### Campus posts high marks in environmental inspection

Dr. Irene Moszer, vice president of business and finance, shares the following good news with the campus:

On Monday, Sept. 17, the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation visited Alfred University's Environmental Health and Safety Department. As with all hazardous waste inspections, it was a surprise. After his review, DEC Representative Thomas Corbett reported Alfred University's record-keeping over the past three years as 99.9% better than the other 4,000 companies that he visits. He said he found exactly what he was looking for and found it in complete order. These records included all hazardous waste manifests, waste profiles, waste characterization reports, and universal waste (lamps, mercury containing thermostats and batteries) paperwork/certificates.

The next stop was the Central Accumulation Area in Myers Hall. Corbett found everything in complete order and in compliance. He also viewed the Universal Waste Storage area at the Lambda House, where everything was found to be in perfect order. The final stop was a lab on the first floor of Myers Hall where he viewed a sample Satellite accumulation area.

As a result of his findings, Corbett has offered to help find grant money (through the NYSDEC) to create a video training for other colleges and universities using Alfred University facilities as examples.

Cherise Haase, AU environmental health and safety coordinator, singled out praise for Michele Mitchell for her outstanding efforts in ensuring Alfred University hazardous waste generation and storage areas, including recordkeeping/documentation are always in 100% compliance. She also offered appreciation and recognition to the Physical Plant crew that maintains the universal waste storage area.

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### Alfred U Yearbook Wins Premier Print Award

The Printing Industries of America, the world's largest graphic arts trade association, recently named Alfred University's 2007 Kanakadea Yearbook among the best in the nation.

Begun in 1950 as the Graphics Arts Awards Competition, the program attracts entries from companies in North America, South America, Asia, Europe and the Pacific Rim. Thousands of entries are scrutinized by a panel of judges, who select the winners in numerous categories.

The top "Benny Award" (named after Ben Franklin) was awarded to MIT. Two first-place "Awards of Recognition" were given to Alfred University and Penn State, followed by 10 "Certificates of Merit" awards given to schools including Harvard, West Point, and Dartmouth.

This was Alfred's one-hundredth volume of the Kanakadea and attracted attention due to its non-traditional format. The book doubles as an "everlasting" desk calendar that can be used year after year. Graduating students are placed on their birthday rather than alphabetically. The unusual book required Jostens Publishing to create a special binding and fold-out cover to match the Alfred students' imagination.

The Kanakadea yearbook staff was led by Editor Alyssa Blittersdorf and included students Maya Simonson, Kaitlin Sherin, Julie Gordon, and Ashley Sheriff. Significant amounts of photographs were submitted by senior Shaun Latulippe and graduate student Patrick Powers.

- \* Gives away belongings and favorite objects
