## Alfred University confers degrees during annual Commencement exercises 5/14/07

Alfred University officials conferred 13 doctoral degrees, 104 master's degrees (M.F.A., M.S., M.A. and M.B.A.), 454 undergraduate degrees, and 34 certificates of advanced study during Commencement exercises Saturday, May 12, in the McLane Center on campus. Dr. Charles M. Edmondson, Alfred University president, presided over the ceremony. One graduate in the class of 2007 distinguished herself by earning a perfect 4.0 (out of a possible 4.0) grade point average for four years of study at Alfred University.
