Staff to lead participants at national conference into the 'W.I.L.D.' 6/02/15

Two Alfred University (AU) administrators hope to get participants at the upcoming National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Region II conference to go "W.I.L.D" with their programming.

Mark McFadden, director of AU&s Career Development Center (CDC), and Ana Devlin Gauthier, coordinator of the University&s Judson Leadership Center (JLC), will present a session highlighting the University&s W.I.L.D. (Wilderness, Immersion, Learning, Discover) efforts during NASPA&s Region II conference at George Washington University, Washington, D.C. June 7-9.

McFadden and Gauthier will discuss "Leadership in the Wild," covering the theory and research behind the positive impact of students actively engaged with the outdoors. AU&s rural location along with its strong history of leadership development led to a unique outdoor leadership program, formed in spring 2011. As coordinator of the JLC, Gauthier oversees the Women&s Leadership Center, The Gary Horowitz Leadership Development Program, Saxon Sidekicks First-Year Mentoring Program, and AU&s chapter of Omicron Delta Kappa, the national leadership honor society. She graduated from AU with a bachelor of arts degree in environmental studies and earned a master&s degree in student affairs in higher education at Indiana University of Pennsylvania.
