# Oh, my goodness!

## *Saxons undefeated; Eagles win state title!*

ALFRED--It was one incredible weekend.  
First, Coach Bob Rankl’s Alfred University football completed its 2016 regular season Saturday at Yunevich Stadium with a perfect 10-0 record. Bolstered by a crowd of 5,105, perhaps the largest crowd since the early 1970s, the Saxons defeated E8 rival St. John Fisher, 38-17 to earn an automatic bid in the NCAA Division III Football Championship.  
The unbeaten season is the first at Alfred since 1981 when Sam Sanders was head coach. Before that, Coach Alex Yunevich had six undefeated seasons including 1937 (7-0), 1940 (6-0-1), 1952 (6-0-1), 1955 (8-0-0), 1956 (7-0-0), and 1971 (8-0-0).  
Meanwhile, in Middletown, the Alfred-Almond Central School boys soccer team Saturday defeated previously unbeaten South Kortright, 2-0 to advance to Sunday’s New York State Class D Soccer Championship game.  
The next day, Coach Burt

Turner’s Eagles handed the defending NYS Class D champion Fort Ann Cardinals their first loss of the season, 2-1, in double overtime, thus avenging a 2-1 loss to the Cardinals last year in the state semifinals.  
The Eagles struck first on a free kick play when Cory Olix fed a breaking Jake Johnston. Fort Ann tied it up on a chip shot goal.  
Finally, in the second overtime period, Olix fed Johnston again and this time Johnston pushed the ball past a defender to the left and hit a left-footed shot past the goalie into the far corner of the net.  
The Eagles, in defeating Fort Ann, avenged a 2-1 loss to the Cardinals in the State Semi-finals last year.

## ALFRED STATE RENOVATION PROJECT

# MacKenzie will be largest, most modern SUNY residence hall

ALFRED—After only about a month since renovations to Alfred State’s MacKenzie Complex began, great progress is already being made in the effort to transform the building into the largest and most modern residence hall within the State University of New York system.  
According to Glenn Brubaker, director of Facilities Operations, the demolition work on phase one of the MacKenzie Makeover project is about 60 percent complete after the physical work on the facility started in early October.  
“So far, the project is moving along smoothly, as we are just getting underway. The satellite boiler project for the entire MacKenzie Complex is also underway, with DASNY (Dormitory Authority of the State of New York) and the consultants coordinating the two projects to create a symbiotic relationship for both of them,” said Brubaker, referring to the college’s boiler decentralization effort, which involves eliminating campus buildings’ dependency on the college’s main heating plant through the installation of new, more efficient condensing boilers.  
The first phase of the MacKenzie Makeover involves renovating the East Tower to create a new entrance and gathering spaces for students on each floor, while reinventing the Central Quad to create an attractive core for the 1,200-student residence hall that is warm, welcoming, and feels like an extension of one’s own home. The quad’s design includes a 35-foot-tall atrium with the light illuminating natural surfaces of rock and wood throughout.  
Phase one, Brubaker said, is expected to be completed by Nov. 30, 2017. He said the design of phase two is currently underway, which entails completing work on MacKenzie East, such as renovating row house 8 and Tower G.  
“Also, all of MacKenzie South will be renovated,” Brubaker said. “This includes row houses 9, 10, and 11, and Towers H and J. Construction for phase two is tentatively scheduled to begin in May 2018.”



# Pilgrimage to Susan B. Anthony's grave held Election Day

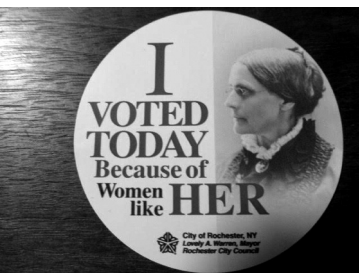
Two months ahead of time, I mentioned to husband Bob that after voting on Tuesday, November 8, 2016, I wanted to put my "I Voted" sticker on Susan B. Anthony's gravestone, as I had heard that some have done the past couple of years. One of the election officials kindly cut out my sticker, leaving it on the paper so the adhesive would be

fresh. We left right after our early voting at the Alfred Town Hall on Shaw Road.

In the hurly burly of this election season, appropriately named Mount Hope Cemetery in Rochester, NY, was a welcome respite. It was a gorgeous day, with many hundreds of people quietly enjoying the weather, the peace, and the moment. There were old and young, middles, too; people taking time from

work; women, men; some well-behaved dogs; babies, toddlers, children out of school; heterosexual couples, families, a woman and her wife behind us carrying sunflowers; groups of friends and new friends, as we waited in line for over an hour for our few moments at the sticker-and-flower-bedecked site. It was grand, a privilege, surprisingly emotional, and a reminder of the blessings we Americans share, simply by being citizens of the United States of America.

The previous Thursday, Alfred University hosted Molly Barker, developer of Girls on the Run, whose website proclaims, "WE INSPIRE GIRLS to be joyful, healthy, and confident, using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running." Our granddaughter,

Claire participated in Alfred Almond's program, so she, her mom, and I were some of the first to arrive at the site of the program. Ms. Barker came in, and because I knew that Claire would need to leave early, I asked her if she would like me to accompany her to see if Barker would pose for a photo. We got the photo, and a healthy dose of Barker enthusiastic encouragement, during which time she asked about Claire's interests, capabilities, and dreams. We are so grateful for the work of the Alfred Almond coaches in bringing this healthy, supportive program to our grade-school girls. Claire now runs 5K races with us.

When Claire got off the school bus on Election Day, I told her about when, in 1968, I decided to be the first woman to wear a pant suit to my place of employment, Lewiston-Porter Junior-Senior High School. It was very dressy, and almost a dress. I was a bit scared, worried about how a woman in pants would be received. I'm not sure anyone even noticed, but in the cool morning at Mount Hope on Tuesday, I hardly saw a dress.

Finally, the first weekend of November, Bob and I participated in a lovely 5K run in Lancaster County, PA. Not only were there many women and girls running, but the age and

gender classification awards were equal, a first, a second, and a third for females in each age group in addition to the same for males. This in contrast to a race I ran in 1976, in which I was the only woman contestant of 150 runners.

The meaning of all this to this grandmother is that my daughters and their daughters look upon a very different world than that which my generation experienced. There is much progress to be made, but thanks to people such as Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth, Molly Barker, and so many others, this is an encouraging time to be a woman in this country, when a woman could be elected President.

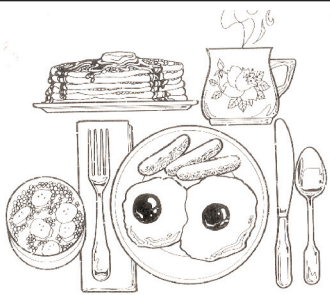

This is her recipe, which was a family Christmas tradition.

#### Aglio E. Olio Recipe

- 1 lb. Capilini
- 1/2 c. olive oil
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 c. coarsely chopped walnuts
- 2 T. fresh parsley, chopped
- freshly ground pepper to taste
- chopped basil leaf to taste
- grated cheese to taste

Cook the pasta. Sauté the garlic, oil and walnuts until golden brown. Put pasta and sauteed mixture into pre-warmed serving dish and mix well. Top with parsley, pepper, basil, and grated cheese. Serve hot!

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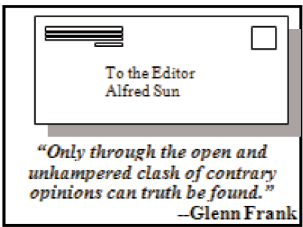

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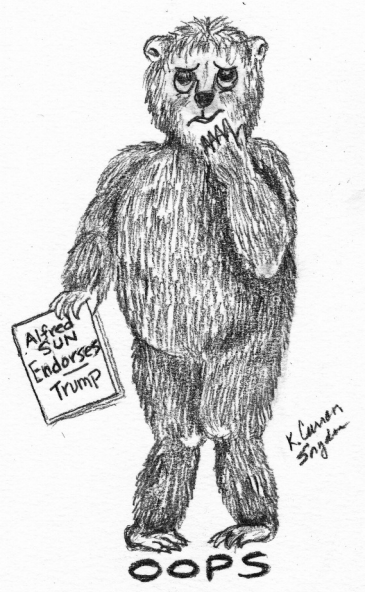

### WHAT DOES THE 2016 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION REALLY MEAN?

The outcome of the 2016 Presidential election was a total surprise to me. Judging by the reactions of those who are protesting, I am not alone in my surprise. There are many different theories and opinions about what happened, and what it means. After listening and reading a great deal about the voting, here are my own thoughts about the election of Donald Trump.

One perspective on the vote is that Hilary Clinton “lost” the election, more than Donald Trump “won” it. As of November 13th it appears that Clinton received almost 61 million votes compared to Trumps 60.4 million votes. However, the popular vote isn’t critical because the outcome is determined by the electoral college. Trump has an overwhelming lead in that vote (290-228). Clinton won big in New York, California and Illinois, while losing close in Florida, North Carolina, Ohio, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania. Trump has actually received fewer votes than either McCain or Romney in the two prior elections. Clinton significantly underperformed Obama’s vote totals of 68 million (2008) and 65 million (2012). Clinton lost because she received more than 7 million (2008) and 4 million (2012) fewer votes than Obama.

In several key cities African-American voter turn-out was much smaller than in recent elections. More than 1.5 million fewer African-Americans voted in 2016, than in 2012. Lower turnout in Milwaukee (Wisconsin), Detroit (Michigan), Philadelphia (Pennsylvania) and Charlotte (North Carolina) probably allowed Trump to win those states. Lower turn-out was crucial to the outcome of this election.

Nevertheless, Trump achieved a remarkable victory. Although it appears that fewer Republican voters turned out for Trump than voted for either John McCain or Mitt Romney, he still won. Many Democratic voters crossed party lines to vote for Trump. Why did traditional voting patterns change? Here are some of the answers that are being put forward:

- Clinton didn’t have a focus for her campaign, other than that she wasn’t Trump;
- Clinton didn’t generate significant enthusiasm for her candidacy, while having some major negatives related to the e-mail scandal and Clinton Foundation corruption;

- Many voters from both parties were frustrated that their “party” had abandoned them and was dedicated to “special interests” rather than to the traditional values of their party;

- Trump’s central message was the same as Obama’s message in 2008 and 2012. His call for fundamental “change” in American government resonated with many working class Americans;

- The past three Presidential elections have been won by candidates running as “outsiders.” Unfortunately for her, Hilary Clinton was viewed as the quintessential “insider;”

- It appears that “economic” issues, including Obamacare, foreign trade deals, poor paying jobs, illegal immigration, etc., were more important than the “social” issues that Clinton emphasized.

I believe that there are some important messages here for both political parties. Consider the following:

A. The Democratic Party neglected its historic base of “blue-collar” workers, and focused on special interest groups. Those “blue-collar” workers punished their party by voting for Trump in large numbers. However, Trump was not a traditional Republican conservative candidate. He had already defeated those candidates in the Republican primaries. The key message is that both major political parties need to re-evaluate their values and focus. In that sense Donald Trump may have established a new political movement. His coalition is more focused on traditional values and economic policies than on ideology. The political party that recognizes and embraces that reality may become the dominant party of the next several decades.

B. America is not as liberal as either major party, or the main-stream media, believed. The liberal elite does not have the mandate it thought it did. Traditional values focused on families, jobs and community are still important to a majority of Americans.

C. The Americans that I know that voted for Donald Trump are not racists, religious bigots, homo-phobs, or anti-immigrants. They are loyal traditional Americans who want to “Make America Great Again.”

D. By giving Trump a Republican Congress, they voted to end gridlock. They want Constitutional government again.

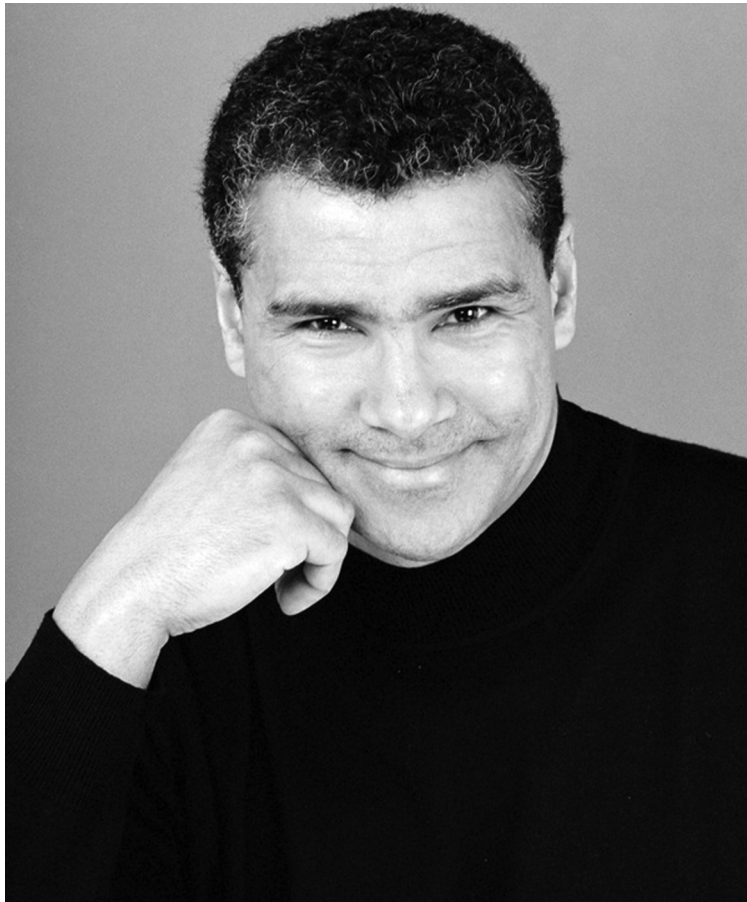

In 1975, Mahloele left a family and a country that he loved, knowing that if he stayed, his life would be "wasted" in jail, where his close friends were incarcerated during the apartheid years.

In Philadelphia, he makes his living teaching music and performing. In the absence of other musicians from South Africa, he has begun to nurture an ensemble of diverse African and African American musicians, teaching them traditional music and his own compositions.

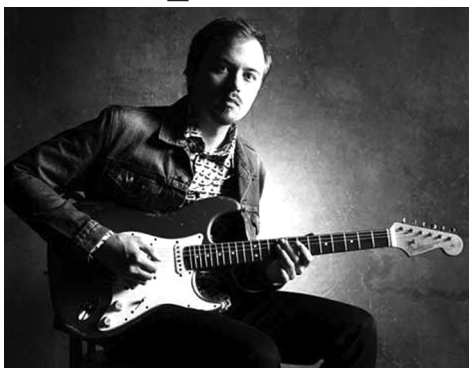
### Guitar virtuoso Joe Robinson to perform in Wellsville

### It was a successful nesting season on Jericho Hill

According to my records, the "For the Birds" column has been missing from *The Alfred SUN* since sometime last July. It's not that the birds were missing in action but more that I was preoccupied with caring for Dick. Thank you to all who wrote to me after his death.

One subject I wanted to write about was how successful the nesting season was for the birds around our house on Jericho Hill. The only birds that were unsuccessful were a pair of Tree Swallows that I found dead early in spring, huddled together in a frozen state, in one of our nest boxes on the hill behind the house. Later in the summer, a pair of House Wrens took up residence in that box, and were successful in raising young. The other nest box successfully fledged young Eastern Bluebirds.

The number of successful nestings around the house was amazing. We had a pair of House Wrens who made a nest in a nestbox in our front yard. Not too long after the eggs hatched, the nest box fell onto the ground and because there was so much disturbance to the nest inside, I figured all was lost.

Later in the day, I spotted the female carrying food into the ruins of the nest inside the box! So I quickly secured the box, guaranteed not to fall over now,



and watched the adults care for their young for at least eight more days, when to my delight I watched the young take their first awkward flight out of the box.

The usual starlings raised at least one clutch of young in a hole in the house siding. But it wasn't just cavity nesters that were successful. I watched a pair of Brown Thrashers raise two young who stayed around the yard for weeks. Of course, there were several nest loads of American Robins. Song Sparrows and Chipping Sparrows nested near the house and raised young. A Common Yellowthroat nested behind the house as did a pair of Prairie Warblers farther up the hill. Toward the end of the season, a pair of American Goldfinches nested along the driveway. A pair of Northern Cardinals brought their young to the yard.

But the most interesting nest for me was that of a pair of Eastern Kingbirds. Kingbirds are relatively drab as the plumage goes, except that the male has a

brilliant crimson crown that you only see when the male is angry or bold enough to want to appear more 'male' (see photo).

I sometimes find kingbird nests in the tops of Christmas trees on the Kent plantations. But I had never had one nest so close to the house, way up in one of the huge spruce trees in the front yard. Kingbirds are noisy, almost overly defensive of their nests and I often sat outside near the nest and watched them bring

food for the young.

One day, I knew the young were almost ready to fledge, and my heart sank when I saw two young drop to the ground right on the path where Ron Snyder was soon due to bring a full hay wagon down from the field!

When the two young refused to make any effort to take cover, I brought a lawn chair out and babysat the two youngsters until I saw the hay wagon approaching! That called for action, so I picked the two up and moved them to safety, but not without half the flat flies (Hippoboscids) living on them, transferred to me! Later that evening I could still hear the young begging for food from their attentive mother.

Hippoboscids flies have always fascinated me. We see them often on the early fall birds we

band at Braddock Bay. The size of the fly depends on the size of the bird it is living on. I've seen extremely tiny flat flies on the smallest of the warblers. When I find them on large hawks I'm handling, they are huge. They are often tricky to remove from a bird. If enough of them get on a young bird, they can seriously impact the bird's health and survivorship. One season at Braddock Bay a researcher asked us to collect Hippoboscids flies for a study he was doing. It often became a comedy to watch a bander try to get the fly into the collection vial.

But, to get back to the summer nesting successes, I began to wonder why the season had been so good for the birds. One day it dawned on me that I had not seen a cat in the yard for months. We used to have what I think was a feral cat that often wandered into the yard during the daytime. Now I wonder how many nestlings that cat killed. It makes me want to stress that the best cats are indoor cats. Steve and Jacki always have two or three rescue cats in their home, who only go outside when they are on a leash. The cats' favorite place in the house is on a ledge by a window next to the bird feeder. The birds are safe and the cats are entertained.

But I promise not to nag you about cats again. It's good to be back!

ALFRED TOWN BOARD MEETING

### 2017 Town Budget, Home Owner Energy, and Resignation

In the presence of a fairly large and attentive gathering of community members the Alfred Town Board opened its regular monthly meeting with a hearing on the proposed 2017 Town Budget. In the face of no opposition the proposed budget was adopted unanimously. It is noteworthy that the board once again stayed below the state-mandated tax cap which, for 2017 is a meager .068%. It is also noteworthy that the board has just about run out of cost cuts to stay below the cap which has been in effect since 2011.

Routine reports included the fact that the Alfred Police responded to 20 calls in the town during the past month. The plurality of these were traffic related but also included vandalism and assault with a weapon.

Your supervisor was in receipt of correspondence regarding a proposed Community Choice Aggregation arrangement under a program developed by the Public Service Commission. The firm Energy Enterprises wants towns in Allegany County to join together so that home owners can purchase electricity and gas at lower costs. As more information is known about the program it will be reported in this column.

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# In The Alfred Sun 50, 25 and 10 Years Ago

*Shocked to see Sun endorse Donald Trump*

To the Editor,

I was surprised and frankly shocked to see the *Alfred Sun* endorsing Donald Trump for President. I find it quite perverse that after so many years of not endorsing any candidate, the *Sun* would choose this particular candidate, of all candidates, to endorse: a person who millions, including many stalwart conservatives and life-long members of the Republican party, consider the worst nominee of a major party in the entire history of the United States.

Donald Trump is manifestly unfit for the presidency. He is ignorant of political issues, foreign affairs and the constitution. He constantly lies, making the most absurd and outrageous claims—

e.g. that global warming is a hoax; that Barack Obama was not born in the US; that the election is rigged—for which he never produces a shred of evidence. He deliberately incites hatred, fear, distrust, and contempt directed toward various vulnerable groups, including Muslims, immigrants, Hispanics, African-Americans, women and gays. He will be the first major candidate for president not to release his taxes (although he said he would—another lie). He is also the first to say that he may not concede even if the vote goes against him: a clear indication of his contempt for democracy.

There is a reason why so many newspapers around the country that would normally en-

dorse the Republican candidate have refused to endorse Trump. They think, rightly, that someone so vulgar, narcissistic, unformed, and indifferent to the welfare of others would be a disaster for the country. A Trump presidency would also disgrace the US in the eyes of the world.

In your endorsement you argue that Hilary Clinton has been plagued by scandal. But some of the so-called "scandals" you mention, like the supposedly suspicious death of Vince Foster are entirely fabricated. To treat them as real is the sort of "journalism" that we expect from the worst tabloid gutter press, not from the *Alfred Sun*.

You mention that Trump opposes abortion, and offer this as a reason to support him. But this is an utterly specious argument. Trump has never opposed abortion until recently. Indeed, in previous elections he has regularly made donations to pro-choice candidates (including Hilary Clinton). It is perfectly obvious that he doesn't care a fig about the abortion issue. Clinton, on the other hand, has spent her life fighting against the sort of deprivations suffered by women that make unwanted pregnancies more likely and abortions less safe.

A signed letter giving reasons why people should vote for Trump would have been a fair statement of private opinion. But an unsigned editorial is objectionable since the use of "we" implies that to some extent the views expressed represent the community. This is especially disturbing at a time when Alfred University is engaged in a strenuous effort to make Alfred a more welcoming place to minorities. *The Alfred Sun* part of the face that this community shows to the world. It is shameful that this face should now be associated in anyone's mind with the ugly scowl of hate that is representative of Donald Trump's campaign.

Youth Services Program seeks young adults who want to work

BELMONT—Allegany County Employment & Training is currently seeking young adults who want to work but need a chance to prove themselves. The Youth Services Program provides job seeking assistance, training, paid work experience with employers and other services to eligible youth ages 16 – 24 who are not attending any school. “Employers say they want experience, but how can I get experience if no one will hire me?” This comment of frustration is often heard among young adults who have ambition and a desire to better themselves, but feel there are no opportunities in the local economy. Employment & Training helps connect young job-seekers with opportunities.

Local businesses and agencies can benefit from paid work experience by giving youth a six week training period while the program covers the young person’s wages and workers’ compensation insurance costs. A Job Developer will work with each employer before the work experience begins, to determine what qualifications and skills each youth will need to have to start and what skills will be developed during the experience. The Youth Services Coordinator will meet with interested youth to evaluate their current skill levels and determine what pre-training is most appropriate before the youth is interviewed by the employer.

During the work experience, Employment & Training will communicate with the employer and the youth to assess what skills are being learned by the youth and coach them in the finer points of meeting employer expectations. At the end of the work experience, newly-trained employees can be hired by the business or agency and the Coordinator will follow-up for a period of one year to offer ongoing support for job retention.

Saxons first E8 football team to achieve unbeaten season

ALFRED—The Alfred University football team defeated visiting St. John Fisher, 38-17, Saturday afternoon at Yunevich Stadium to win the Empire 8 Conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Division III championship tournament.

AU, ranked 14th in the nation, ended the season 10-0 (8-0 Empire 8), giving the Saxons their first undefeated regular season since the 1981 team finished with the same regular season mark. By defeating 18th-ranked Fisher, AU won the Empire 8 title outright and became the first team in league history to finish a season unbeaten.

Alfred outgained Fisher, 345 yard to 298, as Saxon senior quarterback Tyler Johnson (East Syracuse-Minoa) threw for four touchdowns and ran for another. The Saxon defense harassed Fisher quarterback Matt Naton, the league's leader in passer efficiency, all game long. Naton threw for 264 yards on 25-of-45 passing, but was sacked six times and intercepted twice.

Fisher (8-2, 6-2 E8) got on the scoreboard first, taking the opening kickoff and driving 81 yards in 11 plays, with Naton

tossing a 21-yard TD pass to William Coon 4:51 into the game. Alfred answered, going 68 yards in seven plays, as Johnson capped the drive with a 26-yard TD pass to junior tailback Maleke Fuentes (Olean) with 6:07 left in the opening frame.

The Saxons scored the next 17 points to take a commanding 24-7 lead early in the third. Johnson's one-yard run 1:27 into the second quarter ended a six-play drive that began after junior linebacker Shaquille Muscadin (Monsey/ Ramapo) intercepted Naton at the Fisher 34. Johnson's 41st rushing touchdown of his career broke the school record he shared with Hall of Fame tailback Jesse Raynor (1999-2003).

A 39-yard field goal by junior Trevor Monk (Liverpool) with 5:17 left in the half put the Saxons up 17-7. Fuentes returned the second-half kickoff from out of his own endzone 90 yards to the Fisher 10, and a penalty moved it to the Cardinal 5. Three plays later, Johnson connected with senior wide receiver Brendan Buisch (Hornell) on a nine-yard touchdown and AU led 24-7 1:44 into the third.

Fisher pulled to within 10

points on the Cardinals' ensuing drive, marching 71 yards in seven plays, with Naton tossing a nine-yard TD pass to James Flagler to make it 24-14 with 10:47 left in the third.

After the teams exchanged punts, Alfred took over at their own 27-yard line and two plays later, Johnson connected with Buisch on a 70-yard bomb that put the Saxons up 31-14 with 6:44 left in the third. Fisher drove deep into Saxon territory on its next drive, but settled for a 33-yard Devin Dzikowicz field goal with 2:47 left in the third to make it 31-17. AU closed out the scoring early in the fourth, driving 62 yards in nine plays before Johnson tossed a 17-yard TD to senior tight end Ralph Pagliei (Lake View/Orchard Park) 2:38 into the final frame.

Johnson completed 11 of 17 passes for 222 yards with four TDs and no interceptions. He also ran for a game-high 67 yards on 17 carries, while senior tailback Casey Bright (Pulaski) ran 14 times for 40 yards. Buisch finished with four receptions for 114 yards and a pair of scores. Pagliei caught three balls for 40 yards and junior wideout

Rodney Etienne (Spring Valley/Ramapo) had two catches for 31 yards.

Fisher was held to just 34 yards on the ground, with Tony Fusco running for a team-high 26 yards. Mike Collichio caught a game-high nine passes for 50 yards; Dylan Harrington caught five for 63; and Coon caught four for 57 and a TD.

Junior linebacker A.J. LiCata (Lake View/Frontier) had eight tackles (seven solo), including two for loss and a sack, while freshman linebacker Isaiah Moak (Averill Park) had eight (half-sack). Muscadin had five tackles (2 ½ for loss, one sack) to go with his interception, and freshman end Josh Rivers (Medford/Longwood), senior nose guard Zach Brinkley (Brockway, PA) and junior tackle Dave Carloni (Clifton Park/ Shendehowa) each had solo sacks. Freshman cornerback Shemar Hayes

(Rochester/Aquinas) had three tackles, two pass breakups and an interception.

Cross country men 6th, women 11th

Cross Country: Men's 6th, Women 11th at USCAA

The cross country team wrapped up the 2016 season with a successful performance at the USCAA Championships in Virginia Beach, VA. The men's team finished 6th while the women finished 11th.

Jacob Hanss (East Rochester) raced to USCAA All-American honors with a 13th place finish. He finished the 8k race in 26:41. Eric Hulbert (Mexico) was 29th (27:40), Kyle Glaub (West Seneca East) was 57th (29:00), Jesse Hallett (Honeoye) was 60th (29:13), and Joseph Kretschmar (Phoenix, AZ).

The Pioneers scored 209 in the event which featured 172 finishers and 22 teams that scored. SUNY Delhi won the championship with 46 points.

Lindsey Thiel (Liverpool) led the Lady Pioneers in the 6k course. She finished in 24:51 to earn 26th place. 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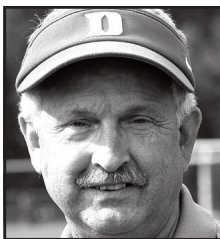
