In the above course Young Ladies will be expected to take French and Italian instead of Latin, unless they prefer the Latin.

Those completing this course satisfactory to the Board of Examiners, and possessing a good moral character, will receive a Diploma, signed by the Principal and President of the Board of Trustees, under the corporate seal of the Academy.

Students not having completed the prescribed course, will receive commendations as Teachers, when they evince the requisite qualifications, and aptitude for teaching, but no professor is allowed to give such commendations, till a student has spent at least one term in the regular course of instruction in this Institution.

Department of Languages.

LATIN—*Text Books.*—Arnold's course of Reading, Bullion's Grammar, Bullion's Reader, Cæsar's Commentaries, Anthon's Cicero's Orations, Anthon's Sallust, Cooper's Virgil, Folsom's Livy, Anthon's Horace, Kingsley's Tacitus, Cicero de Officiis, Cicero de Oratore, Terrence, Juvenal, Leverett's Lexicon.

GREEK—*Text Books.*—Arnold's course of Reading, Bullion's Grammar, Anthon's Lessons, Anthon's Reader, Wilson's Testament, Cleaveland's Xenophon's Anabasis, Packard's Xenophon's Mem., Felton's Iliad, Grove's Lexicon.

SYMBIARY.—Adam's Roman Antiquities, Porter's Grecian Antiquities, Butler's Ancient Geography, and Atlas, Anthon's Classical Dictionary.

ITALIAN.—Craglia's Dictionary, Nuovo Testamento, Gerusalemme Liberatta, Vergani's Grammar.

FRENCH.—Boyer's Dictionary, Levizac's Grammar, Girault's Vie de Washington, Charles the twelfth, L'Historic des Etats Unis, Le Brun's Telemaque, Bolmar's Conversational Phrases, Girault's French Guide.

Department of Mathematics.

Text Books.—Those enumerated in the course for teachers, and Hassler's Theoretical Arithmetic, Davies' Bourdon's and Hackley's Algebras, Davies' Differential and Integral Calculus, Davies' Descriptive Geometry, Davies' Analytical Geometry, Farrar's Topography.

Department of Natural Science.

Most of the Text Books usually used in this department have been enumerated in connection with the teacher's department.

Department of Moral Science.

Text Books.—Paley's Natural Theology, Butler's Analogy, Wayland's Moral Science, Stewart's Mental Philosophy.

Department of Vocal Music.

Those wishing to become scholars in vocal music will have the opportunity of studying it under the instruction of an accomplished and experienced teacher, by taking it up as a regular study, the same as any other department of science.

Ladies' Department.

Ladies recite in classes with gentlemen as far as they are pursuing the same branches. All needful facilities for acquiring a knowledge of the polite and ornamental branches of education will be furnished.

Section II.

ACADEMIC TERMS.

The Academic year for 1847-8 consists of three terms, as follows :

The First, commencing Tuesday, August 10th, 1847, and ending Thursday, November 18th, 1847.

The Second, commencing Tuesday, November 30th, 1847, and ending Thursday, March 10th, 1848.

The Third, commencing Tuesday, March 22d, 1848, and ending Thursday, June 30th, 1848.

As the classes are arranged at the commencement of the term, it is very desirable that students purposing to attend the institution, should then be present; and as the plan of instruction laid out for each class, will require the entire term for its completion, it is of the utmost importance that students should continue till the close of the term, and accordingly, no student will be admitted for any length of time less than a term, extraordinary excepted.

Students prepared to enter classes already in operation, can be admitted at any time in term.

The entire expenses for an Academic Year, including board, washing, lights, fuel and tuition, (except the extras above named) need not exceed seventy-five dollars.

The expenses for board and tuition must be settled in advance, at the commencement of each term, either by actual payment, or satisfactory arrangement.

Section IV.

ACCOMMODATIONS.

The main buildings of the Institution consist of the North Hall, occupied exclusively by gentlemen, under the immediate supervision of one of the teachers; the South Hall, occupied exclusively by ladies, under the immediate supervision of the Preceptress; the Middle Hall, occupied by the Principals and their families, and also for a Boarding Hall; and the West Hall, occupied by students who board themselves, under the supervision of a family.

Ample Lecture and Recitation rooms are provided in each of the Halls.

Students board in the Hall with the Professors and their families, who are responsible for furnishing good board, and for the order of the Dining Hall. Each room for those who board in the Hall, is furnished with a bed and bedding, a table, two chairs, and a pail.

A number of private families accommodate a few boarders.

Section V.

FACILITIES.

Apparatus.

The Apparatus of this Institution is sufficiently ample to illustrate successfully the fundamental principles of the different departments of Natural Science.

A MANIKIN of the most approved structure, and a large amount of other apparatus in illustration of Human Physiology and Anatomy, have been imported from Paris, expressly for this Institution. This enables the student in these highly important and interesting branches of science, to pursue his studies with advantages nearly equal to those afforded by the dissection of an actual subject, having this further advantage of being divested of all those revolting circumstances ever attendant on the dissecting room.

Lectures.

Courses of Lectures on Natural and Moral Science each term of the year.

A course of Lectures on Chemistry will be commenced at the beginning of each fall term, and continue to its close, accompanied by a complete course of experiments.

Daily Lectures on School Teaching during the fall and winter terms.

Section VI.

A D M I S S I O N .

Candidates for admission into this Institution must present testimonials of good moral character, and be willing to comply, unreservedly, with the following

Regulations.

1st. No student will be excused to leave town, except to visit home, unless by the express wish of such student's parent or guardian.

2d. Punctuality in attending to all regular academic exercises, will be required.

3d. The use of tobacco for chewing or smoking, can not be allowed either within or about the academic buildings.

4th. Playing at games of chance, or using profane language, can not be permitted.

5th. Passing from room to room by students during the regular hours of study, or after the ringing of the first bell each evening, can not be permitted.

6th. Gentlemen will not be allowed to visit the rooms of ladies, nor ladies gentlemen's rooms, except in cases of sickness, and then it must not be done without permission previously obtained from one of the Principals.

7th. The use of any kind of alcoholic drinks, can not be permitted, unless prescribed, in case of sickness, by a regular Physician.

8th. Good order must be maintained at all times, in all the rooms and halls of the Institution, and in all the intercourse of students with each other.

9th. All students are required to retire as early as 10 o'clock p. m., and to rise as early as 5 a. m., unless in case of ill health, it shall be rendered inexpedient to do so.

10th. Any room occupied by students, will at all times be subject to the visitation of the Teachers of the Institution, who are required to see that the regulations are complied with.

11th. Entire decorum will be expected of every student at all academic exercises. These are: 1st. Chapel exercises each morning through the term, 2d. Regular recitations, 3d. Compositions and declamations, 4th. Lectures, Literary, Scientific and Moral, 5th. Meetings of Literary Societies.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

Students will be expected;

1st. To keep their own rooms in order. 2d. Not to throw anything out at the windows. 3d. Not to lounge upon their beds. 4th. Not to damage any of the furniture of their rooms beyond ordinary wear with fair usage. 5th. To repair to the meals regularly at the ringing of the bell at regular hours, which will be announced at the commencement of the term. 6th. To take such seats at the table as shall be respectively assigned to each one. 7th. To touch nothing on the table till the honors of the table are performed. 8th. Not to leave the table, except by excuse, until all are regularly dismissed, and then to leave the dining-hall in the same order as each may be seated at the table. 9th. Not to visit the kitchen or dining hall other than at meal times. Nor the wash room, except at stated times to bring or receive clothes, or in procuring warm water for cleaning rooms, &c.

Section VII.

N O T I C E .

This Institution has a quiet and retired location, six miles south of Almond, and thirteen miles south-east of Angelica.

The primary object of this Institution, is the qualification of School Teachers. Teachers' classes are exercised in teaching, under the immediate supervision of their respective teachers, combining all the facilities of a Normal School. It has sent out not less than one hundred and fifty teachers annually for the three past years, a number much larger than from any other Institution in the State.

The plan of instruction aims at a complete development of all the moral, intellectual and physical powers of students, in a manner to render them thorough and practical scholars, prepared to meet the great responsibilities of active life.

The Trustees would take this opportunity to assure the public that no exertion shall be wanting on their part, to make the Institution worthy of the very extensive patronage that it has hitherto received.
