## Focus on the Collection

Ellen Shankin is often referred to as one of the outstanding functional potters in the United States today. Only a glance at her work tells you why. Not only are her forms beautiful with the harmonious application of stunning glazes, but the pieces are also user friendly and reasonably priced Although our Roger D. Corsaw Collection of Functional American Ceramics already included an Ellen Shankin covered casserole. and a butter/sugar/creamer set, the Museum opted to purchase this handsome pitcher from the Farrell Collection Gallery exhibit at Chicago International New Art Forms

Exposition at Navy Pier last Sep-

tember. A similar pitcher with an ash plaze was awarded first place in the Seventh Annual San Anaelo Na-1992. Ellen received a B.F.A. with College of Ceramics at Alfred in 1977. Her home and studio are located in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia.
