. 4. The duties of the treasurer shall

be to act as custodian of all funds of the organization, paying bills only by vote of council, and on receipt of an order signed by the President and Secretary of the organization.

Sec. 5. The duties of the non-dormitory legislative committee shall be to meet at least once a month to enforce rules pertaining to non-dormitory women. The duties of the chairman shall be to call meetings of the non-dormitory legislative committee, and to call and preside over such meetings of non-dormitory women as are necessary for the administration of non-dormitory business. The president of the Women's Student Government has power to call special meetings of this committee whenever she deems it necessary.

ART. VIII—ELIGIBILITY

Sec. 1. The President of the Women's Student Government shall be a Senior, and she shall have preferably served on the council, either as a representative or as a member prior to her Senior year

Sec. 2. Three unexcused absences from Council meetings by a member shall disqualify her from office.

Sec. 3. Any member is liable to impeachment for misconduct in office by a two-thirds vote of the Council and may be removed from office by a two-thirds vote of the entire Women's Student Government.

ART. IX

A quorum of the Women's Student Government shall consist of at least two-thirds of its members.

ART. X

Six members of the council shall constitute a quorum, and no action shall be taken by the council upon the agreement of five voting members.

ART. XI—MEETINGS

Sec. 1. The President of the Organization with the advice of the Council, shall call a meeting whenever sufficient business demands it. Attendance at these meetings shall be compulsory.

Sec. 2. The council shall meet regularly every week for discussion of matters and for the transaction of such business as is necessary.

ART. XII—PUBLICITY

Sec. 1. Each member of the organization shall be supplied with a copy of the Constitution and Regulations of the Women's Student Government at the beginning of each College year. The Constitution and the Regulations shall be read by the president to the freshman class at its first meeting.

ART. XIII—AMENDMENTS

Sec. 1. This Constitution may be amend-

ed by a two-thirds vote (of a quorum) of the organization.

REGULATIONS

ART. I—PREAMBLE

Sec. 1. The Women's Student Government heartily believes that normal comradeship between young men and young women, in mutual respect and reverence, in fine self-direction and self-control are essential to the co-operation of social life and activities with the claims of health and scholarship.

The following regulations are an attempt to adapt the members of this organization to the special conditions of the college community. This organization expects its members to be guided by the underlying principles of wholesome social relationships in all situations whether covered by these definite statements or not. Disregard of these principles or violations of the regulations will be considered sufficient grounds for imposing penalties.

ART. II—CLOSING HOURS

Sec. 1. Seniors shall be at their places of residence by 10:00 P. M. except on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights, when the hour shall be 10:30 P. M.

Sec. 2. Juniors shall be at their places of residence by 9:30 P. M. except Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights, when the hour shall be 10:30 P. M.

Sec. 3. Sophomores shall be at their places of residence by 9:30 P. M. except Friday and Sunday nights when the hour shall be 10:00 P. M., and Saturday night when the hour shall be 10:30 P. M.

Sec. 4. Freshmen shall be at their places of residence by 9:00 P. M., except Friday and Sunday nights when the hour shall be 10:00 P. M., and Saturday night when the hour shall be 10:30 P. M. Beginning May 1, closing hours for Freshmen shall be 9:30 instead of 9:00 P. M.

Sec. 5. Women not attending college dances on the college calendar shall observe 10:30 o'clock P. M. closing hours and shall be permitted to go to Hornell or elsewhere without such action being counted as a special permission, although of course, with proper chaperonage, and after permission has been granted.

ART. III—SPECIAL PERMISSIONS

Sec. 1. Special permission from the Council must be obtained for all in town and all out-of-town parties and entertainments lasting later than the closing hours specified in Article II, sections 1, 2, 3, 4, although supervised by the Student Life Committee, or granted by the Student Senate, but not on the College Calendar.

Sec. 2. Applications for special permission to attend parties or entertainments not on the college calendar, and lasting

later than closing hours, must be made to the Council before 7:00 o'clock P. M. of the day of the occasion, in order to give the Council opportunity to grant or reject the permission as is advisable.

Sec. 3. Application for special permission shall be made in the form of a petition signed by the applicant, delivered to the president of the organization. In order to grant permission, the petition must be signed by the president of the organization and one other upperclass representative on the Council. No more than six permissions shall be granted a semester unless the applicant has an index of 2.

Sec. 4. Women attending functions for which special permission has been granted shall be in their places of residence not later than 12:15 P. M.

Sec. 5. Closing hours for all women shall be 10:30 P. M. during vacation except when special permission has been granted by some authorized member of the Council.

Sec. 6. Women shall be allowed to go to the restaurant any night after functions on the college calendar. Forty-five minutes only shall be allowed for restaurant privileges.

Sec. 7. A Senior woman may chaperone a group of girls until twelve o'clock on special occasions, such a permission being granted by the Dean of Women and made known to the president of the organization.

A group composed of girls only, and other than Freshmen, may attend out of town functions unchaperoned until their closing hours.

Sec. 8. Out-of-town permission during vacations must be obtained from the matron or house chaperone. Whenever a girl returns early to college during vacation she shall at once notify the matron of her return.

ART. IV—ENTERTAINING

Sec. 1. Entertaining shall be regulated as follows: Members of the organization may entertain on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday evenings, and on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Young men will call at other times only as escorts.

Sec. 2. Whenever vacation rules are in effect entertaining shall be confined to afternoons and evenings only.

ART. V—CHAPERONAGE

Sec. 1. Groups of not over eight people attending evening parties, picnics or automobile rides, not lasting later than the closing hours specified in Article II, Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4, may be chaperoned by a Senior woman, provision for such chaperonage having been made with the council or president of the organization. Parties of more than eight people, and lasting later than closing hours, shall be referred to the

regulations on chaperonage of the Dean of Women.

Sec. 2. "Not lasting after closing hours" in Sec. 1 of this article shall be interpreted to mean that women shall be at their places of residence at the closing hours specified in Article II.

Sec. 3. Any woman, other than a Senior, going on picnics not lasting later than eight o'clock must sign her name in a book provided for that purpose, and must check off in person her name, stating time of return.

Sec. 4. Any woman, other than a Senior going on automobile rides taking her out-of-town for more than half a day, shall sign her name and destination in a book provided for that purpose or shall make the same known to the matron or chaperone of the house.

Sec. 5. A Freshman woman with an escort must be chaperoned by an upper-class woman until 8 o'clock on picnics, hikes, automobile rides, and on any occasion taking her outside of the town limits: and after 8 o'clock must be accompanied by a Senior woman. This ruling applies to all Freshmen women until Christmas vacation.

ART. VI

Sec. 1. After a careful and thorough explanation of the rules by the president

of the organization, the Freshmen shall be required to pass an examination on the rules and regulations pertaining to W. S. G. attaining at least a B Grade on such an examination. This shall be conducted by the council not later than Nov. 1. In case anyone fails to pass this examination—due punishment will be inflicted until the grade is attained.

Sec. 2. Provision shall be made to send the President of the Women's Student Government to the Annual Inter-Collegiate Student Government Convention. In case the President cannot go, another delegate shall be elected by the organization from either the Junior or Senior Class.

ART. VII

Sec. 1. Any member upon leaving town shall leave, with the person in authority at the place at which she is rooming, information as to where she is going, and her address while out of town.

ART. VIII—DUES

Sec. 1. Each member shall be assessed \$1.00 a year. This amount should be paid to the treasurer during the last week of November.

Sec. 2. Provision shall be made to send the President of Women's Student Government, and a Junior representative, to the annual Inter-collegiate Student Government Convention.

ART. IX—ENFORCEMENT

Sec. 1. Each member of the Women's Student Government is honor bound to observe and to co-operate in enforcing this system of government.

ART. X

Smoking on the part of any college woman, while under college jurisdiction, is strictly prohibited.

CAMPUS COURT

Art. I. NAME—The name of this organization shall be the Student Campus Court.

Art. II. PURPOSE—Sec. 1. The purpose of this court shall be to uphold Alfred traditions and campus rules.

Sec. 2. To bring male offenders, underclassmen, against such traditions and rules up for trial.

Sec. 3. To prosecute offenders by suitable and just punishment for any infringements of said traditions and rules.

Art. III. ORGANIZATION—Sec. 1. The court shall consist of twelve Sophomore jurors, two Junior examiners, and one Senior judge.

Sec. 2. The court shall be elected in the following manner: each fraternity shall elect two Sophomore representatives and one alternate, and the non-fraternity group shall elect four Sophomore representatives and two alternates. These elections shall take place at the beginning of each college year.

Sec. 3. The two Junior examiners, one alternate, and a Senior judge, shall be elected by the old court (Sophomore jurors), and shall take office the first meeting in May previous to their term of office.

Sec. 4. The Secretary, and any other officer deemed necessary by the Court, shall be elected at the first meeting of each year from the Sophomore jurors.

Sec. 5. Nine Sophomore members shall constitute a quorum of the jury.

Sec. 6. A two-thirds vote of the jurors present shall be necessary for conviction.

Sec. 7. Upperclass students of the college may be spectators at meetings, but shall take no part in the proceedings.

Art. IV. **EXPULSION**—Sec. 1. By a three quarter vote of the court any member may be expelled because of attitude, absence from meetings, or any other reasons which hinder the harmony and functioning of the body.

Sec. 2. In case of expulsion, the organization for which the expelled man is a member, is entitled to elect his successor. This shall be done before the next meeting of the body.

Art. V. **MEETINGS**—Sec. 1. The court shall decide upon a regular time and meeting place for all its sessions.

Sec. 2. The court shall meet and perform its duties regularly each week.

Art. VI. **REVISIONS**—In order to revise the constitution of this court a three-fourths' vote of the said court is necessary.

DEPT. OF CAMPUS DUTIES

Art. I. **NAME**—The name of this organization shall be "The Department of Campus Duties."

Art. II. **Sec. 1. OBJECT**—To create an efficiently functioning organization for the purpose of obtaining a fair and equal distribution of Campus Duties, and the carrying out of said Duties.

Sec. 2. JURISDICTION—The Student Senate shall have direct jurisdiction over all actions of the Department.

Art. III. **Sec. 1. OFFICERS**—There shall be one Administrator and two Assistant Administrators.

Sec. 2. ELECTIONS—The Administrator must be a Senior appointed by a majority vote of the Student Senate.

(1) One of the two Assistant Administrators, who must be Juniors, shall be elected to the position of Administrator at the second meeting of the Senate in May. *Note.* If the Junior, elected to succeed the Administrator, fails to return to school or fails to continue after having served part of his term, the other Junior Assistant automatically becomes the Administrator.

(2) Sophomores, who desire to become Assistant Administrators, shall make application to the Secretary of the Student Senate not later than May 15, and said body shall, by an elimination vote, elect two who shall become Assistant Administrators for their Junior year. A third and fourth choice shall also be made. *Note.* In case either or both Sophomores, elected to the position of Assistant Administrator, shall fail to return to school, or

fail after entering school, for their Junior year, to continue with their duties, the Senate shall, by a majority vote, elect one in place of the Assistant Administrator from the third and fourth choice or in case of both, the third and fourth choice shall automatically be elected to the positions of Assistant Administrators.

Art. IV. Sec. 1. CAMPUS DUTIES—The following list shall constitute the activities in which Freshmen shall be called upon for work: Football, Track and Field, Cross Country, Wrestling, Tennis, Kanakadea, Fiat Lux, Athletic Association, and any other duties sanctioned by the Student Senate.

Sec. 2. DUTIES OF ADMINISTRATOR—The Administrator, upon receipt of a written requisition from the Manager, shall select the number of eligible Freshmen required, and place the names upon official stationery, stating time, place of reporting, date, and the amount and kind of work. This shall be signed by himself and posted at least 24 hours before the men are to report. *Note.* Managers shall report to the Administrator on the results of the working lists, giving names of those not reporting, lateness, and any additional information which he feels may prove beneficial.

Sec. 3 DUTIES OF ASSISTANTS—The Assistant Administrators shall perform duties prescribed for them by the Administrator, and shall endeavor to become familiar with every phase of the department.

Art. V. EXCUSES FROM CAMPUS DUTIES
Sec. 1. Under the following conditions Freshmen may be excused, by the Admin-

istrator, from active participation in Campus Duties:

(1) No Freshman shall be excused from Campus Duties because of extra-curricular activities until the Administrator has been officially notified that said Freshman has been elected to a position on one or more of the following organizations: Glee Club, Band, Fiat Lux, Cheer Leaders, Squad. An official notification shall set forth the necessary information concerning the above ruling, and shall be signed by the official head of the organization concerned.

(2) Managers shall hand to the Administrator the names of candidates in their particular Athletic Activity by the day following the first meeting of the candidates. These men shall be excused from all campus duties. *Note.* When a candidate shall have failed twice to report, for insufficient reasons, the manager shall notify the Administrator by the day following the second absence, and the name shall be placed on the active working list.

Sec. 2. If the Administrator deems it necessary, he shall report to the Student Senate the names of those Freshmen who fail to co-operate in the accomplishment of Campus Duties, or who have been necessarily excused because of illness or physical deformity, or any other reason which the Administrator deems sufficient.

Art. VI. Sec. 1. By-LAWS—The Senate shall request information from the Administrator concerning the qualifications of the applying Sophomores and the two Assistant Administrators with reference to elections or promotions. The Administrator shall, upon request from the Senate, name his choice or choices in both cases.

(1). If a Sophomore, who is a member of the Senate, is also an applicant for the position of Assistant Administrator, he shall not be allowed to be present at the election of the two men, who shall become Assistant Administrators the following year. He may, however, be present at the election of the Administrator.

(2). If one or both of the Juniors are members of the Senate, and also Assistant Administrators, they shall not be present at the election of the Administrator for the following year, but may be present at the election of the two Assistant Administrators and the third and fourth choice.

CAMPUS RULES

ARTICLE I

The Campus Rules shall be incorporated into the By-Laws of the Constitution of the Students' Association of the College Department of Alfred University.

ARTICLE II—FRESHMAN RULES

1. All Freshmen shall wear the regulation cap or toque throughout the first semester, and during the second semester, until Moving-Up Day. Freshmen entering College the second semester shall wear the cap or toque in accordance with the above rules for the second semester and the first semester of the next year, unless excused by the Senate. Freshmen shall not, in any way, alter the appearance of the regulation cap or toque, which shall be

worn conspicuously upon the head every day in the week including half holidays, the exceptions being from 6 o'clock Friday night until Monday morning, vacations, and when, but not until the student is out of town.

2. Freshmen are prohibited from wearing prep. school emblems, and monograms of any athletic association except that of Alfred.

3. Freshmen shall neither smoke, nor chew tobacco, except in private dwellings and Burdick Hall, and all University students including students of N. Y. S. A. and A. H. S. are prohibited from smoking on the campus, as herein defined; that portion of land within the following boundaries: Kanakadea Creek. Pine Street extended, the fence above the Steinhelm and pumping house, and a line which will be a continuation of Ford St., to meet the other two boundaries. In addition to this shall be included the Park, Library Square, the Tennis Court, and the Athletic Field. At the beginning of each school year a map of the campus shall be posted in some public place.

4. All Freshmen and Freshmen Specials shall report for duty when so directed by a notice, posted at least twenty-four hours in advance of the time at which they shall be required to appear, and signed

by the Campus Administrator. In the advent of a contingency, the Campus Administrator may be empowered by the President of the Student Senate, to obtain Freshmen labor without formal notice.

5. None but Seniors shall carry canes.

6. Freshmen shall be required to hold open the chapel doors every morning until the student body shall have passed out. This is to take effect after the first assembly. The student body shall pass out according to classes in the following order: Seniors, Juniors, Sophomores, Freshmen, Specials; the whole body standing at once upon the dismissal of chapel.

7. Freshmen shall be strictly required to observe all the rules of common courtesy, and shall show due respect to University Faculty and Upperclassmen by touching caps, giving preference in entering and leaving buildings, on the tennis courts, etc. They shall also, when walking in company with an upperclassman, carry any books or parcels of said upperclassman.

8. Freshmen must carry matches for upperclassmen.

9. Freshmen shall learn the Alma Mater before October 15.

10. Freshmen must attend all college assemblies and mass meetings, and all Varsity games held at Alfred unless excused by the Senate. Application for ex-

cuse must be written and given to a Senator 12 hours beforehand (exceptions may be made in emergencies).

11. Freshmen shall not wear knickers or white trousers. During the time when they are wearing Freshman caps, both Freshmen men and women shall wear black and only black hose. Also during this time Freshmen men shall wear black ties, as shall Freshmen women when they are wearing blouses with which ties can be worn.

12. All Freshmen shall keep off the grass on the campus west of the Kanakadea, and shall not trespass on that section of the Campus bounded by Park and University Streets, and the cement walks leading to Academy Hall.

13. It shall be the special duty of Sophomores to report violations of Campus Rules by the Freshmen to the Campus Court, though violations may be reported by members of any class.

14. Moving-Up Day shall be on the last Thursday before Decoration Day, and shall entitle all Freshmen, not affected to the contrary by either Student Senate or Campus Court decree, to Sophomore privileges.

15. Men of the Freshmen Class who violate such Campus Rules as set forth in Article II, shall be tried and sentenced by the Campus Court, whose members shall

execute, or cause to be executed, all decisions rendered by that body.

ARTICLE III—CLASS CONTESTS

1. The only conditioned students allowed to take part in these contests are first year students. Upperclassmen shall not take part except as here-in-after stated.

2. The officials of all athletic class contests shall be upperclassmen in connection with the physical director.

Legitimate contests shall consist of procs. football, basketball, track, tennis, debates, and cross-country.

3. The Freshman class must challenge the Sophomore class in writing to the following contests: football, basketball, baseball, track, tennis, debates, and cross-country.

4. If in any case the Freshmen fail so to challenge in these latter contests, it shall count a victory for the Sophomore class, unless by previous vote of both classes it is decided to omit such contests.

ARTICLE IV—PROCS

1. A real *proc* shall consist of a piece of paper or some other material not smaller than one square foot, *bearing the name of the class which posts it*. A false proc may be identified with a real proc in every respect save that it must *not* bear the name of the class which posts it.

2. To win the proc contest, the Freshmen must remove or deface all but one of

the procs which the Sophomores shall post according to the conditions of the following sections of this article.

3. Procs shall be posted only during the week beginning on Monday following the opening of College and ending on Friday of the same week. They shall not be more than ten in number. They must be posted in the open; that is, they must not be concealed by any moveable object, nor in any building, nor above eight feet from the ground, measurement to be made from the center of the proc. Both false and real procs must be posted so that all the proc itself as well as any printing on it is visible. *All real procs must be posted on the same day*. A false proc and a real proc must not be posted on the same day, nor shall real procs of more than one color be posted.

4. No proc shall be posted after the first one has been removed or defaced by the Freshmen, or after six A. M.

5. The ringing of the chapel bell before 6:30 A. M. shall be the signal that the first real proc has been removed. If the bell is rung by or for the Freshmen before any real proc has been removed or defaced, the contest shall be considered a victory for the Sophomores. *The ringing of the bell on the removal of a false proc gives the contest to the Sophomores*. At six A. M. the chapel bell shall be rung by a

Senior member of the Senate as a signal that the contest is closed for the day. The chapel bell must be accessible at all times.

6. No mechanical means of detention shall be permitted by either class.

SOCIAL REGULATIONS

There is a college Committee on Student Life which has advisory supervision of activities in which the interests of the students in general are involved. This committee is guided in its action by the following general regulations concerning:

(A) Committee on Student Life.

1. It shall be the duty of this Committee to supervise student life in dormitories, i. e., Ladies Hall, Burdick Hall, Sororities and Fraternities.

2. The Committee shall have complete supervision over the boarding and rooming places of all college students both within and without the dormitories.

3. The Committee shall have supervision over all student social functions and amusements. Students desiring to promote any entertainment, party, class affair, dance, etc., (this to include the so-called vacation dances), shall first make application to the Student Senate, as provided in the constitution of the Students' Association. All permissions granted shall at once be submitted for approval to the Dean of

Women, who shall also approve the chap-erones for such functions.

4. The Committee shall be a regular medium of intercourse between students and faculty. It shall be its duty at all times to advise with the Student Senate and make suggestions to it bearing on matters of student conduct and self-government. The Student Senate will confer with this Committee on any or all matters of student interest.

5. One member of the Committee, a woman, shall act as adviser to women, and one, a man, as adviser to men.

(B) Dancing.

1. That there shall be no dancing in any University building, except when approved by the Student Life Committee.

2. That all dancing shall be subject to the supervision of the Committee on Student Life.

3. During the week-end, private out-of-town dances of which the organization is satisfactory to the Student Life Committee, may be attended if satisfactory arrangements for spending the night are made with the Dean of Women.

4. No out-of-town dances are to be attended during the week except by special arrangement with the Dean of Women.

(C) Rooming.

1. A register of proper accommodations for students is maintained and supervised by the Committee on Student Life.

2. Men and women shall not room in the same building except with approval of the Committee on Student Life.

3. Young ladies shall be expected to engage rooms and board at the Ladies Hall unless they can show cause to the contrary.

4. Young women may not call at Burlick Hall or at any of the men's club houses or meet young men at the houses where they room. Young men and young women are absolutely forbidden to go to each others' rooms for any purpose, except by special permission which may be granted to brothers and sisters.

5. No out-of-town dances are to be attended during the week, except by special arrangement with the Dean of Women.

(D) Chaperonage.

1. All evening picnics and drives, and all evening out-of-town parties, must be arranged beforehand with the Dean of Women and President of the U. S. G., and provision made for proper chaperonage.

3. When a woman is invited to visit at the home of a man she must show to the Dean of Women permission from home and an invitation from the man's mother or other member of his family.

4. When a woman is invited to visit other than a college woman or other than a near relative, it is necessary to show to the Dean of Women permission from home.

5. Women returning to college from home must be at houses of residence by closing time.

(E) The above social regulations hold for holidays, Christmas, Thanksgiving, and Easter vacations and Commencement Week, and also apply to the day before the beginning of any semester and after the close of the semester.

(F) Student Activities.

1. That the Faculty put itself on record as being in hearty sympathy with the regulation of the Student Senate that no social event or evening entertainment be permitted in the week preceeding semester examination.

2. That no student be allowed to participate in dramatics—except in credit courses in the drama, in instrumental or inter-collegiate athletic contests, to be on the staff of the Flat or of the Kanakadea, to be a member of the Glee Club, or to hold an executive office in any organization connected with the University, who has not achieved or does not attain an index of .5.

3. That no other than University and college dances be given on the calendar of university events.

4. That students be allowed to hold office and participate in student activities only as directed by the Merit System.

PUBLICATIONS

THE FIAT LUX is the University paper, published weekly during the college year by a board of editors chosen by competition from the students. An editor-in-chief, usually a Senior elected by the staff, administers the policy of the paper in consultation with that body. Each college student automatically subscribes to the Fiat Lux when he matriculates, the cost of his subscription being included in the semester bill.

THE KANAKADEA is the University year-book published under the direction of the Junior class. It contains the annual record of all student activities, and the three-year history of the Junior Class, with individual pictures and records. The Kana-kadea staff is headed by a Junior editor-in-chief and associates, selected by the class. A board of Junior section editors, selected by competition, together with representatives elected by each other class, and a number of assistants from the two lower classes, complete the staff.

ATHLETICS

Athletics are the spice of college life, and without them there is little to keep up college spirit. They do not pay financially, but successful teams form the best physical training department a college can have.

At Alfred, athletics take the following forms: Football, basketball, cross country, track, wrestling, and tennis. Whatever has been Alfred's success in athletics is due, in a large measure, to the fact that every able-bodied Freshman has entered some activity, and that places on the various teams have been objects of keen competition. Since the one year ruling has gone into effect at Alfred in relation to New York State Conference games, Freshman teams have generally improved in strength and performance, and play active schedules. Freshmen who play on these teams are awarded class numerals, and those who play on Varsity squads in non-conference games may be eligible to receive varsity letters, certificates from the Athletic Association, and incidental awards.

Athletics are also furthered by schedules of interclass competitions, chiefly between the underclasses; and intramural sports which are administered by the Intramural Athletic Association under the supervision of the Director of Athletics. In these latter sports, some trophy is usually provided.

With steadily increasing athletic facilities in an improved Merrill Field with a new field house, and Davis Gymnasium, now under construction and in use, Alfred athletics cannot fail to show the effect of such progress in more winning teams and spirit. The completion of Davis Gym-

nasium will satisfy a long-felt need in providing a gymnasium adequate to the needs of Alfred in every respect—including basketball courts, indoor track, swimming pool, locker-rooms and showers, and offices of athletic administration.

FOOTBALL, despite set-backs arising from the re-grading and repair of Merrill Field, has continued to occupy the center of interest in Alfred sports. Alfred has had strong winning teams, and it is possible to have another. Now that Coach Heers, formerly of Syracuse, has undertaken the destiny of the eleven, prospects for success seem distinctly favorable. A Freshman team, with a good schedule, will call for a number of candidates shortly after the opening of the fall term.

BASKETBALL has won considerable prominence, as a result of both the excellence of the team and the popularity of the sport. The team successfully plays difficult schedules, and makes extensive trips, showing a steady increase in success and ability each year. A Freshman team usually plays a number of games, with several trips.

CROSS COUNTRY has proved itself Alfred's most successful sport. Last season, under the coaching of "Doc" Ferguson, the team won the Middle Atlantic States Cross-Country Championship, and defeated some of the best cross country teams in the east. The success of the team has probably contributed more to Alfred's prominence than any other sport.

TRACK, closely allied to cross country, has shown a rapid rise in popularity and success along with that sport. The team

has ably acquitted itself in competition with strong opponents, and last season won the first New York State Conference Track Championship. In addition, the team for the past two years has been an active threat for the Middle Atlantic Track Championship.

WRESTLING, now a high point of interest in Alfred sports, has taken rapid strides ahead in the last two years, and promises much for the future. Coach Seidlin, who wrestled for Cornell under Coach O'Connell, saw his charges through a successful schedule last season. As a means to physical development, wrestling has no peer, and offers much to inexperienced candidates for the team.

TENNIS includes a university tournament and several matches with outside teams. Although seriously hampered by the lack of adequate court facilities, the tennis team successfully played both in outside and intercollegiate matches last season, and bids strongly for popularity among students.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. In order to be eligible to play on Athletic teams, a student must be regularly enrolled in one of the four colleges courses, or as a special student, and must take a minimum of sixteen semester hours per week, doing full work in a regular course as defined in the curriculum.

2. In order to be eligible to play on Athletic teams, a student must have attained in the last official index, a minimum index of 0.50. Immediately after every official index, those persons whose index is below 0.50 may have two weeks in which to raise the index to the necessary 0.50 before being dropped from the team.

3. Beginning with the fall of 1926, no student shall participate in New York State Conference games until he shall have been in attendance for one full collegiate year subsequent to attaining the equivalent of Freshman rank in the Liberal Arts and Science course, in Ceramic Engineering, or Applied Art.

4. No student shall participate in Conference games for more than three years in the aggregate, and any member of the team who plays in any part of a Conference Athletic contest does thereby participate in Athletics for the year.

5. No student shall play in any game under an assumed name.

6. A student who participates in Inter-collegiate Athletics and does not complete the work of that semester shall not be permitted to compete in the same sport in his next year of residence.

7. No person shall be admitted to any collegiate contest who receives any gift, re-

muneration, or pay for his service on the college team, except such team awards as may be authorized by the Athletic Council and Committee on Athletics.

8. No member of the faculty of Alfred University shall participate in any inter-collegiate or inter-scholastic contest.

9. The second team shall consist of only those men who have regularly participated in practice against the varsity. The second team shall be under the jurisdiction of the coach, and no group of men other than the above stated shall represent the University in any form of athletics.

10. A candidate for a position on a team shall present himself to the chairman of the Athletic Committee and sign the following declaration.

Amateur Standing Card

I herein assert that I never played athletics professionally. I herein further assert that while in College, I will enter into no athletic contests other than those that appear on the athletic calendar of Alfred University, or such special cases as may be decided on their merits by the Athletic Committee.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. The coach shall have complete jurisdiction of the team in all matters of conduct. He shall be required to suspend

from the team, for a time commensurate with the offence, any person guilty of immoral, ungentlemanly, or unsportsmanlike conduct.

2. The Coach will report to the Committee on Absences immediately after an out-of-town game the names of the students, who have participated in the contest, and the time when they left Alfred and when they returned to Alfred. This information is for the use of the Committee on Absences.

3. No body of students exceeding four in number (two in basket ball) shall take part in any games played out of town, outside of the regular schedule approved by the athletic committee.

4. Match games shall not be played on either Saturday or Sunday except by special permission of the President.

5. No more than one game of basketball, baseball, or football shall be played in any one week, except when the team can profitably play a series of games on any one trip away from home. Extra games may be played on days when classes are not in session. (See rules 2 and 3).

6. The Faculty permits the following teams to make schedules:—football team, women's basketball team, men's basketball team, track team, tennis team, cross country team, and wrestling team; also the corresponding second teams.

7. See also "Merit System."

ATHLETIC FINANCE

A departure in athletics was witnessed in the year 1915-16, when the hitherto separate athletic interests of the college and agricultural departments were combined into an all-university association.

Under the new arrangement, athletics are controlled in the college by the Athletic Council consisting of twelve councilors, eight from the college and four from Ag School. A committee of four faculty members acts in an advisory capacity to the Council. The Council formulates the general policy to be pursued, while the execution of the plans is effected by the Graduate Manager, who has broad powers. Under the Graduate Manager are managers and assistants, elected by a board consisting of the Coach, the Graduate Manager, and the President of the Athletic Association for work in specified sports.

Financial support is secured through membership, payment of dues and receipts from games.

Every college student becomes a member of the Association upon payment of his tuition bill, which includes an athletic tax of \$10.00 a year, making all bona fide members with all rights to hold office under the Association's supervision. By vote of its student body, the Agricultural School assesses itself.

THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. The name of this Association is the Alfred University Athletic Association.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT

Section 1. The object of the association is to train the physical part of men and women through games, contests, and athletics.

Section 2. To promote between Inter-scholastic and Intercollegiate Institutions, Athletic Contests.

Section 3. To raise funds for the promotion of such enterprises.

Section 4. To purchase, lease, hold or take by deed such buildings and other real estate as may be found consistent in the transaction of such purposes, and to equip and improve them in such a way as to make them best fitted to maintain such a business. The association may run such business enterprises that may indirectly or directly raise funds for such maintenance.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Athletic Association of Alfred University shall be President, Vice President and Secretary, elected by the student Athletic Council from among the councilors, and shall hold the same offices in the Association as in the Council.

Section 2. To give centralized direction, the Athletic Council shall be composed of twelve representatives, called Councilors, elected by ballot, from the students of the College and of the State School of Ceramics, four from each of the two upper classes, one from each class to be a woman; two representatives from each of the two under classes. During the first week in May representatives from the next year's upper classes shall be elected. The Freshmen representatives shall be elected during the second week of October. When the acting president of the council shall have received the names of those elected in May, he shall call a meeting of the ten members, who shall elect their president, vice president, and secretary, and shall organize the council for the ensuing year. The term of office of the council shall begin as soon as practicable after the elections. The first meeting is at the call of the President, and subsequently weekly meetings shall be arranged. The chairman of the Faculty Athletic Committee, the Director of Athletics, the Coach and the Graduate or Faculty Manager are non-voting members of the council, sitting in an advisory capacity. The business managers of the various departments and captains of the various teams shall attend council meetings at the summons of the President.

Section 3. The University Treasurer shall be custodian of the Jumph Injury Fund. The Graduate Manager may recommend payment of certain bills of direct concern to the purpose of the Fund.

Two assistant managers shall also be appointed by the council, their terms of office to be one year.

Section 4. The Graduate or Faculty Manager shall be appointed by the Alumni Advisory Board on Athletics from a list of three names to be submitted annually, or whenever a vacancy exists, by a majority vote of the members of the Athletic Association, and he shall hold office during the approval of the Advisory Board. In case no names are presented, or those presented are unsatisfactory to the Board, an appointment may be made by the unanimous vote of the Advisory Board. The Graduate or Faculty Manager shall be bonded to the Association to the extent of \$500. The Graduate or Faculty Manager shall receive such remuneration for his services and expenses as may be approved by the Advisory Board, and such remuneration shall be paid from any funds received by the Advisory Board for the promotion of athletics. The Graduate or Faculty Manager shall also inventory all property and make account of wear and tear on equipment. The department equipment shall be deposited with him and surrendered to the departmental man-

ager on a regular account basis, to be held each seasonable year.

The Alumni Advisory Board on Athletics shall be responsible for all debts incurred by the Association.

The Graduate or Faculty Manager shall be a member of the association and shall be subject to the articles of the constitution. He shall submit at the end of each term a complete financial report to the Athletic Association and to the Alumni Advisory Board on Athletics.

The student manager of the different sports shall be assistant manager and shall act for the Graduate or Faculty Manager either upon his request or during his absence.

ARTICLE IV—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at meetings of the Association and of the Council. He may call meetings of the Council or of the Association, provided they be given reasonable publicity. Four councilors or ten Association members can call a meeting of their respective bodies by signed and posted notices.

Section 2. The Vice President shall assume the duties of President during the latter's absence.

Section 3. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Association and of the Council.

Section 4. The University faculty member in charge of the injury fund shall be responsible for all money raised for such cause. Upon the consent of the Council he shall make such payments as are deemed necessary.

The duties of the assistant student managers shall be to raise money for this purpose.

Section 5. Any member of the Council having three consecutive unexcused absences shall be suspended from the Council.

Section 6. The Athletic Council is the executive board of this Association. It shall direct the policies, grant the privileges and the franchises of this Association, and determine the manner of granting the same, and under due provocation revoke any privilege granted.

Section 7. All students who have participated in any one intercollegiate game during the season shall meet at the call of the retiring captain and elect the captain for the ensuing year.

Section 8. Any student of Alfred University paying the dues of the Association is eligible to vote in matters of business and shall be entitled to admission to the games under its auspices; and, under reasonable restrictions imposed by this Association, can become a participant in

its games, and eligible to wear its honors and insignia.

Section 9. The President, Vice President and Secretary of the Association shall meet with the Alumni board and determine the respective parts in a future program.

Section 10. The chairman of the Faculty Committee on Athletics shall be a member of the Alumni board.

ARTICLE V—BY-LAWS OF BOARD GOVERNING INSIGNIA AND HONORS

Sec. 1. The major sports are Football, Basketball, Baseball, and Track. The minor sports are Tennis and Wrestling,

Sec. 2. Every athlete who is entitled to a first team insignia in either major or minor sports, shall receive a certificate designating the authority for wearing the letter. This certificate shall be signed by the Chairman of the Athletic Committee (faculty), the Coach and the President of the Athletic Council.

Sec. 3. The insignia for major sports are as follows: football insignia 9-inch block "A," basketball and track insignia 8-inch block "A," cross country to be awarded the same as track. The insignia for minor sports in a 6-inch block "A."

To win a major "A" in foot-ball or basketball, an athlete must play two-thirds of the playing time in all intercollegiate games, except upon recommendation by the

Coach and the approval of the Athletic Council.

Any person breaking a Track record shall receive a track "A."

Any man winning a first place, or its equivalent in points in an intercollegiate track meet shall receive a track "A."

Any athlete, who has regularly practiced with the Varsity squad in a given sport during three seasons, but who has not been awarded the Varsity letter in that sport, may be recommended by the Coach for such an award.

Each manager shall receive the insignia of the sport which he manages.

Any athlete winning his match in an intercollegiate tennis tournament shall receive a minor "A."

A student trainer, duly appointed, and having satisfactorily completed one year's work, shall receive a 9-inch block "A."

Sec. 4. Class numerals shall be three-inch numerals awarded:

To women, for participation in at least half the playing time in two inter-class sports, with the exception of track. The person must win at least one point in track to have it count toward her numerals.

To men, for participation in half the playing time on one of the Freshman Var-

sity teams, or upon recommendation by the coach after the same manner as the Varsity letter awards.

Section 5. After recommendation by the Council, the Athletic Association may vote to make some award to an individual, who has rendered some exceptional service to the Association.

X Sec. 5. After recommendation by the Athletic Association any person awarded his first major "A" shall receive a Varsity sweater selected and approved by the Athletic Council. Other awards may be made to championship teams by a majority vote of the Athletic Association.

Sec. 7. Amendments to this constitution can be made by a two-thirds vote after having been published in the Fiat Lux.

ARTICLE VI—MANAGERS

Sec. 1. Managers, assistant managers, trainers, and cheer leaders, shall be awarded on the following competitive basis:

Sophomores shall be permitted to try out as managers, trainers and cheer leaders, after informing the Athletic Council of their intention, and upon reporting to the manager of the sport, the trainer, or the head cheer leader.

Sec. 2. At the close of each sport the board shall choose two Junior assistants for the following year.

Sec. 3. From the Junior assistants, Managers, Trainers, and Cheer leaders, shall be chosen the Varsity and Freshmen Managers, the Trainer and head cheer leader for the following year.

ARTICLE VII

Section 1. The sports for girls for which an "A" may be granted, are basketball, track and tennis.

Section 2. Every girl who is entitled to a first team insignia, shall receive a certificate designating the authority for wearing the letter. This certificate shall be signed by the Chairman of the Athletic Committee (faculty), the Coach and the President of the Athletic Council.

Section 3. The insignia for girls' sports shall be a five-inch block "A." There shall be no second team insignia.

Any girl participating in inter-collegiate sports, must play in one-half the playing time each season—there being a schedule of at least three collegiate contests—to win the insignia, except on the approval of the Athletic Council, after recommendation by the Coach.

Any girl out for Varsity basketball for four years, or after having participated in inter-class basketball for four years—entire season each year—shall, upon recommendation of the Coach and approval of the Athletic

Council, receive the insignia. Names shall be filed with the Athletic Association at the end of each season, and recommended by the Coach.

Any girl breaking a track record shall receive an insignia.

Any girl who shall win a tennis tournament with at least ten original entries in singles, or six entries in doubles shall receive the tennis insignia.

Any girl participating in an inter-collegiate tennis tournament shall receive a tennis insignia.

Section IV and Section V. The same as in Article V.

CROSS COUNTRY TROPHY

The Dr. Russell S. Ferguson Cross Country Trophy, donated to the student body of Alfred University as an expression of appreciation and respect for "Doc" Ferguson, who by his willing labors has done much to place Alfred University far ahead in cross country.

This trophy was founded by Sanford S. Cole '23, Captain of Alfred's first cross country team, and recognizes "Doc" Ferguson's success and personality in coaching winning teams, and at the same time provides an object for non-varsity competition in bringing new cross country material to light.

CONDITIONS OF AWARD

1. The trophy is to be competed for by teams from the college fraternities on the campus, and from dormitories of college men.
2. Each team shall consist of not less than five, and not more than eight men.
3. In case an organization fails to enter five men, it shall waive all rights to compete in the meet.
4. The first three men of each team to finish shall count for the team's score, and low score shall win.
5. No man shall be allowed to enter the race who has not had at least three week's training under the cross country coach.
6. Men who have won letters in cross country shall not be allowed to run.
7. The meet shall be held the fourth week following registration, the course shall be set by the coach, but of length greater than three miles.

8. Any organization winning the trophy four times shall become permanent owner of the trophy, and a new one shall replace the one won.
 9. The men eligible for entering the race must carry a minimum of twelve credit hours of college work.
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INTERSCHOLASTIC DAY

For the last sixteen years, Alfred has held an interscholastic track meet at which high schools from central and western New York and Pennsylvania have been represented. Greater interest is shown in this event each year and large crowds come a great distance to see the meet. All the principal field and track contests are held, and also two prize speaking contests—one for men and one for women.

FRATERNITIES SORORITIES AND CLUBS

MEN'S INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL

We, the men's fraternal organizations of Alfred University, in order to promote harmony and mutual understanding among the fraternities on the campus; to act as an interpreting medium between the faculty and the allied organizations on the campus of the University; to lay and enforce rules for governing all situations of common interest to the fraternities, do hereby adopt and agree to be governed by the following Constitution and By-laws of the Men's Interfraternity Council.

ART. I—NAME AND OBJECT

Sec. 1. The name of this organization shall be The Men's Interfraternity Council of Alfred University.

Sec. 2. The object of this organization shall be to control all matters that may be determined to be of mutual interest to the various organizations herein represented.

ART. II—MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. The Council shall be composed of three representatives from each member organization.

Sec. 2. Each representative shall be entitled to one vote in any meeting of the Council.

Sec. 3. Any new fraternity organized upon the Campus. upon being recognized by

the Faculty, may apply for admission to the Council.

Sec. 4. An applying fraternity may be admitted to membership by a three-fourths vote of the Council, such membership to take effect upon the signing of the Constitution of the Council by the organization making application.

ART. III—OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Sec. 1. The officers of the Council shall be a President, a Vice President, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Sec. 2. The duties of the officers shall be in general, those pertaining to their offices by parliamentary custom.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall furnish a copy of the minutes of each meeting of the Council to each member fraternity within one week after date of meeting.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall pay out moneys only by direction of the Council.

ART. IV—POWERS

Sec. 1. The Council shall have power to enforce all enactments, regulations, etc., within its jurisdiction as defined by the articles and By-laws of this Constitution.

ART. V—PLEDGING

Sec. 1. No man shall have a pledge pin in his possession until pledged according to the By-laws of this Constitution, nor shall he be considered pledged until he wears a

pledge pin in the proper place, or has signified in writing his intention of joining a given fraternity.

Sec. 2. No fraternity shall pledge a man until after he has completed the work of one Semester after matriculating in Alfred University.

Sec. 3. The following rules shall be strictly observed in regard to pledging:

(1) Closed Season shall be defined as that time from the beginning of college in the fall until Rushing Week.

(2) During Closed Season, no fraternity shall entertain more than three Freshmen at any one time.

(3) The last full week of college before Christmas vacation shall be considered as Rushing Week. Beginning on the Monday of this week, each fraternity shall have a night to entertain prospective pledgees. These nights shall be chosen by lottery.

(4) Bids shall be sent out by the Secretary of the Council at 8:00 A. M., on the last Friday before the beginning of Christmas vacation. All bids stamped and addressed, must be in the hands of the Secretary, by that time.

(5) No bids shall be returned before the following Monday, and all bids shall be returned before Christmas vacation begins.

(6) From the time the bids are sent out, and until 12:00 o'clock noon of the following Monday, no fraternity shall discuss fraternity matters with any prospective pledgee.

(7) All fraternity bids shall be sent out on printed forms supplied by the Council. Nothing else in addition to these cards shall be sent out.

(8) No Freshman shall room or board in any fraternity house until he has been pledged by that fraternity.

Sec. 4. No fraternity shall approach any man after he has been pledged to another fraternity or has signified in writing, his intention of being pledged.

Sec. 5. Any fraternity which solicits the membership of any man in a manner which shall be considered unnatural or unfraternal shall have committed a misdemeanor requiring judicial action by the Council.

Sec. 6. No fraternity shall pledge a man who has worn the pledge pin of another fraternity of this Council until four months have elapsed from the time the first pin was returned.

Sec. 7. If a man should have his pledge pin taken from him, the Council shall be informed by the fraternity whose pin he wore.

Sec. 8. The names of all new pledgees shall be reported by each fraternity at each meeting of the Council.

ART. VI—INITIATION

Sec. 1. No man shall be formally initiated into any fraternity until he has attained an index of 0.80, either for his first semester, or at any subsequent official index. Agricultural School men must complete their first term with an average of 70%, or attain such a grade at any subsequent issuing of grades.

Sec. 2. After a man has been initiated into a fraternity represented on this Council, he is not eligible for membership in any other fraternity during his stay in Alfred.

ART. VII—AMENDMENTS

Sec. 1. The regular meetings of the Council shall be at 9:30 P. M. on the first Wednesday of each month of the college year.

2. The place of meeting shall be rotated among the fraternities in the order of their signing the Constitution. Notice of each meeting shall be given by the President of the Council at least twenty-four hours before the time of meeting.

Sec. 3. The President of the Council shall be a Senior member, and the Vice President a Junior member. In case the President is detached from his office for any reason, the Vice President shall become President for the remainder of his term.

In such an event a new Vice President shall be elected.

Sec. 4. All representatives shall assume their duties at the first regular meeting of the Council in the fall, with the exception of the Agricultural School representatives, who shall assume their duties at the first meeting after the opening of the Agricultural School, and shall serve during the entire college year.

Sec. 5. The officers of the Council shall be elected at the first meeting of the year after the opening of the Agricultural School.

Sec. 6. Special committees may be appointed at any time by the President.

Sec. 7. In case of the absence of any member from any meeting of the Council, said member's vacancy must be filled by a ranking substitute should a fraternity not be fully represented at a Council meeting. A fine of one dollar shall be imposed upon each absentee at or before the next meeting of the Council.

Sec. 8. All motions pertaining to reprimands, penalties, suspensions, and expulsions, shall be carried by a three-fourths majority vote. All amendments shall be carried by a unanimous vote.

Sec. 9. All other measures shall be carried by a majority vote.

Sec. 10. Any fraternity which belittles, or attempts to belittle or degrade, any other fraternity in the eyes of any person by word or action, shall be considered as having committed a misdemeanor requiring judicial action by the Council.

Sec. 11. The Council shall determine the nature and extent of the penalty resulting from any proven misdemeanor.

Sec. 12. A complete list of the active members and of the pledges shall be filed by each fraternity with the Secretary at the beginning of each College semester.

Sec. 13. All voting shall be done by open ballot unless otherwise designated.

Sec. 14. All officers of the Council shall be students, but in the event of a disagreement or controversy, the Council shall appoint a referee whose decision shall be final.

Sec. 15. No representative shall resign without the consent of the Council.

Sec. 16. Amendments to the Constitution shall not be voted upon until one month after being submitted.

Sec. 17. Special meetings may be called by the President at any time.

Sec. 18. Each fraternity agrees to be governed by this Constitution and its By-laws.

WOMEN'S INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL

Art. I. NAME AND OBJECT—Sec. 1. The name of this organization shall be the Women's Interfraternity Council of Alfred University.

Sec. 2. The object of the organization shall be to control all matters which may be determined to be of interest to the various organizations herein represented.

Art. II. MEMBERSHIP—Sec. 1. The Council shall be composed of two representatives from each women's fraternity, at least one of whom shall have served previously.

Sec. 2. Each representative shall be entitled to one vote in each meeting of the Council.

Sec. 3. Any new women's fraternity on the campus being recognized by the faculty, automatically becomes a member of the Council, after signing the Constitution.

Art. III. OFFICERS AND DUTIES—Sec. 1. The officers shall consist of a President, who shall be a Senior, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Sec. 2. The duties of the officers shall be in general those pertaining to their offices by parliamentary custom.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall furnish minutes of the last meeting to each member of the Council by the next fraternity meeting following the Council meeting.

Sec. 4. The officers of the Council shall be elected at the last meeting of the college year, when the new and old Councils shall meet together. The new Council alone shall have power to vote at this election.

Art. IV. POWERS—The Council shall have power to enforce all enactments, regu-

lations, etc., within its jurisdiction as defined by the articles and by-laws of this constitution.

Art. V. RUSHING—Sec. 1. Rushing shall extend over a period of not longer than seven school weeks.

Sec. 2. Each fraternity shall have but two entertainments.

Sec. 3. The entertainments shall be given one a week, by each fraternity in turn, three weeks intervening between the first and second entertainment given by any one fraternity.

Sec. 4. The order in which these fraternities shall entertain shall be determined by the Council.

Sec. 5. There shall be a definite amount of money apportioned for entertainment, the amount of which shall be set by the Council.

Sec. 6. Only college women shall be guests at these entertainments.

Sec. 7. Afternoon entertainments shall end at six o'clock, and evening entertainments shall end so that guests shall be in their places of residence at 10:30 o'clock.

Art. VI. PLEDGING—Sec. 1. Pledging shall take place but twice a year, in the fall and in the spring.

Sec. 2. (1). Invitations shall be sent out the fourth Monday after the rushing period.

(2). Replies shall be sent to the fraternities by the following school Monday.

(3). The Pledge Service shall be the next school Monday.

(4). At least two weeks shall then elapse until the Initiation Service.

Sec. 3. No Fraternity shall pledge a woman until she has completed the work of one semester after matriculating in Alfred University.

Sec. 4. (1). Until pledged, no freshman woman shall be entertained at more than four meals or more than four informal parties at any one fraternity house, nor shall more than three Freshmen be invited to a meal or informal party at any one time; except by special arrangement with the Council in either event.

(2). No woman shall room or board at any fraternity house until she is pledged.

(3). No freshman woman shall room with a fraternity woman.

(4). Each fraternity shall be privileged to word and revise its own invitation.

(5). The invitations shall be mailed at twelve o'clock noon of the day designated by the Council.

(6). From the time the invitations are sent out until the answers are received, no fraternity woman except the one appointed by her fraternity president shall have communication with a freshmen girl, and then on fraternity matters only.

(7). From the time invitations are sent out until the answers are received, no form of rushing shall take place.

(8). No fraternity member shall approach any woman after she has been pledged to another fraternity, or has signified her intention of being pledged to that fraternity.

Art. VII. INITIATION—Sec. 1. Each fraternity shall determine the date of its initiation services.

Sec. 2. No woman shall be formally initiated into any fraternity until she has attained an index of 1.0

Sec. 3. After a woman has been initiated into a fraternity represented on this Council, she is not eligible for membership in any other fraternity represented on this Council during her stay in Alfred.

Art. VIII. VOTING—Sec. 1. All voting shall be done by secret ballot unless otherwise designated.

Sec. 2. All matters pertaining to reprimand, penalties, suspension and expulsion shall be carried by 2-3 majority vote.

Art. IX. MISDEMEANORS—Sec. 1. Any fraternity which belittles or attempts to belittle or degrade any other fraternity in the eyes of any person by word or action, shall be considered as having committed a misdemeanor requiring judicial action by the council.

Sec. 2. The Council shall determine the nature and extent of the penalty resulting from any proven misdemeanor.

Art. X. RESIGNATION—No representative shall resign without the consent of the Council and her fraternity.

Art. XI. MEETINGS — Special meetings may be called by the President at any time.

Art. XII. AMENDMENTS—Sec. 1. Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by any fraternity. The representative of this fraternity shall submit the amendment in writing to the Council, and it shall be voted upon one month after being submitted.

Sec. 2. All amendments to be carried must receive unanimous vote of the Council.

HONORARY SOCIETIES

ETA MU ALPHA

Eta Mu Alpha is an honorary fraternity, the object of which is to promote better scholarship and a greater interest in the intellectual life of the University; to promote leadership and fair play; to support any movements in the interests of a greater Alfred, particularly those which will strengthen the the intellectual life of the University.

Membership in this fraternity is based primarily on scholastic standing. All upperclass students who are properly enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the New York State School of Clay Working and Ceramics are eligible to membership, providing they have completed their previous college work at a minimum index which is, for the Juniors, 2.4, and, for the Seniors, 2.2.

PHI SIGMA GAMMA

Phi Sigma Gamma is an honorary fraternity, formed to recognize those women who have rendered positive service to Alfred for at least two years.

Its purposes are: to be positive factors in Alfred's growth; to maintain and extend a spirit of co-operation and good-will between fraternity and non-fraternity groups; to uphold true Alfred traditions and express those ideals in their service to-

ward Alfred. On the Campus, Phi Sigma Gamma strives to create an incentive toward achievement for Alfred.

PHI PSI OMEGA

Phi Psi Omega is an honor fraternity, chartered to form a bond between men in the two upper classes who have proven their loyalty to Alfred. The aim of the fraternity is to give the undergraduate, who because of activities and athletics, is unable to gain the coveted "honors," something to work for, a goal to be gained through service and loyalty to his Alma Mater.

The membership is limited to eight. There is a scholastic requirement of two years with an average index of 1.5. The candidate must be a member of the Junior or the Senior class of Alfred University, or a graduate alumnus of this University. Membership will be based on scholastic record, college activities, and, most important of all, character.

CLUBS

THE CERAMIC GUILD is organized by the Art Department as a means of advertising the school by acquainting the people with a pleasing and creditable grade of pottery, and as a means for the disposal of student work, the Ceramic Guild gives regular exhibitions which have been very successful.

THE CERAMIC SOCIETY is a student

branch of the American Ceramic Society. It consists of all the upperclassmen and the faculty of the New York School of Clay Working and Ceramics. The Society meets regularly and discusses Ceramic problems and other items for self improvement.

DEUTSCHE VEREIN is a club whose only qualification for membership is an interest in German. It holds weekly meetings, and aims to create an appreciation for German literature, life, and customs.

THE ENGLISH CLUB. Primarily organized with the purpose of studying contemporary literature, the English Club serves as the means of developing critical and appreciative reading of literature. Its informal discussions make its meetings entertaining, and give an opportunity for self expression.

THE FOOTLIGHT CLUB is an organization to promote the best in dramatics. Its members are elected from those who show the most ability for acting, and a try-out play is held the first part of each college year. At least once every year some suitable play is selected and given by the club.

THE GLEE CLUB is an organization consisting of sixteen men and a director, the positions being competitive. Each year the Club makes an extended trip, giving concerts under the auspices of various schools, clubs, and other organizations.

LE CERCLE FRANCAIS is a student organization formed for the informal study of French in its most interesting phases. At the weekly meetings of the society, members usually present papers on appropriate topics.

PRESS CLUB, composed mostly of Journalism students and others interested in the work, is under the direction of Prof. I. A.

Conroe, and forms a news link between events in Alfred life and outside newspapers. College credit may be earned for work on the Press Club staff.

Varsity "A" Club is composed of men who have earned their major or minor "A's." Eligible candidates for membership must petition the club. Each man is elected to the Club by a majority vote. The purpose of the Club is to promote a greater athletic interest, and to encourage high school students to attend Alfred.

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

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

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
