

Hamilton 18th Jan^r 1857

My dear William.

We were very glad to get a letter from you, and are glad to hear you are all well, we were in hopes that you would have been able to have come to see us before your business commenced but as we are disappointed, we hope you and Henry will come the first opportunity you get, we are now all well excepting dear Anna she has very symptoms of the consumption, she was confined to her bed in Cincinnati for 3 weeks Mr Clark wrote for Henry who went down the same day and found her some better, but very weak, her Physician thought he could do more for her but gave her some little Tonic and thought it would best for her to leave the City, and the change may be of service to her, so as soon as she was able she came here now 4 weeks ago she continues quite feeble tho much better than she was then, some days she appears to be getting better, next day she is down again, we think she is going like her dear Father. I must now let you know that we came down here about 3 months ago to spend the winter with Henry and if we found it would answer us, to remaine in Hamilton but every thing is so very dear that it will not do at all, Wood 4 dollars a Cord without the cutting for a fire, Butter 25 and every thing else according, House Rent 100 for the little one S. Giffen lived in no garden, and our Income so small, Rent so low that we shall have to sell our Houses in Centerville, the first chance we get, property is so low there now, we shall have to loose money on them. Josfi ^{has} come to see us here and wants us to buy joining to him, and says we can live ⁱⁿ the Village and he will attend to our Business in planting gathering and selling our corn for us and all he possible can for us, and if anything is needed in want of help he is always one to come to be with us we can live for so little there to what we can here, Wood is no more than ^{old} 1 dollar ready for the fire, we can keep also Chickens &c, and he says it is not much of any colder, his health and all the rest of the Family was never better, he looks well and says he ^{is} not ned of a over coat but 2 or 3 times this winter, he works on his land most every day, he says it is more healthy than Hamilton, and not so much game there, as here, & your dear Father and Henry intends going there next month to see how it will do, and if we go you will be nearer to us, I now conclude with our united love to you all do not forget to bring one of your Daughters I hope your wife and our poor Jo them Your affec^r Mother Ann Howells
