

# Waterwells Road gets a lift

Alfred Sun Reporter ALFRED–We could hear the thumping early in the morning

as construction, actually REconstruction in the "dip" on Waterwells Road proceeded.

The tamping of the material,

following the placement of the new pipe was "thumpthing" as Bob Volk was quick to point out.

Closed during the removal of the old sixty-six inch pipe, the area was occasionally closed as the new pipe was placed and stabilized. Lloyd Hollenbeck, of Industrial Services, Andover, genially gave the curious passerby some of the statistics of the project.

The replacement pipe is eighty feet long, sixty-six inches in diameter, one-half inch thick, and weighs thirty thousand pounds. Hollenbeck generously praised former Alfred Town Highway Superintendent Jamie Mansfield, for his great work applying for a grant and receiving \$75,000+ from FEMA for the project.

Hollenbeck also remarked that his bid of \$60,000 for the work was far below the next bid (another good reason to "Buy Local?)

As we chatted, we were impressed by Hollenbeck's determination to do an excellent job and by his knowledge of how 'flow" works, and what must be done to preserve the humanmade means of controlling it. I asked how well this particular construction would last, and his reply was that it would be good for at least a hundred years.

# AU gets approval for additional math degrees

Division of Mathematics were approved by the NYS Education Department to offer bachelor of science degrees with majors in mathematics and mathematics with a concentration in actuarial science. These majors will complement the existing bachelor of arts degree in mathematics. The Division of Mathematics has also recently created a minor in computer sci-

"By offering additional mathematics



degrees and a computer science minor, Alfred University can better serve the diverse interests and abilof its ities students as well as prepare them to become more competitive candidates for graduate school

or the 21st-century workforce," said Dr. Joseph Petrillo, associate professor of mathematics and Cole Professor in Math-

"The bachelor of science degree in actuarial science prepares students for a ca-

reer in the actuarial field,' added Dr. Darwyn C. Cook, associate professor of mathematics and division chairman. "Actuaries help companies manage risk by analyzing information using



mathematical tools. The actuarial career is one of top five jobs in the United States every year. Actuaries are well compensated, and have a great working environment," he noted.

The bachelor of science major in mathematics offers a rigorous and broad range of courses in mathematical theory and mathematical and scientific applications. Like the existing bachelor of arts major in mathematics, students earning a bachelor of science degree will develop a firm the diversity of a liberal arts education. but they will also have the opportunity to study specific aspects of mathematics and science in greater depth.

'Students who earn a bachelor of arts degree in mathematics at Alfred University are well-prepared for careers in education, business, and industry. However, the bachelor of science degree in mathematics will help us to develop much stronger applicants for graduate programs and jobs requiring analytical problem solving, such as those in finance and computer science," said Petrillo.

The bachelor of arts major in mathe-

matics includes three informal options business, science, education - that reflect the general diversity of the bachelor of arts degree. With the new bachelor of science degrees, students have the opportunity to specialize in actuarial or the physical sciences. Students may decide on the bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degree after matriculating at the University. There are many factors in that decision, including interest in other fields and post-graduation plans.

The Mathematics Division at AU re-

mathematical foundation and experience flects the national trend toward integrating computing technology into its instruction. The division has a fully functional computer laboratory with power desktop computers equipped with various mathematical software and features audio/visual and teaching aids.

According Career to (careercast.com), three of the top four jobs in 2015 (based on income, work environment, stress, and hiring outlook) are actuary (#1), mathematician (#3), and statistician (#4). Computer-related jobs also took three spots in the top 10, namely, data scientist (#6), software engineer (#8), and computer systems analyst (#10).

Cook earned a Ph.D. in mathematics from Louisiana State University; a master of arts degree in mathematics from the State University of New York (SUNY) at Potsdam; and bachelor of arts degrees in mathematics and in computer science from SUNY Potsdam.

Petrillo earned a Ph.D. and a master of arts degree, both in mathematics from SUNY Binghamton and a bachelor of science degree and minor in physics from Wilkes University, Wilkes-Barre, PA.

Eric Luypaert (a name of Belgian origin, he told me), the driver of one of them, was sweeping the area of the truck that had been unloaded when I stopped to ask him about the the plants. Placed on the roof, these will help keep the building cool, he said. He kindly took these two photos for the Sun.

I believe this is sedum. Copy/pasted from the Green Roofs website is the following: This is a tough yet beautiful plant with green to reddish foliage that explodes in a profusion of stunning bright gold flowers in the summer. Blooms attract pollinators. In autumn, the leaves turn bright red-orange with lime and yellow tones, creating one of the best cold weather displays. The foliage persists through the winter. A very adaptable plant, this species spreads quickly to create a mat.

Ferne got her driver's license when she was 53 and then delighted in driving lady friends somewhere to dinner. She even drove to Texas by herself. She was beloved by everyone and raised a family of outstanding people who went on to become pillars of the Al-

This recipe was one of Ferne's tried and true bar cookies, which she baked frequently for visiting grandchildren and to share at the many dish-to-pass meals she enjoyed with family and friends.

#### **Butterscotch Brownies**

•Melt over low heat: 1/2 c. butter, then stir in until blended: 2 c. light brown sugar.

•Cool, then stir in: 2 eggs.

•Sift together and stir in: 1/2 c. flour, 2 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt •Then add: 1 tsp. vanilla and 1 c. coarsely chopped walnuts (optional) After spreading in 13x9 greased pan, Ferne always sprinkled with chocolate chips, much to the grandchildren's delight.

Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes until when touched lightly with finger only a slight imprint remains. Cut into bars while

We Remember Ellen

I did not have the privilege of having Ellen Shultz as a teacher and drama director at Alfred-Almond Central School. I graduated in 1974. Neither did our four children have that privilege as Ellen retired before their high school

My wife Beverly, however, in the summer of 1979 was cast alongside Ellen in an Alfred University Summer Theatre production of "Not Enough Rope." From what I can remember, it was loads of fun.

One thing that some folks may not know or perhaps have forgotten is that Ellen Lipsey was a cheerleader while a student at Alfred University. She led cheers for the back-to-back undefeated football teams in the 1950s and----soon thereafter married the All-American on the team, Chuck

The way I see it, Ellen continued that role of cheerleader throughout her life. From the sidelines or her director's chair, her words were always encouraging. They built up, they cheered everyone on.

Heywood Hale Broun once asked Alfred's legendary football coach Alex Yunevich what was his philosophy, to what did he attribute his success?

Alex replied, "Da boys. Da boys. A coach is nothing more than Hamburger Helper. It's da

From my observation, Ellen had a similar philosophy. It was always her kids. It was never about Ellen, it was always about the kids. But we all know she was more than a box of Hamburger Helper. She was a gourmet cook! When her kids were on stage, in the spotlight, shining like stars, she glowed.

I attended many of the musicals and plays over the years at A-A. I observed how kids responded to her fun-loving, laid back direction. After one such performance, I congratulated Ellen and, recalling the fun Beverly had with her in "Not Enough Rope" years before, suggested that when she retires from teaching, we should start a community theatre group and get summer theater going again in Alfred.

Years later, she visited the *Al*fred Sun office one cold January School auditorium.

day and asked, "So are you ready to start?'

'Start what?"

"Community Theatre!"

We scheduled a meeting, I was elected president and despite committing numerous impeachable offenses over the years, at Ellen's insistence I've continued as president.

I'll never forget those early days. Month after month, our treasurer reported the same balance of \$116.73. Our early years were challenging. She filled out tedious paperwork for some cultural arts grants. We didn't always get the funds that we needed. But Ellen was resourceful. And Chuck was always there to help. Somehow we made it work...with much thanks to Salvation Army!

Ellen took the same recipe for success that worked at A-A and applied it to Alfred Community Theatre. She enlisted folks from the community, encouraged them to discover their hidden talents... And then cheered them on!

And speaking of recipes, Ellen compiled a community cookbook that featured vignettes of some of Alfred's best cooks along with their favorite creations. The cookbook has served as a successful fund-raiser for us.

Through the years, we've learned that everyone has a part to play in "community" theatre... including the audience.

Under Ellen's loving direction, Alfred Community Theatre earned a solid reputation for excellent amateur theatre and we gained a loyal following. And it's always been fun. That's always been our bottom line.

While I missed her during my years at A-A and my children missed her during their years at A-A, I am so grateful for the time that we've had together with Ellen in Alfred Community Theatre. And I'm grateful to the Shultz family for sharing her with all of us. Thank you and may God

#### "CONSTRUCTIVE COOPERATION"

Many sessions of the Board of Legislators seem to develop specific "themes" or topics that run throughout the meeting. The common theme or focus that I observed in the July 27th session was related to constructive cooperation.

The first inkling of that emphasis occurred when we were led in the Pledge of Allegiance by former Navy 3rd Class Petty Officer Charles Williams. They demonstrate how much can be accomplished when people work together towards common goals.

A public hearing was held to receive comments regarding proposed Local Law #3 that will authorize the establishment of a Local Development Corporation to manage the Allegany County Wireless Broadband Internet Service. Later in the meeting the Board approved Resolution#168-15 that enacted that local law. This moves Allegany County one step closer to establishing a wireless Internet system that will serve the entire county. Some portions of the County already have Broadband Internet, but more than half the residents of our county lack access to such Broadband service. Both the federal and State governments have identified this as an area of critical need.

Our County is demonstrating constructive cooperation by multiple agencies. The E-911 System and Sheriff's Department are sharing their towers and microwave communication facilities with the Broadband system. The County IT Department is helping coordinate services. The County Planning Department is also assisting with various services. Together we can do more than any single agency can do alone. Over the next several months we will be taking additional steps to make Broadband Internet service a reality for most of the County.

Other significant resolutions that were approved included one appointing Keith Hooker as Director of Information Technology, and one amending his salary for that position. Another resolution appointed H. Kier Dirlam as the Director

of Planning, and amended his salary for that position. The Board approved another resolution allowing certain positions in the Office For the Aging to be filled prior to receiving Committee approval, provided the County Administrator gave his approval.

The Board also approved the sale of several tax sale parcels. Another resolution approved a grant application for the 2014-2015 Direct Care Worker Program by the Office For the Aging. The Board also approved the transfer of \$13,525 between Office For the Aging accounts to pay for the purchase of office equipment. Another resolution approved the acceptance and appropriation of a \$12,216 donation from the Allegany Senior Foundation to the Office For the Aging for the Meals on Wheels program. The collaboration of the OFA and Senior Foundation is another outstanding example of what can be achieved through constructive co-operation.

The Board also accepted the Balancing Incentive Program in the amount of \$223,711. The Board also approved a lease for facilities in Wellsville that houses programs for the Allegany County Community Services program. Finally, the Board approved the designation of the Wellsville Daily Reporter as our sole official newspaper for the week of August 3rd.

There is a lot going on in County government right now. In addition to the Broadband initiative referred to above, there is the upgrade of the E-911 System. We are exploring ways to stimulate economic development throughout the County, and reduce spending. We are engaged in negotiations and mediation with several Unions representing County employees. The County Landfill is nearly full, and decisions need to be made about how to handle our solid waste in the future. Our Cooperative Extension Association is going through major transitions. The issues facing the County Legislature are complex and challenging. If the answers were simple or obvious the decisions would have already been made. However, by working together in a spirit of constructive cooperation we can overcome these challenges and make Allegany County an even better place to live.

ALFRED-Peter Metz, a Ph.D. candidate in Alfred University's (AU) Kazuo Inamori School of Engineering, last weekl received the 2015 Jerome B. Cohen Award from the International Centre for Diffraction Data. The award, along with a \$1,000 check, was presented at the 64th annual Denver X-ray Conference, Aug. 5 in Westminster,

The Cohen award recognizes outstanding student achievements in the broad field of X-ray analysis.

Metz has been working with spallation neutron source instrument scientists at Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Tennessee since March 2015 under the Department of Energy Office of Science Graduate Student Research program. His research focuses on total scattering analyses on crystalline materials with pronounced elements of disorder such as stacking faults, work particularly relevant to energy applications.

"I'm interested in materials for alternative energy and scattering studies – both neutron and X-Ray – are a great way to study those materials," said Metz.

A Syracuse, native, Metz earned a bachelor of science degree in ceramic engineering from AU in 2010. His doctoral research adviser is Dr. Scott Misture, Inamori Professor in AU's Materials Science and Engineering Department. Metz is working on completing his dissertation in preparation for graduation in spring 2016.



# Alfred State gets ARC grant

ALFRED-The Appalachian Regional Commission has awarded Alfred State a grant in the amount of \$143,457, which will be used to bring renewable energy to the Advanced Manufacturing Center on the School of Applied Technology campus in Wellsville.

The grant funds will allow for a project that involves training and educating electrical, welding, and machine tool students in the monitoring and management of renewable energy aspects of sustainable advanced manufacturing through installation of a commercial-grade photovoltaic system and energy monitoring of all energy systems in the center. Students, who will install the photovoltaic system, will gain an understanding of energy costs related to the sustainable operations of a commercial facility by implementing an energy-management system.

The project will also allow us to work toward making the new Advanced Manufacturing Center a zero-energy facility," said Dr. Craig Clark, executive director and dean of the School of Applied Technology

Dr. Skip Sullivan, president of Alfred State, said, "Our students will benefit from this project by gaining hands-on experience and developing skills and knowledge related to renewable energy components of sustainable advance manufacturing. We are grateful to the Appalachian Regional Commission for providing us this grant.

The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), according to its website, www.arc.gov, is a regional economic development agency that represents a partnership of federal, state, and local government. ARC provides funding each year for several hundred projects in the Appalachian Region, in areas such as business development, education and job training, telecommunications, infrastructure, community development, housing, and transportation.

In June, Alfred State broke ground on the center, which will be used to train and educate welding technology and machine tool technology students in state-of-the-art sustainable practices in advanced manufacturing through efficient processes. Other uses for the facility include prototyping and assisting manufacturers in the development of new products and systems.

The building will house freshman and senior welding students and senior machine tool technology students, and includes classrooms, a computer lab, a welding fabrication shop, material handling and preparation space, a CNC machine shop, and metrology and inspection space. It is expected to be in use by the fall 2016 semester.

# Town, Village seek input for comprehensive plan update

ALFRED—The Town and Village of Alfred are in the process of updating the joint 2004 Comprehensive Plan.

A comprehensive plan is a written document that describes the community character, the current demographic and economic state of the municipality and a future vision for growth and development. The community character (e.g. rural setting, college town, areas of family housing or commercial businesses) serves as the basis for local zoning and land use regulations. New York statutes specify that all zoning must be in accordance with the comprehensive plan.

In addition to regulating land use and zoning, local governments build and maintain roads and provide other services such as police and fire protection, water supply and sewage treatment. A comprehensive plan provides the context for local officials and citizens to make decisions about these services. A current comprehensive plan, updated every five years, is necessary for obtaining grants and loans for government and community organizations to finance needed projects.

According to New York Law, a comprehensive plan should reflect the ideas and needs of the entire community, thus the participation of all community members (residents, property owners, business owners, students) is critical to the development of a plan.

Public forums will be held in the Town and the Village in order to gather further information and dates for those will be announced shortly. Additionally, the following survey was developed. Residents in the Village received the survey along with their water bill,



Among the topics are adaptive significance of dog-dog reactivity, frustration and negative emotional responses, management strategies, and games for reac-

Wendy Dresser-Recktenwald, senior director for the Alfred State Office of Human Resources and the Center for Community Education and Training FOIL/records access officer, said one of the most common canine behavioral problems is leash reactivity.

'Many dogs will lunge and bark aggressively while on a leash and because of this, many dogs get returned to shelters or dumped at shelters because owners feel they can't control them," she said. "This can be stressful on the owner, but ultimately could make or break the happy home we wish for all dogs to have."

The on-hand expert for the event will be Kelly Cottrell, CTC, supervisor of training and behavior at the Louisiana SPCA.

# In The Alfred Sun 50, 25 and 10 Years Ago

"The use of a wall-to-wall carpet at an expense of \$4,000 is an indication of our desire to provide a first class grocery store for area residents," said an IGA spokesman. The store is being managed by William Roberts, formerly of the B&C food chain where he managed a store in Syracuse for 15 years. Mr. Roberts is a graduate of Morrisville Tech where he majored in food technology. He is married to the former Arlene Champlin of Alfred, also a graduate of Morrisville with a major in food service. Roberts said the store will employ 12 full-time clerks, butchers and checkers. "We will also hire students on a part-time basis," he said. The store has parking space for 50 cars and will be open six days a week, closing Sunday only... 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# Alfred State moves ahead in DIII membership pursuit

ALFRED-The NCAA Division III Membership Committee has moved the Alfred State Athletic Department into year two of the provisional membership process confirming that the college fulfilled all the requirements during the 2014-15 academic year.

The NCAA DIII provisional membership process takes four years and each year has different requirements and duties that an institution must fulfill. The NCAA and its membership committee work

hand in hand with the institution to acclimate the college to DIII policies and procedures. Once the process is complete, Alfred State will have all the benefits of full membership, including voting rights on DIII legislation, postseason play, committee memberships, as well as institutional grants and student-athlete awards.

Athletic Director Kelly Higgins is excited about the news. "First steps are always the hardest to take, and this was a great one that has been successfully taken by Alfred State! It took a committed team effort from within Athletics, as well as the full support of the Alfred State leadership, many others from across the campus, and our colleagues and friends within the NCAA to make this a reality. Special thanks go out to all involved. I know the Pioneers will continue to complete all the remaining steps required to achieve full membership within the NCAA over the next few years."

College President Dr. Skip Sullivan

said, "I am proud of the accomplishments of Alfred State and our Athletic Department. Students will benefit ultimately from our progression to full membership.'

Approximately 350 student athletes are at Alfred State. The college sponsors 18 intercollegiate teams that are housed in the Athletic Department, which also oversees physical education, intramurals, and the campus fitness centers.

# Vecchio sets high academic standards for AU Saxons

ALFRED-Alfred University's intercollegiate athletic teams enjoyed unprecedented success in competition in 2014-15, but also excelled in the classroom while making a positive inpact on the local community.

The AU Department of Athletics recently released its spring 2015 academic report, which showed significant improvements over the 2014-15 academic year. The University's 17 NCAA-affiliated sports teams logged a combined cumulative grade-point average of 3.008 for spring 2015, up from the combined GPA of 2.991 posted after the Fall 2014 semester.

Paul Vecchio, director of athletics, has set the departmentwide GPA goal at 3.0. Nine of the Saxons' 17 NCAA teams eclipsed that benchmark in 2014-15, led by women's tennis, with a team GPA of 3.72. Men's soccer had the highest men's team GPA, at 3.31.

Other teams with a GPA of 3.0 or higher were: women's volleyball (3.26), women's soccer (3.24), women's swimming and diving (3.20), women's track and field (3.12), softball (3.08), women's cross country (3.04), and men's basketball (3.03).

Men's tennis was the most improved team from the Fall 2014 to Spring 20156 semester, while women's tennis was the most improved among female sports.

Several teams also showed marked improvement in the percentage of their respective rosters to earn individual academic honors. The athletic department recognizes students with Saxon Scholar honors for having a GPA between 3.20 and 3.49, while Dean's List recognition is afforded to students with a GPA between 3.50 and 3.74. The highest academic honor, the Empire 8 Conference President's List, is given to those with a GPA of 3.75 or higher.

Alfred's academic report references 17 NCAA-affiliated teams -- men's and women's basketball; men's and women's cross country; football; men's and women's lacrosse; men's and women's track and field (the report combines indoor and outdoor squads into one team); men's and women's swimming and diving; men's and women's tennis; men's and women's soccer; softball; and women's volleyball – with a combined 408 student-athletics. For 2014-15, 146 student-athletics earned academic honors, or 36 percent of total of 408 student athletes competing in NCAA-sponsored

AU also offers four non-NCAA intercollegiate sports: men's and women's Alpine skiing and Western and English equestrian (both co-ed). When the academic achievements of the 68 student-athletes on those teams are added, that number jumps to 38 percent. The combined 2014-15 GPA of all student-athletes, when skiing and equestrian is included, was 3.044.

Several AU student-athletes earned noteworthy individual accolades. Men's soccer senior Jeff Thomas (Canandaigua, NY/Canandaigua), football junior Michael Berardi (Wellsville, NY/Wellsville) and softball junior Dana Torchia (Pompton Plains, NJ/Pequannock Township) earned College Sports Information Directors Association (CoSIDA)/Capital One Academic All-District honors, while two members of the men's swimming and diving team – seniors Joseph Rogers (Dublin, NH) and David Coombes (Dansville, NY/Dansville) - earned Scholar All-American honors from the from the Collegiate Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA).

In addition, men's soccer (from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America) and women's swimming and diving (from the CSCAA) earned national academic team

'The recognition afforded our student-athletes by CoSIDA, the NSCAA and the ČSCAA is a microcosm of the outstanding efforts our student-athletes have made in exhibiting excellence both on and off the field," said Vecchio. "The success of such a large percentage of our studentathletes academically, particularly at a University with the academic rigor of AU, is a great point of pride for our depart-

Student-athletes' academic improvement can be attributed in part to the Life Skills Coordinator position created at the beginning of the 2014-15 year. The position, made possible by support from AU alumni Russ Fahey '58, his wife Pat, and Kristin Klabin '93 and her husband, Alex, was held by Jake Spadoni, a 2013 AU graduate and former men's lacrosse All-American.

Spadoni, who also served as a lacrosse graduate assistant coach the last two years, graduated in May with a master's degree in literacy education. Vecchio described the Life Skills Coordinator position as a "direct

liaison to our first-year studentathletes," helping them adjust to the rigors of being a collegiate student-athlete. Spadoni's duties were helping new students in managing their time and directing them to available resources to assist them in their studies.

"The work that Jake did in concert with our coaching staff led to a significant reduction of students on academic probation in 2014-15 while aiding our retention efforts significantly," Vecchio said. "I look forward to this program growing and further creating a major impact on our retention and academic success rates in the future."

Student-athletes were also active in the University and local communities, logging approximately 1,300 community service hours. Seven teams - men's basketball, football, men's lacrosse, women's soccer, women's tennis, and women's volleyball - completed community service projects in 2014-15, with a total of 241 student-athletes contributing an average of 5.4 hours of service.

The AU student-athletes' success in classroom coincides with what was a banner year for Saxon teams. Alfred teams finished in the top four in the Empire 8 Conference standings in six sports, with a school-record four - men's soccer, women's tennis, men's basketball and softball -- competing in their respective championship tournaments. Softball would win their E8 tournament, while men's basketball was runner-up. Two other AU teams - men's tennis and men's lacrosse – finished among the top four in the league standings, but missed out on berths in their respective conference tournaments due to tiebreakers.

Saxon teams competing in sports sponsored by the Empire 8 finished sixth in the Empire 8 Commissioner's Cup standings, the best ever for AU in the 16year history of the conference. The Commissioner's Cup rankings are determined by how teams finish in the league standings of each Empire 8-sponsored sport.

Vecchio noted the athletics program at AU strives to create excellence not only in competition, but also in the classroom and in the community. The program's record of achievement in 2014-15 shows student-athletes and their coaches are attaining many of those goals.

"In 2014-15 our student-athletes excelled in the three areas that share our focus equally: academic performance, athletic prowess and making an impact on both our campus and community," Vecchio commented. "Our coaching staff has provided excellent leadership to our studentathletes to excel in these three critical areas and I am incredibly proud of the fact that we had our finest year from a competitive standpoint in our 16-year association with the Empire 8 while not missing a beat in our other commitments."
