

Alfred Sun Reporter SYRÁCUSE—The New York State Fair opened Thursday, August 23 for its 12 day run. I've never been to the fair and was a little intimidated by the fact there is parking for 24,000 cars on site. It was easy to find the parking areas and by using my EZPass I could park in an area that was close to the fair so I didn't have to use the shuttle buses provided.

The fair charges \$10 per adult to enter and tickets are available at Tops, Wegmans and other stores but not in our area. Even though people poured into the fairgrounds, ticket sales were quick at the main gate.

There are several permanent buildings as well as temporary

areas. It's pretty large and I'm going to blame my city upbring-

The fair had special days. Monday was Governor's Day but other special focus days include Senior Citizens, Law Enforcement, Gospel, Beef, Fire and Rescue and more.

It was impossible to miss Governor Andrew Cuomo since he was greeted by a crowd of demonstrators opposed to fracking. Some were dressed in "No Frack" T Shirts and many carried signs. They followed him chanting and singing during his entire visit though I didn't see any interaction between the Governor and any demonstrators but he did take time to visit with other people along the way and sampled some of the vendor food along the way.


There were vendors who manufacture in New York such as Saranac (beer and soda) as well as several wineries, honey vendors and a huge maple syrup store. Cutco Knives (Olean) were there but most of what I saw was made elsewhere.

is a major concern.



Constitution Day speaker set

ALFRED-Alfred University (AU) will mark Constitution Day 2012 by hosting a guest speaker who will focus on the Emancipation Proclamation.

The public is invited to hear Dr. Timothy J. Madigan, associate professor of philosophy at St. John Fisher College, Rochester, on Monday, Sept. 17, as he presents "Foreign Policy and the Emancipation Proclamation: Europe's Contribution to American Freedom" at 7 p.m. in the Knight Club, located in AU's Powell Campus Center. Admission is free.

There will be a door prize of

conclusion of the presentation, sponsored by the Alfred University Provost's Office.

Madigan, author of numerous books and articles, will discuss how Lincoln's Émancipation Proclamation helped to prevent both England and France from recognizing the Confederacy. He will also highlight the role played by Secretary of State William Seward in the manner in which the Proclamation was released to the world.

Constitution Day recognizes the adoption of the United States Constitution and those who are

historical value awarded at the American Citizens. Although similar holidays have been observed since 1911, it was not until 2004 that a law officially establishing the holiday was created. Constitution Day always occurs on Sept. 17, although it may be observed on another date if Sept. 17 falls on a weekend or another holiday.

Many educational institutions observe Constitution Day by presenting videos about the United States Constitution, distributing Constitution memorabilia, and hosting Constitution-themed fairs and websites.





This simple recipe is from the cookbook A Taste of Georgia published by the Newman Junior Service League of Newman, Geor-

Dill Pickles

For each 1 quart jar: small cucumbers, washed 1 garlic clove 1 stalk celery Brine: 1 c. salt

1 green pepper, cut into fourths

1 tsp. mustard seed

1 hot pepper

1 quart vinegar 1 T. dill seed

2 quarts water Put whole cucumbers into 4 quart jars. Add to each jar the garlic, celery, and green pepper, cut into fourths. Make brine of salt, water, and vinegar and boil with dill for 5 minutes. Add 1 tsp. mustard seed and 1/4 hot pepperto each jar. Pour hot brine over pickles in jars and seal immediately. Ready in 6 weeks.

The historical association is known as Baker's Bridge because that is the original name of our hamlet. Alfred Station is all of the Town of Alfred, minus the Village of Alfred. "Downtown" Alfred Station has one street--Main Street--which is about one block long. It could be said that Alfred Station has a suburb - a

stretch following Main Street known as Tinkertown. The rest is farm land and woods. We maintain a building referred to as The Meeting House, located at 5971 Hamilton Hill Rd., just off Rte. 21 in Alfred Station.

The mission of the Association is to discover and collect material which may help to establish the history of the area, to provide for the preservation of such materials, to assist in the preservation of historical buildings and to disseminate historical information in cooperation

From September through May, we hold monthly meetings with guest speakers drawn from our membership as well as from other historical societies. Topics range from local and state history to architecture, collectibles and antiques, and early and modern crafts and technologies.

Our September meeting will commence at 7:30 p.m. at the "Meeting House" on Monday, Sept. 17. 



Burling against EPA expanding jurisdiction

Assemblyman Daniel J. Burling (R,C-Warsaw) Tuesday called upon national leaders to oppose the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) efforts to expand its jurisdiction over private lands through the Clean Water Act (CWA).

The EPA is seeking, through the CWA, to change its policy to expand regulation of "waters of the U.S." This could give the EPA authority to mandate permits for work on ditches, seasonal waterways, standing water in farm fields and many other wet spots which were never intended to be regulated under the CWA. The CWA was created specifically to regulate environmental concerns in "navigable waterways."

"The EPA believes it has the right and the need to involve itself in the lives of farmers and private citizens. Although the Supreme Court has already decried this federal organization for involving itself too far into states' and localities' concerns, the EPA still is pushing for changes in its policy, which would give it unmitigated powers, without congressional approval or oversight, in the day-to-day operations of our farms and private property," said Burling.

The amount of regulations and red tape our farmers and citizens have to cut through to make an honest living is frightening. Now, a federal organization wants to unilaterally attack farmers with more regulations, permits and fees. It is inappropriate for the EPA to so forcibly try to entrench itself in the day-today operations of our local farmers; and it is insulting that federal organizations believe that farmers are willing to damage the local environment. A healthy environment is conducive to a healthy harvest. Our local farmers don't need any more regulations on one of the most honorable, important and oldest industries in America's history," said Burling.

The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance, led by retired Army Specialist Fourth Class John Harrington, of Angelica. It is greatly appreciated.

Privilege of the Floor was granted to Tom Green, of the Town of Allen, who gave a presentation about the 2012 Angelica Civil War Weekend that will be held on September 22nd and 23rd. In addition to the Encampment and Living History Scenarios there will be downtown street battles throughout the weekend. One highlight will be a Sunday afternoon (2:30 pm) concert featuring the Houghton College Philharmonia and College Choir. There will be a unique outdoor performance of Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture that will include Church bells and Civil War era cannon. Other period music will be performed along with spoken narratives. Privilege of the Floor was also granted to Genesee River Wilds Director Christina Hedstrom. She presented a new brochure describing the recreational opportunities that are being developed by Genesee River Wilds. The Genesee River and Genesee Valley Greenway are now part of a unique recreational corridor known as the "Triple Divide" extending from Rochester to Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Consider taking advantage of the opportunities for hiking, fishing, kayaking, bicycling, canoeing, bird-watching, and viewing some breathtaking scenery. What a beautiful region we live in.

During the business portion of this session the Board considered 10 different resolutions. At the request of Public Health Director Lori Ballengee the Board approved Resolution 116-12 creating a full-time nurse practitioner position in the Health Department. Under Lori's capable leadership the Family Planning Program has turned a \$46,835 loss in 2009 into a \$49,879 surplus in 2011. Creation of the full-time Nurse Practitioner position will help make that program more self-supporting, and should reduce expenses for other departments and programs. Resolution 117-12 accepted State funding from the NYS Crime Victims Board, set the salary for our Crime Victims Coordinator, and appropriated appropriate funding to the District Attorney accounts. Resolutions 118-12 through 121-12 transferred funds between different accounts in various agencies and departments. Resolution 122-12 approved an agreement with Aldrich & Cox, Inc., for risk management and employee benefit consulting services

Resolution 123-12 approved an agreement with Conxx, Inc., to provide for a study and recommendations concerning the County's 911 System and Point of Presence facility. The cost will be \$14,750. This study will analyze county needs, existing facilities, and options for providing high-speed broadband services throughout the County. This study will hopefully provide a roadmap for development of new technology and services to serve residents and businesses, as well as government, schools and medical institutions. The timing fits well with a new grant program recently announced by New York State.

Resolution 124-12 authorized an engineering study for the closed bridge on County Route 46 in Caneadea. The study requires special engineering qualifications that county personnel do not possess. Hopefully this will enable the County to determine what must be done to safely re-open this historic bridge. Resolution 125-12 approved the sale of six 2012 Tax Sale properties.

Following the close of the regular session a special "Committee of the Whole" meeting was convened to discuss personnel matters for specific employees. It was conducted as an "executive session." Over the coming weeks we will conduct numerous special committee meetings and other sessions related to development and approval of the 2013 Budget.



ALFRED-Since the 2010 earthquake in Haiti, 64 Alfred State students in the College's veterinary technology, building trades, and nursing programs have traveled to Haiti to volunteer and learn as part of the College's widely-recognized project-based learning initiative. 

ALFRED—There will be a public closing reception for "Colorscapes," an exhibition in University's (AU) Schein-Joseph International Museum of Ceramic Art, Binns-Merrill Hall, today (Thursday, Sept. 6), from 4:30-6:30 p.m.

In conjunction with the exhibit, William Carty, John F. McMahon Professor and chair of the Ceramic Engineering Department in AU's Kazuo Inamori School of Engineering, will present "Color: The Happy Accident that Begs to be Studied," on Monday, Sept. 10, at 4:30 p.m. in Binns-Merrill Hall, room

Carty writes: "After form, the color of the ceramic glaze is arguably the critical esthetic. Color can be elusive, however, particularly in ancient ceramics where the results were sometimes described as 'Happy Accidents.' Of the three principle (modern) routes to obtaining color in glazes, the color that is dependent on the complex interaction between chemistry and kiln atmosphere is the most intriguing."

Colorscapes," curated by Kala Stein, Alfred University class of 2009, opened last spring in the Binns-Merrill Hall museum. The exhibit will remain open through Friday, Sept. 14.

'Colorscapes" surveys color ancestry in ceramics, focusing on three prominent colors in ce-

The exhibit includes pieces from the museum's collection and additional pieces borrowed from contemporary ceramic artists Linda Cordell '95, William DePauw, Gerit Grimm '04, Bryan Hopkins, Nicholas Kripal, Forrest Lesch-Middelton '98, and John Williams.

In 2011, Stein was named one of the Top 10 Emerging Artists by Ceramics Monthly and was noted for her innovations with non-traditional mold techniques. She exhibits her work locally and nationally and she is currently exploring curatorial projects. She earned a bachelor of fine arts degree from the State University of New York at New

The Schein-Joseph International Museum of Ceramic Art is a teaching and research center. It houses nearly 8,000 ceramic and glass objects, ranging from pottery shards recovered from ancivilizations cient contemporary sculptures, installation pieces and advanced ceramics. The museum features a permanent collection of graduate thesis ceramics created by Alfred-educated ceramists, many of whom have gone on to earn international recognition.

Fosdick-Nelson to host reception

ALFRED-Alfred University's Fosdick-Nelson Gallery, Harder Hall, will host a public opening reception for "Reading Through Beuys," a collection of various media by or about the late German artist Joseph Beuys, from 7-9 p.m., Friday, Sept. 7.

The exhibition, which will run through Friday, Oct. 12, features a collection of books, posters, videos, postcards, interviews, and mass-media images by or about Beuys.

Also included are contemporary works produced in response to Beuys works by Shannah Burton, Eberhard Kranemann, Emil Schult, David Sylvian, Caroline Tisdall, Stephen Vitiello, and John Zorn.

The exhibit is curated by Andrew Deutsch, AU professor of sonic and video in the Expanded Media Department. Deutsch earned a master of fine arts degree in integrated electronic art from the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, and a bachelor of fine arts degree in video art and printmaking from Alfred University.

Beuys was active in Europe and the United States from the 1950s through the early 1980s. He came to be loosely associated with that era's international, proto-Conceptual art movement, Fluxus. Bueys's diverse body of work ranges from traditional

media of drawing, painting, and sculpture, to process-oriented, or time-based "action" art. Beuys is especially famous for works incorporating animal fat and felt, two common materials – one organic, the other fabricated or industrial - that had profound personal meaning to the artist.

The Fosdick-Nelson Gallery housed in the School of Art & Design, is a vibrant learning center for the visual arts. Rotating exhibitions highlight work by established and emerging artists working in New York, the United States, and abroad. Located in rural western New York, the Gallery is the only established contemporary art venue within a 60-mile radius for the community to experience a diverse mix of art firsthand and participate in an exciting forum of contemporary art and culture. Extended programming, including gallery lectures and special projects, gives students and members of the community an opportunity to engage with artists, curators, and scholars.

Graeve opens Bergren Forum today

ALFRED—Olivia Graeve, professor of materials science and engineering in Alfred University's Kazuo Inamori School of Engineering, will open the fall 2012 semester of Bergren Forum offerings with "Nanomaterials: It's a Small World After All." Her talk will begin at 12:10 p.m. today (Thursday, Sept. 6) in AU's Nevins Theater, Powell Campus Center. All are welcome free of charge.

Graeve explains: "Over the past three decades, nanomaterials have been the subject of enormous interest. These materials, notable for their extremely small size, have the potential for use in wide-ranging applications, from extraordinarily tiny electronic devices, including miniature batteries, to biomedical uses, and as packaging films, superabsorbants, components of armor, and parts of automobiles.

"Nanomaterials are not simply another step in miniaturization," says Graeve, "but a different arena entirely; the nanoworld lies midway between the scale of atomic/quantum phenomena and the scale of bulk materials. This talk will provide an introduction to the behavior of nanomaterials, as well as presenting the state-of-the-art in nanomaterials discoveries.'

Graeve has built one of the largest research groups on campus, involving both undergraduate and graduate students in her projects. As a researcher, she has earned the respect of her colleagues at Alfred University, and elsewhere.

In 2011, Graeve was awarded the Jaime Oaxaca Award by the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers, a national recognition given annually for 'selfless and outstanding contributions to the fields of engineering and science to the Hispanic community over an extended period of time." In 2010, the American Ceramic Society presented her the Karl Schwartzwalder Professional Achievement in Ceramic Engineering Award.

Graeve holds a doctoral degree in materials science and engineering from the University of California-Davis and a bachelor of science degree in structural engineering from the University of California-San Diego.

One Time, One Meeting

The Practice of Zen Meditation

TRUE EQUANIMITY

One morning earlier this summer, I found myself standing atop an unstable blue object known as a BOSU Ball. Invented by David Weck in 1999, the BOSU Balance Trainer is an inflatable rubber hemisphere attached to a rigid platform. The central component of what BOSU Fitness calls a "mindful approach to exercise," the BOSU Ball is designed to improve the body's sense of balance while strengthening its stabilizing muscles. I was standing on the BOSU Ball because I'd been having knee pain, and our family doctor had recommended physical therapy. In turn, the affable but demanding physical therapist with whom I was working had prescribed the BOSU Ball. "Don't fall off," he cheerfully warned, having just assigned me thirty squats. Miraculously, I managed to comply.

In a manner analogous to that of the BOSU Ball, Zen practice also aims to strengthen our sense of balance, physical and emotional. In Zen teachings, the capacity to maintain one's equilibrium, especially under stressful, uncertain, and unstable conditions, is known as *equanimity*, a translation of the Sanskrit word *upeksha*. The traditional posture of sitting meditation—knees down, back erect, head balanced on the spine—supports the cultivation of *upeksha*, as does the practice of walking meditation, which trains the practitioner to walk with dignity and steady awareness. But these forms and practices, however essential to Zen discipline, are but the outward expressions of an inner poise. And at the heart of that inner poise is a balanced, inclusive way of experiencing the world.

In his explanation of *upeksha*, Zen master Thich Nhat Hanh examines the roots of the term and its deeper implications:

[Upeksha] means equanimity, nonattachment, nondiscrimination, even-mindedness, or letting go. Upa means "over," and iksh means "to look." You climb the mountain to be able to look over the whole situation, not bound by one side or the other. If your love has attachment, discrimination, prejudice, or clinging in it, it is not true love. People who do not understand Buddhism sometimes think upeksha means indifference, but true equanimity is neither cold nor indifferent. If you have more than one child, they are all your children. Upeksha does not mean that you don't love. You love in a way that all your children receive your love, without discrimination.

As is evident from this explanation, the word equanimity means more than remaining calm under pressure, though calm is a part of it. True equanimity is grounded in a fundamental opening of the heart and mind. It arises from and is sustained by a radically egalitarian social attitude.

Upeksha is one of four such attitudes in Buddhist teachings, the other three being loving-kindness (metta), compassion (karuna), and sympathetic joy (mudita). Known as the four Immeasurable Minds, these attitudes may be developed through daily, systematic practice. Specific methods vary according to content, but their general form remains essentially the same. We begin by focusing on ourselves ("May I be balanced and at peace") and from there proceed to address a loved one, an acquaintance, a stranger, an enemy, and "all sentient beings." Simplifying that sequence, Pema Chodron recommends, for equanimity, a three-stage recitation: "May I dwell in the great equanimity free from passion, aggression, and prejudice. May you dwell in the great equanimity free from passion, aggression, and prejudice. May all beings enjoy the great equanimity free from passion, aggression, and prejudice." "It is always fine," she adds, "to use your own words."

It is indeed fine—and perhaps preferable—to use one's own words, but where equanimity is concerned, we must be careful not to misinterpret the quality we are attempting to cultivate. As Thich Nhat Hanh notes above, true equanimity is not a cold indifference to others' suffering. Nor is equanimity a passive, see-no-evil neutrality. As the Zen teacher Norman Fischer puts it, equanimity is an "active, loving, eyes-wide-open regard for all beings—equally." The practice of equanimity does not oblige us to regard Hitler and Neville Chamberlain as moral equivalents—or, to take a contemporary example, to view the actions of Bashar Al-Assad and his political opponents as equally culpable. What it does demand is that we remain, in Fischer's words, "fully present, fully alive, right in the middle of things," and that we meet even the most adverse situation with a warm, calm, and balanced attitude. Far from encouraging a callous detachment or false neutrality, the practice of equanimity fosters empathy for our fellow human beings, including those we most dislike, while allowing us to retain our personal integrity.

For most of us, that is a formidable challenge, but the potential rewards are no less considerable. In Buddhist teachings, equanimity is regarded as the highest of the Four Immeasurable Minds. It is said to perfect and consummate the other three. In his essay "Toward a Threshold of Understanding," the American Buddhist monk Bhikku Bodhi describes equanimity as "a state of inner equipoise that cannot be upset by gain and loss, honor and dishonor, praise and blame, pleasure and pain." Brought to fruition in the fullness of time, equanimity establishes an "unshakeable freedom of mind," emancipating the practitioner from "all points of self-reference" and "the demands of the ego-self," which tug us this way and that. No longer in thrall to those demands, we come to embody what Thich Nhat Hanh has called the "wisdom of non-discrimination," which dissolves prejudicial attitudes and removes erected boundaries between ourselves and others. Should we eventually attain that wisdom, we will not only have restored our equilibrium and secured our emotional footing. We will also have brought a humane, equanimous perspective into our everyday lives.

GENEVA-Vintage wooden boats from the Finger Lakes Boating Museum will be on display along with vintage race cars at Watkins Glen International Sept. 7-9.

For the first time, the Boating Museum is participating in the Glenora Wine Cellars U.S. Vintage Grand Prix Presented by Welliver. The Glenora event at the race track is held in conjunction with the weekend Grand Prix Festival in the Village of Watkins Glen.

Since 1993 the Grand Prix Festival of Watkins Glen has celebrated the village's history of motor racing.

Mike Eckert, Manager of Partnership Sales at Watkins Glen International, explained that this year the Glenora event was expanded to include vintage boats and planes as well as the cars. The race track is working on a plane display with the Glenn Curtiss Museum in Hammondsport.

The Boating Museum will display the following boats at the race track:

INBOARDS - 1931 Penn Yan Imperial; 1950 Penn Yan Clipper; 1952 Morehouse Utility;

CANOE - Penn Yan Guide ROWBOATS - 1905 Sutherland double ender fishing boat; 1930s Mitchel trout boat.

"Motor racing and boating are both very significant in the heritage of the Finger Lakes and we are pleased to take part in the Watkins Glen celebration by showing boats from our collection," said Vince Scalise, Boating Museum president.

The Grand Prix Festival in the village includes the Walk of Fame Award Ceremony, a historical lecture and a judged auto show. The highlight is a tribute to the original Grand Prix course that wound through village streets. This tribute is open to selected cars participating in the Glenora Vintage Grand Prix taking place at the nearby Watkins Glen International race course. Different classes of cars race all weekend at the track.

The building, which will be located on the current Geneva Chamber of Commerce site, is being enabled by a \$2-million grant provided to the city by state Sen. Michael Nozzolio and a \$450,000 grant to the city through the Regional Economic Development Council initiative. Construction is scheduled to begin this September.

The Boating Museum has assembled a collection of more than 100 wooden boats built in the Finger Lakes over the past 100 years, as well as numerous related artifacts and extensive reference material. Portions of the collection will be displayed on a rotating basis within the new facility, but President Vince Scalise emphasized that there will be a lot more to the museum

than viewing boats because education, restoration and preservation are the key elements of the museum's mission.

Also featured will be boat rides on Seneca Lake, active onwater programs including sailing and small boat handling, interactive workshops and displays to engage visitors in the design and construction of boats and boating history materials and programs.

The boating museum is a 501c3 not-for-profit corporation and was chartered by the New York State Department of Education in 1997 to "research, document, preserve and share the boating history of the Finger Lakes region."



To read Civil War letters

ALMOND: The one hundred fifty-year old Civil War letters of a Fremont couple will be presented in dramatic reading fashion by Ken and Leah Corey of Bath at the Sunday, Sept. 16 Almond Historical Society Open House at 3 p.m.

A special guest at the meeting will be Helen Kelly Brink, president of the Steuben County Historical Society and great-granddaughter of John McIntosh Kelly and Maryett Babcock Kelly, whose letters the Corevs will read.

Mrs. Brink offers this insight into the letters in the foreword to her book, I Thought It My Duty To Go To My Country's Call: "Unlike today when it's comparatively easy to keep in touch with military personnel fighting our country's battles, letters had to serve this purpose during the Civil War. My great grandparents had been married less than three years and had a nineteen months old son when great grandfather enlisted in August 1862. During the next two years and ten months they wrote letters to each other, sometimes every day. These letters, which had been carefully saved by the family, eventually came into my possession. Realizing their historic value and the fact that many had already become very hard to read, I knew that their further preservation required action. Therefore, I began the sometimes difficult task of deciphering the letters and typing them into my computer. I copied them exactly as they were written including the spelling, punctuation and grammatical errors.

"Because of my involvement with the Steuben County Historical Society in Bath, Steuben County, New York, I had determined from the beginning of this project that the diary and the actual letters, many still in their envelopes, would be donated to the Society for placement in its archives. When the Society's curator heard about this forthcoming donation and my dilemma about what to do with the copies I'd made, he suggested that I put it all into a book. He allowed that even though much had already been published about the Civil War and its soldiers, another account about a Steuben County soldier and his family and friends might be a welcome addition. I hope he's right!" Mrs. Brink writes.

Ken and Leah Corey describe their relationship as a "match made in heaven". They are both retired registered nurses who then started their own respective businesses. Leah creates wearable art from glass beads in her aMEUSEments Studio (www.volksbeads.com) and Ken restores air-cooled Volkswagens!

They both also have a life-long love of theater. In fact they have 90 years of combined theater experience between the two of them, with their experience ranging from set design/construction to costume design to performing many lead roles.

They were thrilled to be presented with an opportunity to dramatically interpret letters written during the Civil War, especially letters written by a couple from Steuben County. Ken observed that he and Leah enjoy performing because for an hour or so they can become another person, and in this case it is John McIntosh Kelly and Maryett Babcock Kelly from Fremont, NY.

The presentation will be given in the meeting room of the 1830s Hagadorn House, located at the corner of Karrdale Avenue and Main Street, at the village's only traffic light. The Hagadorn House will be open from 2 to 5 p.m. for tours, as will the new office/archives building adjacent to the museum, according to Lee A. Ryan, AHS president. Chinese music to be featured Sept. 14

ALFRED-The Division of Performing Arts and the Confucius Institute at Alfred University (AU) are teaming up to co-host an evening of Chinese music at Miller Theater on Friday, Sept. 14 at 7 p.m.

Earlier in the day, at 3 p.m., there will be a workshop on Chinese music in Room 302 of the Miller Performing Arts Center. Both events are free and open to the public.

The evening performance will include musicians from Alfred University, Binghamton University (State University of New York, SUNY), and the Chinese Music Ensemble of New York City. Founded in 1961, The New York ensemble is the oldest and largest Chinese orchestra in the United States.

The afternoon workshop will be presented by Zhang Hong, senior instructor of Chinese at Binghamton University and founder and director of Song of Silk, a performance group that aims to bridge East and West.

An active soloist, Zhang has participated in many concerts and groups, including the Shanghai Philharmonic Society, the Milwaukee Symphony Chorus, the Milwaukee Chamber Orchestra, the Symphony Orchestra of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and Eastern Silk.

Zhang gives lectures and recitals on Chinese vocal music and culture and workshops on Teaching Chinese through Song nationwide.

She earned a master of music degree in voice performance from Binghamton University and a bachelor of music degree in voice performance from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Zhang has received SUNY awards for Excellence in Teaching and been recognized for Outstanding Contribution in Chinese Language Education from the Chinese Language Teachers Association. In addition to Zhang, the evening program will include Wu Zhongbei (Daisy), a Guzheng (Chinese zither) artist and instructor in the Confucius Institute at Alfred University.

Wu is an associate professor of the art center of Hunan University of Commerce. She is an examiner of the National Guzheng Performance-level Examination in China and the deputy chair of the Guzheng Branch of the Hunan Province Musicians Asso-

She earned a master of art degree in musicology from the Graduate School of the Chinese National Academy of Arts and a bachelor of arts degree in music education from the Hunan Normal University. She has received multiple excellence in teaching awards.

Joining Zhang and Wu on the

program will be Hu Jianbing, a traditional Chinese wind musician. He has earned wide recognition for his artistry as a sheng soloist and composer.

Upon graduating from the Chinese Central Conservatory of Music, he joined the National Traditional Orchestra of China. He performs regularly with the legendary Yo-Yo Ma and the Silk Road Ensemble, and has premiered concertos with many orchestras, most recently with the Seattle Symphony.

In 1998, he moved to New York and founded the Chinese Performing Arts of North America. Said the Boston Globe of Hu's recent work, "he has an impressive command of the sheng and a broad range of classical, folk, and modern musical litera-

Also on the evening's program is Bao Jian, a graduate of the Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing who has gained attention as a performer of the guanzi, a double-reed folk instrument of ancient Chinese origin. His numerous awards include the 1998 Pro Musicis International Award and First Prize in the 1995 "International Chinese Ethnic Instrumental Competition" in Beijing.

With knowledge of classical and folk Chinese music, Bao is also acclaimed as a major innovator of contemporary works. UNESCO chose his recording of the song of "Three Layers of Yang Guan" to be internationally published. His performance of "Lin Li" concerto with the Hong

Kong Philharmonic Orchestra set new standards for the guanzi. He is currently an artistic director of the Chinese Performing Arts of North America.

It is part of an international network of Confucius Institutes dedicated to promoting the study of Chinese language, culture, ethics, and philosophy, and furthers the understanding of China today.



Dig up the dirt, test your soil pH

ALLEGANY COUNTY--Did you know, the best time to test your soil and adjust its pH level is NOW, in the fall, NOT in the spring! Any amendments you add to your soil can take up to 6 months to work their magic (i.e., lime or sulphur).

Cornell University Cooperative Extension Master Gardeners are hosting fall pH clinics starting Sept. 15.

Your soil pH number is linked to how vigorously your plants will grow. Most gardens flourish in the range of 6.0-7.0, slight acidic to neutral. Many of us lucky enough to be within this range won't have to add lime or sulphur to our soils.

Many soils in Allegany County range in the mid to high 5.0's (slightly acidic); the parent materials our soil is made from influences this number. This means soils that have not had amendments, such as compost, leaves, lawn clippings, etc., routinely added may require an addition of lime to meet the minimal neutral

pH also affects what nutrients the plant can take up in its' roots. When pH is high (over 7.0) iron, manganese, copper and zinc in the soil become unavailable to plants. Conversely, when pH is low (below 6.0) calcium, phosphorus, and magnesium become unavailable. The nutrient may still be in the soil, however it is bound up in the soil due to the pH and the plant cannot use it.

Have your soil tested to see if you need to add lime or sulphur to adjust the pH and see your garden respond next year!

Instructions For Taking A Soil Sample For the pH Clinic

First determine how many samples to take. Different gardens/ beds, lawns, areas with different soil types, areas where amendments such as limestone were added, areas with plants having different pH requirements, good/bad areas, etc. should be sampled separately.

Individual samples should be taken from the upper 6 to 8 inches of soil.

Each soil sample is comprised of 5 to 10 individual samples obtained by walking back and forth diagonally across the area or randomly chosen throughout the area to be sampled.

Use a trowel to dig a small hole to the desired depth (6-8"). Remove a slice of soil from the entire side of the hole and place this in a clean plastic container after removing any grass,

Repeat this procedure at each of the 5 to 10 random spots and place the soil from these spots in the same container.

Mix the soil thoroughly in the bucket; wearing clean gloves will reduce contamination of the soil sample.

Next remove two 8 ounce cupfuls of the soil in the container and place this in a plastic bag. If the soil sample is overly moist, allow to dry a few days. Secure the bag. This is your soil

8. Mark the outside of the bag with an identification (i.e. #1, #2, or "A", "B", or "East", "West", Upper Garden, Perennial Flowerbed, etc.). Keep the identification simple and something

Repeat this entire procedure for each additional garden, landscape bed, lawn, etc.



AU swim teams offer lessons


